Randy Neugebauer to replace Larry Combest

Randy Neugebauer announced Tuesday he is running for U.S. Congressman from the 19th Congressional District to replace Larry Combest.

The vacancy will be filled by a special election.

Neugebauer, 52, is President and CEO of Lubbock Land Company, a residential commercial land development company. He graduated from Texas Tech in 1972 with a BBA in Accounting.

Neugebauer served six years on the Lubbock City Council. Two of those years, 1994 to 1996, he served as Mayor Pro Tempore. He has been President of the West Texas Home Builders and President of Texas Association of Builders. In 1999, Neugebauer was elected to the National Board of Home Builders as Vice President covering the State of Texas. He has also served as President of Texas Boys Ranch.

As Chairman of the Ports-to-Plains Trade Corridor Coalition, Neugebauer worked with business leaders from Mexico to Canada to complete the corridor from Denver to Mexico. President Bush recently signed the route designation into law.

Neugebauer and his wife, Dana, have two sons, a daughter-in-law, and two grandsons.

Senator Bivins outlines important issues

State Senator Teel Bivins of Amarillo held a Town Hall Meeting Monday afternoon in the community room at the Muleshoe State Bank. Bivins, who's District 31 includes Bailey County said that he came to "get my marching orders" for the coming session of the Texas Legislature. He said he considers the town hall meetings across his district to be the "most important meetings he attends."

Bivins outlined the most important issues of the coming session or what he called the "marquee" issues. He listed them as 1. Budget, 2. School Finance and 3. Home Owner's Insurance.

On the budget, Bivins said it is too early to decide what to recommend because the current talk about short fall is "pure speculation." In January, the State Comptroller would come up with the accurate numbers on income.

To finance public education, Bivins, who chairs the Texas Senate Committee on Education, said he would recommend taking a billion dollars out of general revenues and "feed it" through the system to the school districts to alleviate the pressure on property

taxes.

Bivins said out of 1050 school districts 350 of them are already bumping the \$1.50 per hundred limit on property taxes for schools. He said the state need to lessen the reliance on property taxes to finance public education.

As far as home owner's insurance, Bivins said a change in regulation had already started to help with the problem and Farmers Insurance has announced they would stay in the home ownership insurance in Texas. Bivins said we live in a "bad weather state" which generates lots of claims with floods, hail, tornadoes, and hurricanes. He also said there were 31,000 black mold claims last year. All of these Texas should look at California. California now limits punitive damage awards in law suits to \$250,000. He said this would help keep doctors in Texas and hold down insurance rates.

When question about being quoted as favoring the elimination of the 12th grade, Bivins said it was another Senator who made the suggestion to eliminate the twelfth grade and fund a full years pre-kindergarten.

Bivins was re-elected in November without opposition.

The Center for Business and Industry at CCC has been approved for Workforce Investment Act (WIA) funding for a four-week Healthcare Assistant program designed to prepare students to take and pass the Nursing Assistant Certification Examination.

The course will include 40 classroom hours and 35 lab and clinical hours. Those who successfully

complete the program and qualify for certification as a Nursing Assistant can expect to earn starting pay of \$6.50 to \$7.20 an hour in the healthcare field. Cost of the program is \$325 and can be 100 percent funded for all WIA eligible participants. Applicants should be 18 years and older with a high school diploma or GED. Registration deadline is December 9.

USDA approves CRP extension of emergency grazing

COLLEGE STATION — In continuing response to this year's widespread drought, USDA's Farm Service Agency State Executive Director, John T. Fuston today announced the extension of emergency grazing of Conservation Reserve Program acreage in Texas to December 31, 2002.

Today's announcement makes all counties in Texas previously approved for emergency grazing eligible for the extension. Grazing is authorized until December 31, or until disaster conditions no longer exist,

whichever comes first. CRP participants who do not lease livestock may rent or lease the grazing privilege to an eligible livestock producer located in an approved county. CRP participants may also donate the grazing privilege to another livestock producer with a compelling need.

