Mrs. A. H. Chappell was awarded a bronze plaque for being the most outstanding exhibitor in the Women's Division of the Floyd County Fair last week. Mrs. Chappell also served as a member of Canned Fruits and Vegetables Committee for the Fair.

Mrs. Chappell, who annually wins a number of ribbons at the Floyd County Fair, received 20 ribbons this year. She received blue ribbons for her tatting on satin pillow cases, crocheted centerpiece and blackberry jelly. She also received five pounds of sugar for her prize-winning jelly.

She received red ribbons for two quilts, one cross stitched and one appliqued, a fancy apron, a crocheted doily, neatest box of candy, hot pot holders, crocheted hot dish mat and cross stitched pillow cases. Her entries which received third place were a crocheted centerpiece, a crocheted doily, a dresser scarf, cross stitched chair set, cross stitched apron, watermelon rind preserves, pickled onions, blackeyed peas and applesauce cake.

Cletus Grady, jr., halfback for the Silvertown Owls, was named as the first Class A "Back of the Week" this season by the Amarillo Daily News sportswriters.

Grady was selected for the honor on the basis of his outstanding play in the White Deer game, in which he gained almost all of the rushing yardage compiled by the Owls.

A senior in Silvertown High School, Grady won the Regional 440 in track and competed in the State track meet last year. This fleetness of foot was an asset at White Deer on the kickoff return play, on which the Owl blockers did such a fine job so that Grady could go all the way (90 yards) for a touchdown.

Silvertown's Owls, apparently resting on their laurels after defeating White Deer the previous week, were lucky to eke out a 28-0 win over Turkey here Friday night by scoring 20 points in a fourth quarter rally. The Turks came to win, and the team's passing game looked like a well-oiled machine as Quarterback Russell Barnhill popped passes to Halfback Rod Setliff and End Dennis King with little defense from the Owls.

It took Turkey only three plays longer to score against the Owls than it took White Deer, and the first points went up on the board on a 15-yard Barnhill to Setliff pass. Barnhill carried the extra points.

An Owl drive was halted on the Turkey-23 by a fumble, and early in the second quarter another Barnhill to Setliff aerial scored six points more. No conversion points were made on the incomplete pass.

The Owls' second-quarter tally came after the locals had attempted a touchdown pass on fourth down from the three- or four-yard line. The pass was complete, but the player was out of bounds when he caught it, and the ball went over to the Turks who ran it out to the ten and fumbled. In possession again with four chances to score, the Owls picked up four of the yards before Quarterback Lannie Arnold went in for the score. Halfback Cletus Grady, jr. ran for the two extra points, and at halftime the Turks led the Owls 14-8.

The Owls received the third quarter opening kick, ran one play and lost the ball on a fumble. The Turks took over at midfield and didn't stop until King crossed the goal line. The pass for extra points was no good, and the Turks held a 20-8 advantage.

Silvertown controlled the ball three plays before fumbling, but did stop the Turks in spite of a somewhat doubtful pass interference call, when Grady intercepted a Turk pass and carried it out to the Turkey 24. After a series of exchanges the Turks fumbled on their own 24, and the Owls scored on a seven yard run by Arnold. A pass from Arnold to Halfback Mike Tate added another two points, and the Turk lead was narrowed to 20-16.

The Owls attempted an inside kick which was taken by the Turks at the Silvertown 47, but did manage to hold the Turks to a 9-yard gain. Taking the ball on their own 39, the Owls marched downfield and scored on a two-yard run by Halfback Bill Strange. Danny Vaughan's kick was blocked, and the Owls moved ahead for the first time, 22-20.

On the fifth play following the after-touchdown kickoff, Strange intercepted a pass on about the Turkey 30-yardline and ran it all the way back for a touchdown. There was no conversion, and the Owls held their 28-20 final score. The Turks moved well on two pass completions before fumbling to the Owls just before the game ended.

So far this year, the Owl scoring has been distributed among seven players. Quarterback Arnold leads with 18 points; Strange has gotten 12 points; Grady has eight points to his credit; Mike Tate has six; Donald Weast and Gary Whitfill each have two, and Danny Vaughan has scored one point.

