What fools we be always to wait for "someone else" to get things done!

I awakened Monday to a fact that pleases me not the least bit. I can't explain why I have slept through something that means so much to our family and to many other families here — I think I have been in a state of shock ever since the day that Ken Cook told me he was resigning as the Briscoe County Agent.

Monday I happened along while Don Cornett and Cook were working Kim and Mike's lambs, and suddenly the reality that Cook wouldn't be here when the time comes for our Ken's lambs to be worked hit me like a ton of bricks!

Do you realize what his leaving will do to the 4-H program that he's built here? How long will it be before our County is able to find a replacement who will accept US?

Most of all, I'm sorry that I haven't realized sooner that something could have been done to keep him here. Lots of people have told me how much they hate to see him leave, but instead of crying to one another, we should have gone to his bosses, our Commissioners, and said, "We don't want him to leave; offer him a raise. ANYTHING, but keep him here!"

Let's face it: men with Cook's good sense of humor who will be as good to our kids and will also be able to get along with the adults are not easy to find. If you did find a man like this, he probably wouldn't be willing to live in a town or County like ours, a place with no doctor or dentist, no recreational facilities to speak of, and little else than the job to offer.

I didn't know too much about what a County Agent does until our son took on an animal project last year, and during that feeding and showing season, I learned a lot about what keeps Cook busy. I also learned from people in other counties that not all of the County Agents do as much as Cook does. I know now how much time he puts into working with groups and individuals, and how much of himself went into the winning of all the ribbons that our 4-H'ers received during the past year.

I know how many nights Cook worked getting animals ready for shows and how he hardly gets any sleep at all at the shows. He likes for the lambs "his" kids show to have the "Cook top-nogging" that was his trademark when he showed 4-H lambs himself. I've gotten used to seeing our lambs with the fleece left long on top, and I like the way it looks.

I've heard him tell the boys and girls that he wants to see them in white shirts and green ties in the show ring, and I heard him tell one group of boys before they went to Lubbock for livestock judging: "Boys, I want you to be wearing ties. You may as well get used to wearing ties, because you are growing up and it is expected of you."

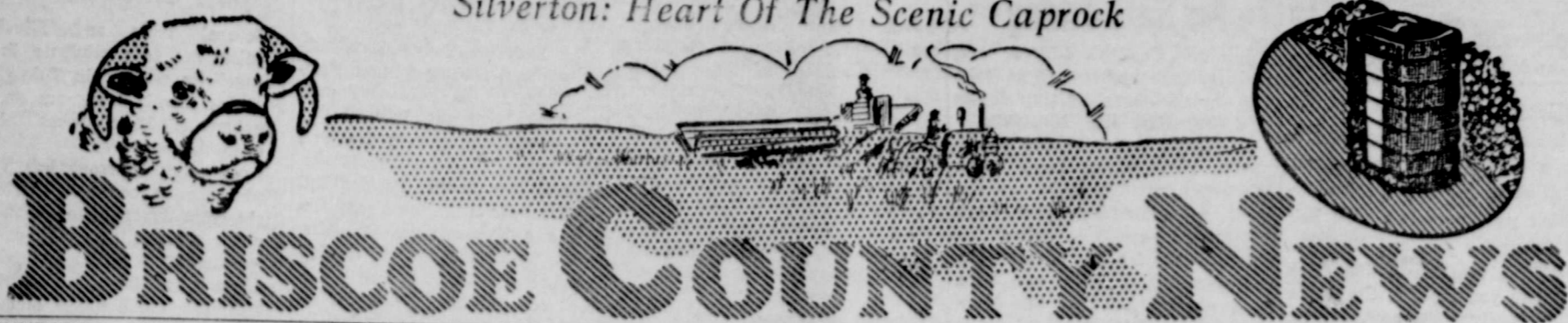
Or he might say, "Fellow, you need to remember to get a haircut before the show." The 4-H'ers have never had a reputation for being a bunch of long-hairs, and he wants his to look extra special.

As far as I know, none of the kids get mad at him for this. He expresses his wishes in a kind, but firm, way and they know he is right and do what he asks.

He's teaching the kids about their projects, but he's also teaching them something that I consider more important; he is teaching them to take pride in their club and in themselves by dressing neatly and conducting themselves well wherever they go. I've heard people in years past ask: "So what good does it do for a County Agent to help the kids raise and show stock?" I was never able to answer this question very well before, but I know now that the Extension program is helping our boys and girls mature in experience and grow up to be better men and women. I can compare my attitude toward 4-H with what I think of Little League baseball: "If a kid is out stealing third base, he probably won't be out stealing hub caps." You can't apply it in exactly the same words to 4-H, but if a kid is taking care of a club project and his regular school activities, he'll fall into bed at night too tired to think about

Food Stamp Program Being Implemented In Briscoe County

The Food Stamp Program is being implemented in Briscoe County. Mrs. Helen Phelps, Welfare Technician, will be in Silverton each Wednesday from 9:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. to accept applications. She will be in the County Courtroom. Applications will be accepted from families not receiving assistance through the State Department of Public Welfare.

Those families already receiving State Assistance will see their regular Field Worker with the State Department of Public Welfare, in Briscoe County, Mr. Emil Schattel of Memphis.

The issuance of Food Stamps is expected to begin August 17. Those who think they may be entitled to participate in this welfare program must contact either Mr. Schattel or Mrs. Phelps to make application before you can be approved to receive the Food Stamps.

See Mr. Schattel if you are now receiving State Assistance and see Mrs. Phelps if you are not receiving State Assistance but think you might qualify.

