 Cotton insects are on the in-
 crease in many parts of Briscoe
 County. Some boll worm damage
 has been noticed in the southwest
 and southeast parts of the county,
 but severe infestations are not
 evident in any place at this time.
 Farmers should be checking
 their fields every two to three
 days for boll worms and other
 destructive cotton insects for the
 remainder of the growing season.
 With our recent beneficial rains
 and cool damp weather, insect
 build-ups can come in very sud-
 den and alarming rates as is evi-
 dent by our recent greenbug situa-
 tion.
 The first load of grain sorghum
 will be cut in the county in the
 next two to three days. Some
 tests of 18 to 20 per cent mois-
 ture have already been recorded.
 Good yields are indicated on
 most irrigated fields and the ma-
 jority of dryland fields although
 present hail damage to grain and
 cotton has severely damaged iso-
 lated fields. Several farmers in
 the eastern part of the county
 lost entire stands of cotton and
 were severely damaged in produc-
 tion of grain sorghum.
 Although adverse weather con-
 ditions have hampered production
 of our main cash crops, the recent
 rains have supplemented the
 stockmen's range possibilities in
 the new growth of succulent pas-
 tures throughout the county and
 will enable cattle to remain in
 good condition going into the
 winter months.

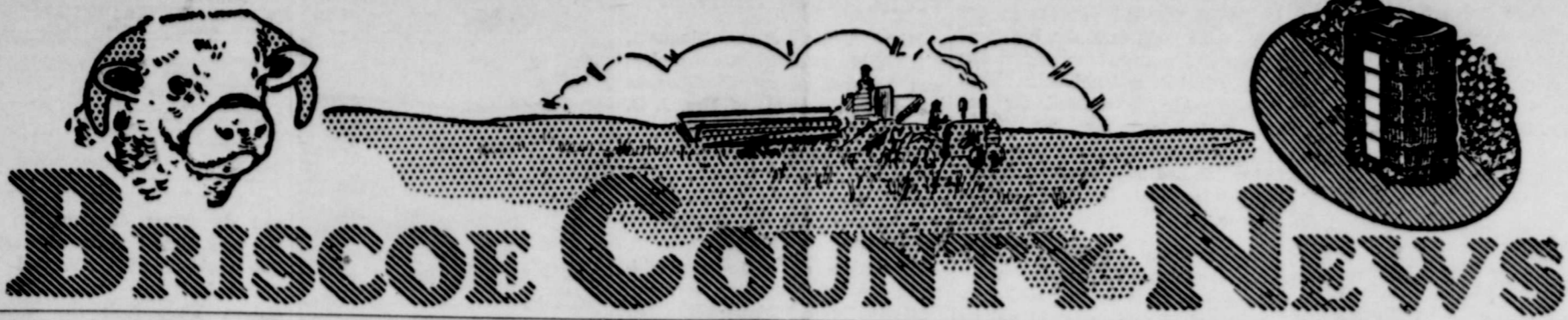

A community clinic, for the purpose of giving tuberculosis tests to adults and children of this area, is being planned Wednesday, November 6, under the direction of the Top of Texas Tuberculosis Association. There will be no charge for the tests, but an Easter Seal campaign will be conducted.

Mrs. Roy Younger, who is Briscoe County's representative to the Top of Texas Tuberculosis Association, has announced that the TB testing program will be conducted at the school under the direction of School Nurse Mrs. Delphine Klemm. She will be assisted by nurses from the TB association. Individuals and clubs will be called on to assist with the clinic.

Students will receive the tests until afternoon on the day of the community clinic, and adults will be asked to go for the tests beginning at 2:00 p.m.

The need for the TB testing of residents in this area was brought to the attention of civic leaders recently when a case of tuberculosis was confirmed in a young man whose home is in this county. He is presently being treated at the tuberculosis clinic in San Angelo.

Due to the fact that this young man had been in contact either directly or indirectly with many residents of Briscoe and Swisher counties, the need for mass testing was seen. The youth had been employed where foods are sold in both Briscoe and Swisher counties.

A clinic was held Wednesday in Quitaque for residents of that portion of the county.

Tuberculosis is a disease which most people don't think of very often, and for many years it has not been a great threat in this area. However, tuberculosis is on the rise in Texas, with the number of cases last year doubling over the number in the previous year. There have been reports of a sprinkling of cases in the northern Panhandle, and these statistics seem to present the need for a general testing program in order that tuberculosis not become a problem here.

Tuberculosis is rarely fatal, but does require treatment, and the patient is required to rest in bed most of the time during treatment. If other cases of tuberculosis are located in Briscoe County, arrangements will be made by the Top of Texas Tuberculosis

School Enrollment Down This Year

The Silvertown Schools opened this week with an enrollment of 525 students.

This figure is down from last year's total of 538. A total of 156 students were registered in high school at this time last year, but so far this year only 145 are attending classes at Silvertown High School.

The 380 grade school enrollment figure is only off two students from this time last year.

According to an announcement by Superintendent J. S. Hinds, there were 60 first grade students enrolled this year. Plans had been to provide only two sections of the first grade, but on tallying the enrollment, the third section was added. Mrs. Ruby Steele, who taught first grade last year, had been assigned a section of the second grade, and when the third section of the first grade was opened, she resumed her first-grade assignment. Mrs. Sheri Lorraine, who had been assigned to teach English in junior high, was reassigned to the second grade, and Mr. Hinds is presently looking for a teacher for junior high English.

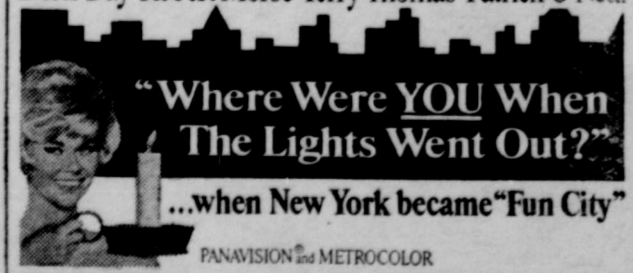
