Amendment Lowers Voting Age to 18

County Tax Assessor-Collectors have received notification from Texas Secretary of State Martin Dies, jr., that persons 18, 19 or 20 years of age who are presently registered to vote for federal elections only may now vote in ALL elections in the county and other political subdivisions.

Ramplsey Infant Buried Saturday

Graveside services for the infant daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Dwight Ramplsey of 209 North Bowie, Tulia, were conducted at 3:00 p.m. Saturday in the Silverton Cemetery. Lynn Rhodes, minister of the North Crosby Church of Christ in Tulia officiated. Burial arrangements were made by the Silverton Funeral Home.

The infant was stillborn at 8:30 a.m. Friday at Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulia.

Survivors include the parents; a brother, Ty Don, of the home; grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. O. C. Ramplsey and A. T. Bingham, all of Silverton, and Mrs. Ikie Bingham of Lubbock; and great-grandparents, Mrs. Mary Ramplsey and Mrs. Stella Davis, both of Silverton, and Mrs. H. C. Carroll of Quitaque.

United States Constitution lowering the voting age to 18 in all elections has been duly ratified by the state legislatures as prescribed by the Federal Constitution. The Federal Register in Washington D. C. confirmed July 1, 1971, that this new amendment went into immediate effect. This United States Constitutional Amendment overrides Article VI of the Texas Constitution insofar as it requires an otherwise qualified voter to be 21 years of age to be eligible to vote. Thus as of July 1, any registered 18, 19 or 20 year old may vote in ANY election—federal, state, county, city, or other political subdivision.

Persons who turned 18 years of age after the close of the regular 1971 registration period may still register for the current voting year. The certificate is effective for any election held 30 days after registration. It is not necessary to segregate these late registrations from any other age classification on the list of registered voters. Also, these registration certificates are not to be stamped "For Federal Elections Only."

Fewer Farms In United States Today

There were 2.9 million farms in the United States in 1970. This is a decrease of 2% from the 1969 figure and a 26% decrease for the past decade.

Individual farms are getting larger due to mergers but the total amount of land in farms has decreased somewhat due to urbanization and highway construction.

Production of farm goods went up 20% since the beginning of the last decade, gross farm income went up, but net income went down \$3 billion.

When the batter gets a hit he must mount his donkey and ride around the bases in proper order—if he can. There are no strike-outs or walks. Fielders must ride to within a step of the ball before dismounting and must remount before throwing the ball. Soft-ball is used. Nine players on each team. Game plays five to seven innings—approximately one hour and a half.

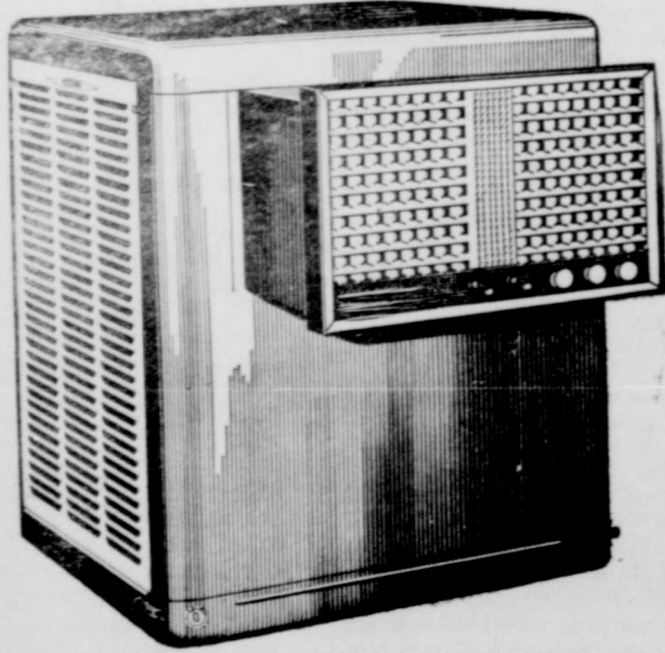
