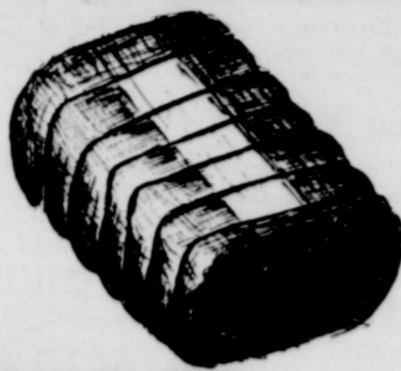

Marvin Self Qualifies For State Track Meet

Marvin Self earned a berth in the State Track Meet by winning first in the Discus Throw and second in the Shot Put at the Regional Meet held in Lubbock Friday and Saturday.

The Regional Discus and Shot events were clearly competition between only two of the contestants: Ricky Thurman of White

Deer and Self of Silverton. In most of the meets where the White Deer senior and Silverton junior have competed against one another this year, Thurman has placed first in the Shot Put, with Self in second place, and Self has placed first in the Discus, with Thurman finishing second.

The Regional Meet followed this same trend. Self threw the Discus 163'11", with Thurman heaving the "saucer" 155'3 3/4". Third place was won with a throw of 150'9" and sixth place in the event was won for a heave of 128'3 1/2".

Thurman won the Shot with a put of 55'3 1/2", with Self in second place with a put of 54'2". In the finals of the event, Self tied Thurman at 54'2", but Thurman was able to take his best throw in the preliminaries to take first place. As yet, Self has been unable to get off as good a put in the meet as he has gotten in practice. Third place was won with a distance of 46'11 3/4", and sixth was won with a put of 46'4 3/4".

