This issue is completely without the censorship that Charles usually enforces upon me—to keep me in line, you know. (I should have played dirty, and thrown in all the editorial opinions he has made me file in the wastebasket through the years!)

It's funny that lots of people consider weekly newspapers as arch rivals, fighting one another tooth and nail. For us, the newspapers in the surrounding towns are the best friends we have and each of us stands ready to help the other whenever we can. We do lots of borrowing, trading and buying from one another.

It's been a long time—before Gaston and Lottie Owens were in Quitaque—but one week I set several galleys of type for the Quitaque paper on our linotype and took it to them when they were in a bind. We even printed the Quitaque paper in our shop for three weeks one time. We printed the Turkey paper in our shop for five years.

One Thursday morning early, Edgar Hays and Willis Reynolds (Edgar has since sold his interest in the Lockney paper to Jim Reynolds) called to say that they had a press breakdown before they finished their second run. Willis had run our old Babcock press when he was at Tullia. They loaded the half-printed papers into a vehicle along with the chases full of type and came over. They put it on our press and one of them operated the press while his partner went to eat breakfast, then he came back and took his place at the press while the other went to eat. They had been working all night, and I know they were worn to a "frazzle." But they wouldn't let Charles help them.

Several years ago our press broke down and Charles took the chases of type to Tullia and the Herald printed our paper there. We owe them a tremendous debt now, especially after they have made engravings for us and done so many things to help us along. I certainly do hope that one day

# Councilmen Hear Water Test Report Monday

Silvertown Councilmen met in a special session Monday afternoon to hear the report of Charles Sherman, Amarillo, vice president of Ground Water Surveys, Inc., who is electric logging the deep water test holes being drilled into the Santa Rosa formation for the City.

Of the four test holes, only the location directly across the street from City Hall proved to be worth further study. On the basis of the findings in this test, Mr. Sherman recommended that the City drill two additional tests, each within 500 feet of the City Hall. Locations selected were on the Cagle property north of the telephone office and on Crass property.

Reason given for drilling the other tests around the hopeful find was to determine how large a pocket had been located in the Santa Rosa sands.

It was pointed out that in the Hereford area, the additional tests weren't made and the wells drilled without further study are declining.

Leo Fleming and Louis Grabbe have been doing the actual drilling for Davis Drilling & Pump Company, and Fleming described the test holes thus:

No. 1—Davis Drilling Company property on the west side of town; drilled to 700 feet; nothing hopeful.

No. 2—northwest part of town—drilled 720 feet; some sand.

No. 3—southwest part of town (in area of good producing Ogallala formation well); drilled to 700 feet; about 60 feet of sand and clay.

No. 4—(City Hall location); drilled to 680 feet; hit sand at 500 feet, ran out of sand at 640 feet. Mr. Sherman added the information that of this find, there was possibly 80 to 85 feet of good sand. It will not be known until the sand samples are evaluated.

Council voted to let Mr. Sherman go ahead and evaluate all of the test holes drilled and have them located on a City map so the City will have a permanent record of the water exploration.

This would prevent future duplication of the work that has already been done and would enable any geologist to analyze the situation on the basis of the history of findings.

## Texas To Register Largest Number Of Vehicles In History

State Highway Engineer J. C. Dingwall today announced that Texas will register approximately seven million vehicles during 1968. "This is the largest number in our history," Dingwall said.

All 1968 Texas license plates have been delivered to the 254 County Tax Assessor - Collectors for issuance during February and March of 1968.

Of the estimated seven million vehicles to be registered, the Texas Highway Department believes that 4.75 million will be passenger cars and 1.9 million will be commercial trucks and tractors. Trailers and motorcycles will account for the balance.

The most dramatic increase is expected in the motorcycle category, based on the past two years' experience. While passenger car and commercial truck registration will increase about 3.5 per cent, motorcycle registration is expected to increase 16 per cent. This follows a 25 per cent increase in motorcycles in 1966 over 1965 and another 17 per cent increase last year.

Motor vehicle owners can avoid long lines by registering during the month of February, rather than waiting until the March rush.

