Quarantine Clamped On Horses In Texas

The State of Texas placed a quarantine Tuesday on all movement of horses within the state in an effort to curb the spread of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, a sleeping sickness which also affects human beings.

Due to the quarantine, the All-Youth Quarter Horse Show which was to have been sponsored by the Briscoe County 4-H Horse Club in Silverton on July 24 has been cancelled by The American Quarter Horse Association.

The disease has spread from the epidemic-plagued Rio Grande Valley, and the U.S. Department of Agriculture has released the vaccine used in the Valley for use throughout the state, Secretary Clifford Hardin announced Tues-




