## Silvertown Owls Open Fall Football Workouts

last year. Wood is in his first year as assistant football coach here, having been at Claude last year. Wiggins is beginning his third year as head basketball coach and assistant football coach here.

The Silvertown Owls opened fall football training workouts here Monday morning, with 36 boys reporting for equipment.

This is Coach Bill Lorance's first year as head coach of the Owls, and he is being assisted by Coach Bill Wood, who is also in his first year here, and Coach Billy Wiggins, who is starting his third year as basketball coach for Silvertown.

The coaches are being actively assisted by High School Principal O. C. Rampley.

According to the District 2-A "Football Facts" magazine, the Owls have eight regulars and 14 returning lettermen.

Lannie Arnold, who was All-District last year, is a triple threat to Owl opponents, with his passing, punting and running. A senior, he weighs in at 165. Cletus Grady, jr., a senior weighing in at 165, was an honorable mention in last year's All-District poll, and will likely be a big man for the Owls again this year as will Bill Strange, who turned in a dazzling performance during his freshman year. A 6'0" sophomore who now weighs 190, Strange has power, speed and quickness.

Coach Lorance expects Donald West, a 160-pound senior, Johnnie Weaver, a 145-pound senior and David Holt, a 150-pound sophomore, to battle it out for backfield positions.

Most of the players named worked out with weights during the winter and spring, and are expected to be in good physical condition.

The end position is shaping up into a four-way battle between Paul McWilliams, a 150-pound senior, Gary Whitfill, a 155-pound senior, Max Hamilton, a 150-pound senior, and Steve Brown, a 140-pound sophomore.

The tackle position should be strong with a lot of size and speed in 175-pound sophomore Alvin May, 195-pound senior Jackie Davis, 210-pound senior Ronnie Sharp. Guards will be led by All-District Larry Comer, who is a tri-captain along with Grady and Arnold. The other position could be capably handled by an 180-pound freshman, Marvin Self. Their competition will come from Terry Bomar, 135-pound sophomore, and Max Weaver, 150-pound junior. Danny Vaughan, a 200-pound senior, should give the Owls solid strength at center. He will be backed up by Ronnie Vaughan, a 165-pound freshman.

The Owls will scrimmage Matador here at 7:30 p.m. Friday, September 6.

In this time of local, state and national elections with their publicity caused by political showmanship, farmers are likely to forget that an election more vital to their livelihood is being quietly conducted. This is the annual election of community committeemen to serve the farmers of Briscoe County. The farm program cannot possibly serve local farmers if good men are not elected as committeemen.

Community committeemen are a vital link between the farmer and this office. Their main job is to serve as a channel of communication between the farmer and this office. Another important function that they perform is the election of one county committeemen each year. Of course the main responsibility for tailoring the farm program to local needs is born by the county committee. It is, therefore, no insignificant job that the community committee have in regard to the election by them of a county committeeman.

Each farmer is urged to vote in this election for men of sound judgment who have the farmer's interests at heart.

A great deal can be lost by putting men in this important position who have personal interests at heart rather than the good of the farmer.

The following dates are called to your attention because of their importance in the upcoming election.

August 23, 1968—Final date to receive nominating petitions. The purpose of this action is to allow farmers to nominate men to serve as community committeemen.

September 18, 1968—Final date to return ballots if they are to be counted.

September 23, 1968—The ballots are to be counted by the county committee at 8:00 a.m. in the local office.

September 25, 1968—The newly elected community committeemen will meet at 8:00 p.m. in the ASCS office for the purpose of electing a county committeeman.

Field Day For South Plains Center Set

The 59th annual field day at the Texas A&M University South Plains Research and Extension Center will be held Tuesday, September 10, beginning at 1:00 p.m.

Tours of field plots and an open house will continue throughout the afternoon.

The center is located about 7½ miles north of Lubbock on U. S. 87.

General theme for the upcoming event is "Service to West Texas Agriculture: Past, Present and Future."

Highlights at the field day will be discussions and tours of field plots on cotton varieties and diseases, weed control, soil fertility, irrigation flexibility and sorghum midge control.

"Each year this field day is planned and developed with the intent of providing the South Plains farmer with the latest information on the most important and most current agricultural production problems. Research results will be explained and information will be provided to assist the farmer in making management decisions about crops, water, fertilization, timing operations, agricultural chemicals, mechanization and water," according to Briscoe County Agent Ken Cook.

