## Owls To Open Football Season At Turkey

Very few inquiries about the wage-price freeze and other aspects of the President's Executive Order on Economic Stabilization have been received here, according to James E. Griffin, County Executive Director.

### Boat Registration Laws Also Changed

Boat owners registering their craft this year will find some changes in the law. For one thing, all water craft powered by any sort of machinery must now be registered with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Changes in the Texas Water Safety Act went into effect September 1, 1971, and applications for renewals and original certificates of number may be awarded beginning January 1, 1972.

New registrations will be good for two years from the date of issuance. The department is also shifting to a staggered system of renewals. All renewal notices will be sent out at the same time, but different registrations will expire at different times, and the registration rates will be prorated accordingly.

The new Certificate of Number will be a plastic card which can be carried in the boat owner's wallet. Two decals in the shape of the state come with each Certificate of Number and are color coded with expiration dates marked on the face. They are to be placed on a line even with and three inches aft of the registration numbers on the boat.

An across-the-board increase of \$3 in registration fees for all boats also goes into effect January 1, 1972. New rates for registration are: Up to 16 feet, \$6; 16 to 26 feet, \$9; 26 to 40 feet, \$12, and over 40 feet, \$15.

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### MANY DIE FROM INADEQUATE EMERGENCY TREATMENT

Twenty-thousand accident victims die unnecessarily each year as a direct result of inadequate emergency care and at least another 25,000 are permanently disabled from the same cause. These are the alarming statistics released after a national study. Communities can do something about it, and many are.

Koonce, Field Consultant with the Division of Civil Defense and Traffic Safety of the Texas State Department of Health, will present a program at the meetings of the Silverton Lions Club and Silverton Fire Department on Thursday, October 7. He will appear before the Lions at their regular noonday meeting and before the volunteer firemen at 7:00 p.m.

Mr. Koonce will encourage community awareness and concern toward the life-death importance of well co-ordinated Local Emergency Medical Services. A film will be shown which dramatically illustrates how a small town saw the need for better emergency care and worked to fulfill that need.

### LAKE SIDE BIOLOGY LAB FOR CLARENDON COLLEGE

Mr. Bill Elerbrook, chairman of the Science Division at Clarendon College, stated today the Biology Department at Clarendon College has secured a site located on the Greenbelt Lake north of Clarendon. This site will serve several purposes. First, it will be a study site for biology research, dealing with marine life, where the students will collect specimens, study them, and preserve them for future reference. This will give the student a more realistic view of marine life.

Second, it will serve as a relic and artifact area with the site undisturbed compared to the changes in the surrounding area. The site will also serve as a research area giving the student practical experience with the methods and tools of biological research.

Greenbelt Lake is a relatively new lake, and the research will serve as on-going biology history. This lab site will be used extensively by the Biology Department to stress the study of the environment and man's relationship to it.

### APPLICATIONS REQUIRED FROM PARTICIPATING RETAIL GROCERS IN TEXAS

Retail grocers in the state of Texas who participate in the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Food Stamp Program will be required to submit new applications.

The grocers will need to reapply due to automation of the processing of redemption certificates (deposit slips retailers use in redeeming food stamp coupons they have received for eligible foods) and the need to update information maintained on all participating retailers, according to Martin Garber, southwest regional administrator for the Food and Nutrition Service—the agency administratively responsible for USDA food programs.

Forms needed by the retailers to reapply will be mailed to them on September 1. New authorizations will take effect on December 1, 1971, and new authorization codes will be assigned to authorized retailers. Mr. Garber said that grocers who fail to submit new applications and receive new authorization cards will not be authorized to accept and redeem food stamp coupons after November 30, 1971.

one surprise after another in announcing appointments to key state positions.

One of the biggest was selection of his longtime aide and top political campaign worker Robert D. (Bob) Bullock, formerly of Hillsboro, as Secretary of State, succeeding Martin Dies, jr.

