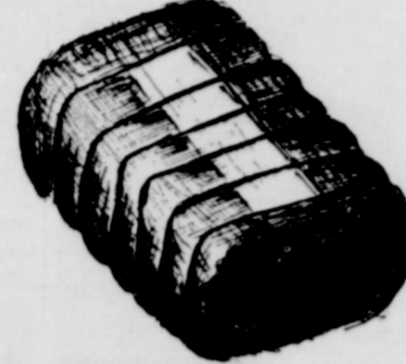


Cogdell Estate Gives \$90,000.00 To Silverton Clinic, Ambulance Associations

Silverton: Heart Of The Scenic Caprock

People of the Silverton community have been designated as the recipients of a \$90,000 gift, according to an announcement made on Friday of last week during a meeting of the Briscoe County Clinic Association directors and several local businessmen.

Mr. and Mrs. Billy Cogdell and their three children were present at the meeting, which was held at the First State Bank, to announce that \$90,000 would be presented to the Briscoe County Clinic Association and to the Silverton Ambulance Service. Mr. Cogdell said that no strings were attached to the gift, but requested that a new clinic building be constructed and equipped and a new ambulance purchased.

It is Mr. Cogdell's hope that the new facilities and equipment will help to insure that Silverton will always have a resident doctor. He said that he would like to see the Clinic Association directors build and equip a facility of adequate size but one no larger than they could maintain in the future. He also said that he would like for the people to have a new ambulance because it could be a tragedy of great proportion if the old ambulance were to break down with a patient on an emergency run.

Mr. and Mrs. Cogdell had already announced plans to retire the \$2,000 debt on the clinic x-ray machine before the decision was made to increase the size of the gift.

The money is being given out of a hospital trust fund that was established by the late D. M. Cogdell, Sr.

American Farmers Getting Promises

U. S. Representative Graham Purcell (D-Tex.) told the annual state convention of the Texas Farmers Union recently that "American farmers are being promised one thing and given another" by the Republican farm policy officials.

Purcell, chairman of the subcommittee on livestock and grains of the House Agriculture Committee, told a crowded auditorium that the Department of Agriculture has allowed some 60 million "new acres" to be brought into production "just by shifting from the annual base acreage and diversion programs of the Johnson Administration to the set-aside programs of the Nixon Administration."

The veteran farm-belt Congressman promised hope for farmers through Congressional action and discussed two bills of crucial importance to farmers which could receive House action this week. He characterized them as bills

Two Accidents Investigated Here

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated two accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of November, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed and two persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first eleven months of 1971 shows a total of 34 accidents resulting in two persons killed and 22 persons injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety for November 1971, shows a total of 576 accidents resulting in 20 persons killed and 292 persons injured. This was 19 less accidents, one more fatality and two less injured than during October.

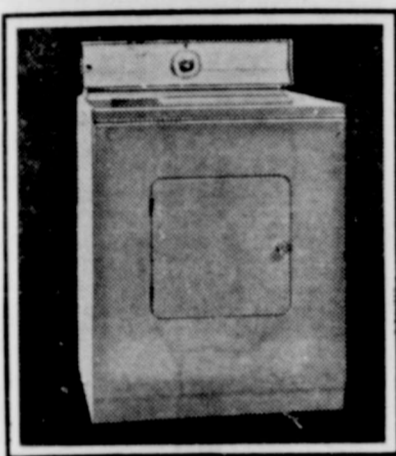

State Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, Tex.—Insurance bounced back into the news on three fronts here last week.

State Board of Insurance Chairman Larry Teaver promised, after a public hearing, to review all aspects of the new catastrophe pool for windstorm coverage in high risk coastal areas.

Agents and property owners complained of price gouging and of companies' allegedly unloading on the pool properties which should be insured at standard rates. Companies denied the charges.

Board also took under consideration an Allstate Insurance Company proposal to cut auto coverage rates up to 20% for new-model cars equipped with shock-absorbing bumpers.

All 1973 and later cars must have bumpers which can withstand a five miles an hour front-end crash and a two and a half miles per hour rear-end wallop without damage.

Allstate proposed to allow discounts to become effective with 1972 model cars equipped at owners' expense with the tested shock-absorbing bumpers.

Initial reduction would be 10% in premiums for the five mph front, two and a half mph rear safety protection. The cut would reach 20% for cars which can be crashed at five mph into a test barrier, front and rear, with no damage to the vehicle.

Board members heard support and opposition for proposed new rules to curb arbitrary cancellations and non-renewals on property and casualty insurance. Under the regulations, auto insurance in effect 60 days could be cancelled only for failure to pay premiums or where driver's licenses have been suspended or revoked. Companies could cancel coverage at annual expiration dates by giving 30 days written notice.

Teaver advised a rule prohibiting cancellations for "age alone."

COURTS SPEAK

Texas Supreme Court ordered Cooke County district court trial of a teenager's suit against his father for alleged negligence on the job which led to a serious permanent injury.

Case was the first in which the state's top court had considered whether parents should be immune to actions brought by their children due to events outside the normal family relationship.

In two other cases, the Supreme Court sent applications for savings and loan association branches—in Hallettsville and Bay City—back to Commissioner W. Sale Lewis for further proceedings. Lewis had approved the applications, but had not filed a required concise statement of underlying facts supporting his finding, court opinions concluded.

AG OPINIONS

Laws prohibiting dumping of refuse within 300 yards of public highways and anti-dumping statutes pertaining to public and private properties and public waters are both valid and can be harmonized, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin held.

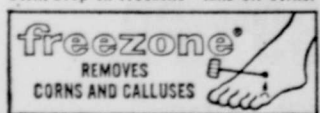

*A hydrologist employed by the Rio Grande Compact Commissioner can be paid \$11,816 a year, although the commissioner himself is limited by law to \$6,000.