Other attractions during the field day will be a large machinery exhibit, a newly constructed ginning laboratory, greenhouse and laboratory displays and displays on the home economics and 4-H Club programs on the South Plains.

More than 40 research scientists and extension specialists officed at the Center will be on hand to assist with the field day and to deal with individual problems on virtually all phases of agricultural production.

**CANNED GRAVY SAUCES TASTY LAMBERGER**



You don't have to be a kid to enjoy a steady diet of hamburgers, but it helps. Thus, for the parental set, we suggest an alternative to the quick and easy hamburger meal... the lamberger repast.

The following version uses canned mushroom gravy to keep the meal easy-to, and complement the piquant flavor of the lamb. One 10 1/2 ounce can of gravy combined with crisp green pepper, snappy garlic and fragrant rosemary makes enough sauce to mix with the meat, and use as a pour-on sauce. Your ingenious main dish is a sensation for backyard grilling or indoor broiling. Accompaniments for the chubby burgers might include toasted, buttered buns, and a crisp green salad. For dessert, present a mix-made fudge cake, along with mugs of coffee.

**LAMBERGERS ROSEMARY**

- 2 slices bacon
- 2 tablespoons finely chopped green pepper
- 1 medium clove garlic, minced
- Generous dash crushed rosemary
- 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) mushroom gravy
- 1 pound ground lamb
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- Dash pepper

In saucepan, cook bacon until crisp; remove and crumble. Pour off all but 1 tablespoon drippings. Cook green pepper, garlic, and rosemary in drippings until green pepper is tender. Add gravy and bacon. Combine 1/2 cup sauce with remaining ingredients; shape into 4 patties. Place on broiler pan 4 inches from heat. Cook 10 minutes on each side. Meanwhile, heat remaining sauce; stir now and then. Serve with patties. Makes 4 servings.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:  
Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 1-f, to read as follows:  
"Section 1-f. "FOR the constitutional amendment to exempt certain property temporarily stored in a public warehouse from ad valorem taxation."

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (HJR20)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 11a, Article VII, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 11a. In addition to the bonds enumerated in Section 11 of Article VII of the Constitution of the State of Texas, the Board of Regents of the University of Texas may invest the Permanent University Fund in securities, bonds or other obligations issued, insured, or guaranteed in any manner by the United States Government, or any of its agencies, and in such bonds, debentures, or obligations, and preferred and common stocks issued by corporations, associations, or other institutions as the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System may deem to be proper investments for said funds; provided, however, that not more than one per cent (1%) of said fund shall be invested in the securities of any one (1) corporation, nor shall more than five per cent (5%) of the voting stock of any one (1) corporation be owned; provided, further, that stocks eligible for purchase shall be restricted to stocks of companies incorporated within the United States which have paid dividends for five (5) consecutive years or longer immediately prior to the date of purchase and which, except for bank stocks and insurance stocks, are listed upon an exchange registered with the Securities and Exchange Commission or its successors.

"In making each and all of such investments said Board of Regents shall exercise the judgment and care under the circumstances then prevailing which men of ordinary prudence, discretion, and intelligence exercise in the management of their own affairs."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (SJR4)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 4. Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a of Article III thereof, so as to provide for contributions on the basis of the full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to a vote of the people at an election and for proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 48a of Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 48a. In addition to the powers given the Legislature under Section 48, Article III, it shall have the right to levy taxes to establish a fund to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for persons employed in the public schools, colleges and universities supported wholly or partly by the state; provided that the amount contributed by the state to such fund each year shall be equal to the aggregate amount required by law to be paid into the fund by such employees, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid each such person by the state and/or school districts; provided that no person shall be eligible for retirement who has not rendered ten (10) years of creditable service in such employment, and in no case shall any person retire before either attaining the age fifty-five (55) or completing thirty (30) years of creditable service, but shall be entitled to refund of moneys paid into the fund.

