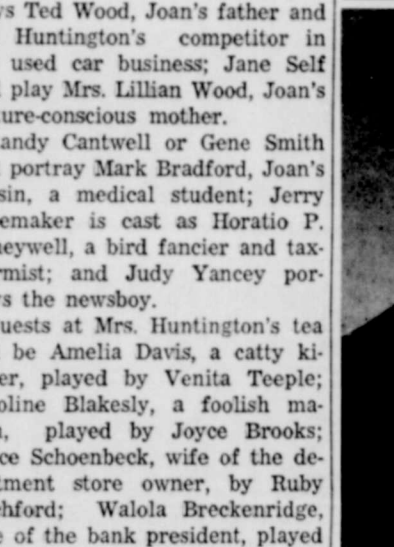

Paden To Lead Gospel Meetings

Membership Drive For Water, Inc. Opens Here

A kickoff dinner for memberships in Water, Inc. was sponsored at the City Cafe recently by the First State Bank.

Chester Mitchell, director for District 10 of Water, Inc. was present to introduce Attorney George McClesky of Lubbock.

McClesky explained to the group plans to move Mississippi River water into West Texas and urged everyone to work with Water, Inc. now. He outlined the organization of Water, Inc. and said that three main hurdles must be surmounted in the project: political, financing and engineering.

He said the Mississippi River carries 550 million acre feet of water per year into the Gulf of Mexico, and that Water Inc. hoped to divert about 19 million into Texas.

He outlined the engineering problem of moving the water over 425 miles and raising it from sea level to 3300 feet.

"This looks impossible... but when you view what the people of California have done in moving large amounts of water... we can see that it is possible," McClesky said.

**SOIL SCIENTIST ASSIGNED TO WORK
 HERE IN BRISCOE COUNTY**

Wayburn Mitchell, soil scientist for the Soil Conservation

Service, has been assigned to this area to work on the soil surveys of Briscoe and Swisher counties.

The survey is a part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey, a cooperative project of the Soil Conservation Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. The purpose is to get a complete inventory of the agricultural land of the nation and to learn as much about it as possible.

The different kinds of soil are located on aerial photographs. Soils are separated by the texture of the topsoil, color, depth and nature of the various soil layers, the slope of the land, and the amount of erosion.

When the soil survey is completed, the aerial photographs on which the information is recorded will be made into a map. The map will be published with a report describing the soils and outlining uses for them. Field work for Briscoe County should be completed in 1970. Copies of the report will be available to local farmers

Pruning Rose Bushes

Don't be in a hurry about pruning rose bushes. If the plants are cut back too early, warm days plus the abundance of soil moisture will force new growth from the base of the plants and a severe freeze between now and spring could kill the roses to the ground.

On unpruned plants, the new growth will take place in the top and this is usually the only part of the plant damaged should a late freeze occur.

We suggest delaying the rose pruning job until early March. Also, don't prune climbing roses until after the first spring flush of flowers.

Fertilizer

Demand for fertilizer is high and because wet fields have caused delays in getting plant food distributed, a real push is expected when the fields are dry enough for working.

The best way to be sure that you have the right type and amount of fertilizer when you need it is to get it on order now or even perhaps in the barn. And if you need spreader or applicator equipment, better get an order in early for its use. Once fields are dry enough to permit use of the equipment, it may be hard to get.

If fertilizer is purchased in bags, here are a couple of storage tips. Be sure to give it room to breathe by leaving an air space between each stack of bags. Always store fertilizer in a dry place. Don't place bags on a dirt or concrete floor because they will pick up moisture and get lumpy and caked up. It isn't a good idea to stack fertilizer more than eight bags high.

Keep fertilizer away from animals since it is food for plants and not for animals.

