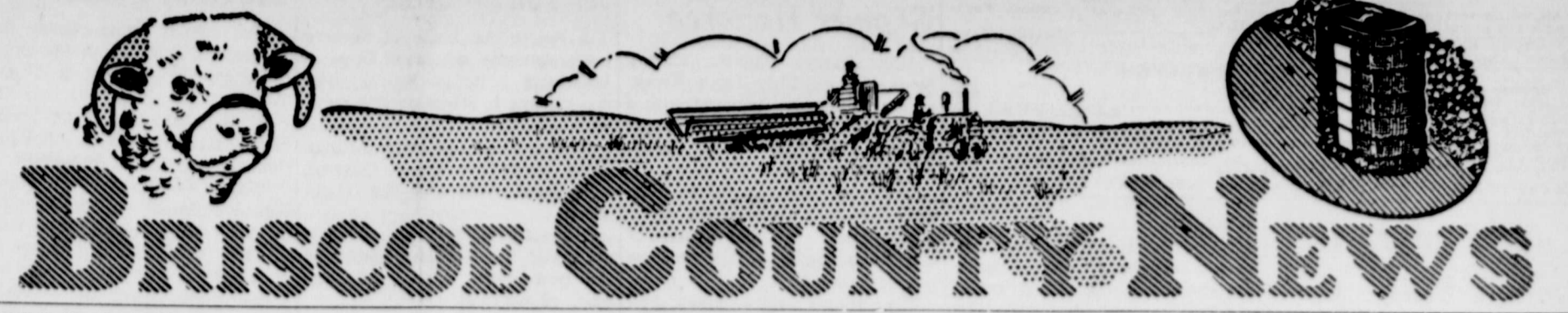

Top South Plains 4-H'ers To Be Honored Tuesday

Thirty-nine top 4-H Club boys and girls from throughout the South Plains will be honored at the annual Extension District II Gold Star Banquet on December 10 at 7:00 p.m. at Coronado High School in Lubbock.

"These youngsters will be saluted as the most outstanding 4-H members from their respective counties in the district," pointed out Billy C. Gunter and Mrs. Aubrey W. Russell, both of Lubbock, who are district agents with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "The Gold Star Award is the highest honor that can be bestowed by a county and is awarded only once to a boy or girl."

The award winners are selected annually by committees within each of the 20 counties in the district on the basis of personal development and outstanding achievement and leadership in projects and activities as well as contributions to the overall county 4-H program, according to County Agent Ken Cook.

About 450 people are expected to attend the event.

Guest speaker will be Dr. S. M. Kennedy, academic vice president at Texas Technological College. Master of ceremonies for the banquet will be the Honorable H. J. (Doc) Blanchard of Lubbock, state senator from the 28th senatorial district.

With an overhead projector, overlays can be flashed on a screen so that the teacher can explain problems to the whole class without having to copy it on the board. This also eliminates the need for diagram charts, and provides a newer and more modern method of teaching.

Superintendent Hinds explained that Mrs. Alvin Redin has been using an overhead projector which was purchased for her remedial reading class through the PESO program, and that the other teachers "are envious." James Ross Alexander has been using an overhead projector in the mathematics department some. The projectors cost approximately \$145.00 each, and Mr. Hinds says that the school desperately needs two and would like to have four of them.

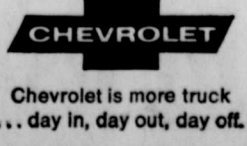

Mrs. Pat Northcutt, first vice-president, called the meeting to order in the absence of the president, Mrs. Wayne McMurtry.

