Such a lot of this area we live in has been too dry all this year of 1970. I've heard people speak of how dry it is in the Quannah area and I've heard reports that the rainfall that Amarillo has received so far this year is only about half of what they usually get by this time of the year. We went to Lake Meredith Saturday, and I saw so much country that looked dry and parched and in need of rain. A salesman from Lubbock told me that it just HAS NOT rained any in Lubbock since the first of the year, and that they need it badly.

Then I weighed our local lack of rain against what I have heard about the results of our wheat crop. With most of the harvesting just about done, the reports I have heard seem to indicate that we in Briscoe County have experienced a better-than-average harvest, both on dryland and irrigated farms, in the wheat department. A lot of pretty good yields have been reported.

Could this, then, mean that the rains we have had have come at good times for the wheat crop? And can we not be grateful that the showers held off long enough for most of the harvesting to be finished? This spares the farm people—all of us—those days of worry because "the wheat is ready to cut but the field is too wet and we need to get it cut before it gets hailed out."

I don't like the hot weather that accompanies dry spells, and I don't like the gritty, gritty winds. When we complain about the weather and make threats at the cloud-seeding planes, aren't we forgetting that we're not the only ones who haven't had much rain; that we were pretty dry before the cloud seeding started on May 14; and that we have a lot to be thankful for in spite of it all?

We're all just plain DST tired, and nothing does so much to make us feel better than a good rain!

ther continues to be the order of the day. "These pests live on animals continuously and feed as much as 20 times a day," explains Dr. Bill Clymer, area entomologist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "A moderately heavy infestation of 5,000 flies can extract one-half pint of blood or about a 1,000-pound animal."

In addition to the blood loss, the flies constantly irritate animals thereby causing a loss of energy. Digestive upsets are common and feed utilization and consumption decrease.

"Some authorities say that uncontrolled infestations of horn flies can cause a loss of one-half pound of flesh or one quart of milk per day," points out Clymer. To combat horn flies during periods of peak populations, insecticides may have to be applied on a two-to-four-week basis, he adds. In addition to spraying, other methods that are effective are dusting, dipping, self-treatment dust bags, back rubbers and mineral treated salt blocks.

Numerous insecticides are available for controlling horn flies. Information on these can be obtained from the "Texas Guide for Control of External Parasites of Livestock and Poultry" available at the county Extension office.
