In the report, Thomas J. Henderson, president of Atmospherics Inc., and Donald Dickering, assistant, who made the "on-site" investigations, stated that under the original goals established for this feasibility study, the total 5,500 square miles of interest was to include approximately six counties, within which a 3,000 square mile area would occupy a principal area of interest for possible

hail suppression research. However, the subsequent on-site nvestigations revealed a need to expand the total area of interest to include nine counties covering some 8.500 square miles.

The report studying the climate stated that from Lubbock on the south to Tulia on the north, the climate can be described as semiarid. It is the transistional area between desert conditions on the west and relatively humid climate

to the east and southeast. Temperatures range between a mean daily maximum of 74 degrees F and a mean daily minimum of 44 degrees. Highest temperature on record is about 110 degrees with a record minimum of near -16 degrees.

Temperatures are variable but the greatest changes occur during the winter months when frequent surges of cold air move down from the north. The winter cold periods rarely last longer than two or three days before west and southwest surface winds bring the warming trends.

Summer days are hot but low in humidity and good wind circulation minimize any extended uncomfortable periods.

Precipitation is most frequently the result of summer thunderstorm activities. Like temperature, the monthly and annual precipitation amounts are variable.

Records indicate an annual minimum of less than nine inches to a maximum of nearly 40 inches. Maximum amounts in any 24-hour period have reached seven inches. A few monthly totals have been recorded which are greater than the record minimum annual am-

Maximum rainfall usually occurs during May, June and July when the warm moist air flows northward from the Gulf of Mexico. Sixty-five to 70 per cent of the total annual precipitation occurs during the May-September period.

The report pointed out the need for hail suppression research in this area.

According to those compiling the report. "In other areas of the United States and abroad, we have found a significant correlation between the months which produce maximum cumulonimbus cloud activity and months which produce maximum hail frequency.

"This does not seem to be the case in the primary area of interest covered by this report," they


The report related that examination of weather data showed that the months of June. July and August produced the greatest frequency of cumulonimbus cloud activity while the months of April, May and June produced the maximum hail frequency.

"Available data is insufficient to explain which precipitation mechanism might be responsible for hail within a particular regime of cumulonimbus developments.

Let's get those Christmas plants off to a good start. It's much easier to keep them in good health than it is to nurse them back after they begin ailing.

Take the poinsetta — with red, pink, or white bracts. It is very sensitive to changes in temperature, so keep it out of drafts. Use water at room temperature. Bracts will last longer if the plant is kept at lower temperature, particularly at night. If it is near a window, move it back at night so it won't get a chill. Give it bright light but no sun. Gradually withhold water after the plant is through blooming. Store in a cool basement until April or May, watering it once a week.

When the weather warms up, cut back stems to about 6 inches and sink the pot in a protected spot in the garden; prune it back in July or August — or a couple of times during that period. Before the weather turns cold, bring the plant to a South window; water and feed regularly; give it total darkness about twelve hours a night during October and November. Bracts should show color by Thanksgiving and you can dis-continue the artificial darkness. The prizedpart of the poinsettia is the colored bracts or leaves, and not the true flower, which often falls soon after the plant is purchased. If the small flower parts do fall, the showy bracts still remain attractive.

"Mothers may also burst into tears because they're ex-hausted', says one doctor.



Lighting Compliments Christmas Tree

Any Christmas tree is pret-tier and safer if it is properly lighted. To determine the number of lights for your tree, indoors or out, multiply the height times the width times three. One-half this final number is a minimum number of lights. Pandom places of lights. Random placement gives an informal touch. With a poorly shaped tree or for more formal decoration, you may want to arrange the lights vertically so that each string is clipped to the top of the tree and runs straight to the bottom. Slightly less formal is a diagonal spiral arrangement around the tree, or a wavy arrangement. No matter which method you use, start at the top and work down to the bottom. Place lights nearest the trunk first and work out to the

tips of the boughs.

For added effect, floodlights at the base of the tree add decorative shadows and give sparkle to ornaments. Colored floodlights can add drama,

How To Wrap That Round Package

To wrap a round package, place the package on the paper and cut so that there is an inch overlap on the side. Fix neatly with tape. Leave enough paper at both ends to fold over and meet in the center of the cylinder. Pleat these ends neatly toward the center making firm creases. Cut two circles of paper to fit the ends of the cylinder and paste them over the pleats.

