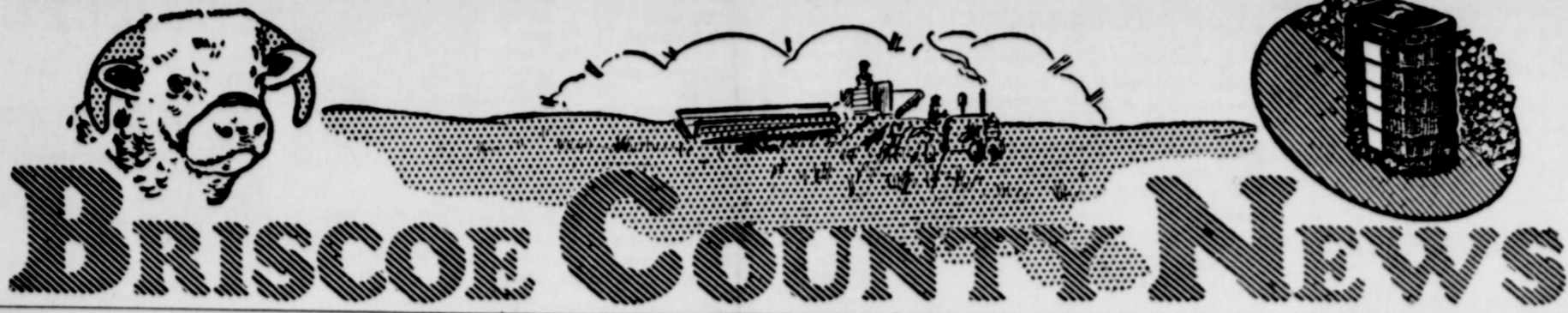

# Open House Planned At First Baptist Church

Members of the First Baptist Church in Silvertown will host an open house from 2:00 until 4:00 p.m. Sunday, November 24. Dedication services for the church's new and remodeled buildings will be held at 11:00 a.m. and 6:00 p.m. that day.

The morning dedication will be directed by the pastor, Rev. C. H. Murphy, jr. A former pastor, Rev. Clyde Cain, now pastor of

Avondale Baptist Church in Amarillo, will lead the evening dedication service.

Area residents are invited to attend the dedication services and open house. Department workers will be present to act as hosts in their departments, and the adult department teachers and officers and young people will receive visitors and act as guides. Guests will be asked to register in the

church foyer, and refreshments will be served during the open house.

The entire church plant now contains 17,100 square feet of floor space, with 2,500 square feet of new space and 9,000 square feet of remodeled space. Part of the remodeling was made necessary by a fire which destroyed the education building several months ago.

The building now provides facilities for three nursery departments, a beginner department, two primary departments, two junior departments, an intermediate department, a youth department and an adult department. There are three offices, a church library, a parlor, a bride's room, a kitchen and fellowship hall, a kindergarten which operates five days a week, and a sanctuary with a seating capacity of 350.

The new and remodeled space has been provided at a cost of \$75,000.00, and the church plant is now valued at \$175,000. The total evaluation of all church prop-

erty, including two mission churches, is now \$236,000.

Charles Whitfill is serving as general chairman of the building committee. Members of the building planning committee are Walter Bean, chairman, Raymond McJimsey, Carman Rhode, E. A. Birdwell and A. D. Arnold. Serving on the building finance committee are Johnnie Burson, chairman, Alvin Redin, Rex Holt and Roy Mack Walker.

Mrs. Walter Bean has served as chairman of the decoration and color committee, and others on her committee have been Mrs. Wayne McMurtry, Mrs. A. D. Arnold, Mrs. Bob Rauch and Mrs. E. A. Birdwell. A gold and brown decor has been carried out throughout the church plant, with gold carpeting having been laid in the church parlor, offices, sanctuary and some of the adult classrooms. The pews and choir chairs in the sanctuary are upholstered with matching gold fabric. Paneling, kitchen cabinets and furniture are in matching oak veneer, and mediterranean-style light fixtures have been added in the sanctuary.

The exterior of the building has also received a new look and stained-glass windows have been added.

