### To Do Mission Work In 'Project Germany'

Miss Laquita Bomar, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Wylie Bomar, jr. of Silverton, will be one of several college students going to Germany this summer to do mission work in a number of cities.

Laquita will be taking part in "Project Germany," an evangelistic endeavor which has been carried out each summer for several years, sponsored by individuals and Churches of Christ. Silverton Church of Christ has assumed the sponsorship of Laquita, and will support her fully, with the exception of an initial sum contributed by her parents.

The group of students, all of whom use their regular vacation time for this effort, will meet in Searcy, Arkansas, June 5 for orientation. They are scheduled to leave Memphis, Tennessee, on June 9 on their flight to Germany, and expect to arrive back in the United States on August 18.

Cities in which the group will work include Dusseldorf, Cologne, Wiesbaden, Munich, Karlsruhe, Frankfurt, Nuremberg, Kaiserslautern and Ludwigburg.

Some of the activities carried out by the students include singing as a choral group in busy sections, making personal door-to-door calls, inviting people to attend revival meetings; enrolling interested persons in "cottage meetings" and Bible study periods, and other duties too numerous to mention.

## Four Towns To Vote On Mackenzie Project

An election to determine the fate of the proposed Mackenzie water project which would provide municipal water for four area towns has tentatively been set for September 6.

Board of directors of Mackenzie Water Authority, meeting Thursday night in Tullia with city councils from Silverton, Lockney, Floydada and Tullia, member cities, called the election after the four councils and water authority members endorsed the proposal.

The issue, in another form, was presented earlier but was defeated by the voters of Tullia and Floydada. The original proposal was a package deal in which the authority would have acquired the property, constructed the dam, filter system, and constructed water transmission lines to the member cities. Chief opposition came from Floydada and Tullia which did not need the water immediately but would have had to begin using and paying for it immediately.

The new proposal calls for construction of the dam and a part of the filter plant sufficient to serve the needs of Silverton. Each city will provide its own water transmission lines at the time it desires the water. Floydada and Lockney, which will use a common line from the dam to the city limits of Lockney, agreed to build the line in 1977 if by that time one of the cities wants the water. The line can be built earlier if both cities agree, or construction can be delayed until after 1977 if neither city needs the water.

To finance the project, general obligation bonds in the amount of approximately \$4,275,000 would be authorized by the four towns. Of this amount, approximately \$3,460,000 would be spent immediately and would pay cost of the land, dam, raw water line to filter plant, and partial completion of the filter plant. The balance

of \$815,000 would be used to complete the filter plant at the time the other three cities need water from the project.

A 10c operational tax would also appear on the ballot. This would pay for operation of the filtration plant and management of the project.

The water authority would be a new political entity such as a school or hospital district. It would build the dam and assess and collect taxes.

On the same day of the bond election, called by the water authority, each of the four cities will call a municipal election to authorize water supply contracts between the respective cities and the water authority. These contracts are agreements that the cities will purchase their pro rata amounts of water from the authority when they need it. These water contracts will be held by the authority and can be used for security in acquiring funds to build the water transmission lines to the cities.

Since the authority's water

rights to the waters of Tule Creek expire this fall, defeat of the proposal on September 6 will in effect kill the project.

An intensive educational program will be conducted by the authority prior to the election so that each resident will be informed concerning the project. A question and answer brochure will be published soon.

Officers re-elected at Thursday night's meeting were Lon Davis, Floydada, president; Tom Moore, Lockney, vice president; and John

Ziegler, Tullia, secretary-treasurer.

Other members of the board are S. W. Ross, Floydada; O. C. Bailey, Lockney; Charles Whitfill and Milton Dudley, Silverton; and John Tole, Tullia.

