## Grain Sorghum Contract Ratified By Area Farmers

Don Kimball, president of the Texas National Farmers Organization, announced Friday morning the ratification by farmers of the Texas Panhandle of a \$3,000,000 grain sorghum supply contract with West Friona Grain Company, Inc.

The contract, covering 1969 grain sorghum, was ratified when 800 farmers met on Thursday evening, July 24, in Hereford.

Farmers from 16 counties, including Briscoe, will participate in the contract.

The contract reflects a 15% increase in the price of grain sorghum over current quoted prices, and it is believed that this contract and other NFO activities will cause a substantial increase in the price of grain sorghum throughout the Texas Panhandle within the next few weeks.

G. W. Lee, local NFO president, stated that this increase will in many instances be the difference between farmers making a profit or showing a loss on their 1969 grain sorghum crops.

He also stated that an increase of grain sorghum prices in Briscoe County is extremely important to the entire economy of the county. "An increase of 30c per hundredweight in Briscoe County would place in circulation approximately \$300,000.00. Economists tell us that money paid for farm commodities circulates 3 1/2 times in the local economy and 7 times in the national economy."

The importance of a price increase for farm commodities in Briscoe County is readily seen.

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**The Open Door**  
 "... behold, I have set  
 before thee an open door ..."

**The Theological Significance  
 Of The Apollo Missions**

Strange as it may sound coming from a minister, the Apollo Missions of our space program have not only had a scientific impact upon man, but these missions have also had a religious impact. Not every person will see a religious impact or influence; yet I do not see how the man, woman or child who rejoices in the goodness of God's creation can miss an impact. I personally cannot share

the conviction of those who say man has no business in outer space. In fact, I believe just the opposite.

The basic dangers in our space ventures are the temptations to either use our space projects as a means of trying to ignore the desperate human needs here on earth, or to think that because of our success in space there are no limits for man.

It seems to me there are two strong religious implications to be found in the Apollo mission. The first of these is symbolized by the pictures of earth taken from lunar orbit. Because of these missions and pictures man now has a new view of himself, a view we have not had before. Man must now begin to take seriously the fact that he is a planetary being. Any notions we may have held about isolation from others have been dramatically and radically shattered by the Apollo flights.

The earth as seen from lunar orbit is incredibly small. We have been told by many professionals that our world is small. Increasing population, rapid transportation, Telesat satellite communication have made the world seem that way. We are the first generation to be able to sit in our dens and living rooms and watch on TV a war going on half way around the world. If none of these events made an impression upon us, the pictures of earth from lunar orbit should.

Our world is definitely too small for any of us to go on thinking that the problems of others are not our problems too. We may not experience the problem in the same way, but we are affected. Apollo missions have pointed out as never before the need for man in general, and Christians in particular, to become concerned about the welfare of all men and about peace on earth. The earth is too small to do any less. We now have a new view of ourselves.

There is a second religious implication which is equally important. From these flights man can gain a new sense of awe and reverence for the vastness and wonder of creation. One of the Apollo XI astronauts pointed out in this direction when he quoted part of Psalm 8 in his reflection of their mission:

"When I look at Thy heavens, the work of Thy fingers, the moon and the stars which Thou hast established; what is man that Thou are mindful of him, and the son of man that Thou dost care for him?"

Explanation of outer space can give us a fresh, new perspective of the wonder of creation. We have the possibility of gaining a new understanding of God as creator in a way that is very exciting. Man may very well be standing on the threshold of a new and exciting encounter with that reality that undergirds and gives meaning to life as we experience it.

It may be a long time before the full implications of these Apollo flights take hold of us. But I suggest that we should not rule out the religious or theological significance of them.

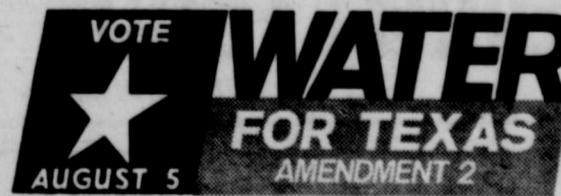