"Moneys coming into such fund shall be managed and invested as provided in Section 48b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas; provided a sufficient sum shall be kept on hand to meet payments as they become due each year under such retirement plan, as

may be provided by law; and provided that the recipients of such retirement fund shall not be eligible for any other state pension retirement funds or direct aid from the State of Texas, unless such other state pension or retirement fund, contributed by the state, is released to the State of Texas as a condition to receiving such other pension aid; providing, however, that this Section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November, 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the following words:

"FOR the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

"AGAINST the amendment to Section 48a of Article III allowing contributions to be made on the basis of full salary of members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment. If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of said amendment, the same shall be a part of the state constitution and be effective from the date of determination of such result and the Governor's proclamation thereof.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said special election and shall have the same published as required by the constitution and laws of this state.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (SJR39)

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 39. Proposing an amendment to Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the state, so as to create an agency of the State of Texas the Employees Retirement System of Texas, authorizing said Board to invest assets of said system in various obligations and subjects of investment, subject to certain restrictions stated therein and such other restrictions as may hereafter be provided by law; providing that contributions of members and the state shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state; providing that such Amendment shall be self-enacting; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, and declaring legislative intent that the adoption of this Joint Resolution shall constitute repeal of Senate Joint Resolution No. 8, previously adopted by this the 60th Legislature, so that the proposition as set forth in this Resolution may be submitted to the voters of this state in lieu of the proposition contained in Senate Joint Resolution No. 3.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Subsection (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the state, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of this state as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the state who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the state, and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classification of officers and employees of judicial districts of this state as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this subsection, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the state to such Fund shall equal the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person, and shall not exceed at any time six per centum (6%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the state.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding Section 1-j to read as follows: "Section 1-j. Notwithstanding the provisions of Section 1 of this article, the Legislature may provide for the refund of the tax paid on the first sale of cigars and tobacco products in this state which are subsequently sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texas."

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on

the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texas."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the refund of the tax on cigars and tobacco products sold at retail within the corporate limits of Texas, or any incorporated city or town in Texas contiguous to Texas."

### PUBLIC NOTICE

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR41)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51-a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended, so as to read as follows:

"Section 51-a. The Legislature shall have the power, by General Laws, to provide, subject to limitations herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions and regulations as may be by the Legislature be deemed expedient, for assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care, and for the payment of assistance to and/or medical care for, and for rehabilitation and any other services for:

- (1) Needy aged persons who are citizens of the United States or noncitizens who shall have resided within the boundaries of the United States for at least twenty-five (25) years and are over the age of sixty-five (65) years;
- (2) Needy individuals who are citizens of the United States who shall have passed their eighteenth (18th) birthday but have not passed their sixty-fifth (65th) birthday and who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of a mental or physical handicap or a combination of physical and mental handicaps;
- (3) Needy blind persons who are citizens of the United States and who are over the age of eighteen (18) years;
- (4) Needy children who are citizens of the United States and who are under the age of twenty-one (21) years, and to the caretakers of such children.

"The Legislature may define

the residence requirements, if any, for participation in these programs."

"The Legislature shall have authority to enact appropriate legislation which will enable the State of Texas to cooperate with the Government of the United States in providing assistance to and/or medical care on behalf of needy persons, and in providing rehabilitation and any other services included in the Federal legislation providing matching funds to help such families and individuals attain or retain capability for independence or self-care and to accept and expend funds from the Government of the United States for such purposes in accordance with the laws of the United States as they now are or as they may hereafter be amended, and to make appropriations out of state funds for such purposes; provided that the maximum amount paid out of state funds to or on behalf of any individual recipient shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that the total amount of such assistance payments and/or medical assistance payments out of state funds on behalf of such recipients shall not exceed the amount that is matchable out of Federal funds; provided that if the limitations and restrictions herein contained are found to be in conflict with the provisions of appropriate Federal Statutes as they now are or as they may be amended, to the extent that Federal matching money is not available to the state for these purposes, then and in that event the Legislature is specifically authorized and empowered to prescribe such limitations and restrictions and enact such laws as may be necessary in order that such Federal matching money will be available for assistance and/or medical care for or on behalf of needy

persons; and provided further, that the total amount of money to be expended per fiscal year out of state funds for assistance payments only to recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Permanently and Totally Disabled, Aid to the Blind, and Aid to Families with Dependent Children shall never exceed Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000).