Owners should bring four items to the Tax Collector's office when registering vehicles: certificate of title, 1967 license receipt, current resident address, and ZIP code.

State law requires each owner to register his vehicle in the county in which he resides and to present his certificate of title as evidence of ownership.

During the 1967 session the Texas Legislature amended the Texas Registration Law by changing passenger car license fees and establishing a minimum fee of \$5.30 for all vehicles, including boat trailers.

The new rates for passenger cars are as follows:  
Up to 3,500 pounds...\$12.30  
3,501 - 4,500 pounds...22.30  
4,501 - 6,000 pounds...30.30

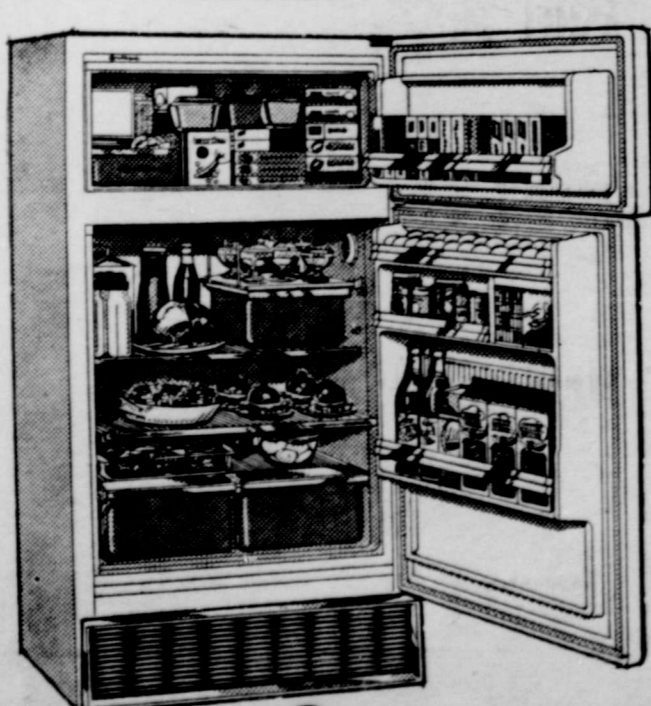

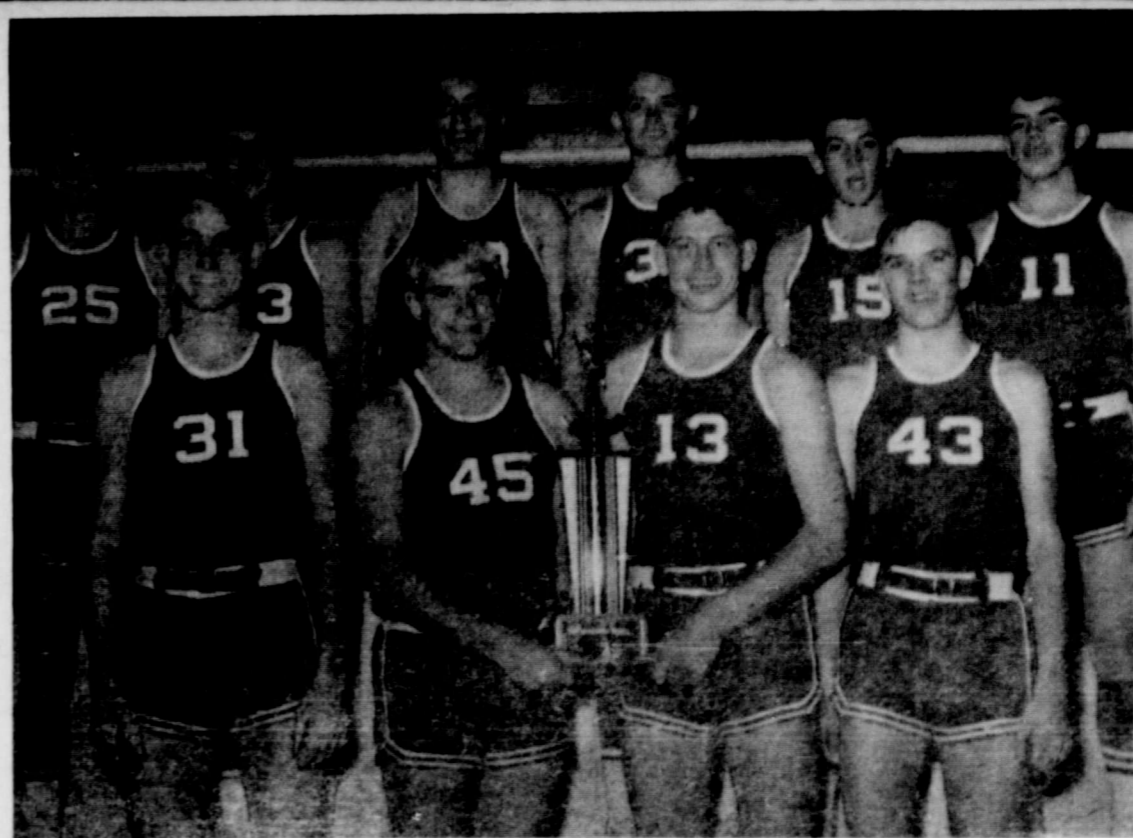

### Ten Texas Travel Trails To Be Featured

Starting next week the Ten Texas Travel Trails, recently unveiled by Governor John Connally at the third annual Governor's Tourist Development Conference,

will be featured in the Briscoe County News.

The accompanying maps will give the reader a closer look at the areas being described.

First to be featured will be the Plains Trail through Armstrong, Bailey, Borden, Briscoe, Carson, Deaf Smith, Garza, Hartley, Hockley, Hutchinson, Lamb, Lubbock, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Floyd, Lynn, Moore, Motley, Potter, Oldham and Randall counties. Silver-

ton is pin-pointed on this map.

Independence Trail traces Texas' fight for independence from Gonzales to San Jacinto. Lakes Trail surprises most Texans with the fact that the state is second only to Alaska in volume of inland water.

Hill Country Trail takes the traveler to the President's Texas home. Mountain Trail is a surprise to those who believe that Texas has no mountains. Forest Trail is routed through four national forests with stops at some of the oldest, most historic towns in the state.

Pecos Trail winds through a land of movies, caverns and western lore. Forts Trail is in an area which has long been a source of pride and a challenge to Texans who have worked for the preservation of these historic forts and missions. Tropical Trail includes the wonders of Padre Island in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