A round package or object can also be wrapped in several layers of tissue paper with overlap fixed with tape, and two or three inches of paper at each end. Tie the end overlaps firmly with ribbon or yarn. Cut rosette like ends that result in thin strips to resemble a party "snapper". Decorate each end with a bow.



Insert meat thermometer in center, away from bone. Place parsley onion and celery around the ham; Pour cider into pan, then cover tightly

Bake, basting frequently with cider mixture in the pan until thermometer registers 130 degrees F, about 3 hours. Remove from oven. Increase oven temperature to 400 degrees. Pour off liquid from roasting pan, and strain. Skim off fat, and discard. Set liquid aside.

Remove skin from ham and score surface in diagonal pattern. Sprinkle with 1 teaspoon rosemary and 1/2 teaspoon cloves. Brush ham with some reserved liquid, about 30 minutes, or until browned.

To serve: Carve a few slices and arrange around ham on platter. Garnish with spiced crabapples, if desired.





A marzipan-cookie cornucopia makes a spectacular center piece, spilling over with al-monds, chocolate truffles, and honey cakes that have mellowed a fortnight.

Christmas means more than the annual celebration of a day or a season. It is a universal symbol of the generosity of the human spirit. 



THE POINSETTIA

The Poinsettia plant was brought to the United States by Joel Robert Poinsett, first minister to Mexico. Poinsett successfully grew the wild scarlet plant on his estate in South Carolina, and American botanists named the plant the poinsettia. The name stuck, in the U.S., even though it was later discovered that a German botanist, Karl Willdenow, had earlier described and catalogued the plant as Euphorbia pulcherrima, or "the very beautiful Euphorbia." Small metal trumpets that often trim Christmas trees began with a Danish custom. They used to play four hymns on them at Yule — symbolizing the four corners of the world.

In Swedish art, St. Lucia is sometimes pictured wearing candles in her hair. Her feast day, December 13, is a forerunner of Christmas.

In Bulgaria on Christmas Eve each peasant takes a lighted candle to the barn to awaken each animal, saying:"The Child is born and blesses you to-

Members of every family carry lighted candles on the way to church. Picture the winking, silvery streams of light threading their ways through the hills and valleys!

We have mentioned only a few of the customs which have prevailed in the European countries. Many of these customs are reflected in American Christmas celebrations, Also as befits a new country, it developed its own can-dle customs . . . these de-serve an article all its own.

Melodious church bells conclude the celebrations of Christmas Day, ringing throughout the land until the last stroke of the clock chimes farewell to the Holiday.

FUN-LOVING KING RESTORES TREE TO YULE STATUS

Ironically it was the "merry monarch," Charles II, that much-maligned king of England, whose li-centious adventures were the scandal of 17th century Europe who actually caused the Christmas tree's return into

English life.
It is said that the Roundheads, who beheaded his father Charles I, had banished the tree as part of the Devil's work, but on Cromwell's demise and the return of the royalists, the fun-loving monarch re-stored this picturesque custom, much to the joy of the English-speaking world.

At this time the Roman Empire was governed by Diocletian. Though he had initiated many political re-forms he was a tyrannical

Lucia while a young girl had dedicated her life to God and had resolved to give her earthly wealth to the poor.

Lucia persuaded her mo-ther to visit the shrine of the early Christian martyr Agatha in Catania.

Beseeching Agatha to in-tercede for her mother, Lucia is said to have effected a miracle, and Eutychia in gratitude agreed to give away a large part of her wealth to the needy.

As was the custom in those days, Lucia was formally betrothed without her consent. However, on learning that he was not marrying an heiress the young man in anger denounced Lucia to the gov-ernor of Sicily, a vassal of the emperor.

When the guards came to drag her away to prison they found they could not budge her from the spot.

An elegant meat dish served in royal houses dur-ing Medieval times at Christmas, was the roast peacock. This dish was called "food for lovers and meat for lords."



Symbols of Christianity Adorn Trees of Far West

Something of a phenom-enon took place recently in certain areas of Southern

It was in regard to the trimming of Christmas trees.

