Water Development Board Reviews Mackenzie Bonds



Mrs. Bud Couch last week presented a check to the Silvertown School Music Department for \$609.00, which represented the proceeds of the L. O. A. Junior Study Club Christmas Greeting Page Project. The check was received by the public school music teacher, Ted Lanham. The money was donated by citizens in lieu of sending Christmas cards locally, and will be used for the purchase of equipment for the music department.

The Texas Water Development Board Thursday tentatively agreed to take \$3.8 million in Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority bonds to underwrite a three-county water resources project. But actual approval won't be forthcoming until the board makes a priority rating on all of its "over commitments."

At this time, the state board's loan commitments total \$23.8 million, and it has only \$17.5 million available to assist water districts and municipalities construct water supply projects—so the board is committed to lend \$6.2 million more than it has to lend.

The board has asked Attorney General Crawford Martin whether it can make interim financing on some projects which could be paid back before the more expensive projects get underway, but he has not yet issued an opinion.

However, some of the commitments do not have to be met for several years, and in an effort to get water to dry or nearly-dry communities, the board Thursday decided it must rate commitments by time of need as well as need itself. The staff was ordered to present a priority proposal when the board meets next in the Palacio del Rio in San Antonio at 1:30 p.m. February 25.

Joe Smith of First Southwest Company of Lubbock, made the

financing request for the Authority which includes cities in Floyd, Swisher and Briscoe counties. Under the water supply project, he explained, a dam and reservoir would be built on Tule Creek in Briscoe County to serve Tulia, Silvertown, Floydada and Lockney.

It would take \$3.8 million to get the project underway, Smith estimated, and the Authority would have to come back at some future date to ask for another \$4.2 million for Phase II construction.

The Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority is planning stage construction because the cities to be served would not all go on the line at the same time. Smith said Silvertown is expected to be the first for service. Lockney-Floydada would follow in about 1977 and Tulia would come in whenever its Santa Rosa sand water well runs out—"that might be 10 or 20 years."

Smith provided the board members with a tightly-written 13-page proposal, tracing the development of the Water Authority and its financing programs. One board member who specializes in municipal bond financing professionally, W. E. (Buck) Tinsley, said, "This is the most expertly conceived and presented plan I have seen since I have been on this board—masterful. This is the type of program for which this board

was created." Water Development Board Director Howard Boswell said there was no legal reason why Mackenzie Municipal Water Authority cannot qualify as eligible for assistance, but he noted that the money needed simply is not available. "We could give a commitment with the understanding that the funding would have to come from proceeds of new water development board bonds," Boswell suggested, "or go the interim financing route."

"We say we are over committed," Tinsley said, "but we don't really know what that means. Let's establish a list of priorities." The board decided to do just that February 25, and deferred a final decision on Mackenzie Authority until then.

Silvertown 4-H'ers took Amarillo by storm early this week and brought home numerous ribbons and premiums as a reward for the work they have put into their animal-feeding projects.

Approximately \$160.00 was earned in premiums by the Briscoe County 4-H'ers.

Top Silvertown exhibitors were Danny Perkins, lambs; Bill Strange, steers, and Dave Francis, barrows.

BARROWS
In the barrow show, Dave Francis, son of Mr. and Mrs. John T. Francis, was exhibitor of the third- and fourth-place crossbreds in the lightweight class. John T. Francis was breeder of the barrows.

Brent Brannon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Brannon, exhibited the fourteenth-place barrow in the middleweight crossbred class. His breeder was his grandfather, Seymour Brannon.

Ronnie Vaughan showed the twentieth-place lightweight Duroc barrow. Todd McJimsey was exhibitor of two barrows, one of which placed twenty-fourth in the middleweight Duroc class.

All of the Silvertown 4-H barrows made the sale, and were sold at auction Tuesday.

STEERS
Bill Strange was exhibitor of the third-place steer in the lightweight Hereford class. Bred by Gene Pickard of Albany, the steer was not sold due to plans to show it in El Paso early in February.

Strange was also exhibitor of the Hereford that placed 83rd in the lightweight steer class of 91 animals.

Beverly Boling showed the 63rd-place lightweight Hereford steer, and her sister, Debbie Boling, was exhibitor of an Angus steer in the heavyweight class.

LAMBS
The Silvertown 4-H'ers swept three classes of the lamb show by

dominating the top ten placings. In addition, a 114-pound heavyweight Rambouillet bred by Obra Watson and shown by Danay Perkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Lee Perkins, was selected as the best finewool lamb of the show. A premium price of \$2.00 per pound was paid by Sears Roebuck for the best-of-its-breed lamb.

Also competing for the best-of-the-breed award was Kent Holt, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rex Holt, who showed a 90-pound Rambouillet which placed first in the lightweight class.

Danna Garvin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. L. B. Garvin, jr., was exhibitor of the first-place animal in the class for lightweight with a 94-pound crossbred lamb. The lamb show opened at 9:00 a.m. Monday with the lightweight finewool class, and Silvertown boys and girls earned nine of the top ten places. The only place in the top ten not awarded to the Silvertown 4-H was ninth, indicating how competitive the Briscoe County show was for lambs this year.

The eight Silvertown lambs shown in the heavyweight finewool class all placed in the top ten.

Five of the Silvertown crossbred lambs shown in the lightweight class placed in the top ten, as did both local entries in the heavyweight crossbred class.

Silvertown Pioneer Buried Sunday

Funeral services for Mrs. J. H. Burson, 91, were conducted at 2:30 p.m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church, with the pastor, Rev. C. H. Murphy, jr., officiating. Assisting were two former pastors of the Silvertown church, Rev. Clyde Cain, pastor of Avondale Baptist Church in Amarillo, and Rev. Carlos McLeod, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Plainview.