Silvertown passed eleven times for 50 yards and two extra points. Turkey passed 26 times for 194 yards and three touchdowns, and had passes intercepted by Arnold, Grady and Strange.

The Owls had approximately 170 yards rushing as compared with about 118 for the Turks.

Red Cross Is Making Gifts For Servicemen

Once again, Briscoe County Red Cross is joining other chapters in the midwestern area in making and filling ditty bags for servicemen in Vietnam for Christmas.

The local Red Cross has agreed to supply 50 of the red and green bags which are being made now and are to be ready by October 4.

It is hoped that this will not be exclusively a Red Cross project, but will be a community project which will be adopted by organizations, groups, business firms and individuals. Participation in the project can be with donations of money for the purchase of some of the items or by the contribution of the items.

Each bag will contain a holiday greeting card listing the names of the contributors of the items. Among the items to be placed in the bags here will be ballpoint pens, pen-sized flashlights and batteries, small pen knives, wind-proof-type cigarette lighters and flints, plastic soap cases, small packages of writing paper and self sealing envelopes, small address books, plastic tooth brush holders and brushes, terry cloth wash cloths (other than white or light color), nail clippers, plastic cigarette cases, combs, mailing size voice tapes, small tins vacuum packed candies or nuts, small plastic snapshot holders, wipe and shine pocket shoe polish, pocket

The Owls also were charged with a pass interference infraction on which Cletus Grady intercepted the pass. This was a close call made by a referee who was quite a ways from the play, and through field glasses looked like a clean go for the ball.

Each team lost the ball on fumbles three times. The Turks made 17 first downs as compared with 12 for the Owls.

Fans who watched the Turks and fans who saw the Owls in the first games of the season had the same comment regarding play: the team surely didn't look like it did in the first game!

Mailing Dates Given For Overseas Parcels

The following periods have been designated for mailing Christmas parcels to members of the Armed Forces overseas.

- 1. Surface transportation, October 14 to November 9
2. SAM (Space Available Parcel Airlift) October 21 to November 2—not over 5 pounds
3. PAL (Parcel Air Lift) October 28 to November 30
4. Airmail, November 30 to December 11

All articles should be packed in boxes of wood, metal, solid fiberboard, or strong double faced corrugated fiberboard. All fiberboard boxes should be securely wrapped in heavy paper which materially strengthens the package. Each box should be well tied with strong cord. Sufficient cushioning material should be used to prevent any rattling or loosening of articles within the package. Unless tightly filled, boxes are likely to be crushed. A slip showing list of contents, and name and address of sender and addressee, should be enclosed in the parcel. Please show the address only one time on parcels.

Addresses must be legible and complete and should be prepared by typewriter or pen and ink. The APO and FPO numbers are the same as the ZIP CODE and must be shown on all mail.

Swisher Electric Co-op Withdraws Offer To Purchase Hall Co-op

Announcement was made September 20, by Lyle Robinson, manager of Swisher Electric Cooperative, Inc. of the decision by the board of directors to remove their offer of a merger with the Hall Electric Cooperative, Inc.

In a letter to Sam Ross, president of the board of directors of Hall County Electric Cooperative, Mr. Robinson said: "In view of the present situation of a divided opinion by the board of directors of Hall County Electric Cooperative upon the question of whether a sale of Hall County Electric Cooperative at this time is the proper action and has resulted in many misleading quotes and mis-information, the board of directors of Swisher County Electric Cooperative removes their offer to purchase, buy, bargain or in any way acquire the assets and liabilities of Hall County Electric Cooperative, Inc."

"The board further agrees that if at any later date when and if the board and membership agree that a sale, merger or acquisition is desirable, then they stand ready to reconsider their offer for a purchase, merger or acquisition of the Hall County Electric Cooperative."

"We are indeed sorry that the matter did not work out more amiable and for the best interest of both Cooperatives.

