## One Briscoe Accident Reported Last Month

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated one accident on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of November, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no death and no injury and an estimated property damage of \$80.00. The rural traffic accident summary for the county during the first eleven months of 1968 shows a total of 25 accidents resulting in two persons killed, seven persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$15,640.00.

## Hutsell Receives Army Commendation Medal For Heroism

Eleven members of the Eagle Brigade were recently honored in a ceremony at 5th Brigade Headquarters at Ford Leonard Wood, Missouri. Colonel H. E. LeFebvre presented two Bronze Star Medals, an Army Commendation Medal for heroism and eight Army Commendation Medals for meritorious service.

Staff Sergeant Joedell F. Hutsell, Headquarters Company 1-5, was presented the Army Commendation Medal for heroism in the Republic of Vietnam.

The medal was for heroism in connection with military operations against a hostile force in which Sergeant Hutsell distinguished himself by valorous action on February 18, 1968, as mess sergeant of a howitzer battery in support of an allied task force near Trang Bom. During the early morning hours, the unit's position was attacked by an estimated Viet Cong battalion utilizing mortars, rockets and assault troops. The enemy succeeded in breaching a portion of the defensive wire. Without regard for his own safety, Sergeant Hutsell left the security of the bunker and picked up a machine gun. Running to the point of heaviest action, he added firepower to that of the hard pressed defenders. This additional firepower helped the defenders to gain the initiative to halt the penetration into the perimeter. Through his courage and rapid reaction to the emergency, he contributed immeasurably to the successful defense of the position. Sergeant Hutsell's heroic actions were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army.

Sergeant Hutsell has served almost 14 years in the Army. The son of Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Hutsell, he has recently volunteered to return to Vietnam for his third tour of duty in January 1969.

He is presently visiting his family and friends here while on leave.

## Mrs. Alva Davis Dies In Amarillo

Mrs. Willie Mae Davis died in an Amarillo hospital Monday morning following a lengthy illness. She was the wife of Alva Davis, and both were former residents of Silvertown and Quitaque.

Funeral services were scheduled at 2:00 p.m. Tuesday at the Blackburn-Shaw Funeral Chapel in Amarillo.

Mrs. Davis was the mother of Mrs. John T. Francis.

### COUNTY AGENT'S DESK

Something Special For The Holiday Season

The beauty of a fire in the fireplace during this holiday season can be made even more noteworthy with the addition of a little something special.

That something special is the preparation of materials for the fireplace which will give multi-colored flames. Chemical treatment of the material to be burned can result in green, red, blue, orange or purple flames instead of the usual yellow flame from wood.

Calcium chloride can be used to produce orange-colored flames; copper chloride—blue; potassium chloride—purple; strontium nitrate—red; lithium chloride—carmine, and copper sulphate—emerald green. Dry pine cones, small chips or blocks of wood can be soaked in these chemicals for the multi-colored flames. Most of the chemicals can be purchased from chemical suppliers or drug stores.

To treat the cones or wood, a plastic pail and an onion sack are needed. The cones or chips are placed in the sack and immersed in a solution containing one pound of chemical dissolved thoroughly in one gallon of water. The bag must be weighted so that all of the material is completely covered and the cones and wood should soak for at least 10 minutes.

After soaking, place the treated material on newspapers to dry and then they are ready for brightening the holiday fireplace fire.

