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Greenbugs On The Increase In Briscoe County Fields

Greenbugs over much of the South Plains seem to be increasing, according to an announcement by Briscoe County Agent Ken Cook. As of today, numerous fields in Briscoe County have required treatment.

Producers are urged to inspect their fields closely every few days in order to keep abreast of the greenbug infestation in this county. The infestations could change from time to time due to an increase in greenbug numbers or a decrease in the beneficial insects.

Greenbugs can be found in moderate populations in older grain sorghum. The greenbugs need to be closely observed as the plants continue to develop.

Corn leaf aphids are present in most areas and spray applications have been made in limited areas. However, corn leaf aphid damage is generally not severe and past research has shown that little gain in yield can be obtained except under extremely heavy populations. Beneficial insects appear to be increasing through the area.

Extent of greenbug damage in grain and forage sorghum depends on their numbers, plant size and stage of growth, plant vigor, moisture conditions, and presence of parasite and predators. Producers should closely observe plant condition as well as development of the greenbug numbers and damage. The damage from the seedling stage to early pre-boot may result in stand loss and plant death.

Plants from emergence to about six inches in height should be treated if damage is visible and greenbug colonies are present on the lower leaf surface. Research data from 1968 indicates that larger plants, up to the pre-boot stage, will tolerate more greenbugs. Numerous greenbugs on this size plant should be controlled before entire leaves are killed.

Yield production during the pre-boot, boot, blooming and grain development stages depend on greenbug numbers, length of time the greenbugs have infested plants and the plant condition. Based on last year's experience and research, heavily populated areas can cause extreme damage to pre-boot and older plants. Indications are to control greenbugs when they cause death to more than two lower, normalized leaves.

During the past year, 780 girls in need of a home have been turned away at Girlstown simply because there is no room for them.

There is an extraordinary opportunity being given to the girls who live at Girlstown, and they would like to be able to open their home, their family and their hearts to as many girls as possible.

What does your church mean to you?

Electric Co-ops Brought Freedom To Rural America

Editor's Note: The following speech was written by Gail Mayfield, a student in Silverton High School, who was a runner-up in the Swisher Electric Cooperative's Youth - Tour Contest. Despite the adverse publicity drawn by some teenagers of the nation, most of them, like Gail, are studying and working hard for a better tomorrow.

"The coming of electricity to the countryside changed the face of rural America, and through the work of the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and the Agency for Internal Development, it promises to do the same for other nations around the world."

The above statement was made by Senator J. W. Fulbright of Arkansas. I cannot think of a better way to abridge the great works of the REA from its adolescence into full maturity.

February 14, 1941, was a big day in the life of the Swisher Electric Cooperative. At last the dream of their electricity project and energized line became a reality.

A big change immediately came into the lives of many people. Because no one can please all of the people all of the time, there were those who were opposed to rural electrification. Some opposition was due to the fear of a broken line electrocuting cattle. Many of these people were ignorant of the fact that their chore of milking the cows could be made less unpleasant by having adequate lighting. Because the lamp lights did not extend their beams very far, many amusing and distressing incidents occurred.

One of the most frequently told stories was of a man who was carrying a five-gallon can of milk and failed to see a calf lying in his path. When the calf spooked, the milk and man went flying in opposite directions. Electric milking machines and lights in barns have now made a giant step forward and have overcome the obsolete problems of yesterday.

Early day fire losses were numerous because of kerosene lamps. The typical housewife's chore was to trim the wicks and clean the lamp globes. She had to take extra precautions to see that the blaze did not escape to the kerosene. If this happened, an entire house could burn and all of the personal belongings of the family would be destroyed in a matter of minutes.

After convincing the farmers and ranchers that they would pro-

fit by electrification, the REA began their extensive work to provide for the needs of rural families. Even today, their work is not completed and they are still striving to serve the present-day demands.

The modern housewife has many luxuries that could not be possible without electricity. Instead of cleaning lamp globes, a wife merely flips a switch which provides adequate lighting for her kitchen. She opens her cans of food with an electric can opener and cooks her meals on an electric stove.

On hot summer evenings she takes ice cream out of her deep freeze to soothe her children. After dining, her dishes are washed by pushing a button on an electric dishwasher. While the dishes are being washed, she enjoys relaxing in the electrically-heated and air-conditioned home. She may even choose to sew on her electric sewing machine, which is much faster and requires less effort than her grandmother's treadle-type.

Her clothes are washed and dried in a short period of time by an electric washer and drier. The water supply throughout the house is supplied by an electric pressure pump and hot water heater. These are only a few of the luxurious comforts of present-day living for the wife and mother whose home is serviced by the rural electric cooperative.

One of the greatest helps to the rancher and farmer is the electric vapor light. This bright light illuminates all parts of the farmhouse and surrounding area.

If a man desires to check on his livestock at night, the light guides him to his project. The tendency for thieves to steal gasoline, tools, or other properties is discouraged by having a vapor light.

Electric lights have contributed greatly to the growing popularity of feed lots. Continual exposure to light causes the animals' biological time clock to be upset. The cattle sleep less, eat more, and gain weight faster. The result is a multi-million dollar cattle industry of ever-increasing proportions which is centered in the rich grain sections of West Texas. In the past ten years, the number of cattle being fattened by feed lot operations has increased 626 percent.

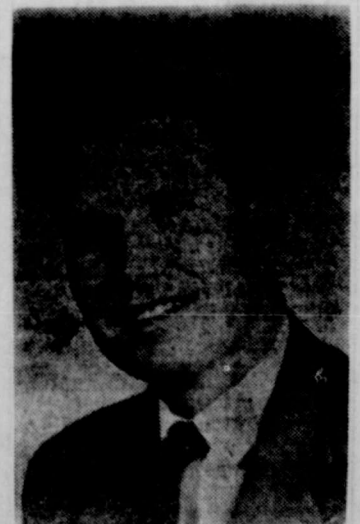

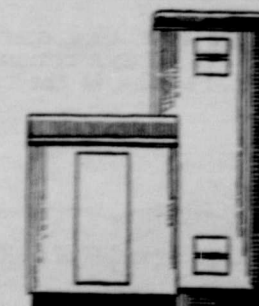