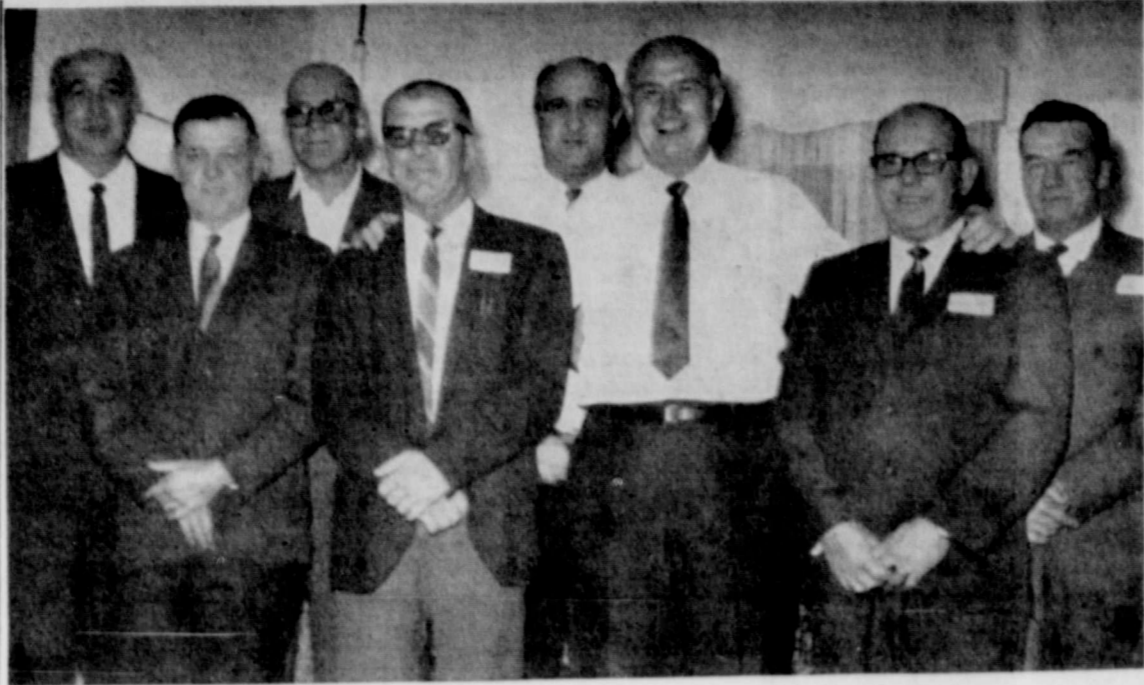
Ten members answered roll call with "A Texas Beauty Spot."

How many times each day do we make transgressions against each other? Or, to bring it closer to home, how often do YOU make transgressions against YOUR fellow man?

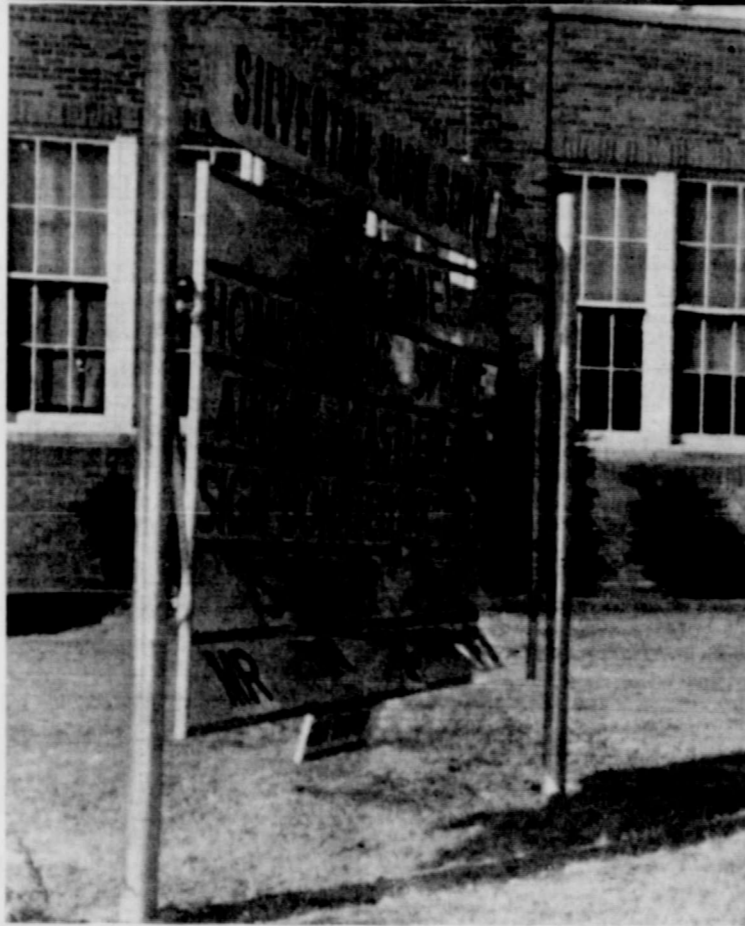
Each of us, as normal human beings, have faults. Some have more than others, some less. But it is time for each of us to take our own faults into consideration rather than passing judgment on others.