If wood is not easily available, newspapers can be rolled into

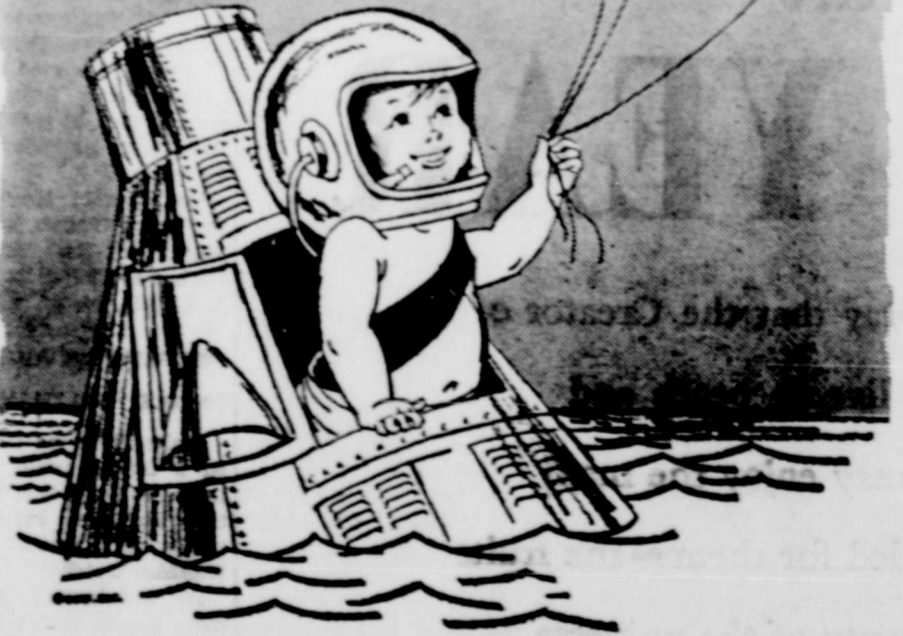

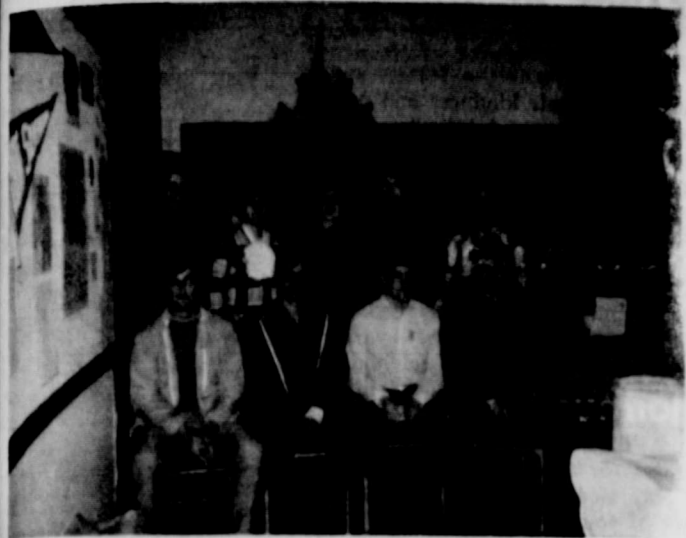

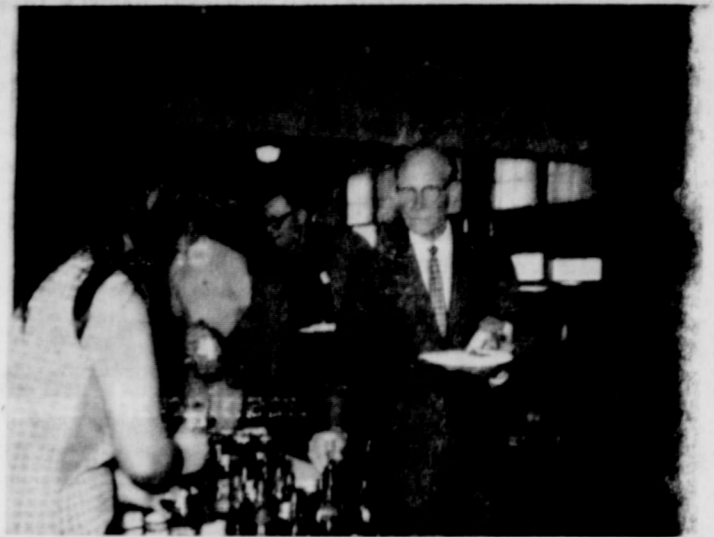
## Student Council Has Christmas Party