"Nothing in this Section shall be construed to amend, modify or repeal Section 31 of Article XVI of this Constitution; provided further, however, that such medical care, services or assistance shall also include the employment of objective or subjective means, without the use of drugs, for the purpose of ascertaining and measuring the powers of vision of the human eye, and fitting lenses or prisms to correct or remedy any defect or abnormal condition of vision. Nothing herein shall be construed to permit optometrists to treat the eyes for any defect whatsoever in any manner nor to administer nor to prescribe any drug or physical treatment whatsoever, unless such optometrist is a regularly licensed physician or surgeon under the laws of this state."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November 1968, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment raising the limit on the amount that may be expended in any one year out of state funds for Public Assistance payments only to Seventy-five Million Dollars (\$75,000,000)."

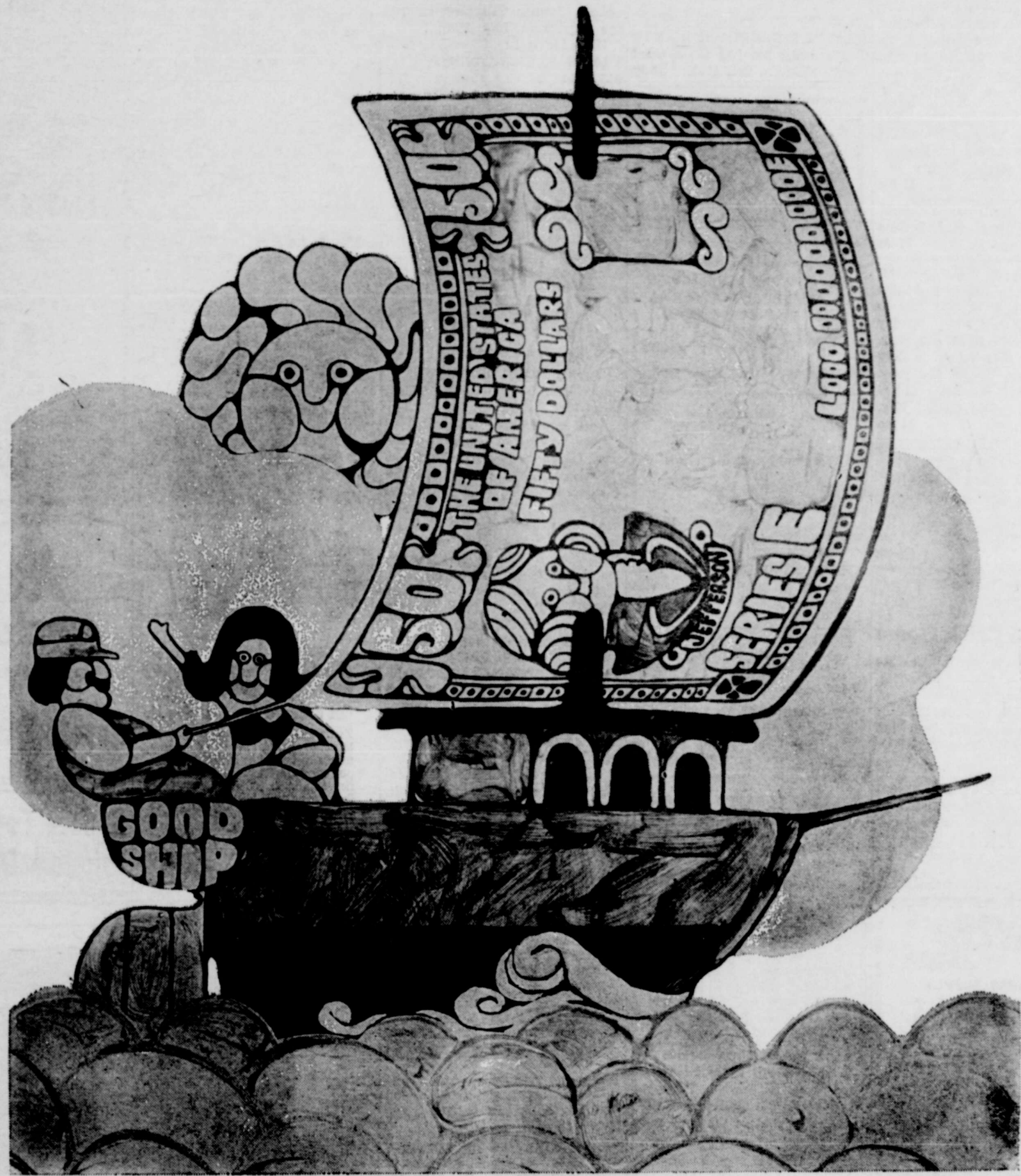