Responsibilities Of Citizenships

Upon returning to school after enjoying the Thanksgiving holidays, a disheartening sight filled my eyes. I couldn't believe my eyes when I discovered the sign that the FBLA Chapter had donated to the school had been partly demolished. The chapter had worked very hard to earn the \$500 to pay for the sign and had donated it, thinking it would be something the school could be proud of. It is hard to believe someone would be so immature as to want to do something so destructive.

The following article was taken from the October issue of Cal Farley's Boys Ranch "Roundup." Apparently someone has failed to practice the following helpful suggestions in rearing their families.

"Children," Cal Farley observed, "want, more than anything else, someone to raise them." As a guideline for those with the responsibility of raising boys, he suggested the following which should be of help to all parents:

"Teach the boy to obey. This is the toughest job and the most important. It should begin the minute after he opens his eyes.

"Give him responsibility. Make him feel part of the working team at home, and later he must become part of the team of whatever sphere of life he enters.

"Be specific with him. Let him know where you stand and therefore where he stands. Then his character is not confused by doubt, uncertainty or conflict.

"Live with him. Help him enjoy his youth by showing him how his boyhood years can be used to equip him for manhood.

"Love him. Let him know it. Show him that love cannot be measured by what you get or what you give but in how you conduct yourself. It is kind of a mutual

respect." I believe most of the young people of Silverton have higher values and goals, more important and constructive things to achieve than to delight in tearing down what others have built. But, of course, there are others whose goals are destructive. I think most of us conduct ourselves in a way that Silverton can be proud of its youth. But there are some, who for reasons known only to themselves, have failed to conform to the generally-accepted ways of having fun. They seek their pleasure at the expense of the community. Besides the destruction of the sign, the building was entered and a classroom clock, slide projector and a new tape recorder were taken.

The Arena Drive-In Theater glass door was shattered and the entire stock of supplies was taken. Things that were of no interest to the intruder were left broken and scattered on the floor. This was the third time the Drive-In has been broken into and similar damage done. It is a shame that these crimes go unpunished. It seems that if EVERYONE in the community, determined in their own minds to put a stop to it, something could be done.

I hope that the students of Silverton High School will not only conduct themselves in a way that will be an inspiration to others, but that they will have the courage to do all in their power to stop those who are indulging in their own selfish means of destruction.

Janet Spurgin, 17, of McKinney, and Anne Ashby, 15, of Dallas, have been awarded expense-paid trips to the 47th National 4-H Congress in Chicago for their projects while John Graham, 16, of Smithfield, won a \$50 U.S. savings bond for his.

Not only will the two young women get a chance to meet with the 1,650 delegates from all over the country in the Conrad Hilton Hotel, Dec. 1-5, but their records in their project areas will also be judged along with other category winners for national college scholarships.

Miss Spurgin, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O. E. Spurgin, chose the area of electricity for her interest and honor. Not exactly a typical area of study for a young lady, electricity, she points out, "is one of the best servants we have." She has learned to save many hours of time and energy as well as saving money through her project.

Electrical Whiz

In her eight years in the electrical field she has participated in more than 2,900 demonstrations, projects and experiences with electrical equipment and ideas. Planning to go into education, Miss Spurgin will travel to Chicago through the courtesy of the Westinghouse Electric

Corporation. She has served as president of her local 4-H Club.

