GUIDELINES AIRED FOR HIRING YOUTH FOR FARM JOBS

Summer is almost here and many farmers and ranchers will be hiring boys and girls to fill in for the critical labor shortage during the summer months. But before employing such youth, certain requirements must be met under the Fair Labor Standard Act as amended in 1966.

Employers must abide by the Agricultural and Child Labor Requirements when hiring youth under 16 years of age other than the owner's or operator's own children.

This law states, briefly, that youngsters under 16 cannot be hired to operate or ride on tractors (over 20 belt horsepower) or self-loading wagons or hoise wagons; operate or unclog combines, field balers, hay conditioners, forage harvesters, corn pickers, roughage blowers or crop dryers; operate post-hole diggers or power driven saws; or work inside a gas-tight forage or grain enclosure or in a yard, pen or stall occupied by a dairy bull, boar or stud horse.

These standards do not apply when a youngster under 16 is employed by his parent on a farm operated by such parent. Also, those youth under 16 who have completed a bona fide cooperative vocational training program are exempt from the provisions of the act.

Many counties and many county agricultural agents in the area are conducting such training programs at the present in order to prepare youngsters between the ages of 14 and 16 for summer employment.

This training mainly involves the safe operation of tractors and farm machinery. Identification cards are issued after successful completion of the training program, and employers should make sure that youngsters have these cards before hiring them. An employer can be fined up to \$10,000 for willful violation of the Labor Act.

Check with your county agricultural agent for additional information on Child Labor if you have plans to employ youngsters on your farm or ranch this summer.

Up at Berkley it looks like a war with the National Guard trying to stop the riots."

After reading this letter I think those of us who are fortunate enough to live in the Panhandle and particularly in Silverton should stop and count our blessings.

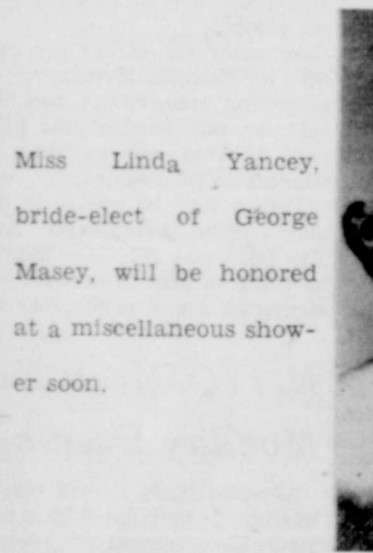

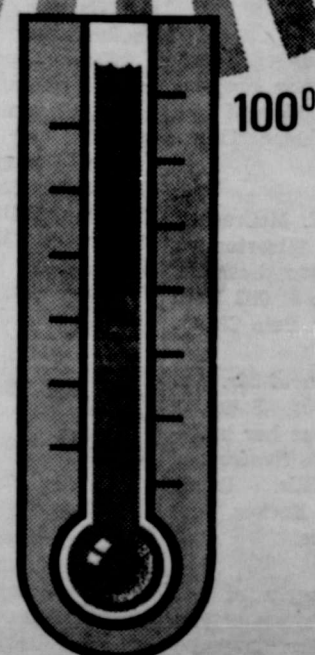

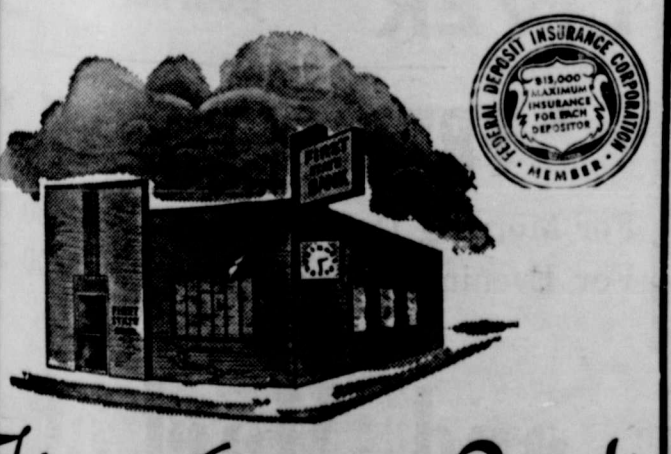
