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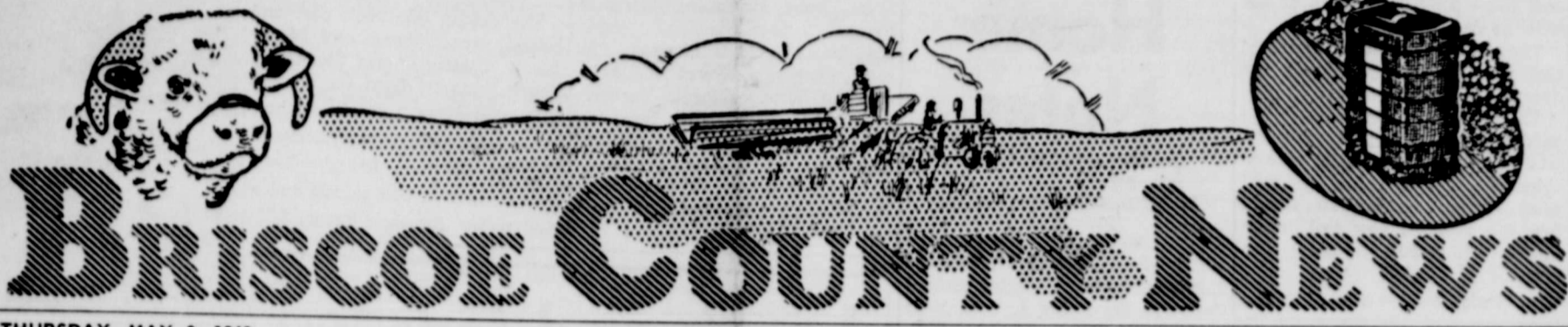

Funeral services for Ira Lawton Nall, 71, a Tulla resident since 1924, were conducted at 3:00 p.m. Tuesday in Wallace Funeral Chapel in Tulla. The Rev. Roland Moore, pastor of the Vigo Baptist Church, officiated. Burial was in Rose Hill Cemetery at Tulla.

Mr. Nall died Sunday night at his home in Tulla.

## Plainview Boy Hospitalized After Accident In Tule Canyon Saturday

A father and son fishing trip ended in a more than six-hour rescue ordeal Saturday for Valjean Cook and his son, Jeff, 13.

Jeff was admitted to the Plainview Hospital about 4:00 p.m. Saturday after he was extricated from rocks in a canyon northwest of Silverton. He reportedly suffered a compound fracture of the left leg and a broken wrist.

The accident occurred about 9:30 a.m. Saturday while Cook, his son, and a friend, Sonny Driver, all of Plainview, were descending a canyon wall to try fishing. Cook said his son "slipped on a rock similar to sandstone" and fell 15 or 20 feet into large rocks.

He said he and Driver managed to lift the youth to a ledge and then decided to go for help. Driver went to a farm house and telephoned for help, and in response, Briscoe County Sheriff Vinson Smith, Highway Patrolmen and a doctor from Tulla, rushed to the scene. Several Silverton men also assisted, including Fred Mercer, Donald Dee Weast, Jarus Flowers, Darrell McWilliams and others.

An effort was made to secure a helicopter from Reese Air Force Base, but clearance reportedly was not given for the chopper.

Cook said Dr. Scarborough descended the cliff and gave Jeff a shot to relax him and to kill the pain. The Silverton ambulance service lowered a stretcher to the victim about 1:30 p.m.

The lift from the canyon required more than an hour and a half, Cook said, with Jeff roped onto the stretcher and the stretcher lifted out by ropes.

Cook was especially complimentary regarding the turnout, and the work of the doctor and law enforcement officers. "We just called and they came out and worked like it was their everyday job. They knew what to do."

## Crop Prospects Improved By Rain

The official measurement of rainfall in Silverton so far in May has been 1.97 inches.

Some heavier reports were received from rural areas to the south and north of Silverton, with two inches of rain being reported by Billy Cogdell from an area of the county which had been very dry.

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### The Legislative Loft

The 61st Legislature is moving into the final month with a tremendous backlog of legislation, most of which will never reach the House floor.

One measure, however, that is certain to receive close attention before the legislature closes its doors is the appropriations bill. The first round ended two weeks ago when the state spending bill was passed out of the House with seemingly little debate.

It's now in a joint committee where substantial changes are anticipated. For instance, the House version did not include a teachers pay raise. A great deal of pressure is on the committee to insert a raise before the bill leaves committee.

Should the teachers receive their proposed pay raise it will

cost the state \$220 million of the existing funds.

The committee has promised that the bill will spend only the revenue now in existence.

There has been discussion regarding a tax free year with legislators returning annually to consider the spending for the next year. It's my opinion we should face the problem now and decide the spending for the next two years.

A special session was held last June that cost the taxpayers between \$30 and \$35 million. If we don't meet, it doesn't cost a thing. That would be a tremendous savings alone.