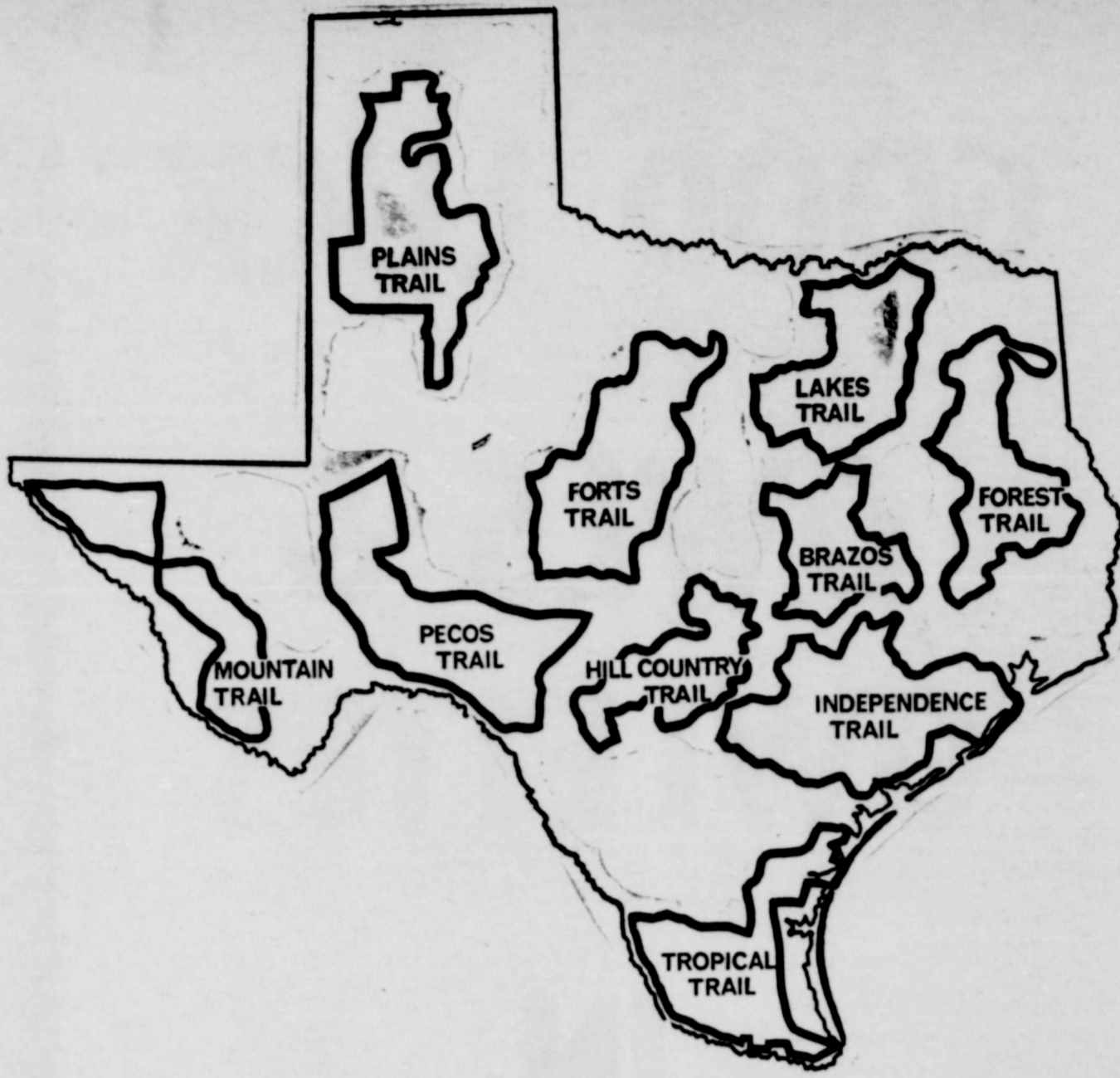

the Silverton Church of Christ. A native of Silverton, Mrs. Rampley is the daughter of Mrs. D. H. Davis and the late Mr. Davis.

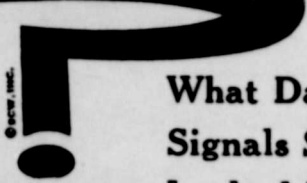

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March Of Time Club Hears Program On Thailand

The March of Time Study Club met with Mrs. Fred Mercer and Mrs. Troy Burson on Thursday, January 18, to view movies and hear comments on the ladies' travels in Thailand.

Thailand is a constitutional monarchy in Southeast Asia, bordered by Burma, Laos, Cambodia, the Gulf of Thailand (or Siam) and the Federation of Malaysia. It is a country of rolling hills about twice the size of Colorado with large areas under irrigation.

The films shown centered on Bangkok, the capitol, and in a forest about 90 miles Southeast of that city near the Cambodian border. Bangkok is one of the largest and most modern cities in Southeast Asia. It is an important port, some 25 miles in from the sea in the Menam delta. There is an extensive inland waterway system and network of modern roads. The hostesses wore dresses which had been loomed and fashioned in Bangkok.

Teakwood is an important article of export and the film showed the use of elephants in a lumber camp. Agriculture occupies 91% of the population.

A reptile clinic is located in Bangkok. Cobras, King Cobras and Vipers are maintained there and are "milked" of their venom periodically for world-wide pharmaceutical use.

Thailand is an ancient monarchy, noted for picturesque architecture and pageantry. It is the only country in Southeast Asia never taken over by colonial power. (The movie "The King and I" has been banned throughout the entire country because of a point of protocol during the making of the film.)