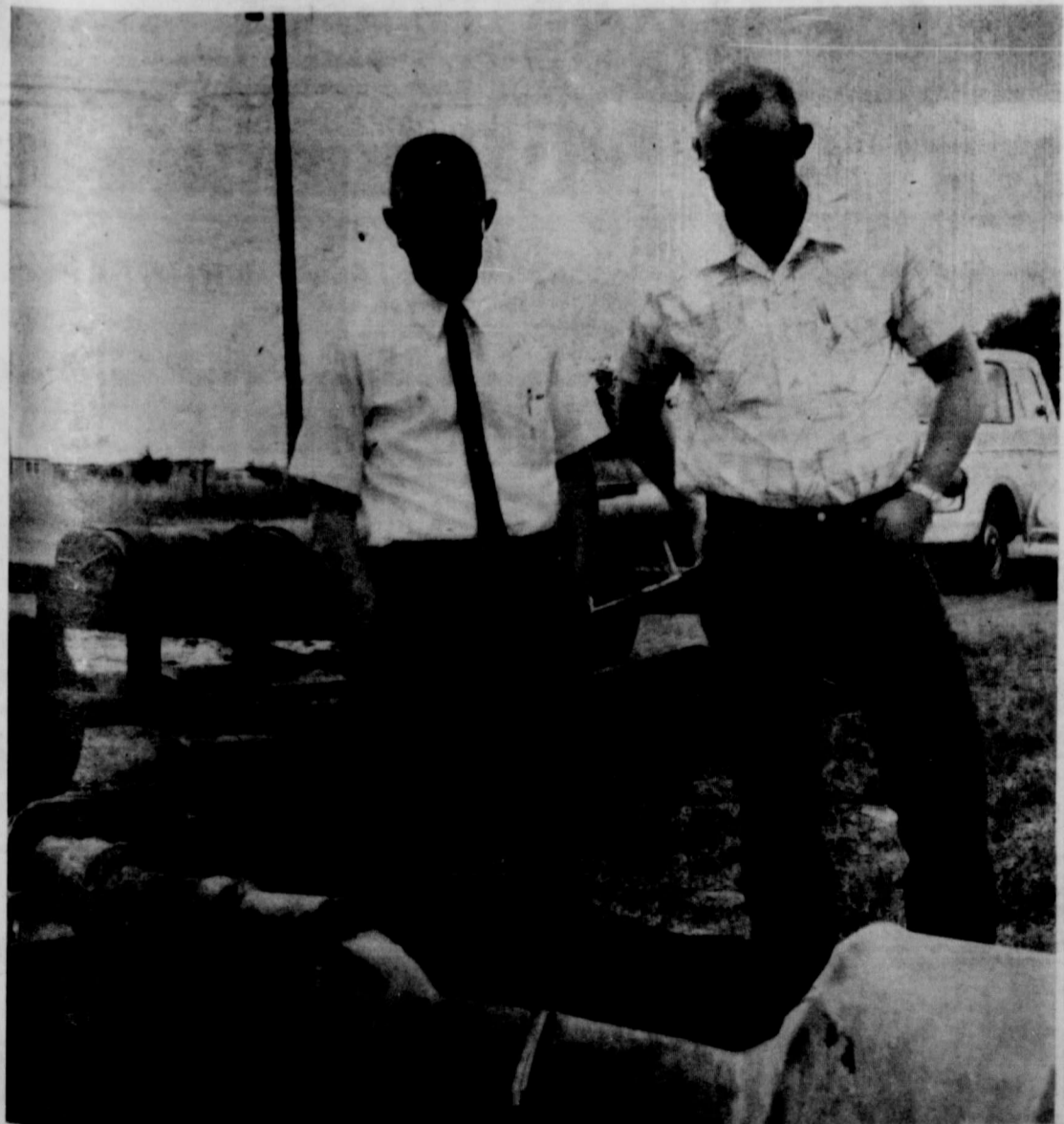

## DEAR EDITOR:

You receive herewith some information about my aunt, Mrs. Velma Reeves Brown of San Benito, who passed away last Friday in San Benito.

Since she lived in Briscoe County about 20 years or more back in those "old days", I guess you still have a number of oldtimers who remember the Reeves of those days. I am hoping you can use a story about her funeral.

