Aoudad Hunters Having Good Luck In County; Season Closes Friday

Moderate to good success has been reported from the field where hunters are attempting to bag trophy aoudad sheep this week.

It was reported Tuesday afternoon that 28 aoudad had already been killed, 13 of them in Briscoe County.

One kill has come close to the record held by Matt Mills, son of Mr. and Mrs. Doug Mills, jr. of Pampa, who got his trophy in 1969 when he was 17 years old.

The near-record horns were on a sheep brought down by Bill McMillan of Dallas and measured 32 inches on one horn and a little less on the other, officials said.

Texas Parks and Wildlife personnel said the big ram would probably, when certified, fall just short of Mills' record kill, the horns of which measured 32 1/2 inches the first time measured.

"There is some shrinkage," said Weldon Fromm, district supervisor for the Parks and Wildlife Department. He confirmed the kill on the W. E. Hawkins Ranch about six miles northeast of Quitaque.

McMillan, like another successful hunter, Billy Foote of Longview, was guided by Johnny Powell and Freddie Martin of Quitaque. The near-record ram was felled Sunday and it weighed 194 pounds field dressed.

Foote's animal weighed 210 pounds when field dressed, but its horn measurement was only 30 1/2 inches. Fromm said after conferring with a check station in the area. Both Foote and McMillan got their trophies in very nearly the same place, it was reported.

The annual hunt for the aoudad, sometimes called Barbary sheep, is by permit only. The 1971 season ends Friday.

Hunters from across the United States, 146 of them in all, started hunting the prize aoudad sheep in the Palo Duro Basin last Saturday. Texas Parks and Wildlife

Department biologists had predicted a good hunt this year and recently estimated the herd at 650 animals or more.

The Texas Panhandle herd was started with 44 of the exotic animals that are native to the Atlas Mountains of Africa. The big sheep may weigh as much as 270 pounds, and the world record aoudad had horns that were 34 1/2 inches long. The Texas record is 32 1/2 inches.

Aoudad hunting weather traditionally is tough on the hunter because cold, rainy weather has often blustered into the canyons during the hunt. Getting an aoudad out of the rugged canyon country demands the utmost stamina.

Annual harvest of the animals in this area is usually less than 50 animals and hunters spend an average of eight hours each and fire an average of three times each during the hunt.

The 146 permits were issued last month to the landowners who qualify, and more than half of the permits were issued in Briscoe County.

This year, for the first time, the Sports Committee of the Amarillo Chamber of Commerce is offering a trophy for the largest animal taken. A custom hunting knife, properly engraved, will be awarded to the hunter with the best kill.

L. O. A. Junior Study Club has announced plans to donate the proceeds of the Christmas Greeting Page to the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service this year.

As in years past, donations will be accepted in any amount, and the names designated by every contributor will appear on a special page in the Christmas edition of the Briscoe County News to be published December 23. On the page there will be the explanation that those listed are wishing their friends a merry Christmas and donating money to the Silverton Volunteer Ambulance Service in lieu of sending Christmas cards locally.

Money donated to the volunteer ambulance service will be used

for the upkeep and operating expenses of the organization. It will be necessary for the group to purchase some air splints, Thompson splints and other first-aid supplies; a portable resuscitator and suction machine are needed. Insurance must be paid on the ambulance, and it will be important to build up a reserve fund for the purpose of replacing the 1960 model ambulance, which has been donated to the ambulance service, sometime in the future.

Sometimes the local ambulance makes several calls a day, and some of the calls take the ambulance to hospitals in distant cities. The money contributed by the City of Silverton and Briscoe County

will help pay for the oil, gas, etc. to keep the unit in operation. But the public donations will help to guarantee the long-term availability of ambulance service for all people in Silverton and the surrounding area.

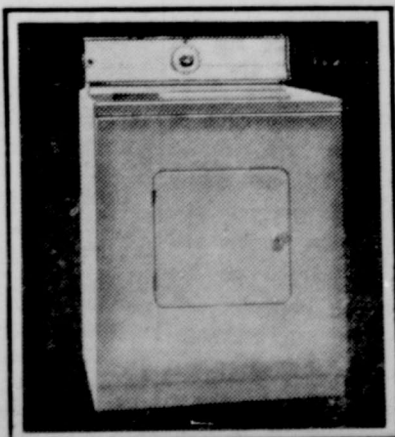

Like Dollars Are Hot Item In Briscoe County

The new Eisenhower "silver dollars" are selling like hotcakes in Briscoe County, just as they have been in other places across the nation.

