WHAT'S THE FRIENDSHIP OF CHILDREN WORTH?

Adults who observed the activities of Ken (Festus) Curtis during the Amarillo Fat Stock Show and Rodeo were impressed because he never failed to talk with the ragged waifs who lacked the price of admission but who gathered behind the pens each night to get a glimpse of their television hero through the fence. It is said that Curtis would line up the children, shake the hand of each, and visit with each one of them.

What is this worth to a television star? Possibly nothing more than having millions of dirty, ragged kids think he is wonderful, but it could be worth much more. The television network has tried to drop the western series in which Festus is one of the characters, but due to a landslide of protest from the viewing audience has not been able to do so. The show is one of the oldtimers, and has seen many other good shows come and go.

Mightn't part of the show's success be due to the popularity of its character actors?

When Kenneth Wyatt, Tulsa artist and minister, was in Silverton recently to be guest speaker for the Young Homemaker-Young Farmer Banquet, he told of accompanying Festus to a children's hospital in San Angelo, where a sick child had been crying for days on end. All efforts to quiet the child had failed, but within seconds after Festus approached his bedside, the little boy was grinning.

Wyatt sold Curtis several paintings while the Amarillo Show was going on, and has made several rodeo appearances with the Festus character since. He appears to be "sold" on the television personality, and has done several favors for Curtis, including making photographs of the countryside on ranches in Briscoe County.

Modern science has transformed the "dried" prune into a tenderized dehydrated, moist fruit. The softer, more moist and flavorful prunes that require little, if any, cooking are dehydrated, pasteurized and steamed to increase their moisture content. The still-moist and tender fruit then is quickly and scientifically packed.

The small size prunes generally are lower in price. Look at the package; a number such as 80/90 or 50/60 indicates the range of the number of prunes in the package. The higher the number, the smaller the prune.

The convenient prune is a good source of vitamin A and iron, both of which have been found lacking in the American diet.

Soft, plump and ready for eating—that's the way prunes tumble from the package or carton these days. Some children eat them as candy and prunes are equally good for ingredient use, either whole, snipped with scissors, or cut from the pit.

You can use one of several methods of preparing prunes. For **Boiling Water Method**, cover a pound of prunes with a quart of boiling water. Cover the container and let prunes soak for 24 hours. Keep in the refrigerator. The longer prunes soak the plumper they get. This method gives a "light-bodied" juice.

Soak and Cook Method: If you like a thick, syrupy juice with prunes, soak them first (overnight preferably). Then cook by bringing the water to a quick boil, turning the flame low and simmering three to five minutes.

Steaming Method: Place prunes in colander and set over tea kettle or pan of boiling water for 30 minutes or more until plumped. You get no syrup at all with this method.

Cold Water Method: If you want plumped prunes to use in baking or cooking other dishes, put the prunes in a jar or bowl, cover with cold water—one quart of water to a pound of prunes. Cover the container and let soak for 24 hours. Then tuck them away in the refrigerator ready for use any time the spirit moves you.

Just Cook Method: Without soaking the prunes first, place them in saucepan, cover with cold water—one quart of water to a pound of prunes—bring to a boil and simmer gently for 10 to 20 minutes. Preferably let stand overnight in their liquid before eating. The prunes grow plumper and

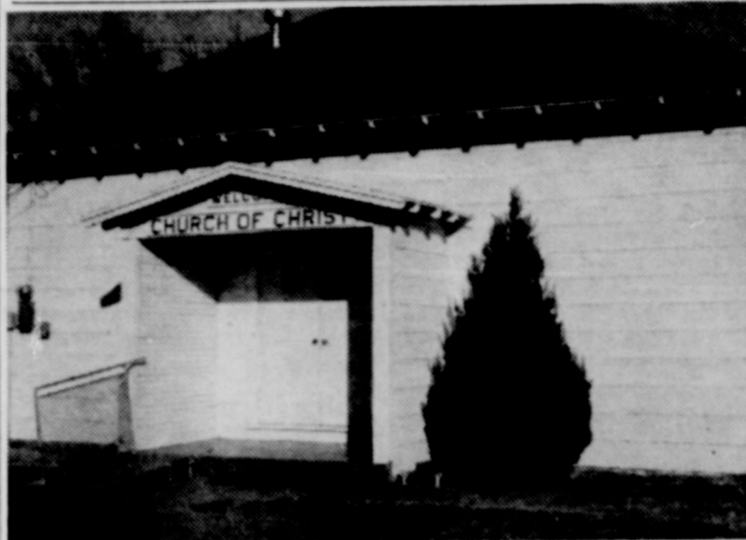

The objectives of brush and weed control is to obtain the longest control for the least cost with the largest increase of forage and livestock production, and to maintain a good grass cover. Brush and weed control is only one important phase of the overall ranch management program. To be most beneficial, brush and weed work should be combined with proper stocking and deferred rotation grazing.

All kinds of biological, mechanical and chemical methods have their place in brush control programs. Consideration should be given to the cost of various methods to obtain the most control for

the cheapest cost, how long they will last and the pounds of livestock products resulting from increased grass production.

Returns from brush and weed control are much more than just increased grass production. Added benefits are:
