ASC Begins Payments To Briscoe Farmers

The Briscoe County ASCS Office has begun payments to farmers under the 1968 farm programs. A substantial number of checks have been received in the local office this week.

Until September 2, 1968, only wheat checks can be mailed to eligible producers. After September 2, 1968, feed grain and cotton checks will be mailed as they are received in the county office. A total of \$45,000 in wheat price-support checks were mailed on July 16.

This timely payment of wheat certificates will help the farmers with their crop expenses. All wheat farms will be paid when the checks are received from New Orleans. The county office is experiencing a 24 day round-trip at this time from the date that the data is mailed to New Orleans until the date that the checks are received in the office. The checks received this week were sent to New Orleans on June 21.

Farmers who desire their checks at an early date are urged to report their crop acreage to the county office as quickly as possible. A farmer who certifies his acreage on July 26 cannot expect to get his wheat check before August 20. As the August 15 deadline approaches, the round-trip time is expected to approach six weeks. This will cause many checks to reach the late reporters around October 1.

REMISSION OF LEUKEMIA IN SISTER OF LOCAL WOMAN

Mrs. Bud Vaughan has received word from her sister, Mrs. Cecil McCain of Albuquerque, New Mexico, that doctors are considering her fight against leukemia as "making medical history."

Mrs. McCain, who was given only three months to live before entering a research program against leukemia, has recently been declared as having no trace of leukemia after her six-month checkup. Dr. Wineman and the other doctors who have participated in directing this experiment in leukemia control have no way of knowing whether Mrs. McCain will have a recurrence of the blood disease, but for the present they are calling this a "medical miracle."

Mrs. McCain has undergone a corpuscle transplant, receiving the new corpuscles from her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Runt Swinney. Early in the program it had been thought that Mrs. Vaughan and another sister might be called upon to take part by donating corpuscles if the health of their parents did not hold up to the rigorous program. However, Mr. and Mrs. Swinney did complete the treatment with Jean, and this was the first time that both parents had participated in this treatment with a son or daughter. In other instances, other members of the immediate family have donated the corpuscles, and in these other cases, remission has not occurred. Mrs. McCain expects to visit in the Vaughan home here soon.

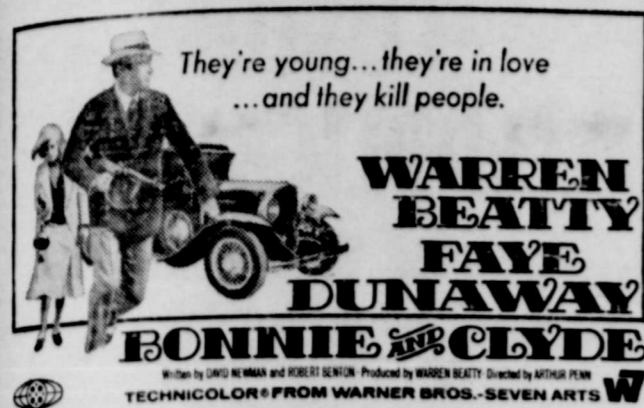

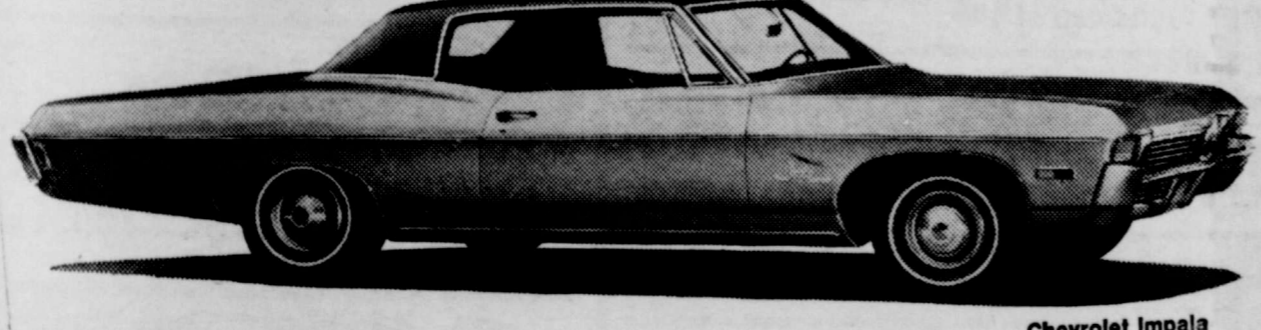