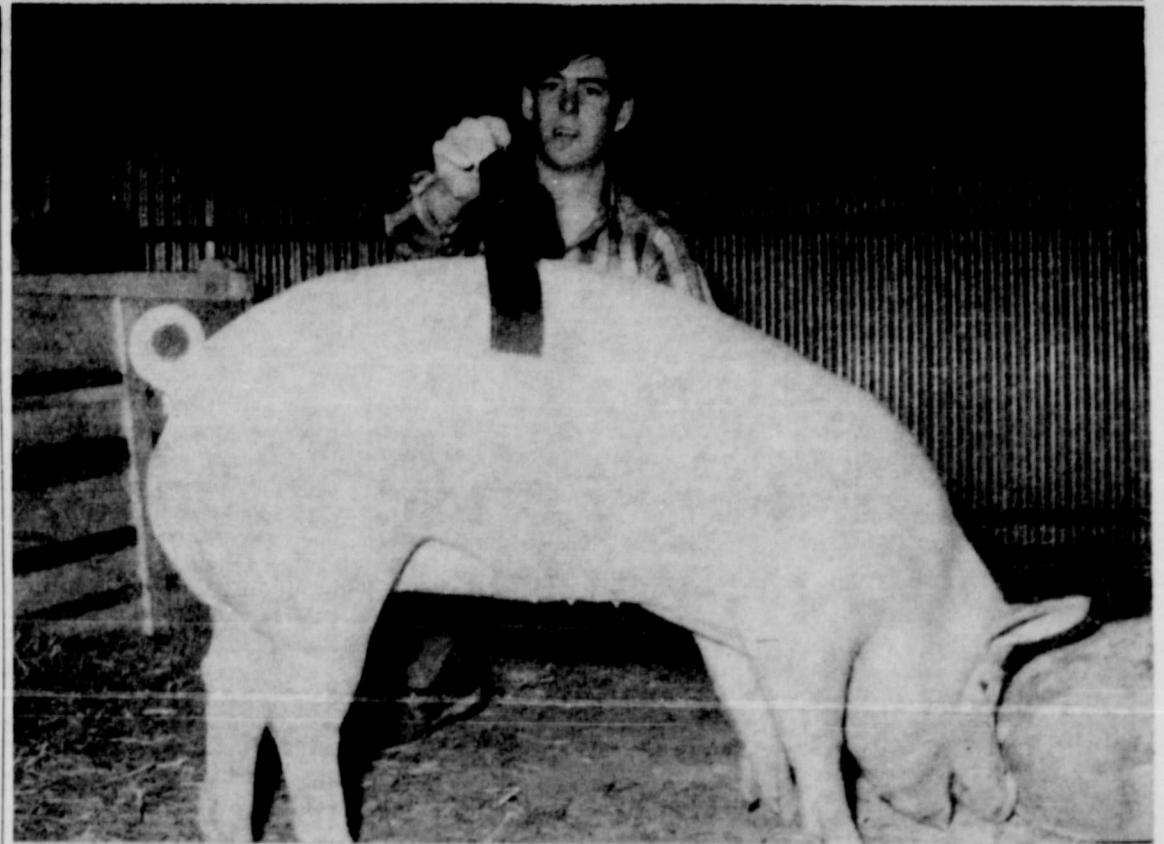
Top Of Texas Tuberculosis Assn. Organized

REHABILITATION SERVICES

BEING STEPPED UP

Because of the steady growth in
numbers of crippled children and
adults in Texas, the Easter Seal
Society for Crippled Children and
Adults of Texas has stepped up
its rehabilitation services.

According to H. B. Simpson, the
Easter Seal Representative for
Briscoe County, a total of 17,622
handicapped Texans received Easter
Seal treatments during 1967.

"Despite medical and scientific
advances," Simpson explained,
"the ranks of the crippled are
growing. This is because of popu-
lation growth, increased number
of accidents and medical treat-
ment which saves victims of crip-
pling diseases who might not have
lived in past years."

Quoting the annual report of
the Easter Seal Society for Crip-
pled Children and Adults of Tex-
as, Simpson said that 21 affiliated
treatment centers, sheltered work-
shops, recreation and educational
programs are in operation in Tex-
as.

"Through these programs per-
sons with a wide variety of handi-
caps receive the help they need
to lead normal lives," Simpson
said.

The largest group served in-
cludes those who major deforma-
ties of bones and joints, severe
speech defects, cerebral palsy,
arthritis, muscular dystrophy and
multiple sclerosis and stroke. The
Easter Seal Campaign which pro-
vides funds for continuation of
these services began March 1 and
continues through April 14, Eas-
ter Sunday.
