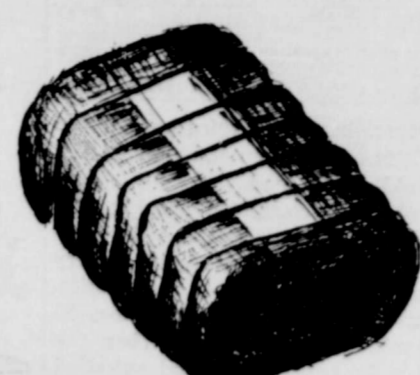

Junior High Owls
Outscored by Colts

Silverton's Junior High Owls
made one of their best showings
this season against the Claren-
don Colts last Thursday. The Colts
only three seventh graders
and on their roster and greatly
outweighed the Owls—as have all
the teams the Owls have gone ag-
ainst this year—but they didn't
do as much with the size
advantage as the Owls did.
The Colts outscored the Owls
14-0 with one of their touch-
downs coming as a "gift" on a

Ziegler and Rudy Betancourt ser-
ved as captains for the game.
Clarendon won the toss and el-
ected to receive. Brett Gill kick-
ed off for the Owls, and after a
series of fumbles by the Colts,
Ziegler recovered for Silverton.
Ziegler picked up three
yards on the first play of the
game, but the Owls lost ground
on the next two plays and Gill punt-
ed to the Colts.
The Colts made three first
downs before letting the ball go
on downs to the Owls. Fernando
Patino and Brent Bean each
picked up three yards before Sil-
verton fumbled and Clarendon re-
covered. The Colts scored the first
touchdown of the game with 16
yards remaining to be played in
the first quarter and made good
their run for extra points.
David Strange passed to Gill for
10 yards gain before the Colt de-
fense stiffened and Gill dropped
back to punt. He got a low snap
from center, saw daylight, picked
up the ball and ran about 20
yards for a first down for the
Owls.
Strange completed passes to
Betancourt, 7 yards; to Bean for
first down, and to Gill before
Silverton fumbled and the Colts
recovered.
The Colts passed for a first
down and the ballcarrier was stop-
ped by Brad Ziegler. Clarendon
then picked up three more first
downs before the half ended.
The Owls took the kickoff which

Ty McMurtry Is Silverton's Newest Eagle Scout

Ty Wayne McMurtry was one of four Boy Scouts in the Haynes District who became Eagles at the Eagle Scout Court of Honor conducted by The South Plains Council at Westminster Presbyterian Church in Lubbock Sunday, October 24, at 3:00 p.m. In all, 26 boys received Eagle Awards. Ty is a sophomore in Silverton High School. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McMurtry, he is an honor student and a quarterback for the Owl football team.

Presiding over the Court of Honor was Lt. Col. John Rogers. Colors were presented by Troop 536 of Lubbock, and following the entrance of the Eagle candidates the audience joined in singing "The Star Spangled Banner." Invocation was given by Eagle Scout Gary Williams of Troop 402 in Lubbock, and "The Impossible Dream" was sung by Larry Marshall. "Challenge to Proficiency" was given by Raymond Peppers; "Challenge to Leadership" was by Rudolph Struve, and "Challenge to Character" was by Andy Anderson. These were the Scouts who examined the applications of the Eagle candidates, and the points on which they reported were those which they judged on the applications.

"On My Honor" was a solo by Larry Marshall. Court of Honor speaker was Rev. Robert Nicholson, pastor, First Presbyterian Church in Lubbock. The Rev. Mr. Nicholson assisted Bill Oehler, Scout Executive for The South Plains Council, in presenting the Eagle Scout Awards.

A reception was held following the ceremony, and all of the new Eagles were in the receiving line. "We are grateful to Scoutmaster Flute Hutsell for his time and service to all the Silverton Boy Scouts," the McMurtry family told the Briscoe County News this week. "Flute works so hard with the boys and does so much more with them and for them than he has to do. He took the Scout bus to Lubbock Sunday afternoon—after they had camped Saturday night at Camp Haynes and he had delivered each of them home in time to get ready for church Sunday morning—and the entire Silverton Troop were in attendance at the Eagle Scout Court of Honor. It wouldn't have been possible to have had this honor come our way had it not been for Flute's devotion to the Scouts."

Eagle Scout McMurtry and Scoutmaster Hutsell started in Scouting together in 1968. Among those attending the Court of Honor, in addition to the Scoutmaster and the Silverton Troop, were Mr. and Mrs. Jack Robertson, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Strange and Mr. and Mrs. Wayne McMurtry. In addition, Ty's maternal grandparents, Sheriff and Mrs. Rufe Jordan, attended from Pampa. His paternal grandmother, Mrs. A. L. McMurtry, was unable to attend due to illness.

