Mr. Whitfill, a math teacher in the Rockport schools for the past eight years, died at 6:00 a.m. Tuesday in a Corpus Christi hospital after a lengthy illness.

He was born April 12, 1939 in Lockney, Texas, and had spent most of his life in Silverton before moving to Rockport. He was graduated from Silverton High School and received his BS degree at Texas Tech University in Lubbock.

He taught geometry and chemistry in Silverton High School and health and math in Silverton Junior High in 1961-63.

During the past year he had been working part-time for the County Surveyor at Rockport.

He was a member of St. Peter's Episcopal Church in Rockport, and was a vester in the church. He was also a member of the Silverton Masonic Lodge.

He was married to the former Gwenlyn Paige of Silverton. Survivors are his wife, Gwenlyn; a son, Scott, and a daughter, Dawn, all of the home in Rockport; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Whitfill of Silverton; two brothers, Gene of Silverton and Rusty of Albuquerque, New Mexico; one sister, Mrs. Gale Sheaffer of Denver, Colorado; and grandparents, Mrs. R. E. Patterson and Mr. and Mrs. Ed Whitfill, all of Lockney.

The family requests that memorials be in the form of donations to charity.

The family is expected here from Rockport this morning, and meals today are to be served at the Ben Whitfill and Lester Paige homes.

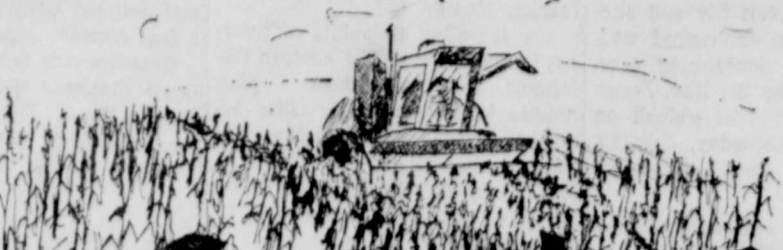

Quarantine Clamped On Horses In Texas

The State of Texas placed a quarantine Tuesday on all movement of horses within the state in an effort to curb the spread of Venezuelan equine encephalomyelitis, a sleeping sickness which also affects human beings.

Due to the quarantine, the All-Youth Quarter Horse Show which was to have been sponsored by the Briscoe County 4-H Horse Club in Silverton on July 24 has been cancelled by The American Quarter Horse Association.

The disease has spread from the epidemic-plagued Rio Grande Valley, and the U. S. Department of Agriculture has released the vaccine used in the Valley for use throughout the state. Secretary Clifford Hardin announced Tuesday.

It is thought by officials of The American Quarter Horse Association that there is small chance of the disease spreading as far north as the Panhandle due to the vaccine having been released and because of strict controls which are being placed on horses in the area.

No unvaccinated horses will be allowed to move from place to place within the county in which they are kept. Vaccinated horses may move inter-county and interstate after a 14-day period which is considered sufficient time for the vaccination to take effect.

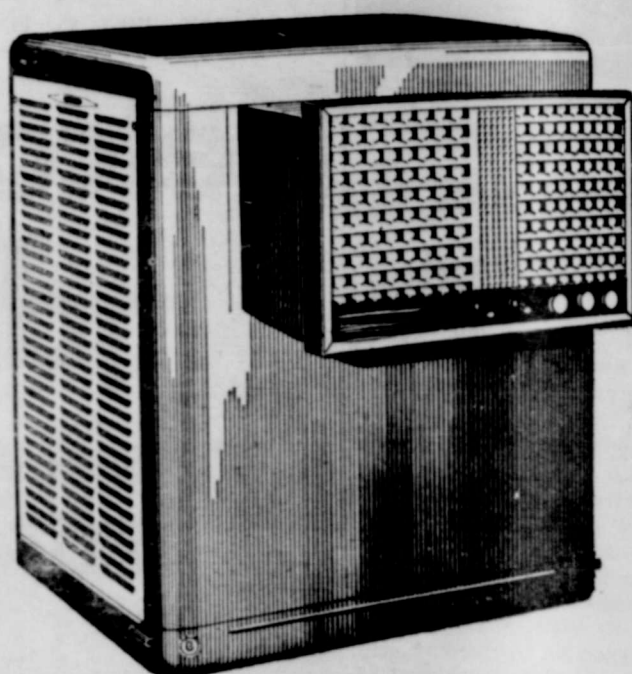

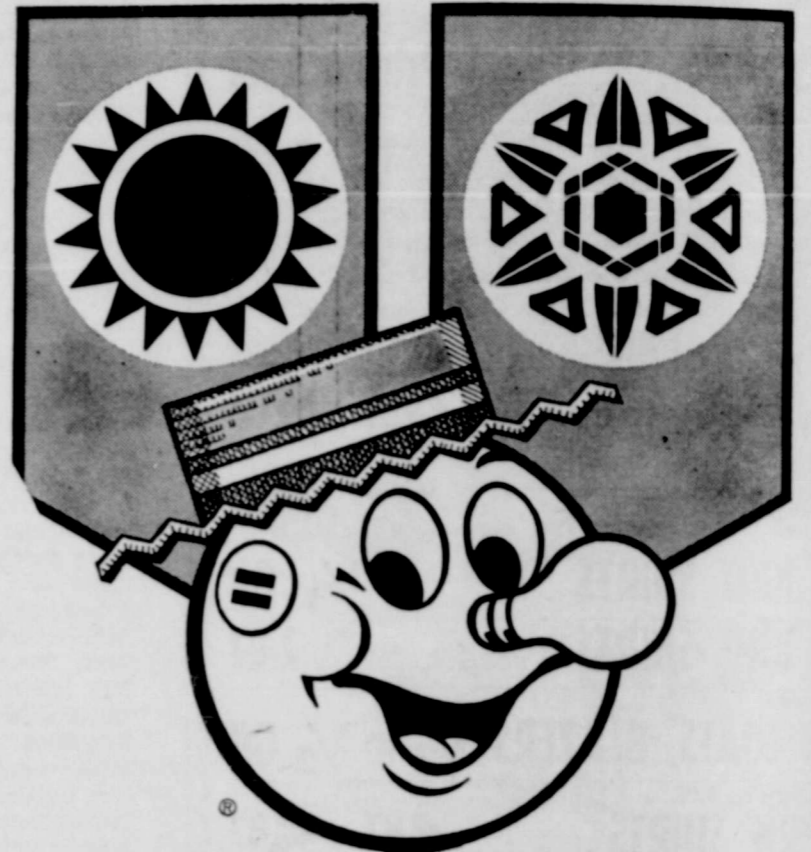