Today's action by USDA was in response to requests received from the FSA State Committees in these four states. Emergency haying was not authorized in order to protect and preserve wildlife habitat and the environmental benefit of

the permanent cover.

CRP annual rental payments will be reduced 25 percent to account for the areas grazed. At least 25 percent of the CRP contract acreage must be left ungrazed for wildlife. Other restrictions and limitations also apply.

Producers should check with their local FSA office to determine which counties are approved for extended emergency grazing. Producers must obtain an approved grazing conservation plan prior to grazing the acreage. Livestock operations in approved counties should submit applications to their local FSA offices.

CRP offers annual rental payments and cost-

share assistance to establish long-term, resource-conserving cover on eligible land. USDA will monitor producers to ensure the land is safely grazed with damaging conservation covers.

USDA also offers other programs to assist drought stricken producers, including emergency farm loans, federal crop insurance, the emergency conservation program and the noninsured crop disaster assistance program. 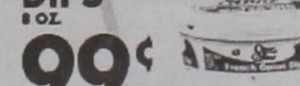

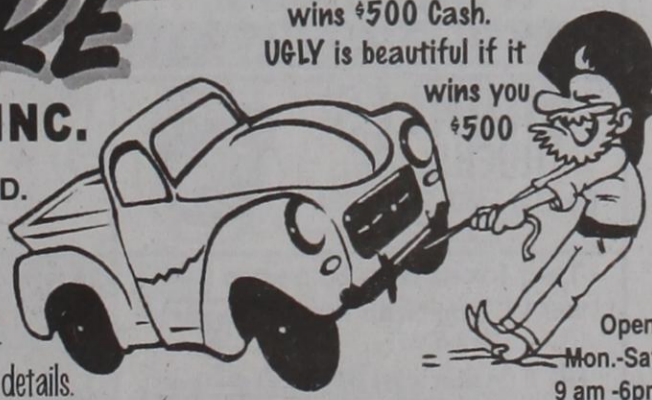

Veterans Affairs doubles Gulf War research funding

SPECIAL TO THE JOURNAL
According to Dawn Merriott, Veterans County Service Officer for Bailey County, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) plans to make available up to \$20 million for research into Gulf War illnesses during fiscal year 2004, a figure twice the amount spent by VA in any previous year.

The announcement, made by VA Deputy Secretary Dr. Leo S. Mackay Jr., highlighted a two-day meeting of VA's Research Advisory Committee on Gulf War Veterans Illnesses. The decision was,

in part, a response to a committee report in June concerning areas of research that need further study.

"We want the best researchers and the best ideas brought to bear on this long-standing problem," Mackay said. "Research into Gulf War illnesses is an area ripe for important discoveries."

Studies by researchers from VA and the private sector have found evidence of a possible neurological basis for the complaints of some veterans.

The committee, commissioned last January by VA

Secretary Anthony Principi and chaired by James Binns, a Vietnam veteran, includes scientists, business people, Gulf War veterans and veterans' advocates. Some members have been critical of previous government efforts to diagnose, treat and research the medical problems of some veterans.

"This is a huge occasion for our work," said Binns. "This is tangible evidence that this administration is different and committed to finding answers."

In addition to the increase in funding, VA plans

to create a special center dedicated to medical imaging technologies. These technologies are important to understanding Gulf War illnesses as well as other conditions important to veterans.

To date, the Departments of Defense, health and Human Services and VA have spent \$213 million on research projects to answer the questions surrounding Gulf War illnesses.

"Science is finally beginning to unravel the mysteries of Gulf War illnesses. And finally, there is reason for hope," Mackay said.

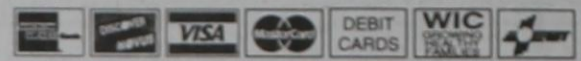