One of her brothers—my father, Oscar Tillman Reeves, who was a Briscoe County rancher on the property now known as the Lemons' ranch at the head of the Linguish Falls canyon about eight miles southeast of Silverton—I believe was Briscoe County's first tax assessor and maybe collector, too. (My brother, Sim Reeves, could tell you.)

Mrs. Brown's father's place was about three miles north and two east of the point where the Floydada-Silverton road hits the county line. The old house, which faced south, was still there ten years or so ago—not sure if it is still there.

You were very cooperative about using a story of my Uncle Kellus' funeral in your paper about May 1—which I sent you, and I do appreciate it. I "pulled a boner" with that story and forgot to mention Uncle Kellus' two sisters, Mrs. Brown and Mrs. Maude Reeves McVay.

My father, Oscar Reeves, died in 1908 while on a business trip to Plainview where he was building a home to move "us so we could go to school." We did move shortly after his death, but my brother, Sim T. Reeves, is a well known (near South Plains)

farmer and rancher now moved over to near Memphis, Texas. Thank you. Garnet Reeves

Funeral services for Mrs. Velma Reeves Brown, 92, of San Benito, who died Friday after a brief illness, were conducted in the First Baptist Church there on Tuesday, May 27.

Mrs. Brown, a pioneer citizen of Briscoe County, moved here with her parents in the early 1880's. Her parents, Joseph Harvey Reeves and Nannie Richardson Reeves had eight children. Mrs. Brown has been very active in church work and civic activities in San Benito.

Survivors include a son, W. O. Brown, jr., M. D., Scottsbluff, Nebraska; a sister, Mrs. Maude Reeves McVay, Grants Pass, Ore-

gon; a granddaughter, Joan Brown of Big Spring; a grandson, Charles Edward Brown of College Park, Maryland; and several nieces and nephews, including Sim Reeves, Memphis.