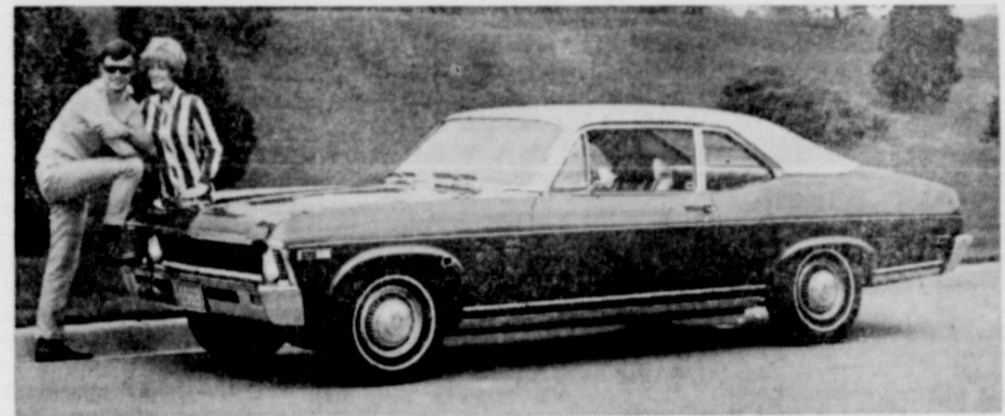

In the Sunday, Sept. 15 copy of the Plainview (Texas) Daily Herald is an article titled "Ministers Push Drive Against Pornography" that I wish every parent could read.

New Features of Housing Act Are Defined By FHA

L. J. Cappelman, Texas State Director of the Farmers Home Administration, said today he had been notified by Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman of the rural housing and rural community planning features of the newly enacted 1968 Housing Act. The Act was signed into law on August 1 by President Johnson. Secretary Freeman's statement pointed out the new housing program is part of the President's drive to remove all substandard housing in the nation within a decade, including the three million substandard houses that exist today in rural America.

Mr. Freeman announced that benefits of the new Housing and Urban Development Act will be channeled into Texas rural areas through the 138 local county offices of the Farmers Home Administration, and through the rural system of Technical Action Panels.

The Farmers Home Administration, a Department of Agriculture supervised credit agency for housing, farming, and community facilities, carries on rural housing programs, established by the new act and previous legislation, for farmers and for other people in the countryside and in rural towns of up to 5,500 population.

New housing services under the act will include:

Housing loan interest supplement payments for families with incomes too low to meet in full the amortized loan payments on individual rural housing loans. Interest supplements on loans

to develop nonprofit rental and cooperative housing for low-income people.

Financial support for "self help" housing projects for low-income families including grants to nonprofit organizations for the development and supervision of "self help" housing projects and loans to nonprofit organizations to buy and develop land to be used as building sites.

Housing and training facilities for rural job trainees and their families.

Expanded housing credit for city people who work in rural areas.

Loans for the purchase of building sites for farm-labor housing.

Mr. Freeman announced that the interest-supplement program for individual borrowers under the Farmers Home Administration authority (Title X of the Act) will be placed in effect immediately. Individual loans may be made for up to 33 years, loans for rental and cooperative housing may be made payable over periods up to 50 years.

The interest-supplement program for rural nonprofit rental housing organizations and cooperatives of low-income families will take effect when administrative arrangements are completed. The new provisions for job-trainee and self-help housing assistance will not take effect until funds are appropriated.

The interest-supplement plan seeks to put adequate housing within reach of lower-income families by reducing their loan or rent payments. The supplement payments will be made by the Federal Government.

A minimum requirement is that a home-ownership borrower who does not have enough income to pay his loan installments in full will pay at least the amount that would be due if the interest rate were one percent.

The actual amount that a low-income family will need to pay will depend on its income and the size of the family.

Freeman said the new Act will facilitate a back-to-the-country movement by city dwellers who

"The NFO has one purpose and one purpose only," Gerald Mc-Cathern, president of the Deaf Smith NFO, in an interview Saturday. "That is to gain fair prices for agriculture commodities through the bargaining process."