Owls Lose Second District Game 35-6

Silverton's Owls made their poorest showing of the season at McLean Friday night, taking a 35-6 District 2-A licking from a team which didn't look as sharp as some of the teams the Owls have played a closer game this season. The Owl team looked sluggish and slow, with individual brilliance showing here and there but not always from the players in whom we have been accustomed to seeing it.

Everyone is entitled to an off-night, and the Owl performance may have been due to a let-down following their first conference loss the week before. Last year's Owls did the same thing in their game with Lorenzo following their first loss of the season to Petersburg.

The Owls made five first downs—two in the first half and three in the second half, while McLean's Tigers made 20.

Silverton got more breaks in the game than sometimes is their lot, recovering four McLean fumbles while losing the ball via the fumble route only once. The Owls passed twice, having one incomplete and one intercepted. McLean's Tommy Duniven did not have an especially good night with his passing, completing three of seven. Duniven threw for over 800 yards last season, but managed to gain only 31 yards on his aerials last Friday night.

The Tigers rushed for 350 yards, while the Owls gained 116 yards rushing (Marvin Self, 13; Dana Martin, 26; David McCoy, 1; Craig Culwell, 77; and Scott Hutsell carried the ball once for a loss of one yard).

The Owls were penalized once for 15 yards, while the Tigers were penalized six times for 60 yards.

The Owls trailed only 7-6 at the end of the first period of play, but by halftime they trailed 21-6.

McLean's first score came after the Owls punted to midfield. QB Duniven took the punt and ran all the way for a score. David Haynes kicked, and with 2:34 remaining in the quarter, the Tigers led 7-0.

McLean kicked off to the Owls following the touchdown, and Craig Culwell took the ball on a about the five-yard line and ran all the way for a touchdown for Silverton. The Owls didn't get off their kick, and with 2:15 remaining in the quarter, the score stood at 7-6.

McLean came back to score 14 points in the second quarter, on a 12-yard run by Ronny Brown with 5:16 remaining in the period, and on a 5-yard run by George Danner with 1:32 showing on the clock. Haynes kicked both conversions, to account for the 21-6 score.

After a scoreless third quarter, Brown scored on the first play of the fourth stanza on a 13-yard run. Duniven scored on a 10-yard run with 5:23 remaining in the game, and Haynes kicked the PAT both times.

Later in the fourth frame, the Tigers fumbled and Silverton recovered on the McLean-27, but the Owl drive was stopped when a pass was intercepted on the Tiger-5 with 42 seconds remaining in the game.

The Silverton High School Pep Squad Beau will be presented Friday afternoon at 3:15 during the Pep Rally in the gymnasium. The candidates are Marvin Self, senior; Terry Culwell, junior; Craig Culwell, sophomore, and Scott Hutsell, freshman.

The Beau will receive a plaque, megaphone and the traditional kiss from Pep Squad President Dorothy Yancey.

The Owls will host Clarendon Friday night in the last home game of the season. McLean, Memphis and Clarendon are presently tied for first place in District 2-A, each with a 2-0 conference record. McLean has given up one touchdown, while outscoring opponents 63 points. Memphis has given up two touchdowns, outscoring opponents 49 points. Clarendon has given up only one touchdown, but has outscored opponents only 39 points.

Wheeler, Silverton and Claude are tied for the cellar, with Claude not yet having scored in District competition.

The Owl defense tightened, and the ball went over on downs on the Colt-45. After an incomplete pass, Strange threw to Gill for another touchdown for Silverton. Patino ran for the two extra points and the Owls trailed by only a 24-14 margin.

Owl defense held Clarendon, and Silverton again received the ball in Colt territory. Strange passed to Ziegler for a seven-yard gain before the Owls fumbled and Clarendon recovered.

Quarterback David Strange came out very well statistics-wise on his passing, completing eight of 16 and having one pass intercepted. The Colts passed four times, completing only one.

Silverton made nine first downs as compared with eleven for the Colts.

The Owls were penalized four times for 30 yards; Clarendon had 20 yards stepped off against them for four infractions.

Silverton fumbled four times, losing the ball all four times; Silverton fans seemed to agree that at least one of the fumbles could have been ruled as an incomplete pass. The Colts fumbled three times, losing the ball twice. Owls recovered two other Colt fumbles which the referees ruled were "taken away" from Clarendon, and the Owls didn't get possession.

With only one game remaining to be played, it looks like the Junior High Cyclone will win the District 2-A crown this season. Earlier this season I had picked the Wheeler Colts to upset the Cyclone, but after Memphis picked up a 14-12 win over the Colts, it looks like it could be Memphis all the way. The McLean Tiger Cubs are a very smooth-operating, well-coached team and could provide trouble for the Cyclone this afternoon. If they don't upset the appcart, the Cyclone will have the crown all wrapped up.

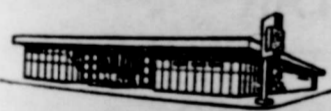
