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Memorial Service Held For J. V. Self

Funeral services for James Vaughter Self, 57, were conducted at 3:00 p.m. Friday, February 14, in the United Methodist Church in Silverton, with the pastor, Rev. Bob Sewell, and a former pastor, Rev. Carl Nunn of Clarendon, officiating. Masonic graveside rites were under the auspices of Silverton Lodge No. 754, AF&AM, and pallbearers were Norman Strange, Carver Monroe, Wayne McMurtry, Carl Bomar, Verlin Towe and Ben Whitfill. Burial was in the Silverton Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silverton Funeral Home.

Mr. Self was found dead about 9:00 a.m. Thursday at a farm three miles west of Silverton where he had gone to deliver butane. Ernest Strange, Briscoe County Justice of the Peace, said death was apparently caused by a heart seizure.

A native of Tupelo, Oklahoma, where he was born to Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Self on December 2, 1911. Mr. Self came to Briscoe County from Oklahoma in 1924. He and Miss Carolyn Schott were married March 8, 1946, at Lubbock.

A veteran of World War II, he had served in the Army Air Corps four years. He was a member of the Silverton Masonic Lodge and had served as Worshipful Master twice. He was a member of the United Methodist Church in Silverton. A stock farmer, he also operated a station and butane dealership here.

Mental Health Advisory Committee Has First Meeting

The Briscoe County Advisory Committee for the Central Plains Comprehensive Community Mental Health/Mental Retardation Center in Plainview, which serves nine counties, including Briscoe, met for the first time Monday of last week, with Mrs. Elizabeth Woodley, program planner, as the guest speaker.

A number of interested citizens were on hand to discuss mental health and mental retardation problems in Briscoe County and to hear what services are now available and what will be available in the future from the Central Plains Comprehensive Community Center.

Until the new facility opens, along with the Central Plains General Hospital sometime in the spring of 1970, the only available services now are for psychological testing, EEG tests, and group and family therapy and consultation at the High Plains Training Center for Children and Sheltered

Workshop, 214 West 11th, Plainview, according to Mrs. Woodley.

"It has been said that a community cannot prosper or grow without facing its problems," Mrs. Woodley said, "and the community must also serve its people and care for its own. Because of inadequate information, lack of community concern, and lack of funds, many communities across the nation have not coped with the growing problems of mental illness, nor have they met the growing need for local services to their mentally ill or retarded children."

"Until quite recently, the men-

Residents Asked To Submit Opinions On Proposed Building

Silverton City Councilmen continue to weigh the decision to build a new city hall, firetruck garage and community center.

It was decided that the Councilmen would test the opinion of city residents by placing a public opinion questionnaire in the local newspaper (located elsewhere on this page) before making a final decision on the proposal.

The proposed building would be 90'x100' and would be constructed at a cost estimated between \$60,000 and \$75,000. A bond issue would be necessary, but it would not be necessary to raise city taxes due to the fact that the City has very little indebtedness and there is a sufficient amount of money in the sinking fund to take care of present indebtedness.

The City's bonded indebtedness is \$10,000, and the payment on this is \$5,000 each year and will be completely paid in two years. There is more than \$17,000 in the sinking fund at present, and part of the City's income each year is added to the sinking fund.

The building would provide facilities for housing three firetrucks. Offices would be provided for the city secretary and for the business transactions of tax assessing and collecting and collection of city water bills.

There would be a room provided for Council meetings. The community room would have one large room approximately 40'x80' with a kitchen and a small meeting room.

The public opinion questionnaires are to be answered by interested residents of the City of Silverton, and either taken or mailed to City Secretary Jerry Patton at the City Hall.

ally ill and related have been traditionally handled out of sight, primarily in state and federal institutions. Mr. Woodley continued, "There is a new concept of how to handle this problem, a changing philosophy about the prevention and treatment of mental illness.

"The new concept is of handling the emotionally ill or retarded in or near our local communities, just as we treat physical disorders, and the theory that prevention, early detection and care in the local community is more effective, and therefore more to be desired, than waiting until the patient must be placed in a distant institution.

"The testing of children and adults who are thought to be mentally retarded is very important," Mr. Woodley said. "Many times the cause that produces this condition can be corrected, and the patient can be completely rehabilitated. The rehabilitation is much easier for a mental patient who has received treatment in an area hospital than it is for one who has been sent to a state institution. And fewer of those who are treated locally have to return again for treatment of the same problem."

Walter Newton of Fort Worth, regional co-ordinator, also added his comments on the plan for the Community Center.

Mr. Woodley complimented the Briscoe County Advisory Committee for being the first organized in the state-county area. She added that if there is enough interest, it is possible that a speech and hearing workshop will be made possible. Plans are also being made for a Speech Prevention Team in connection with the new Center.

Mr. Woodley summed up her comments with the suggestion that many things are possible locally in the field of mental health and mental retardation if the citizens are willing to work for them.

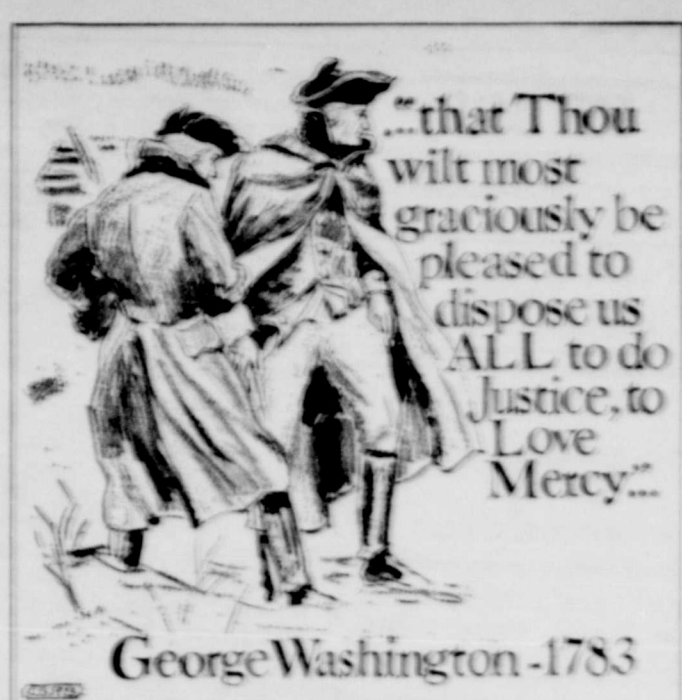

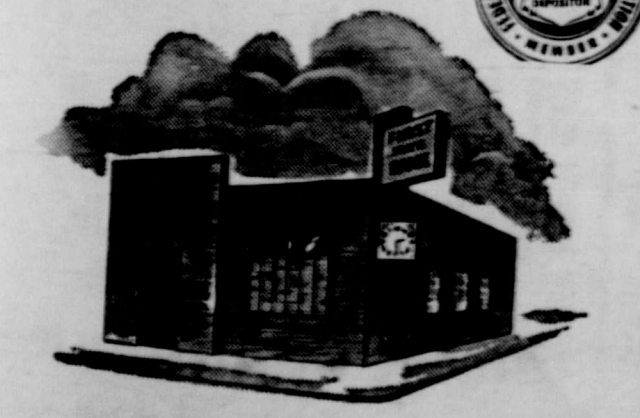