Blue Sox Are Little League Champions Again This Year

The Little League Blue Sox, coached by Ted Strange and Glenn McWatters, have finished the season in first place for the second consecutive year.

Matador handed the Blue Sox their second loss of the season at Matador last Thursday night. The Blue Sox scored two runs in the first, third and fourth innings and added seven scores in the fifth inning, but were able to total only 13 points while the Reds were piling up 20 points.

Runs were scored for the Blue Sox by Jackie Eiland, Bill Reid, Mike Juarez, and Mike Cornett, who got two each; and by Brent Brannon, David Strange, David Lewis, Autry Polley and Larry B. Stephens.

White Sox scoring was led by Clay Jackson, Danny Perkins, Kirk Durham and Brad Ziegler, who scored three runs each; Timmy Roberts, Earl Jarrett and Kyle Bean, two runs each; Brent Bean and James Kitchens, one run each.

Leading the Gold Sox scoring was Ken Sarchet, with three runs; Wes Fleming and Jace Francis, with two runs each; Chris Robertson, Rudy Betancourt, Mike Murphy, Brett Gill and Victor Clower, with one run each.

Robertson was the first Gold Sox player at bat in the fifth inning, and hit what might have been the cleanest home run that has been seen in Little League this year. Sarchet followed in the batting order, and made a home run on errors. Mike Murphy followed and attempted the same thing, but was put out at second.

The Gold Sox were cheated out of hits on long fly balls in the third and fifth innings by the fielding of Kyle Bean and Clay Jackson.

Jackie Vaughn started on the mound for the White Sox, relieved by Timmy Perkins. Brad Ziegler followed in relief and was credited with the win.

Martin Will Fill Baptist Pulpit Sunday

In the absence of Rev. C. H. Murphy, Jr., who left Tuesday on the first leg of his trip to Japan to participate with Mrs. Murphy in an evangelistic crusade, Evangelist Dale Martin, 31, a student at Wayland Baptist College, will be bringing both the morning and evening messages Sunday, July 19, at the First Baptist Church here.

Wandering in a desolation of hopelessness, the Hippie "does his thing." In most cases he uses some form of drugs, he lives in a shadow world of complete abandon of conventions, laws and social respect. He subjects his body to the tragedy of every disease and dissipation and becomes old when he should be in the prime of his life. He has no respect for womanhood and the women have no respect for manhood. They believe or practice free love and challenge the "establishment" to change them.

These are the first-hand opinions and observations of Dale Martin, who has lived with the Hippies for several weeks in the Santa Fe, New Mexico area.

Martin dressed like the Hippies and talked like them, but when he entered the Hippie commune they knew he was not one of them because he was telling them about the saving grace of Jesus and was distributing literature and Bibles.

"We have people reading Bibles who never saw a Bible before we found them," Martin said. "We fail many times but we keep trying, and at night I go into the New Mexico mountains and pray that the Lord will continue to bless and direct my efforts. My work is not subsidized by Wayland, but by 14 businessmen who provide us a total of \$200 per month. With the payments on my stationwagon and necessities, we barely get along.

"The Hippie in New Mexico lives mostly on government food stamps, but a few do have some money or relatives who provide money. They pass much of the time cursing the government, the administration, the "establishment" and organized society. They have no organized plan, although efforts have been made to organize them. They are willing to live in filth, squalor and hopelessness to "do their thing."

Dale Martin has not always been an evangelist. Born into a wealthy family, his parents separated when he was a child. He lived with his grandparents in the Canyon area and was a constant problem to them and society. He was a drunkard, gambler, and was kicked out of one school after another. He married at 17 and did not change his ways. He drove expensive cars, lived in fine homes and continued his libertine conduct. Even after his children were born, he continued his gambling, drinking and debased way of life. He inherited a vast estate, became a night club owner and moved to Las Vegas. He and his first wife separated and he continued the life of dissipation. Later he married again but the second marriage made no change in his conduct.

He made a large investment with two partners and lost his fortune. He still continued gambling and "made a fair living for his family" but he would have nothing to do with a church. Finally at the a revival at a small church and insistence of his wife, he went to heard a professional wrestler who was an evangelist. He first thought it was sacrilegious for a man of his background to be preaching.

"Then I found Jesus Christ," he said. "I found what my empty life had been seeking and my world changed. I decided to become an evangelist. My sermons are the testimony of my life. I have found happiness and I want to lead others to faith in Jesus."

While Martin had lost his fortune, he started a new business that had grown to \$400,000 a year when he found what he had been seeking. He gave it up to begin study to be an evangelist.

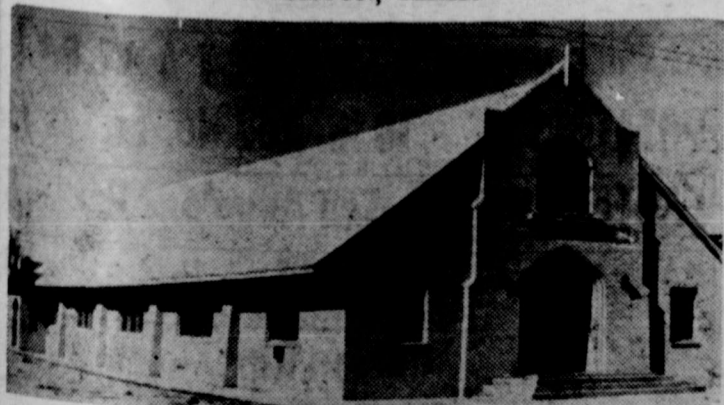
