Did you know that every five seconds, someone receives a blood transfusion in the United States? Many hospital and medical plans do not pay for blood nor arrange for blood replacement, but this policy does.

You pay your premium with a blood donation which will help a present patient in need AND provide you and your family with one year of protection. Any blood bank listed (there are 14 in Texas, including Amarillo, Dallas, Lubbock) will pay your annual premium on the policy in exchange for a blood donation. And if you are unable to donate a pint of blood a year, you may purchase this protection for an annual premium of \$7.50 (family policy) or \$5.00 (individual policy).

A family policy protects the insured (husband, wife, and dependent unmarried children under 19) from blood bank charges for blood plasma and certain derivatives used in all transfusions resulting from accident or sickness (including pregnancy) not specifically excluded from coverage. There is no monetary limitation on claims for transfusions of whole blood, whole plasma and related products. Indemnity for plasma protein fraction and human serum albumin is limited to \$25 per unit. There is no limit on the number of transfusions of any covered blood product.

The policy goes into effect immediately in case of accidental injury. Transfusions required as a jury. 

Bad bleaching causes white garments and linens to develop worn spots quickly. Textile Analysis Laboratories report that bleach misuse is one of the most frequent causes of damage to cloth-

There are two types of bleach: oxygen base and chlorine base. Oxygen base bleaches are more gentle on fabrics and can be used to brighten colors and to maintain whiteness. A note of warning though: if you boil clothes with an oxygen bleach, it be-

comes as strong as chlorine

Oxygen bleaches usually come in a powdered form. As a safety measure, the manufacturer coats each particle of bleach with a protective coating. This prevents the bleach from damaging fabrics before the bleach has been thoroughly dissolved in the laundry water. Therefore, powdered bleaches can be added to the

wash along with the detergent. Chlorine bleaches are available in either liquid or dry form, All bottles of bleach warn against pouring it directly into the washer. Liquid chlorine bleach must be diluted, according to direc- Colo. Red Del. tions, before being added to the wash water. A rule of thumb for diluting is: one part bleach into four parts water, mix well before adding to the wash water. Even diluted bleach should not be pour- Calif. ed directly onto clothing in the

Washers often have a bleach dispenser which adds bleach at the right time and in the right way. If your washer does not Sweet have a dispenser, the diluted bleach should be added after the clothes have been washing four or five minutes. This is the optimum time for the best bleaching action. Always check the dir ections on the label for the am ount to use. Never use more than is recommended,

Then leaf through the book, smoothing down the pages. This loosens the threads, and they will give as the pages are turned





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