Grandsons were pallbearers, and burial was in the Silvertown Cemetery, with arrangements under the direction of the Silvertown Funeral Home.

One of the true pioneer women of Silvertown and Briscoe County, Mrs. Burson died Saturday morning at Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, where she had been a patient since January 1.

Born in Palo Pinto County, Mrs. Burson spent most of her early life in Clay County. The former Miss Maggie Jane Young, she attended Bowie Business College and was a teacher in Clay County. Her family later moved to Crockett County, where she was married December 1, 1907, to John H. Burson.

The couple moved to a ranch and farm seven miles northeast of Silvertown, but also maintained a home in Clarendon, where their children later attended school. The family usually lived in Clarendon during the school terms.

After her husband died in 1945, Mrs. Burson continued to live on the ranch near Silvertown until her recent illness.

Survivors include four daughters, Mrs. Clifford Davis of Amarillo, Mrs. Glenn Allen of Costa Mesa, California, Mrs. Gladys Arnold and Miss Luree Burson, both of Silvertown; one son, Johnnie Burson of Silvertown; a sister, Mrs. John S. Powell of Midland; a half-brother, Jake Young of Ozona; 10 grandchildren and 29 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Burson was fondly known as "Grandmother" or "Mother" Burson to her friends, and when she attended services at the First Baptist Church was rarely called anything else. She was a member of the Good Samaritan Sunday School Class.

His father, Donnie Martin, loaded up the lamb and took him to Claude to the vet and with shots the lamb recovered. In the show ring, however, he didn't place well. I'm sure that Derrel earned the admiration of all who were there with him by living the 4-H slogan: "A good showman can win without bragging and lose without squawking." He accepted misfortune with a sad smile, and worked during the entire show helping other 4-H'ers with their projects. We wish him much better luck when he takes his FFA lambs to Lubbock!

WHEREAS, this Board of Trustees deems it advisable to call the election hereinafter ordered; and

WHEREAS, it is hereby officially found and determined: that a case of emergency or urgent public necessity exists which requires the holding of the meeting at which this Order is passed, such emergency or urgent public necessity being that the proceeds from the proposed bonds are required as soon as possible and without delay for necessary and urgently needed public improvements; that said meeting was open to the public as required by law; and that public notice of the time, place and purpose of said meeting was given as required by Chapter 227, Acts of the 61st Legislature, Regular Session, 1969.

THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF SILVERTON INDEPENDENT SCHOOL DISTRICT:

1. That an election shall be held in said District on the 9th day of February, 1970, at the Commissioners Court Room, Briscoe County Courthouse, Silvertown, Texas. Said District shall constitute a single election precinct for said election, and the following election officers are hereby appointed to hold said election at

the aforesaid polling place:

Mrs. Florence Fogerson, Presiding Judge, Mrs. Ruby Eddleman, Alternate Presiding Judge.

The Presiding Judge shall appoint not less than two nor more than four qualified election clerks to serve and assist in conducting said election; provided that if the Presiding Judge named above actually serves as expected, the Alternate Presiding Judge shall be one of such clerks.

Mrs. Bertha Pavlicek is hereby appointed as the clerk for absentee voting for said election; and the County Clerk's Office, Briscoe County Courthouse, Silvertown, Texas, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 9:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays, and official state holidays; and the aforesaid clerk shall keep said absentee voting place open during such hours for absentee voting.

2. That at said election the following PROPOSITION shall be submitted in accordance with law:

PROPOSITION

Shall the Board of Trustees of said District be authorized to issue the bonds of the District, in one or more series, in the aggregate principal amount of \$350,000 for the purpose of construction and equipment of school buildings in the District, and the purchase of sites therefor, with said bonds to mature, bear interest, and be issued and sold in accordance with law; and shall the Board of Trustees be authorized to levy and pledge, and cause to be assessed and collected, annual ad valorem taxes, on all taxable property in the District, sufficient, without limit as to rate or amount, to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds?

3. That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with the Texas Election Code so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid PROPOSITION, which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION THE ISSUANCE OF

\$350,000 BONDS AND LEVYING TAXES IN PAYMENT THEREOF

4. That said election shall be held and conducted in effect as two separate but simultaneous elections, to-wit: one election at which only the resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation shall be entitled to vote on said PROPOSITION, and another election at which all other resident, qualified electors of the District shall be entitled to vote on said PROPOSITION. The votes cast at each of said separate but simultaneous elections shall be recorded, returned, and canvassed separately. It is hereby declared that the purpose of holding the election in such manner is to ascertain arithmetically: (a) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against said PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors of the District, and also (b) the aggregate votes cast at the election for and against said PROPOSITION by resident, qualified electors who own taxable property in the District and who have duly rendered the same for taxation. Each elector shall be entitled to vote once, in accordance with the foregoing provisions of this Order.

5. That a substantial copy of this Order shall serve as proper Notice of said election, and said Notice shall be published one time, at least 10 days prior to the date set for the election, in a newspaper of general circulation in said District.

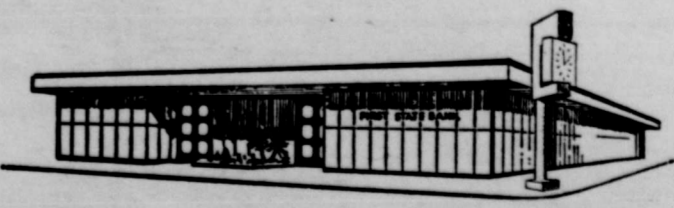