Loves Horses

A lover of horses who now gives professional instruction in riding and care of them, Miss Ashby, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Ashby, has spent hundreds of hours riding, caring for and feeding her steeds. She said she comes from a club where most of the members have or are participating in horse projects. Most of them have received instruction in the equestrian arts from her and other veterans. She was president of her local 4-H Club last year.

For the past four years she has tended her own animals for which she has won many ribbons. They run wild in 500 acres of pasture and she said much of her time was spent just in corralling them. When she attends the congress in Chicago she will go as the guest of Merck & Co., Inc.

Though there is no provision for veterinary science winners

to attend the national congress, Graham has nevertheless come out top man in the state for his project in which he has made significant strides.

Pigs Lead Way

Graham, son of Mr. and Mrs. John Graham, found impetus for his project in three little Javelina pigs which his father saved from a dead sow.

Graham began his questioning there and soon learned many of the academic as well as the experimental facts that go into making a good vet. Although only 16, he is thinking seriously of becoming a veterinarian.

He said all of his other 4-H projects in his seven years in 4-H have been superseded by and have contributed to his winning field of veterinary science. His \$50 bond was contributed by the Upjohn Company.

All of the winners were selected in state competitions by the Texas A&M University Cooperative Extension Service.

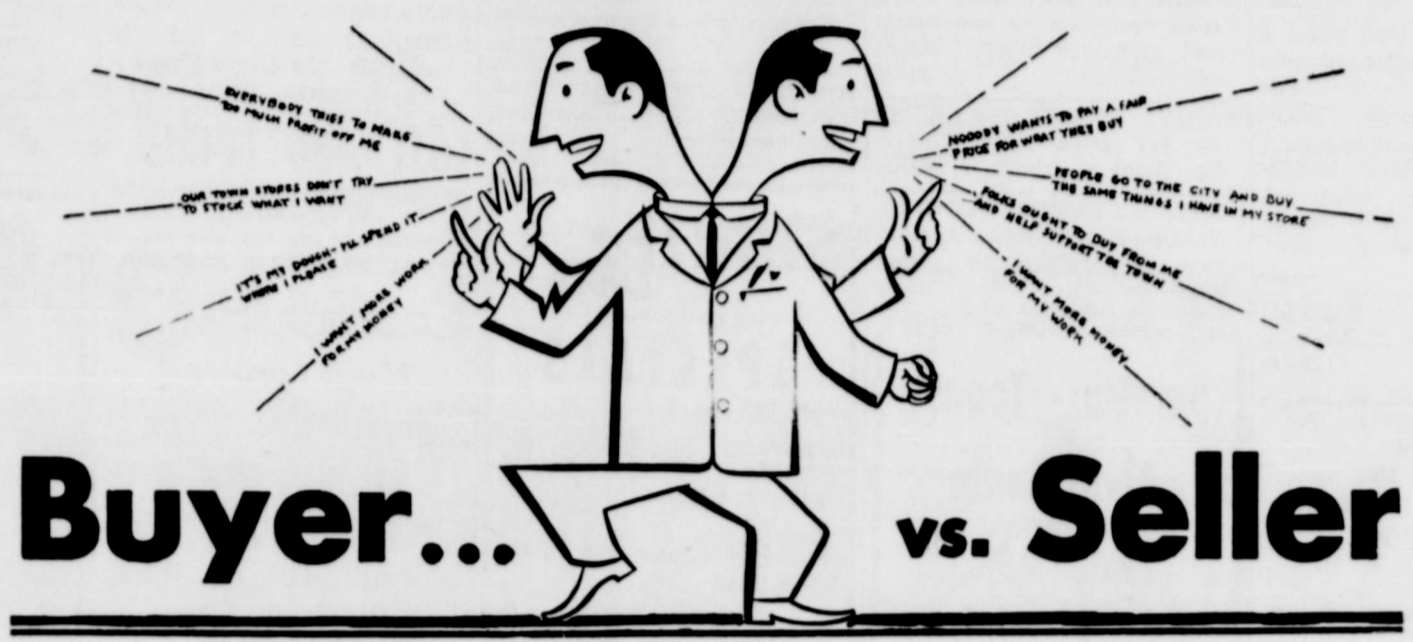