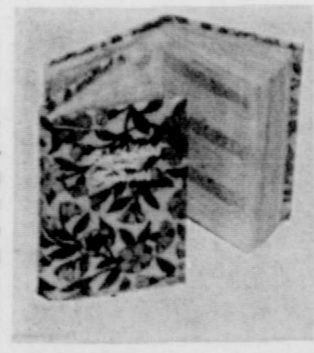

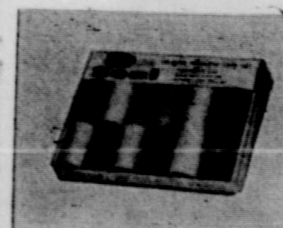

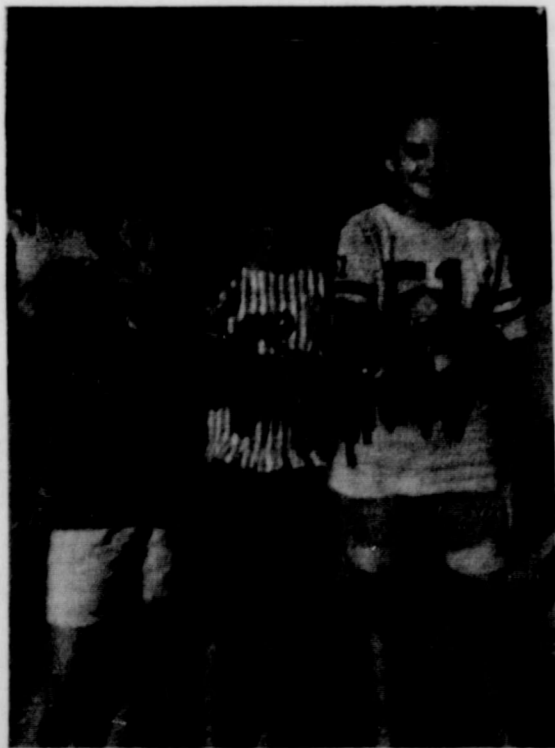
Junior Class News

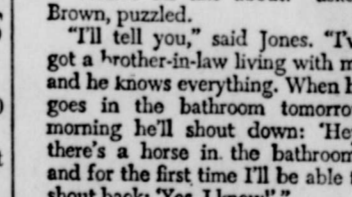

Tuesday of last week, the Freshmen gave an assembly program as part of their initiation. The boys gave a style show.

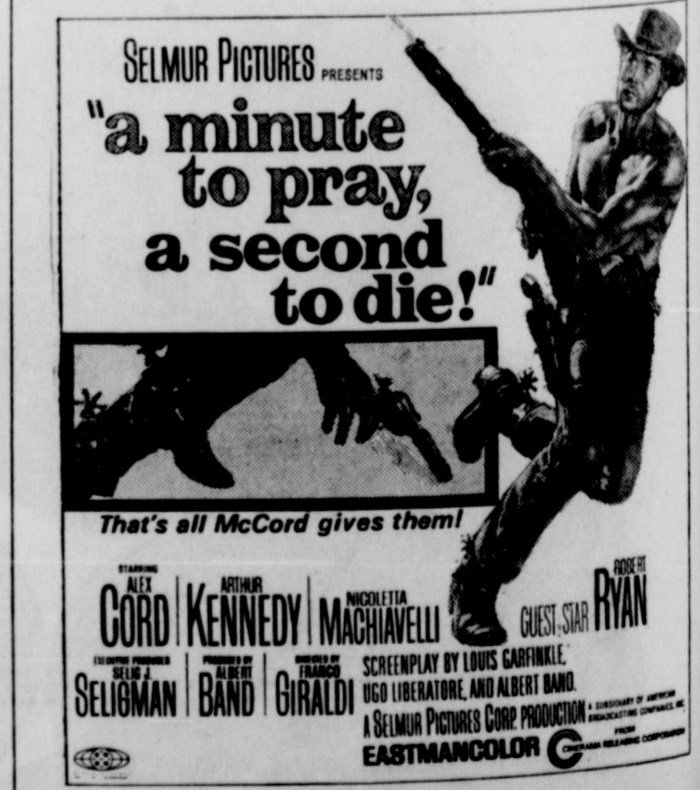
