GOLD FOUND IN TEXAS?

You can't always believe what you hear, see or read, especially if it appears in the Briscoe County News! On about the eleventh of July—when we were trying to put out a newspaper early so we could get off to the mountains—I misread the calendar and set type thinking that the district 4-H dress revue and horse show would be over or in progress when the readers received their copy of the paper. So, I placed the dress revue in past tense and the horse show in present tense. The dress revue took place Tuesday of this week and the horse show is taking place today—I hope—as scheduled. I can guess how surprised the 4-H'ers involved in these two events were to read about the things they had already done when they hadn't!

Well, here we go again. Monday morning, Jon and Elaine LaBaume handed me a clipping that Jon's mother sent them. This carried an Odessa Associated Press dateline and was published July 10, 1969.

"With all the thousands of legends of gold in Texas, somebody just had to find some sooner or later."

"So the Dixilyn Corp. of Odessa, primarily an offshore drilling firm, said Wednesday it has drilled through what it believes to be the Old Hundred Vein in Galena Mountain about five miles from Silvertown, Texas."

"Assays from a core sampling showed about 16 ounces of gold and 52 ounces of silver per ton. The company emphasizes that this single core hole does not establish any amount of reserves and the extent of the ore is completely unknown."

"It is, however, the first company sample from that area of the Old Hundred Vein which meanders in a somewhat vertical direction in the mountain."

"Miners first worked the vein around the 1860's, a company spokesman said."

Well, will wonders never cease! Gold in Texas! Do you believe it? It looks like the unknown writer of that item may be trying to help us stem the local population decrease with a big gold rush. Are we ready for the California boom days? And will someone please locate Galena Mountain for me? (Colorado, maybe?)

Saturday we visited in the summer home of Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Holt in Red River. They have such a comfortable mountain home with a beautiful view of a trout stream in which Mrs. Holt "occasionally" fishes. Mr. Holt waved his Briscoe County News and said he was surprised to see us in Red River because he didn't see anything in the paper about us being there.

It's raining everyday in Red River. This only slightly dampens the fun and helps keep it cool. (I don't recommend your going to the mountains, though; it makes you notice so much more about the heat here when you get back.) At this writing, I've been rained on for seven consecutive days and I surely hope it keeps it up for a few more days.

The grapevine has it that the Champ McGavocks got 3½ inches of rain and the Robert McPhersons 4 inches of rain on Monday evening. Silvertown received 1.40 in the official gauge at Fred Stranges' house. It rained about half an inch during a cloudburst at about 4:30 p.m. in downtown Silvertown, turning the streets into rivers. A board about five feet long, five or six inches wide and a couple of inches thick floated past the News Office. It really isn't everyday that a board that size can travel the half block from the First State Bank to the News Office on the crest of a wave! At the same time, it barely sprinkled at my home which is only about six blocks away.

The youth died Sunday night in a one-car accident about ten miles east of Memphis on Texas 256. A tire blew out, causing the car to overturn. The men who have been chosen by the United States to be included among the astronauts are such outstanding individuals, and their wives and children also seem to possess outstanding qualities. You can hear them describe their feelings about space exploration and their hopes for the future, and be proud that you, too, are an American and "a member of the same team," so to speak.

"We came in peace for all mankind," reads a plaque unveiled on the moon by Astronauts Armstrong and Aldrin and hopefully the achievement will lend itself to that never-ending quest.

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NUMBER FOUR IS IMPORTANT PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT

August 5 will be a turning point for rural Texans if the public gives approval to Amendment Four.

Many of the state's non-profit rural water supply corporations are being heavily taxed; and if the taxation continues, the systems will be forced to make drastic changes. At the present time, some system's tax bills are ranging to near \$20.00 per member per year. In most cases, the system's officers will be forced to raise the normal monthly minimum of \$7.00 to \$9.00 for that first 3,000 gallons if present taxing continues.

With the approval of proposed Amendment Four on August 5, the rural water supply corporations will be given the same tax break as the municipal systems in the state, no taxes.

"Each resident of the state will be given an opportunity to vote on Amendment Four; and if a favorable vote develops, rural Texas will continue to grow," stated Jerry Johnson of Nacogdoches, president of the Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations. He continued, "Approval of Amendment Four will also eliminate the double taxation. In some cases, the member - owners are being taxed

through their system; and, in all cases, the installation of the rural water system created an increased value of their property and they are being taxed on that increase."

The Texas Association of Rural Water Corporations, representing 225 systems in the state with 33,000 members, is urging the general public to approve Amendment Four on the August 5 ballot.

The Power To Save

In his letter to Christians in Rome Paul said: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth; to the Jew first, and also to the Greek." (Romans 1:16)

This verse brings our attention to several things: the gospel was of Christ; it is God's power unto salvation. The definite article "the" sets it aside as being the only power for effecting salvation; it is the power of God to save everyone regardless of nationality; it must be believed before it can work.

The word gospel means "good news" or "glad tidings" for without it man would forever be lost in his sins. The word power is from the Greek "dynamis," from which we get our words dynamite, dynamo, etc. The gospel is God's "dynamite" for blasting out sin. Several verses in the New Testament, in which the word "gospel" is found, shows its relationship to the saving of the soul: in the Apostle Peter's first epistle (Chapter 1) in the closing verses, he speaks of those who were born again of incorruptible seed, which he says is the word of God, and in the closing verse says, "And this is the word which by the gospel is preached unto you."