Others on the church staff in addition to Rev. Murphy, are Wayne Logan, music and youth director; Rev. Leon Anderson, pastor of the New Fellowship Mission; Rev. Mack Diaz, pastor of the New Jerusalem Mission; Mrs. J. W. Lyon, jr., church secretary; Mrs. Jim Clemmer, kindergarten teacher, and Manley Wood, custodian.

**Christmas Mailing Information Given**

Christmas cards must have a 6c stamp on them this year and they will be classified as first class mail if they do not weigh over one ounce, according to an announcement by Postmaster Fred Strange.

You can mail greeting cards up to two ounces for 6c, but they must be unsealed and cannot contain any written messages.

Since most greeting cards will weigh less than one ounce, they will be classified as first class mail. Therefore, it would be to your advantage to use the first class rate, since it can be forwarded and can be returned to the sender if the return address is shown on the envelope.

Overseas SAM parcels must be mailed before November 23.

Overseas PAL parcels must be mailed before November 30.

AIR MAIL parcels must be mailed before December 11.

"Mail early" is the word from postal officials across the country.

# Hard Work Pays Off in 4-H Awards, Visits to Chicago

Two elements are shared by four east central Texas youngsters who will be going to the 4th National 4-H Congress in Chicago, Dec. 1-5.

First, they are all willing to work hard and well. Second, they all are 1968 state winners in 4-H projects. Each was selected by the Texas A&M Cooperative Extension Service.

The four youngsters are: Shirley Dittmar, 18, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Dittmar of Pottsboro. She is a freshman at Tarleton State College and state winner in the food preservation program.

Connie Mitchell, 17, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Mitchell of Strawn. She placed first in the food-nutrition program. Bobby Williams, 18, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Williams of Gorman and a freshman at Texas A&M. The program in which he was named the state winner was leadership.

Kerwin Stephens, 16, the field crops science program winner. His parents are Mr. and Mrs. George Stephens of Comanche. Young Stephens undoubtedly reflected the feelings of the other three when he explained: "Watching my father work and make decisions looked easy. I soon found out different."

And when Stephens and the others found out that to be good in a specialty required hard work, they all went to work.

To become the field crops science champion Stephens raised five acres of peanuts in each of the last five years, in addition to raising watermelons on seven acres in the last two years.

All that required setting up an irrigation system linked to

the nearby Leon River, no easy task in itself.

But the work is paying off with more than the trip to Chicago. Profits from the peanuts and watermelons are going into Stephens' college fund.

In his leadership project, Williams found ample opportunity to work hard. Besides involving himself in a myriad of other 4-H programs, he served as a leader of other 4-H members in beef, swine and livestock projects, trained 10 members each year for a 4-H judging team, served as vice chairman of his district 4-H council and served as a junior leader in his club.

It was as a junior leader that Williams perhaps learned best the rewards of leadership.

In helping nine younger members select, feed, groom and show 14 animals, he became frustrated because there wasn't enough time to "get everything done to perfection." Too, some of the boys seemed to learn slowly indeed.

Then came the day of the show and his frustration mounted, as nothing went quite as he hoped. But then came the reward that changed frustration into "enthusiasm": All the boys' parents came up to him to say thanks.

Miss Mitchell, too, has found that her food-nutrition project involves more than working

only for herself. In addition to preparing more than 1,700 meals as a 4-H'er, she has appeared on radio and television in behalf of 4-H and, as a junior leader, has taught basic nutrition to young members.

Too, she has learned that good dining is more than merely eating a balanced meal. As she puts it: "Mealtime belongs to the family, as members come together perhaps relating their experiences of the day. Make it the nicest part of the day."

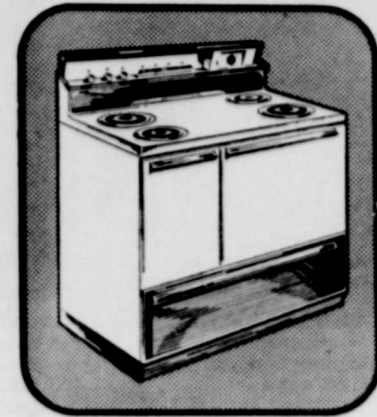
Miss Dittmar in nine 4-H years has canned and frozen enough food to feed a big family (or a small army), but much of her effort, too, has been directed to teaching and leading.