The Tort Claims Act, which I voted against, was vetoed by Governor Preston Smith. Rep. Temple Dickson of Sweetwater, who authored the bill, said he hasn't decided whether or not he will attempt to override the governor's veto. A two-thirds vote is needed to override the veto and the bill received more than that when it was first passed.

There are several measures that have received more than their share of attention recently. I am interested in finding out your opinion. Below are four questions; please send in your thoughts.

1. Are you in favor of lowering

the voting age?

2. Are you in favor of public school teachers receiving a pay raise at this time?

3. Should state aide be given to Parochial schools?

4. Do you favor sex education in public schools?

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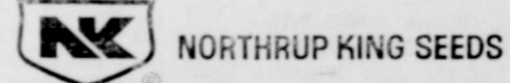

### Oil Painting Workshop To Be Held Here This Summer

A basic oil painting workshop will be taught by Mrs. Louise Vaughan in the Silverton High School homemaking department beginning Monday, May 19.

The workshop will consist of six three-hour classes at \$4.00 each or \$24.00 for the six-week course. This program is not limited to students, but is open to adults. Beginners as well as those who have had previous art training are invited to participate.

The May 19 and May 26 classes will be held from 3:30 until 6:30 p.m. The four Monday night classes in June will meet from 1:30 until 4:30 p.m.

Anyone who is interested in this art workshop is asked to contact Mrs. Rubie Williams at the Silverton High School homemaking department.

In the workshop, special attention will be devoted to the basic principles of oil painting which will include (1) the planning of composition, (2) simplified drawing, (3) design and development of color, (4) and control of color, texture and technique.

Students will be introduced to painting through the study of the basic principles of oil painting, with an emphasis on color mixture and application. They will then move to the study of simple object still life and into landscape and individual preference in landscape once the basics are understood. The instruction will emphasize experimentation, interpretation, technique and style. Individual attention and constructive criticism will be offered.

Materials needed by each student will include: oil paints—white, ochre, cadmium red light, cadmium yellow light, viridian green, cobalt blue, ultramarine blue, alizarin crimson, cerulean blue, raw sienna, burnt umber, black, orange, oxide chromium green, burnt sienna, venetian red; brushes—bristle flat size 12, red sable flat size 12, red sable flat size 5, red sable flat size 3, round sable no. 1; TV tray, research file of magazine pictures for ideas, paper towels, one box Kleenex, newspapers with no pictures on them, plenty of rags, pasteboard box easel, pure linseed oil, grumtine for cleaning brushes, palette, palette knife, one size 16x20 canvas pad, two 12x16 canvas boards, two 14x18 canvas boards, easel, small sticks vine charcoal.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (HJR8)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 5, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, as amended, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet in regular session each year at such time as may be provided by law and at other times as convened by the Governor. When convened in odd-numbered years in regular session, the Legislature shall devote the first thirty days to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointees of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the succeeding thirty days of such session the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider all bills and resolutions and other matters then pending; and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as

may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine its order of business during this session by an affirmative vote of four-fifths of its membership.

"Regular sessions in even-numbered years, commencing in 1972, shall not exceed sixty days and shall be limited to legislation on the subjects of providing funds for the support of functions and activities of the state government and emergency matters submitted by the Governor in messages to the Legislature. At each regular session, commencing in 1971, appropriations shall be made for the support of functions and activities of the state government for the next fiscal year."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on August 5, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide for annual legislative sessions."

**NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT'S DESK**



During the last half of May, some 40,000 Texas farmers will receive at their mailboxes a most important questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service in Austin.

It will be the annual acreage survey and many farmers in Briscoe County will be included in the 40,000. The information derived from the replies will be the basis for the official estimates of crop acreage for the State of Texas and for each county.

Cary D. Palmer, state statistician for the Texas Reporting Service, emphasizes the importance of getting back just as many of the 40,000 questionnaires as possible so that each county will be well represented. Accurate estimates are of the greatest importance to farmers in planting production and marketing and in providing an unbiased picture of Texas agriculture, Palmer adds.

The Texas Legislature has provided a program of estimate for

Section 1. **Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character.

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

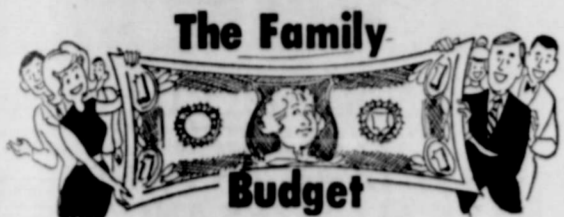

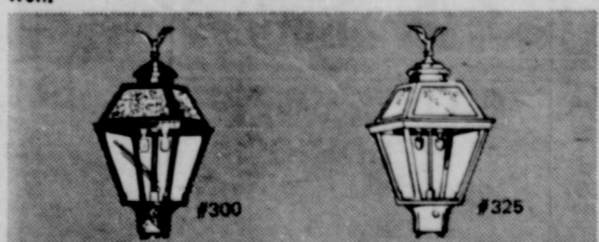