Just before Jesus' ascension to the Father, following His resurrection, he gave His Apostles the great commission: "... Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16: 15-16)

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Peter stated in I Peter 4:16-17, "For the time is come that judgment must begin at the house of God: and if it first begin at us, what shall be the end of them that obey not the gospel? And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the ungodly and the sinner appear?"

Paul answers this rather saddening and disturbing question in his second letter to the Thessalonians in the following words: "And to you who are troubled rest with us, when the Lord Jesus shall be revealed from heaven with His mighty angels, in flaming fire taking vengeance on them that know not God, and that obey not the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ. Who shall be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord, and from the glory of His power." II Thessalonians 1:7-9)

Paul was so sure that the gospel of Christ was the only saving power that he warned the people in Galatia as follows: "But though we, or an angel from heaven, preach any other gospel unto you than that which we have preached unto you, let him be accursed." (Galatians 1:8)

From the preceding verses we deduce that the gospel is God's power to save; Jesus said that those who refused to believe and obey it would be damned.

Peter shows that it must be obeyed when he asked what the end of those would be who refused to obey it. Paul says plainly that they would be punished with everlasting destruction from the presence of the Lord and the glory of His power.

Obedience to the gospel is obviously the same that was, and is, done to be saved or receive remission of sins. The early preachers and disciples urged men to believe (Mark 16:15-16), to repent (Acts 2:38, Acts 3:19, Acts 17:30-31), to confess Jesus as the Son of God (Romans 10:9-19, Acts 36, 37), to be baptized (Acts 10:48, Acts

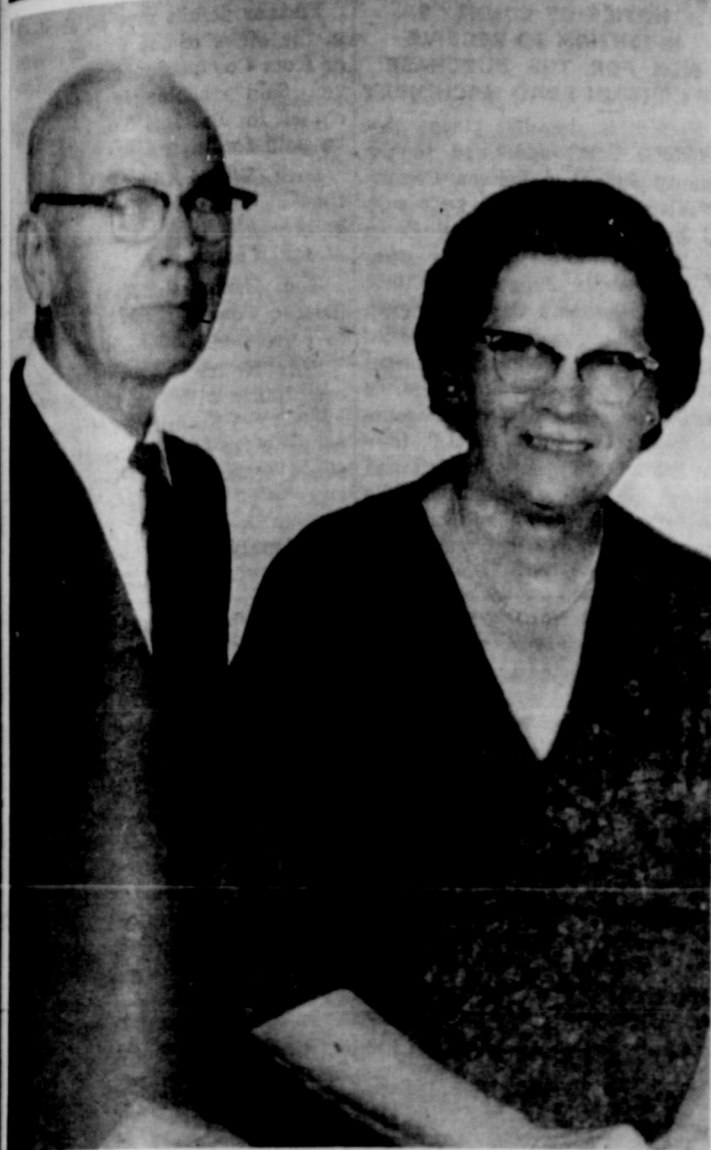

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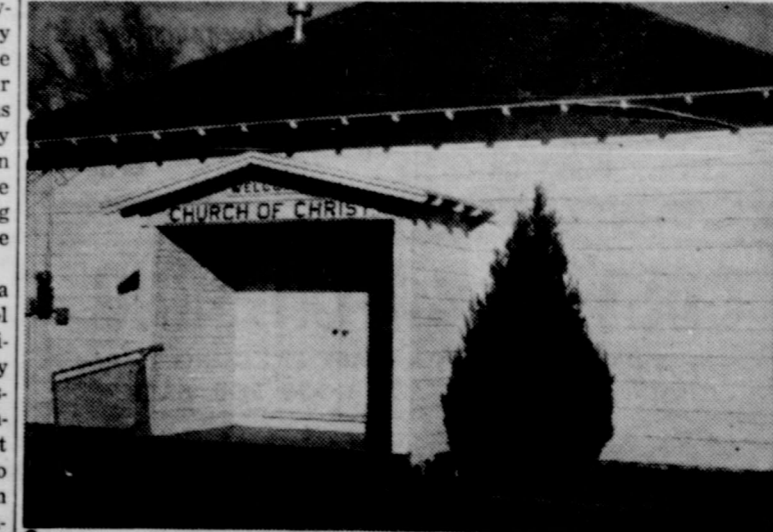