In addition to direct teaching of young 4-H'ers, she has given more than 150 demonstrations and exhibits related to food preservation and has made 45 talks.

Why does she teach? "I have been trained to learn by doing," she said, "so that now I can teach to do the same."

Screwworm Cases Still Popping Up On Plains

Although recent cold weather throughout the Texas Plains area should begin to curb screwworm cases, livestock producers need to continue to keep a watchful eye for the pest during the next few weeks.

Screwworm cases literally exploded across Texas in October, with more than 4,000 cases being confirmed, report officials at the Mission Laboratory where sterile screwworm flies are being produced in record numbers to combat the situation. At present, 190 to 200 million sterile flies are being produced each week, almost three times the capacity for which the plant was designed.

Briscoe County with one case and Swisher with two remain the northernmost counties in the state reporting confirmed cases during October. Other South Plains counties on the "casualty" list include Crosby with one case; Borden, three; Scurry, two; Gaines, one; and Howard, five.

Numerous counties in the Rolling Plains also reported cases during the past month. They include Archer, Dickens, Haskell and Motley, each with one case; Jones and Stonewall, two; Stephens, three; and Fisher, four.

As of November 1, Texas had already recorded 7,852 screwworm cases this year, exceeding case confirmations of all previous

years since the screwworm eradication eradication program was initiated in 1962, with the exception of the first year. Last year only 835 total cases were recorded.

**Soybeans: Production and Use**  
Indicated 1968 U.S. harvested acreage will hit an all-time high of almost 41 million acres. States exceeding 3 million harvested acres include Illinois, Iowa, Arkansas, Missouri, Minnesota, and Indiana.

For the second time, total U.S. production is expected to exceed one billion bushels. Illinois and Iowa are expected to top 100 million bushels—other soybean-producing states will each produce less than 100 million bushels.

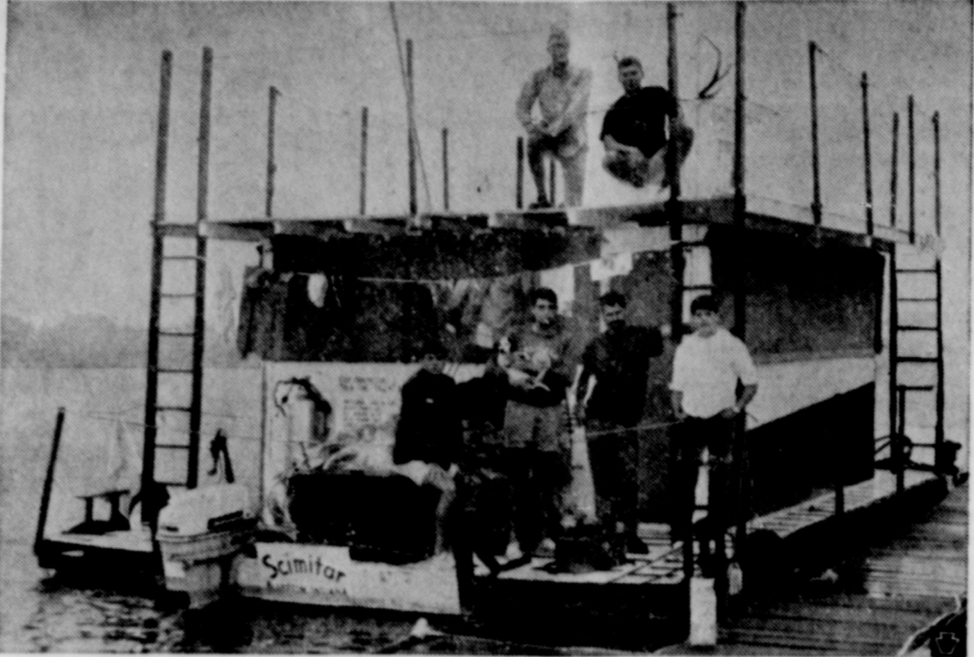
Annual soybean production has consistently exceeded total disposition since 1964. Total crushings have increased since 1960, but the rate of increase has slowed in recent years. Exports continue to climb—but at a reduced rate within the last two years. Amount of soybeans fed hasn't shown much change—while quantities used for seed has increased slightly since 1958.

