Owls Take Groom 21-6, Try Petersburg Next

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Owl Tri-Captains, Marvin Self (30), David Kellum (75) and Dana Martin (12) were pictured with the game referees and Co-captains of the Groom Tigers during the meeting at midfield prior to the football game here last Friday night.

Silverton's Owls earned a 21-6 victory over the Groom Tigers in a very muddy contest on the home field Friday night. A light drizzle fell during most of the fourth quarter.

The Owls opened action in the first half with Marvin Self booming the kickoff into the endzone for a touchback. The Tigers picked up a first down in three plays on their own 47, but runs by 180-pound Senior Fullback John Crowell and 175-pound Senior Halfback Mike Ollinger failed to gain another first down, and the ball went over to the Owls on the Silverton-44.

Dana Martin ran for a first down to the Tiger-45, Carl Gallington and David McCoy combined talents to put together another on the Groom-34, and on the next series of plays the Owls lost the ball on a fumble after having fumbled and recovered on the previous play.

The Tigers picked up another first down on runs by Crowell and Ollinger to their own 48 before meeting tough opposition in Dana Martin, McCoy and Mark Hutsell, and punted to the Owl-30. After Silverton was penalized for delay of the game, runs by Dana Martin and McCoy failed to gain a first down, and the Owls punted to the Groom-43. This time defense by Rex Clayton and Terry Culwell helped hold the Tigers to a small gain and Groom punted to the Silverton-29. Gallington and Dana Martin picked up a first down on the Silverton-42 just before the first period ended. Gallington rushed for another on the Tiger-45, and after a 5-yard run by Self and almost five yards more by McCoy, Self carried the ball the remaining 35 yards for the first score of the game. Self kicked the extra point, and the Owls held a 7-0 lead.

The Tigers ran the ensuing kickoff out to their own 35, were held to no gain by Self, were stopped at the line of scrimmage again, threw an incomplete pass and punted. Dana Martin ran the punt back to the Owl-43.

McCoy picked up a first down to the Groom-32. Dana Martin, Self and Gallington combined talents to rush for six more yards to the Tiger-26. Then on fourth down, Quarterback Martin passed to Terry Culwell who crossed the goal line for a second score for the Owls. The pass for extra points failed, and the home team held a 13-0 lead.

Silverton's kickoff was run out to the Groom-30, and the Tigers proceeded to make their third first down of the game. After being penalized back to their own 35 for being offside, the Tigers were held to a two-yard gain, with good defensive play coming in from Dana Martin and David Kellum, and punted to the Silverton-23. After an exchange of punts, the first half ended.

Groom opened the second half by kicking to the Owls. The ball was run out to the Owl-35. McCoy rushed for two yards before Martin completed an aerial to Terry Culwell, which was nullified by a procedure penalty against the Owls. Dana Martin rushed for eight yards before Silverton punted to the Groom-37. The Owls were penalized for being offside, but the Tigers were unable to gain the other five yards, and punted to the Silverton-34.

On first down, McCoy rushed to the Silverton-38. Martin threw an incomplete pass and on third

Sorghum Producers To Fill Four Board Vacancies

Ballots are being mailed this week to each producer of grain sorghum within the 29-county area of the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board. The ballots are for the purpose of electing four men who will fill the vacancies on the 12-man board that are due to expiring terms of Charles Heck, Nazareth; Melvin Barton, Dimmitt; A. R. Dillard, Hereford; and C. C. (Pap) Reed of Kress.

In addition to the four incumbents, whose names appear on the ballot for re-election, are three other nominees. They are Worth Jones, Hart; Martin Gossett, Jr., Dumas; and Gerald McCathern, Hereford.

The election is to be conducted by mail. Enclosed with the ballots are postpaid envelopes to return the ballots to Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board offices at 1212 14th Street, Lubbock. All ballots must be postmarked by midnight October 15, 1971, in order to be counted. Any bona fide producer of grain sorghum within the TGSPB area is eligible to vote. Should any producer fail to receive a ballot, he may obtain one from the county agricultural agent's office.

The panel of judges will consist of one county judge, one representative of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, one representative of Texas Agricultural Extension Service, one representative of Commissioner White's office, and one representative of Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board.

next play, Self carried the remaining six yards for his second touchdown of the evening. The Owls were penalized five yards for taking too much time, and McCoy ran in for the two-point conversion to give the Owls a 21-0 lead.

Groom ran the kickoff out to their own 45, threw three passes, two of which were complete for a total gain of five yards, and punted to the Silverton-34. Dana Martin picked up a first down to the

Owl-44; Gallington picked up another on the Tiger-45, and McCoy rushed for seven yards more before an Owl pass was intercepted by Jim West who carried it about 65 yards for a touchdown for the Tigers. Nolan Wieberg attempted but failed on a two-point conversion run, and the Owls held a 21-6 lead.

The Owls took the kickoff on their own 20, and Self ran for a first down on the Silverton-35 before the Owl offense ran into trouble. A holding penalty was assessed against the Owls, and even with a penalty against the Tigers for roughing the kicker, Silverton was still forced to give up the ball a few seconds into the fourth quarter.

The Tigers didn't fare any better, gaining three yards, losing five, and the ball went over on downs at the Owl-25. Silverton gained two first downs and rushed to the Tiger-42 before the ball

went back over to Groom. The Tigers gained another first down, their fourth of the game, on the Silverton-30, completed a pass for a 6-yard gain, were penalized for being offside, and on fourth down, Self charged through and threw the ball carrier for a loss on the Silverton-29.

Stan Martin opened the new offensive effort by picking up a first down on the Owl-40. A 15-yard penalty against Groom gave Silverton another first down on the Tiger-45, but on the next series of plays the Owls lost the ball via the fumble route.

The Tigers completed a pass for their fifth first down of the game on the Silverton-45, but after being thrown for losses the Tigers saw the ball go over to the Owls at the Groom-45.

The game ended before the Owls could crank up their offense again.

The Owls made 17 first downs during the game, while the Tigers made five.

Silverton fumbled the ball four times, losing possession twice; the Tigers fumbled twice and recovered both of them.

The Owls were penalized seven times for 45 yards; the Tigers had 40 yards stepped off against them for four infractions.

Silverton attempted six passes, completed two for a 44 yard gain, and had one intercepted. The Tigers passed 12 times, completing six for an 18-yard gain (with some going for no gain or minus yardage).

Silverton gained 295 yards rushing (Dana Martin, 56; Gallington, 43; McCoy, 78; Self, 107; Stan Martin, 11). The Tigers rushed for about 100 yards on ten separate possessions of the ball.

Craig Culwell, who usually shares in the rushing statistics, was unable to play due to an injury to one of his hands.

Silverton has now scored 55 points this season, as compared to 46 points scored by the Owl opponents, and has a season standing of 2-1. Scoring has been shared by six Owls: Senior Fullback Marvin Self, 21; Junior End Terry Culwell, 12; Sophomore Back David McCoy, 8; Freshman Halfback Carl Gallington, 2; Sophomore Halfback Craig Culwell, 6; and Freshman End Harlard Vaughn, 6.

In high school career scoring, Marvin Self has 40 points to his credit now and Dana Martin has 24.