A few days earlier, he selected another staff assistant, V. Larry Teaver of Lubbock, to the State Board of Insurance. Surprise here was that Teaver did not replace Durwood Manford, veteran member of the board.

Manford got a new six-year term and Charles D. Mathews, a Dallas trucking executive and attorney until two years ago, was moved from the board to an Austin district judgeship.

Teaver replaced Mathews when the freshman board member became judge of the new 200th Travis County district court.

Smith stirred some controversy by naming a successor to Brig. Gen. James M. Rose as assistant adjutant general of Texas for air. On recommendation of Maj. Gen. Ross Ayers, the state adjutant general, he picked Lt. Col. Belisario D. J. Flores of San Antonio for the Air National Guard command.

Smith's other appointments included:

\*T. E. (Gene) Mitchell of Plainview as chairman of the Governor's Committee on Human Relations. Dies previously doubled in that job before his appointment to the Ninth Court of Civil Appeals at Beaumont.

\*Robert W. Kneebone of Houston for a new six-year term as a member of the Texas Youth Council.

**REDISTRICTING MOVES ON**  
 A two-way legislative redistricting fight moved toward a Supreme Court decision last week.

Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin filed briefs in appeal from the August 2 Austin district court ruling that House of Representatives reapportionment is unconstitutional because it improperly violates county lines. Martin said the "one-man-one-vote" rule of federal courts eliminates state constitutional provision safe-guarding county lines.

At the same time, 53rd District Judge Herman Jones refused to prevent the Texas Legislative Redistricting Board from reapportioning the State Senate and said the Board may also do preliminary House realignment. Time for attack on board's work, concluded Jones, is when it finishes.

Rep. Fred Head of Henderson brought suit in Jones' court to prevent the Board from redistricting House and Senate. He contended new census data is not complete and that reapportionment should be left until 1973. Head indicated efforts will be made to get his suit before the Supreme Court at the same time as the attack on House reapportionment of the regular session.

**TAX STUDY LAUNCHED**  
 New Legislative Property Tax Committee began a four-year study of how property taxation can be made "fair, viable and ef-

ficient." Sen. Jim Bates of Edinburg was named chairman of the group and Jack Hart of Midland, staff director.

Hart noted a recent decision of the California Supreme Court may make the Texas committee's job more difficult. California court held reliance on property taxes alone to finance public schools is unconstitutional.

Committee's work is being financed by a charge of \$1 per delinquent tax receipt authorized by the Legislature this year. Among goals is computerization of ad valorem tax records on a statewide basis.

**TEACHER PAY HIKE OKAY**  
 Up to 90% of 138,000 Texas teachers will get their pay raises as approved by the Legislature in spite of the 90-day wage freeze, under a Texas Education Agency ruling.

Ruling by State Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar is subject to approval by federal authorities. It would go to 1,200 local school districts on September 8 unless reversed in Washington, but is subject to further interpretation at local school board level.

Edgar said teachers signed contracts prior to August 15, many

were at work July 1, and others had reached an agreement and established eligibility to perform with a local school before the president's freeze order. Commissioner Edgar concluded that raises were in order also in local school districts which pay salaries above the state minimum where agreements were reached before August 15.

Texas Public Employees Association filed a petition for exceptions from the freeze since the Legislature last June passed an

appropriations bill calling for state worker pay raises.

**SHORT SNORTS**

Texas motor vehicle registrations topped \$7.5 million mark for first time during registration year which ended March 31. Figure was 7,515,053, plus 120,295 exempt registrations.

New Texas Film Commission launched drive last week to get more movie production companies to work in state.

INTERIM REPORT

Redistricting

BACKGROUND

Texas Constitution provides that the State shall redistrict at first regular session after publication of the decennial census. That the districts shall be of equal size and counties in each district are to be contiguous.

Baker v. Carr decision of U. S. Supreme Court specifies that districts be formed on basis of "one man—one vote."