In mid-1960's, prices received by soybean producers exceeded the average annual support price. Preliminary indications show growers receiving an average of \$2.49 per bushel for 1967, one cent lower than the \$2.50 national average support price. Texas soybean growers averaged \$2.26 per bushel on October 15, 1968, according to the Crop Reporting Board, Statistical Reporting Service, U.S.D.A.

Domestic consumption and exports and shipments of soybean oil has been slightly less than total production since 1965. This situation was reversed in 1963 and 1964—which helped reduce accumulated oil stocks through 1962.

Soybean meal fed within the U. S. continued to increase through 1967. Domestic use during October 1967—July 1968 totaled 9.1 million tons, an increase of one percent over a year earlier. Forces limiting the gain included (1) relatively high meal prices, (2) increased imports of fish meal, and (3) stronger competition from area in cattle feeding.

Newsman Leads Scout Explorers River Trip



BLUFFTON, INDIANA — They're remodeling and refurbishing the "Scimitar", whose home port of Bluffton is some 150 miles inland.

The land-locked raft-houseboat, built by the Scouts of Bluffton's Explorer Post 2144, is being readied for its 1969 trip down the Ohio and the Mississippi to New Orleans.

Last summer the 3½ ton raft took its crew of 18 Scouts and their four adult leaders to Tiptonville, Tennessee, on the Mississippi — a trip of approximately 600 miles.

An abandoned rock quarry near Bluffton, flooded by rains and seepage, is the testing basin for the 16 by 30 foot craft, on which the Scouts erected the enclosed galley, storage area and pilot house.

The forty-four 55-gallon drums which provided flotation, are being replaced by steel pontoons, according to Explorer Advisor Mike Thoele, of the news staff of the Bluffton News-Banner.

The twin outboard motors are being replaced by an inboard power plant, and paddle wheels.

And, Thoele said, he hopes to add an LP-gas refrigerator to the galley equipment, which already consists of a full-sized LP-gas kitchen range, including an oven. "Chief" of the galley was Bob Spaulding, a former Navy quartermaster and veteran camp cook, and one of the four adult leaders aboard the Scimitar.

The Scimitar, after its "maiden cruise" on the quarry pond, was disassembled and trucked to Marion, Indiana, where it was launched on the Ohio.

Next year, said Thoele, it is planned to truck the raft to the Ohio river at Evansville, Indiana. The LP-gas equipment was furnished by the Blue Flame Gas Corporation of Bluffton, which also trucked the Scouts' vessel from Bluffton to Marion, and from Tiptonville back home.

