 - (3) A new, air-conditioned pickup truck, with automatic transmission, power steering, a trailer hitch, and a punch-button radio for listening to football games.
 - (4) A gun rack, for the rear window of the pickup, big enough to hold a walking stick and a rope.
 - (5) Two leopard dogs to ride in the bed of the truck.
 - (6) A \$40 horse and a \$100 saddle.
 - (7) A gooseneck trailer, small enough to park in front of the cafe.
 - (8) A place to keep the cows; a little land too poor to grow crops.
 - (9) A spool of barbed wire, three cedar posts, and a bale of prairie hay, to haul around in the truck all the time.
 - (10) Credit at the bank.
 - (11) Credit at the feed store.
 - (12) Credit from your father-in-law.
 - (13) A good neighbor to feed the leopard dogs and the cows while you're gone to Colorado.
 - (14) A pair of silver spurs to wear to barbecues.
 - (15) A rubber cushion to sit on for four hours at the auction ring every Tuesday.
 - (16) A secondhand car, for going out to feed the cows when your son borrows the new pickup for a date.
 - (17) A good pocketknife, suitable for whittling, to pass time while at auction ring.
 - (18) A good wife who won't get upset when you walk across the living room carpet with manure on your boots.
 - (19) A wife who will believe you when you come in at 11 p.m. and say, "I've been fixin' fence."
 - (20) A wife with a good, full-time job at the courthouse.

Rites Held At Spearman For Accident Victim

Funeral services for Holland Andrew Sloan, 74, the victim of a car-truck crash four miles west of Silverton Friday morning, were conducted at 3:00 p.m. Sunday in the First United Methodist Church in Spearman.

Rev. W. S. Herring of El Campa, Colorado, officiated at the services assisted by Rev. Terry Williams, pastor of the Fellowship Baptist Church.

Burial was in Hansford Cemetery at Spearman.

Mr. Sloan was pinned in his car in the accident, which occurred about 7:50 a.m. at the intersection of Texas 86 and Farm Road 207. Witnesses said they tried to remove Mr. Sloan from his car, but were unable to get the doors open before the vehicle was consumed by fire. Earlier fire had been extinguished with a portable fire extinguisher, but when the flames erupted the second time the extinguisher had been used up.

The Silverton Fire Department was called to the scene, and extinguished the blaze in a matter of minutes after their arrival.

Highway patrolmen and Briscoe County Sheriff Vinson Smith said the car was traveling south and the truck was traveling west toward Tulsa.

Morris Burgess, 44, of Mount Pleasant, driver of the truck, was treated for head and shoulder injuries at the Silverton Clinic. The truck he was driving collided with a highline pole after its collision with the automobile.

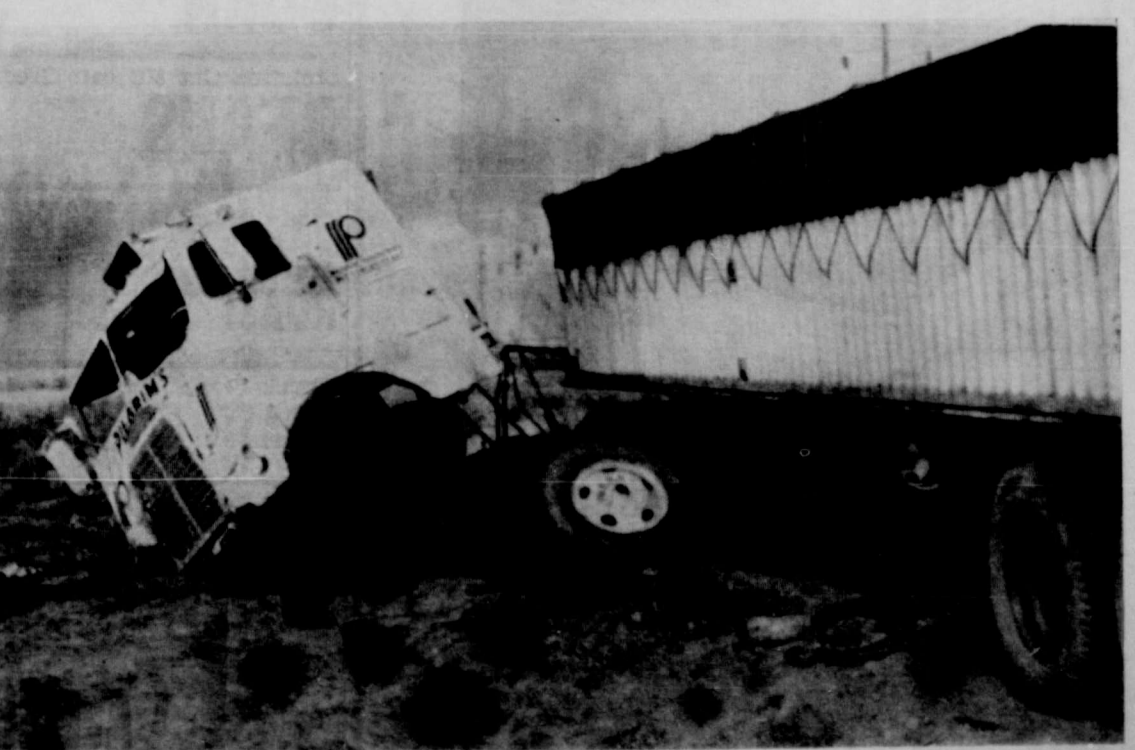
WESTERN COWBOY REUNION SLATED AUGUST 27-28

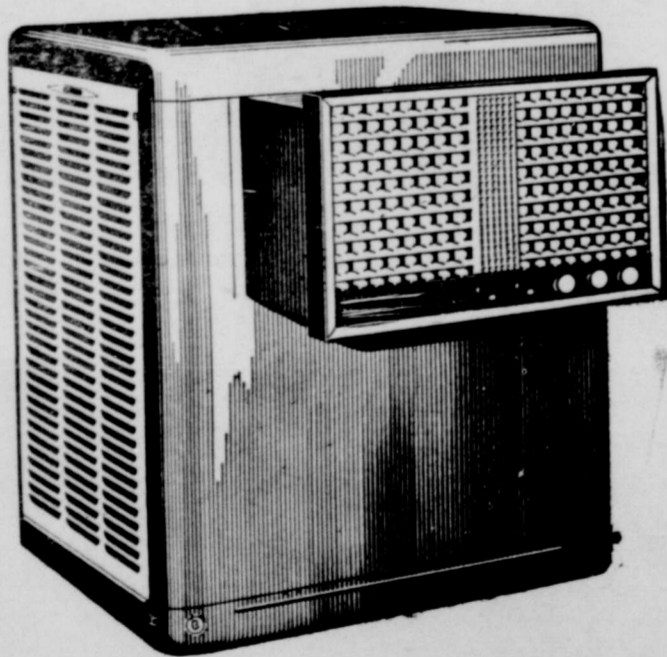
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Gabe Garrisons To Celebrate 60th Anniversary Here

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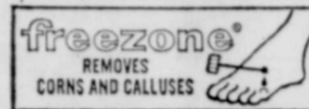
