Irreverence appears in the worship of God far too frequently. In the Psalms (89:7) it is said; "God is greatly to be feared in the assembly of the saints, and to be had in reverence of all them that are about Him." Proper reverence for God and His worship would eliminate the commandments of men from worship (Matthew 15:9). It would also eliminate unnecessary disturbances in meetings for worship, such as hilarity, whispering, scuffing of feet, going in and out needlessly, letting babies cry without steps taken to quiet them, turning and twisting to look over the audience, and many other distractions. The atmosphere of meetings for worship should be as conductive to worship and devotion as possible.

To joke and jest about sacred things is to exhibit irreverence. Calling baptism a "ducking" and treating the Lord's Supper lightly, indicates the grossly irreverent character of the one doing so. "The Lord is in his holy temple: let all the earth keep silence before him." (Habakkuk 2:20) Let us strive more to give reverence to our God as we worship; and do it in spirit and in truth.

The TSA was sponsor of the election and referendum which established a 1/2-cent per bushel self assessment on soybeans produced in the area. Proceeds from the program will be used for research and promotion of new markets for the crop, according to W. B. Tilson, TSA president and chairman of the joint meeting. Aside from flavor, the best part about this menu idea is that both the salad and dressing can be made early in the day before the mercury climbs high. The dressing begins with a can of condensed cream of asparagus soup. This double rich, double thick soup has a smooth texture and a delicate flavor that complements just about every salad ingredient. Crumbled blue cheese, sour cream, and lemon are stirred into this superb cream soup to make the perfect dressing for your salad of ham, chicken, asparagus, hard-cooked eggs, and lettuce. Bountiful main-dish salads are the most tempting dishes