The Silvertown and Quitaque banks got a limited supply of the coins early last week. First National in Quitaque ran out of the new coins last week, and First State in Silvertown had just a few left early this week.

A new supply is on the way, however, as both banks have re-ordered shipments of the coins.

Each of the county banks received 500 of the Eisenhower dollars, and have distributed just about the whole thousand. By next week, the federal government has indicated that it will have unlimited supplies of the \$1 coins coming into banks.

It will probably be awhile before the Eisenhower dollars are in general circulation, because people have a tendency to make collectors' items of new coins.

Unlike previous \$1 coins, the Eisenhower variety isn't made of silver. It's a copper-and-nickel

lated now, a limited number of Eisenhower silver dollars were of coin that will be similar in appearance to the half dollar, quarter and dime.

An Amarillo coin dealer even went so far as to say that he thinks the new coins are ugly and predicts the phenomenal early rush will quickly taper off. "In fact, I think after awhile the banks are going to be hard pressed to get rid of them," he said.

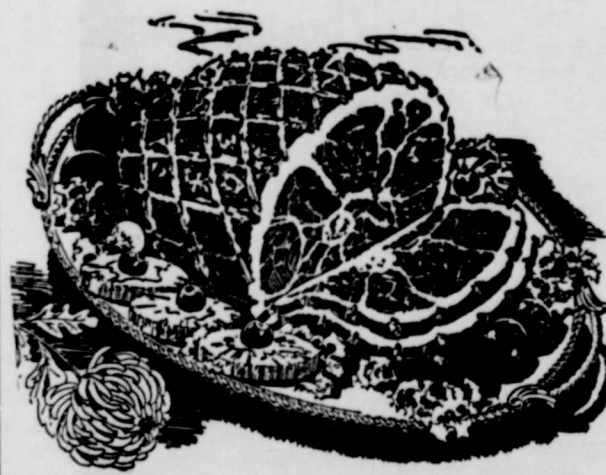

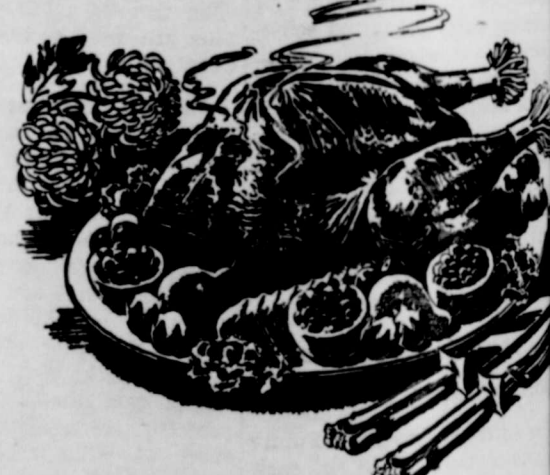

representative and Senator to come by my office and examine the findings." Welfare problems emerged as the number one concern among those mailing back the forms. An overwhelming 95% replied "yes" to the question: "Do you favor requiring all able-bodied persons who receive welfare payments to perform some work for the state in exchange?" Eighty-eight percent favored paying no unemployment compensation or welfare benefits to workers while out on strike. Paralleling the concern with welfare problems were the responses connected with what form a future tax raise should take. When asked what tax would be the least objectionable, 36% favored an increase on selective tax items such as alcoholic beverages, tobacco products, amusements, etc. Twenty-nine percent okayed applying sales tax to all items sold at retail. Twenty-seven percent favored an increase in the state sales tax while 16% favored placing the sales of all commercial real estate transactions under the present state sales tax. Only 3% favored adopting a state personal income tax law. Under the broad heading of governmental reorganization, 63% favored annual sessions of the Texas Legislature while 44% favored adopting a new State Constitution. Eighty-four percent of those polled favored a garnishee law to collect "hot checks," while in another area, an even 46% favored the existing daylight saving time schedule and 46% voted to discontinue the April to October time difference. Nine percent were undecided.

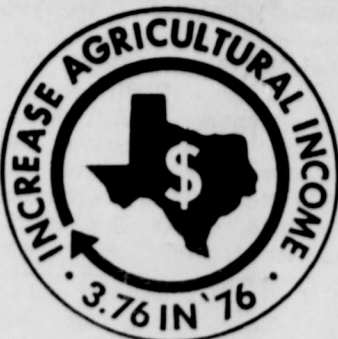
