But the best way to find shells is to hunt the live mollusks (a mollusk is a soft-bodied, shell-bearing animal) in shallow water at low tide. Freshwater shells are found in the mud and sand of ponds

animal. Clams, for instance, can be boiled for a few minutes. Then the shells pop open and the animal can be cleaned out easily.