Instead of using lots of tinsel and garish - colored balls which are traditional but which suggest the barbarian background of much of the superficial celebration of the Season, the people hung stars, crosses and other emblems of the faith from the green branches.



These are known as "Chrismons," the word coming from "Christus" and "monograms.

In other words, the designs are monograms of Christ and the message of

At one Lutheran church, a 20-foot tree was decorated with more than 300 Chrismons, each from 4 to 10 inches in diameter.



Meaning of each of the symbols is stylized.

1 — The circle symbolizes. eternity, and the triangle the triune God – the Father, the Son and the Holy Ghost.

2 – Alpha and omega, the first and last letters of the Greek alphabet, the beginning and the end.

3 - Chi Rho, the first two letters of Christ in Greek. Also, it is said, it refers to Christus Rex, or Christ the King, in Latin.

4 - The first three letters for Jesus in Greek. Also Jesus Hominum Saviour. 5-The cross, a reminder

of His sacrifice for all men; of forgiveness and salvation.

6 - The crown symbolizes the King of Kings.

7 - The sun or righteousness refers to Malachi iv, 2 in the Old Testament, pro-phesying the birth of a Saviour.

8 - The rose symbolizes the nativity.

9 - A butterfly recalls the Resurrection, and man's rebirth through commitment to Christ. 10 - Star made of crosses

with slanting arms, intended

to represent the connection between Christmas and Eas-11 - Christ over the world, as in Matthew xvi, 15, "Go ye into all the world."

A beautiful custom that originated in Austria is the Advent Wreath.

The wreath is made of pine or holly and has four candles in it. One candle is lighted on each of the four Sundays pre-ceding Christmas, while one of the children reads a part of the Christmas Story from the Bible. All four candles are lighted on Christmas Day. Another custom observed

by many Austrian families is the placing of apple twigs in a vase of water on St. Barbar's Day, December 4th. If the twigs blossom by Christ-mas. Eve, good fortune will come to the family, and the more blossoms there are, the greater the luck.

Old Wives' Tales Woven **Around the Christmas** Season Are Favorites

Superstition has long colored our concept of history and particularly its religious tenets. Frequently in countries where literature and the arts flourish, so do "old wives' tales," for good or ill.

In Scotland some people believe that to be born on Christmas is to have the power to see spirits and even to command them. According to Sir Walter Scott the Spaniards attributed the haggard looks of Philip II to the tenrible visions he was able to see because he had been born on Christmas.

By contrast, in Silesia a baby born on Christmas will become either a lawyer or a thief.

English mothers used to take sick babies to the door Christmas Eve midnight, when Mary was expected to pass with her Child. If the baby recovered it was a sign that it had been touched by the Child with healing fingers; if it did not, it was believed that He had called the baby to be His playmate in Heaven.

In the duchy of Swabia girls went to the woodpile on Christmas Eve to draw sticks. If a long one, their future husband would be tall; if a thick one, he would be fat; if crooked, he would also be crooked in figure. If she wanted to determine his business the girl would drop melted lead into a pan of cold water. The lead would congeal into a shape suggesting an occupation. On Christmas Eve a maiden would set a bowl of water outside a window to freeze. The form which the ice took would dictate her future husband's business.

In Northern England girls placed holly under their pillows and chanted:

Good St. Thomas serve me right And send me my true love tonight That I may gaze upon his face, Then him in my fond arms embrace.

Some girls make an indigestible cake of flour, water and salt. They eat this on Christmas Eve and it is expected to make them dream of their future husband.

In Switzerland, if a girl accepts a bunch of Edelweiss at Christmas it is an act of betrothal.

The French have a complicated recipe for Gateau de Riz au Carmel.

The following is the Americanized version. It uses packaged precooked rice and will produce a rich, custardy dessert with a glaze of carmelized sugar and is a perfect dish for your Christmas entertaining.

