COUNTY AGENT'S DESK

Cotton insects are on the increase in many parts of Briscoe County, Some boll worm damage been noticed in the southwest and southeast parts of the county, severe infestations are not wident in any place at this time. Farmers should be checking their fields every two to three days for boll worms and other structive cotton insects for the lainder of the growing season. With our recent beneficial rains and cool damp weather, insect build-ups can come in very sudden and alarming rates as is evident by our recent greenbug situa-

The first load of grain sorghum will be cut in the county in the text two to three days. Some tests of 18 to 20 per cent moisture have already been recorded. Good yields are indicated on lost irrigated fields and the marity of dryland fields although recent hail damage to grain and on has severely damaged isolated fields. 


