We've been noticing the averages of area high school and eighth grade honor graduates, and we think we have reason to brag about the high scholastic averages posted each year by the Silverton valedictorians and salutatorians.

This year there will be approximately 30 graduates; Crockett Grabbe, the valedictorian, has an average of 98.657, and Johnny Roy Weaver, the salutatorian, has earned a 96.171 average. Three other Seniors also have excellent averages: Paul Ray McWilliams, 94.342; Barbara Davis, 91.216; and Carron Montague, 91.000.

The 1969 Silverton eighth grade valedictorian, Amy Birdwell, en joys an average of 95.399, and the salutatorian, Laura Arnold, has a 94.346 scholastic average. Four other students were closely in the running: Joan Cross, 94.166; Debra Cantwell, 93.416; Ramona Martin, 92.166; and Rhonda Sutton,

I have looked up the averages of the Silverton high school and eighth grade valedictorians and salutatorans for the past ten years. I was unable to locate the top high school averages for 1966 and the top grade school averages for 1962, so the averages that follow are for a nine-year period.

Since 1960, the Silverton High School valedictorians have posted an average scholastic grade mark of 95.875. The salutatorians have been right behind them with ar average grade of 93.541.

The eighth grade valedictorians have recorded an average grade of 95.085, while the salutatorians earned an average grade of 94.516.



A basic oil painting workshop will be taught by Mrs. Louise Vaughan in the Silverton High School homemaking department

The May 19 and May 26 classes will be held from 3:30 until 6:30 p.m. The four Monday night classes in June will meet from 1:30 until 4:30 p.m.

In the workshop, special attention will be devoted to the basic principles of oil painting which will include (1) the planning of composition, (2) simplified drawing, (3) design and development of color, (4) and control of color texture and technique.

Students will be introduced to painting through the study of the basic principles of oil painting, with an emphasis on color mixture and application. They will then move to the study of simple object still life and into landscape and individual preference in landscape once the basics are understood. The instruction will emphasize experimentation, interpretation, technique and style. Individual attention and constructive criti-

cism will be offered.