GATEAU DE RIZ AU CARMEL (rice cake)

- 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup of water 1/2 cup sugar
- 1 cup sugar 3 tablespoons water 2 cups milk
 - 1 1/3 cups packaged pre-cooked
 - 3 eggs well beaten 1 1/2 teaspoon vanilla
 - 2 cups (about) prepared whipped topping, whipped cream or custard sauce

Combine the cup of sugar and the 3 tablespoons of water in a small saucepan. Stir over very low heat until sugar dissolves and syrup turns golden brown — about 25 minutes. Brush a thin even coating over the inside of a fluted or smooth-sided 1 1/2-quart mold. Set aside. Combine milk, 1 cup of water, 1/2 cup of sugar and the salt in a saucepan. Cover and bring to a boil. Stir in the rice. Cover and remove from the heat. Let stand 10 minutes. (Not all liquid will be absorbed).

Combine eggs and vanilla. Gradually add some of the hot rice mixture, stirring rapidly. Then add the egg mixture remaining in the saucepan. Pour into prepared mold. Bake at 400 degrees for 40 to 45 minutes, or until center of cake is firm. Unmold cake onto a serving plate immediately. Makes 4 cups or 6 servings. Serve warm with topping of your choice.



DOING IS FUN... Fun is what you make it and this mini-workshop for the junior do-it-yourselfer has battery operated drill, sabre saw, circular saw and orbital sander. The tools can drill or cut through balsa wood, styrofoam and similar materials, yet are safe enough for the youngest handyman.

One of the most enchanting and unusual presents you can give is a bag of pine cones or a Yule log chemically treated to burn in beautiful colors. All you need in addition to the cones or logs are ordinary chemicals which can be found in most drugstores or even in your own home. Use a container of crockery or wood of proper size and shape to mix the chemicals in; and protect your hands with rubber gloves.

Select the color you want and mix the chemicals for that color in water in the proportion of about 1/4 pound of chemical to one quart of water. Place the cones or log in a cheesecloth sling and soak in the solution for several minutes. Lay the treated cones on a thick layer of newspaper to dry after draining them well over the container of chemicals. It will take at least two days for them to dry. The following chemicals produce the following colors:

Table Salt Yellow Borax Bright Green Lithium Chloride . . . Purple Calcium Chloride . . . Orange Copper Sulphate Blue Barium Nitrate . . . Apple Green

SELECT TOYS THAT ARE SAFE

Toys are a part of a child's Christmas, yet some of them are often the cause of suffering and heartache. Many serious injuries to children's eyes are caused by missile-type toys, such as pellet guns, dart guns, air guns, bean shooters and toys with rubber bands that release projectiles, such as sling shots.

Chemistry sets with ingredients which may cause burns or explosions can result in serious injury in the hands of a youngster without the experience to use them knowledgeably and prudently.

This is why safety experts advise choose the toy that fits the child.

CANDLES HAVE ANCIENT USAGE

Candles, long a part of the Christmas observance, were in use long before the birth of Christ. Romans burned candles to honor their pagan gods. Later, Christians used candles to light the catacombs for forbidden Christian ser-

In early America, the cus-tom of putting lighted candles on the Christmas tree gained widespread popularity. It was hazardous, but so was life

Through the years, candles have been traditional in many countries. In Ireland, a candle in the home was considered a profession of faith. Italian families burned a candle before the creche throughout the Christmas season. In Spain, the faithful observed the holiday by placing a lighted can-dle over the door.



The actual joyous singing at Christmastime is traditional and can be traced back through many centuries. St. Francis of Assisi is given credit for using sacred songs, taken from church services, and using them in street festivals during the 13th century. He is sometimes called "The Father Christmas Carols because he intoduced sacred hymns to the people for public singing. In early America the Pilgrims did not sing carols, but we find the rest of the New World bringing Christmas carols with them from their mother country and singing them at Christmastime during the festivities honoring the birth of Christ, much the same as we do today.



After the holidays use the discarded tree as winter protection for shrubs and garden

First, cut off the boughs. Small branches can be placed curved ends up around plantings or over garden beds when the ground is more or less exposed. This will prevent plants from frost heaving.

Another use for the tree after Christmas is as a backyard bird feeder . . . Moreover, they make shelter for winter birds. A fir is ideal since it retains its needles all winter outdoors. The tree should be well anchored, preferably in a hole. Then tie pieces of suet, popcorn, apple, peanut-butter or other morsels of food to the outer branches. Always keep a container of water handy.