News release from Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, chairman of Redistricting Committee, stated "Our basic formula provided that counties which had enough population for a full district should have that district created within the county. Any excess population was to be used with adjoining territories to bring each district within the population requirement for the "one man—one vote" requirement of the Supreme Court."

State divided into quadrants with committee to hold hearings in each "to discuss any redistricting suggestions and proposals that you may have . . . Specifically you are urged to submit three different plans . . . all with populations varying not more than + or - 2.5% from the ideal of 74,645" according to Quadrant IV Chair-

man Menton Murray who traveled to the Panhandle.

With this extensive preparation, one would expect a redistricting bill which followed the Constitution and listened to the people . . . a bill which equally represents the people of all districts and would provide districts that are compact, contiguous and of common interest. Something quite the opposite was the net result.

RESULTS

☆Ch. Jones told me in effect that he was not interested in saving the Panhandle's representation. This was after his presentation of a Congressional redistricting plan which split Amarillo, placing Potter County in one district and Randall in another. (Amarillo Daily News, April 17.)

☆Ch. Jones in a speech to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, stated, "I am a Democrat and I intend to take care of Democrats first. If the choice is between the interests of a Democrat and a Republican, I'm going to try to help the Democrat." He further noted that "Taking care of Rep. George Mahon of Lubbock is the first responsibility of the Congressional and Legislative Redistrict Committee." (Amarillo Daily News, April 19.)

☆Ch. Jones told the Killen Chamber he had done his "dead-

level best to eliminate liberal House members. Hopefully I have made it impossible for some of these people to get re-elected." (Temple Daily Telegram, July 31.) Jones failed to mention that the so-called liberals were members of the "Dirty 30" who opposed Speaker Mutscher with a coalition of Republicans.

☆The Redistricting Bill passed left the Panhandle short TWO representatives instead of one necessary on the basis of population loss. Reps. Ralph Wayne, Phil Cates and I are lumped into one district, thereby losing two.

☆Legislative redistricting bill split not one, but 23 counties in violation of Texas Constitution and has been ruled unconstitutional by 53rd District Court in Austin.

☆Plan provided districts with almost a 9% variance instead of the recommended 2.5%.

☆Old law designating districts became invalid with signing of new law by the Governor. Now that new law is overturned, the State is virtually without districts.

☆Senate redistricting plan not passed at all. Will be done by Redistricting Board which convened August 24. Governor has instructed Board to also draw a plan for the House. Chief Justice, Texas Supreme Court, has said the House has met constitutional obligation by drawing a plan, even

one that has been overturned. Therefore Board has no authority to draw new one.

☆Attorney General ruled June 4 that drawing of districts in a Special Session would be in violation of Constitution.

☆Drawing of the plan was made primarily on the basis of politics which would eliminate all opposition to Speaker Mutscher by pairing his opponents with members of his "Team" for upcoming elections.

☆Little regard was given to the economics, geography or wishes of people who testified at hearings held at taxpayer expense.

☆October 1 is opening of voter registration. This is made almost impossible because lines of various districts may not cross precinct lines. Voters may have to register and be assigned precincts at a later date . . . another added expense for double work which the taxpayer will have to underwrite.

CONCLUSIONS

The citizens of Texas are without representative districts, with no provisions in our Constitution for drawing same. There is virtually no one in State government with the authority to draw them if so ordered. Citizens do not have precincts and candidates do not have legal districts in which to file for office. It has been suggested that all may have to run at-large . . . a cure as undesirable as the disease.

According to Election Bureau of Secretary of States' Office, only alternative is to have redistricting ordered by Federal Courts. At this time there is no case in Federal Court that would allow such action. Another chance may come if State Supreme Court overturns Attorney General's appeal of District Court decision. Then possible for U. S. Supreme Court to order if appealed to this higher Court.

COMMENT

It is amazing that I am the only member of the Panhandle delegation to vote against this measure. Voting aye were Reps. Bynum, Cates, Cobb, Clayton, Heatly, Poff and Wayne.