About 40,000 U. S. servicemen (two-thirds of them Air Force) were stationed in Thailand in 1967.

Education is compulsory between 8 and 15. There are universities, training colleges and vo-

One day last summer three California teenagers were on an LSD trip. Today they are partially blind because they sat staring at the sun that afternoon.

But if these teenagers had gone to church every Sunday of their lives, helped little old ladies across streets, collected clothes for orphanages, worked every weekend to put money away for college and taken home stray kittens and puppies—if they had done these things and more—we would never have heard of them. Today we would be as completely unaware of their existence as the public is unaware of ours.

We, the normal, healthy American teens, don't make headlines. In fact, we don't even make news. That has become reserved for the lunatic fringe, the "hippies," the draft-card burners, the protesters, the drug addicts. But it's all right if we don't make the headlines now. Those who are leading our nation and our world today aren't the ones who made the headlines when they were teenagers.

We must let these mentally unbalanced "creeps" have their headlines today, because the only lines they will have tomorrow will be the ones on their padded cell windows.

They say they are being independent, that they are tired of conformity. Well, so are we. To them, smoking "pot" or taking a "trip" takes the place of love, religion and Americanism. These people are to be pitied, not envied.

Their "fun" will end one of these days (not even a hippie can stay young forever), and when it does they will see that THEY have been the ones who existed in a "plastic world," a world of make-believe.

They will be "out of it" because the mature, loyal citizens (you and I) will be leading our country, fighting our wars, building a decent place for our children and theirs.

Somewhere there must be a way that we can take care of these warped people. And soon it will be up to our generation to find that way, because these people won't be capable of taking care of themselves.

You and I are leading relatively happy lives. We don't have to contend with the senseless problems they face. If they were accomplishing something by their rebellion, if they were improving our world by having lived in it, it would be different.

All they are accomplishing is building a picture of our decade of teenagers. And it's a pretty ugly picture, too. They are weakening our nation to the most feared enemy of all—communism.

The man who said, "Remember, my son, if you burn your draft card, burn your birth certificate at the same time; from that moment on, you are no son of mine," summed up the situation pretty well.

He wasn't talking about those of us who are rebelling in harmless ways, those of us who will

soon overcome the small minority of harmful protesters.

What is harmless rebellion? Our strange music, dancing in our own ways, our own language, our long hair, our weird costumes. They don't hurt anyone, yet they give the feeling of being an individual in this complex world, a sense of identity.

Drug addiction, drunkenness, stealing, cheating, lying — the harmful "protests", are only an excuse for most of the "hippies" or "Flower Children" who preach love and practice war — excuses for not doing what their individual personalities would probably have led them to anyway.

These are the ones the man spoke of. When the day comes for us to care for these pitiful creatures, remember not to be too harsh. It could have been you or me who ended up in the gutter, just as easily as it was he, if we had not had someone there to teach us.

**Students Receive Test Results**

Twelve Seniors have received the results of the American College Testing Program examination they took at West Texas State University in Canyon, and thirteen have received the results of the Scholastic Aptitude Tests taken at Texas Tech.

The tests are required college entrance examinations. The ACT consists of a series of four tests designed to measure to some degree the student's academic ability in the areas of English, mathematics, social studies and science. There is also a section which is primarily personal information about what the student's plans are and what he expects to accomplish. This aids the school he is to attend in setting up his program of study.

The SAT is divided into five sections, in different ratios of English and mathematics.

Each test requires about 3 1/2 to 4 hours to complete. The student's score is sent to his school. The individual receives a copy of his score and a duplicate goes on his permanent record in the office. His scores are also sent to as many as three colleges or universities which he has designated.

Jimmy Ray Baird, a Senior student at West Texas State University and a graduate of Silverton High School, has successfully completed his student teaching in the Business Education department of Silverton High School under the direction of Mrs. O. C. Rampley, cooperating teacher, for a nine-week period.

Mr. Baird has completed the requirements for the bachelor of Business Administration degree and did his student teaching in Typing I. He also observed and assisted in the Typing II and Book-keeping classes.