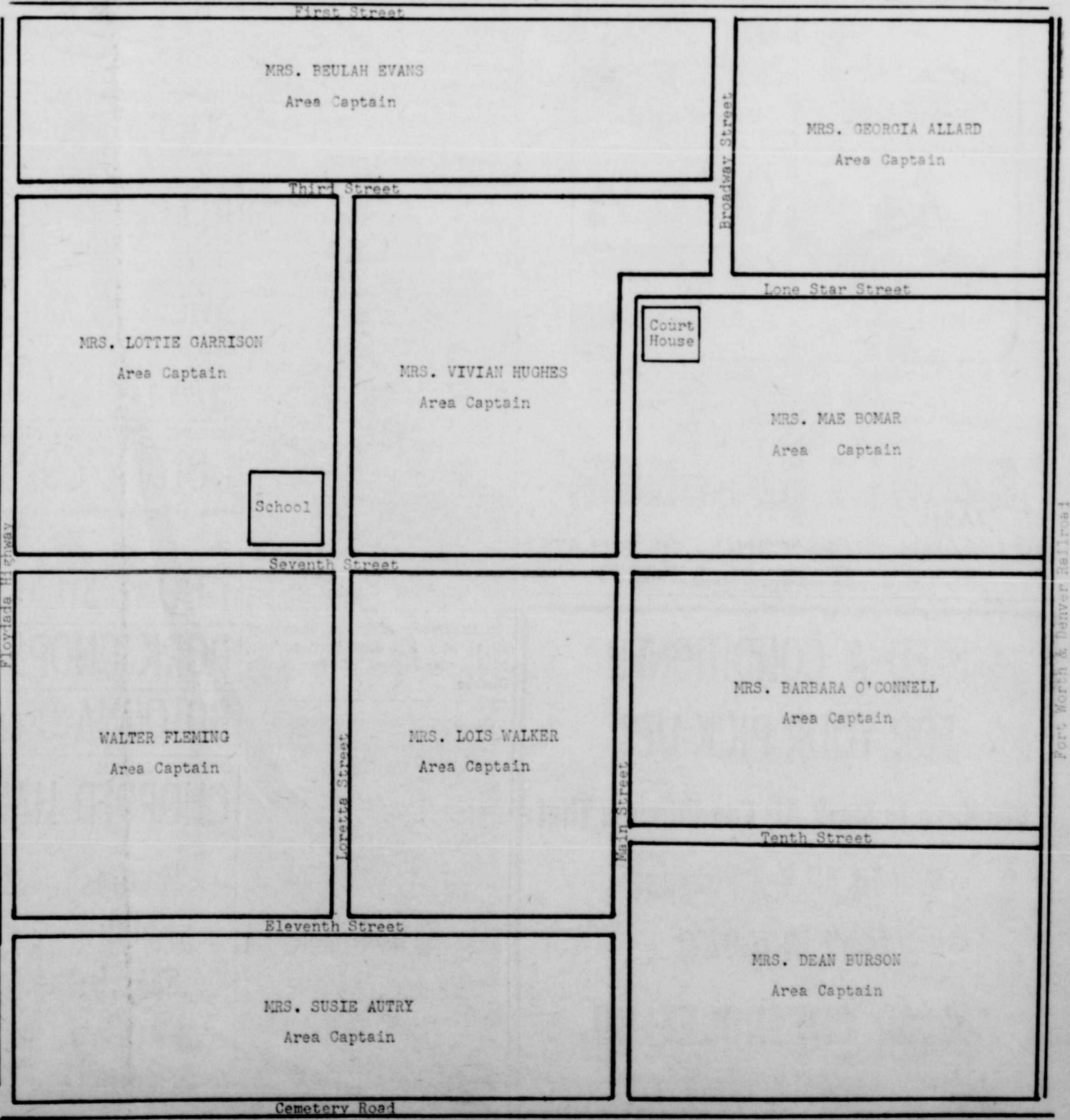

WHEAT REFERENDUM BALLOTS AVAILABLE AT EXTENSION OFFICE

Wheat producers in Briscoe County who desire to vote absentee in the upcoming wheat referendum and producer board election will be able to do so at the County Extension Office beginning April 27, according to County Agricultural Agent Jackie Johnson.

"We will have ballots available for any producers who want to vote absentee in the election between April 27 and May 10," says Johnson. "On May 11 the Texas Wheat Producers Association will hold an election over a 34-county area to determine whether or not to assess producers not more than five mills per bushel on all wheat produced for purposes of research and promotion. At the same time, producers will have an opportunity to elect a nine-man producers board to administer funds for such

a research and promotion program."

Briscoe County producers who do not vote absentee are encouraged to vote in the election on May 11.

Fred Mercer, county director of the TWPA, will be in charge of conducting the referendum and election.

Johnson points out that the Texas Commissioner of Agriculture has certified the TWPA to hold such a referendum and election and that a two-thirds favorable vote will be required to enact the self-assessment program. If the program is approved, the nine-man producers board will have total authority for the collection, use and accounting of all funds and the implementation of programs designed to strengthen the wheat growers' income.

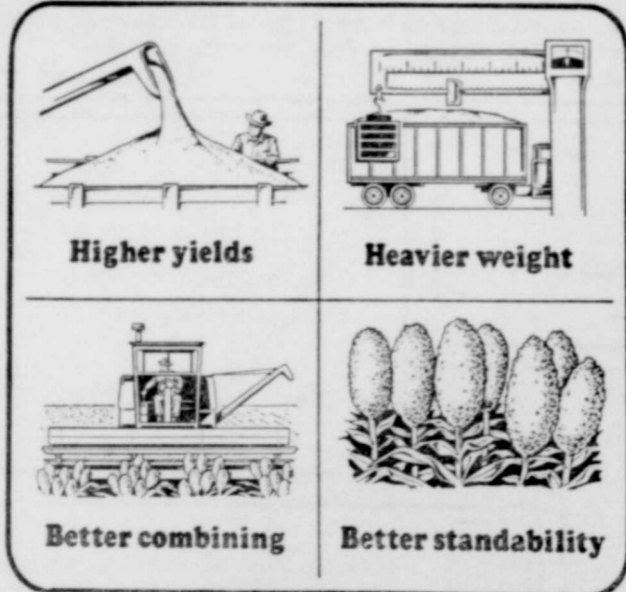

ELECTRIC SHOCK TO BE DEMONSTRATED AT SCHOOL

Electric Shock—just a tingle in the finger—or ventricular fibrillation (when the heart stops beating and death results).

Have you ever wondered why you were only annoyed or startled, while others apparently under similar conditions were seriously injured or killed?

The answer to this very important question will be answered by

Joe Smetana, Safety Director for the Texas Farm Bureau, when he presents a public service demonstration to prevent electric shock at 10:30 a.m. today (Thursday, April 29), principal Richard Souter announced.

"Nobody's safe," says Smetana. "When you are standing on damp ground or wet concrete, bathing, washing, swimming, using or touching any grounded tool or appliance, or are in contact with any piping system or metal structure, ordinary household current passing into your body from defective

equipment or accidental contact with conductors can injure or kill you," he added.

Medical authorities agree that if the amount of current required to light a 15-watt bulb, which is only 1/10 of an ampere, should flow through your heart, death might result in just one second.

Regular 120-volt household current can force two times the lethal dose through you. The degree of danger depends partly on age, physical condition, how long the current flows through the body, and the path the current takes