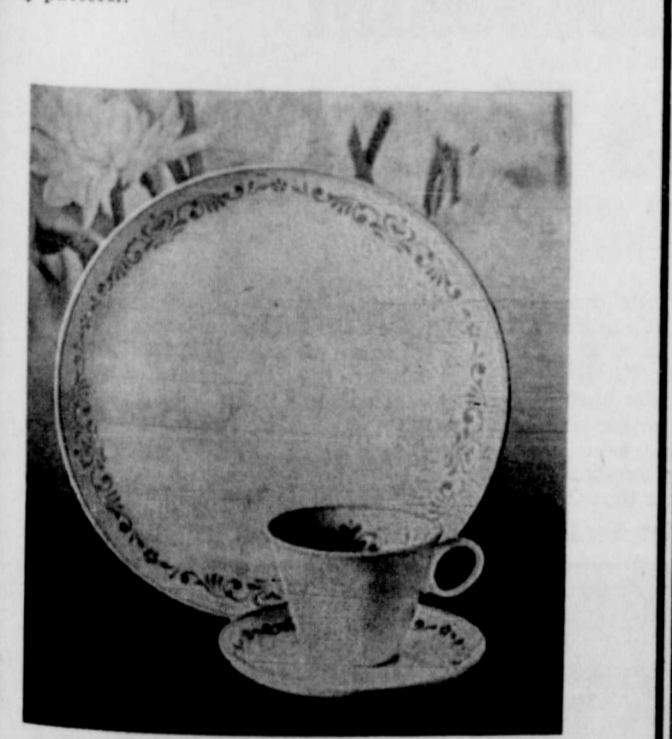