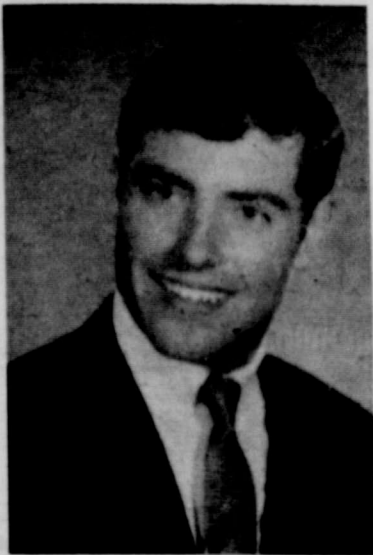

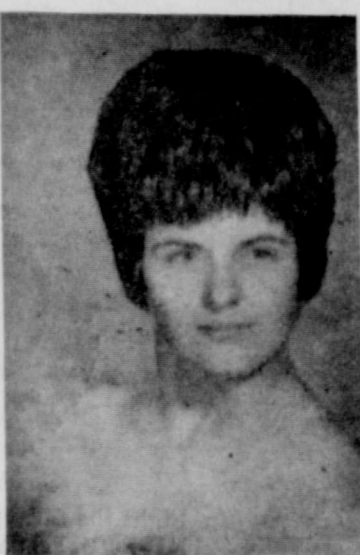

## Program Honors Club's President

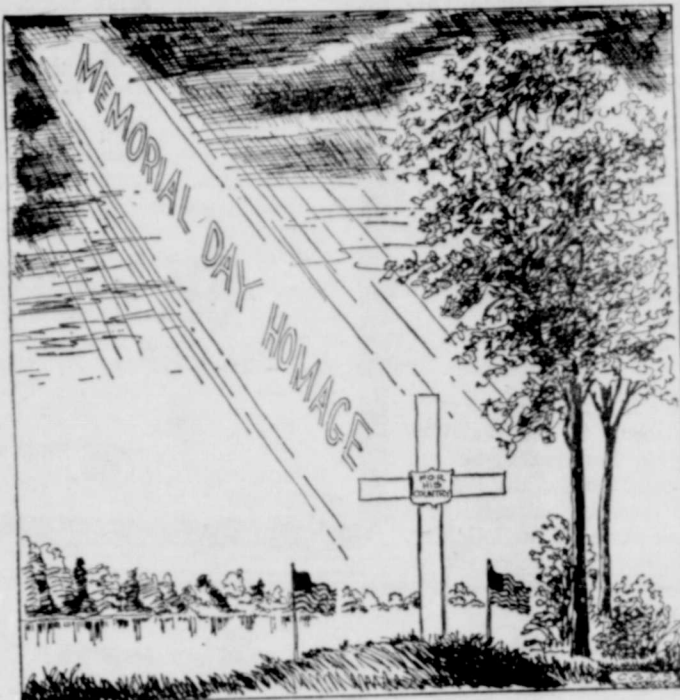

greenery to finish the arrangement—and asked each club member who had not been elected to fill an office to signify her willingness to support the club by adding their part to the bouquet.

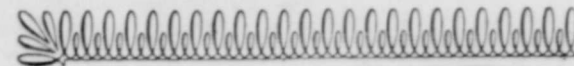

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# Home Notes

Although weaving, knitting and felting currently account for most fabrics used in home furnishings, a new process may give stiff competition.

The new fabric, produced on an European-developed Malimo machine, is neither woven, knitted nor felted, describes Extension Specialist Jane Berry. The fabric is made by laying thousands of yarns side by side on trays where they are stitched into position by tiny needles.

The resulting fabric has several characteristics ideal for home furnishings use, notes the housing and home furnishings specialist. Malimo fabric currently is available in ready-made curtains, draperies and table linens in both solid and fashionable prints. In the very near future consumers will be able to purchase upholstered furniture, slipcovers and bedspreads made of Malimo cloth. Malimo technology takes less time to produce fabrics than with conventional methods. Economy of production can be passed on to the consumer in lower prices. Versatility, another asset of the process, permits a wide range of textures and patterns.

Fabrics made by the Malimo process are noted for superior performance. They dimensionally are stable under practically any condition; will not stretch, sag or shrink. Most Malimo fabrics may be machine washed and dried.

The production speed of Malimo is unique in the field of textiles. A single Malimo machine can produce up to 164 square yards of the fabric per hour. Depending on construction and yarn choice, such fabrics can be treated to have a high durable press rating, and may be able to withstand high heat, breathing action plus many other easy-care features. You may find that the filling yarns run at right angles. These yarns are not slightly "off grain" as sometimes happens in woven fabrics. The slight-of-grain in Malimo fabrics is determined by the warp threads only. If you detect an angle in the filling threads, do not try to straighten the fabric. To do so will be to distort it.

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## Texas 4-H Round-Up Slated For June 3-4

The Texas 4-H Roundup, scheduled for June 3-4 at Texas A&M University, will include some 1800 4-H Club members.

The 4-H members will come from every section of the state and the only livestock involved will be that used in judging and demonstration contests. In addition to the 4-H members, approximately 250 county and assistant county Extension agents and adult leaders, 200 friends of 4-H and contest donors and 30 members of the board of directors of the Texas 4-H Youth Development Foundation will participate in planned activities for Round-up.

The annual event is one of the oldest statewide 4-H gatherings in the nation, and traces its beginning back to near the turn of the century even before 4-H officially became the youth phase program of the Cooperative Extension Service.

The 4-H Club members who go to Round-up have already been named county and district winners in their respective judging and demonstration contests. Only first and second place district winners are eligible to compete in the state contests.

Sharon Jarrett and Marvin Self will represent Briscoe County with a Farm and Ranch Management Demonstration. Sharon is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Claude Jarrett of Silverton, and Marvin is the son of Mr. and Mrs. J. L. Self, also of Silverton.

Their demonstration placed second in the District II elimination contest May 3 at Lubbock. Since then, they have presented their demonstration to the Silverton Lions Club, the Town & Country and Southwestern home demonstration clubs.

Mrs. Claude Jarrett and the Home Demonstration Agent, Mrs. Naomi Hunt, will accompany the team to College Station.