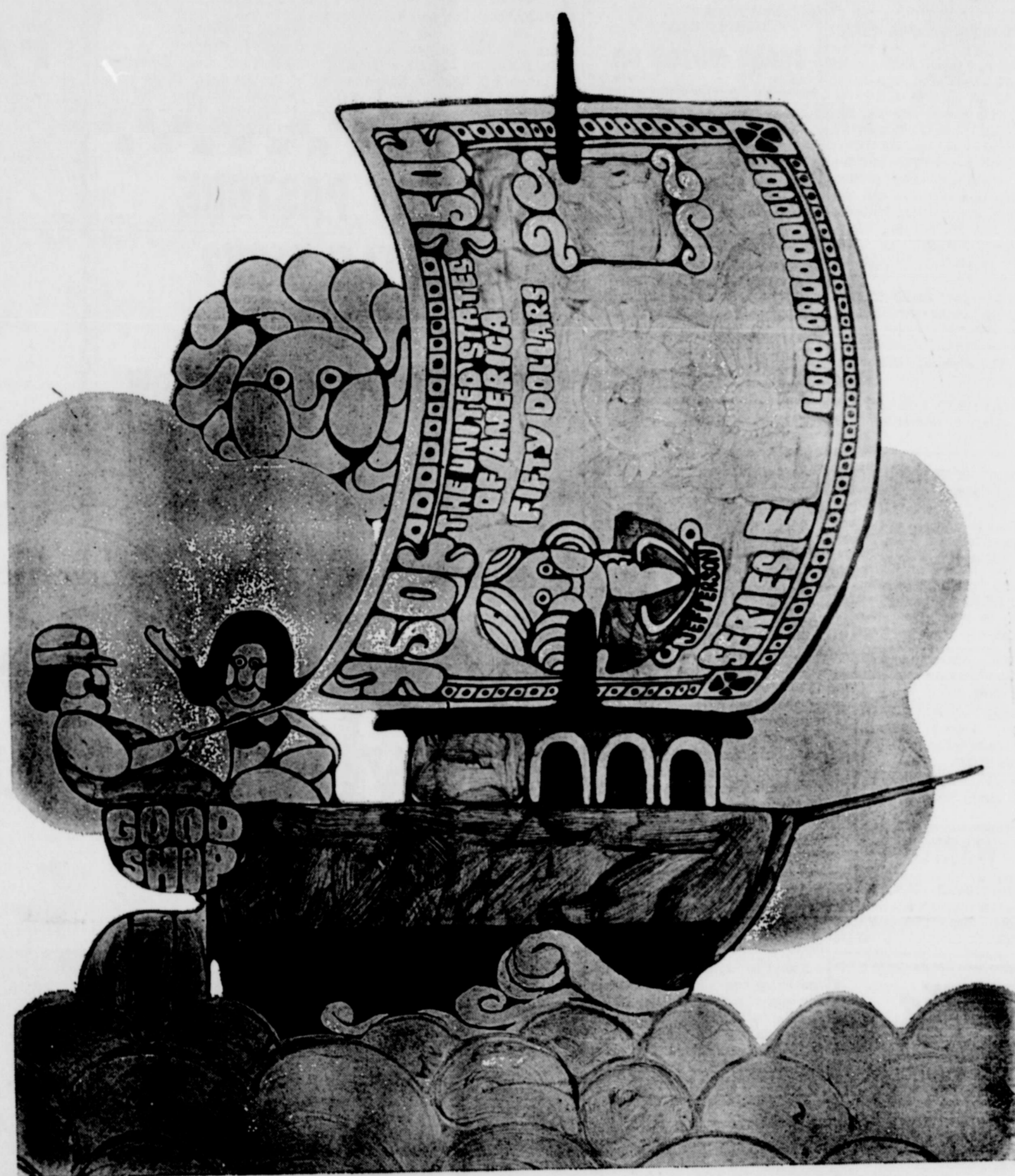

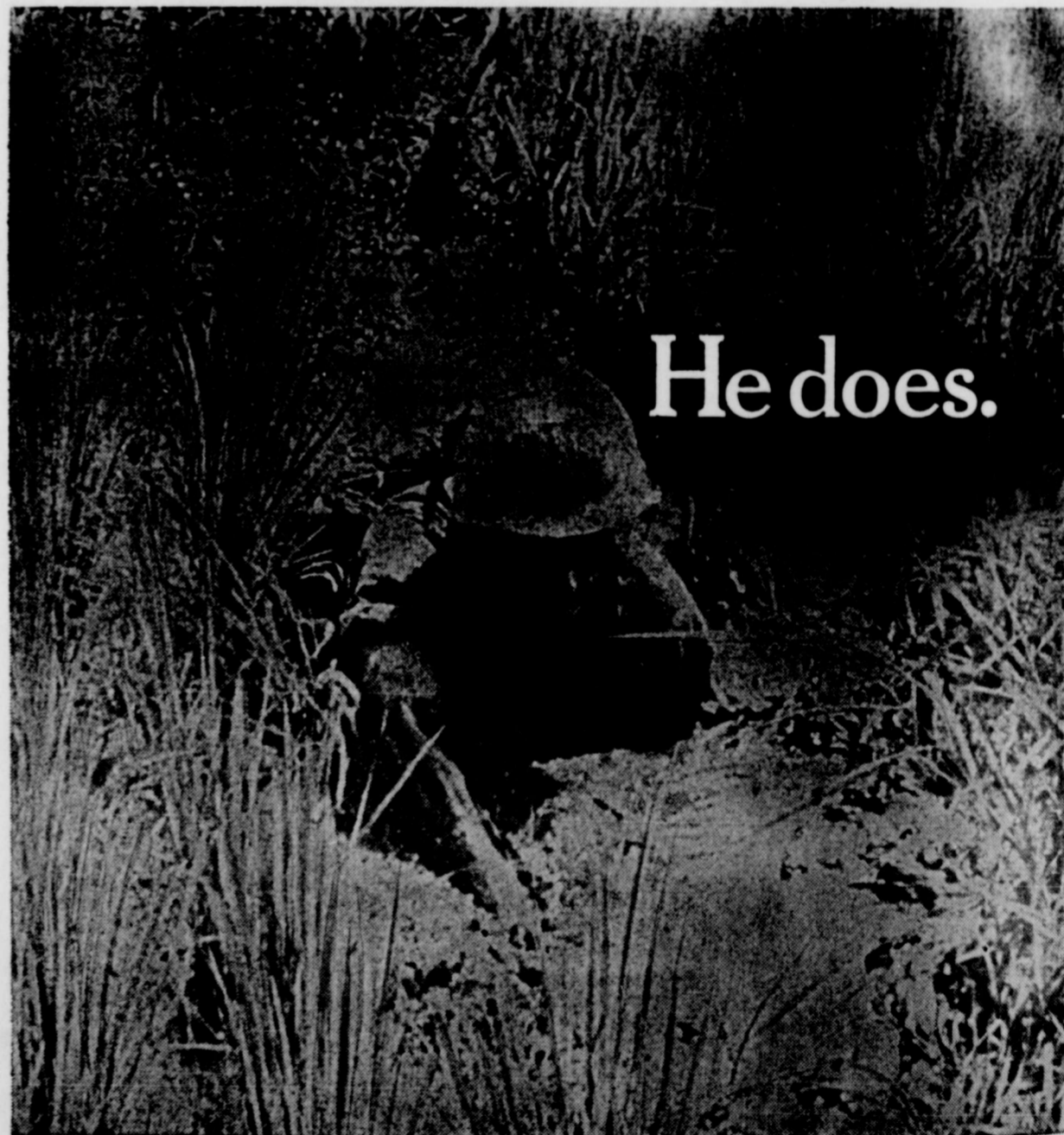