LAND BIDS ACCEPTED

Bonus bids of more than \$1.7 million on oil and gas leases were accepted by the School Land Board for the permanent school fund.

Seventy-six bids covered 39,843 acres of state-owned lands and averaged \$44.77 an acre.

Meanwhile, Land Commissioner Robert Armstrong said revised rules and regulations for oil drilling pollution control in coastal waters will require all oil spills or other mishaps to be reported to the land office within 24 hours of discovery. Written notification will be required of all operations on state leases.

PARTY RULES COMPLY

New state Democratic party rules on delegate selection comply with national and statutory requirements, Texas National Committeewoman Mrs. Carrin Patman of Ganado reported.

The rules for selection of convention delegations will soon go to the State Democratic Executive Committee for consideration. SDEC Chairman Roy Orr indicated a meeting will be held in mid-January to act on them following a public hearing.

12,000 GET RAISES

Retroactive pay raises have been cleared for 12,000 of 63,000 state employees who get \$2 or less an hour.

Raises were approved for the low-pay workers back to September 1 in line with a federal Pay Board definition of "severe inequity" permitting retroactivity for those paid less than the minimum wage before and after the

August freeze.

SPANISH TREASURE APPRAISED

Appraisers have completed the preliminary process of putting a value on treasure recovered from four-centuries-old shipwrecks off Padre Island.

Final reports will go to Federal District Judge Reynaldo Garza of Brownsville who directed the appraisal be made as the result of a lawsuit.

Platoro Inc., the Indiana firm which recovered the treasure in 1967, seeks title to at least half of the artifacts. The state claims all of them, and has threatened to take its case for possession to the U. S. Supreme Court.

SAFETY TIPS OFFERED

Texas Safety Association warns holiday tipplers that 70 driving drunks may end up dead in traffic crashes.

Along with the verbal warning,

TSA sent out charts showing how much alcohol by weight a driver can consume before reaching the state legal "drunk" test level of .10 per cent blood alcohol concentration.

"The motorists of Texas, for their sake and the sake of their passengers, need to recognize the potential dangers during the upcoming holiday season. They need to be alert, ready to take evasive action," said TSA.

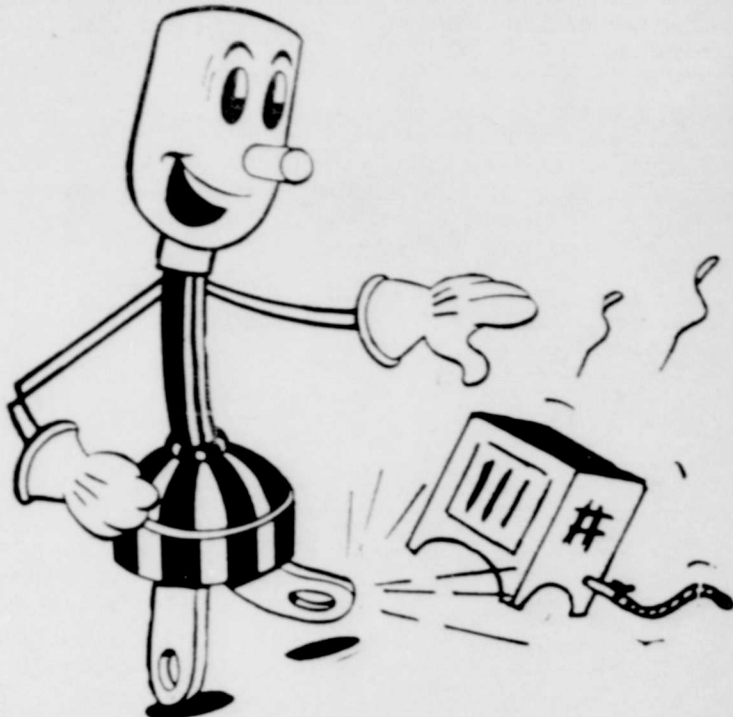

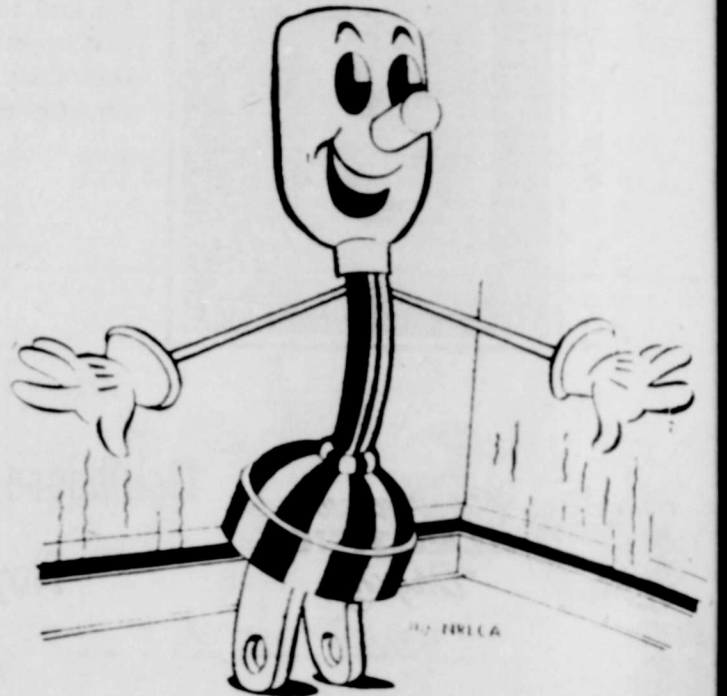

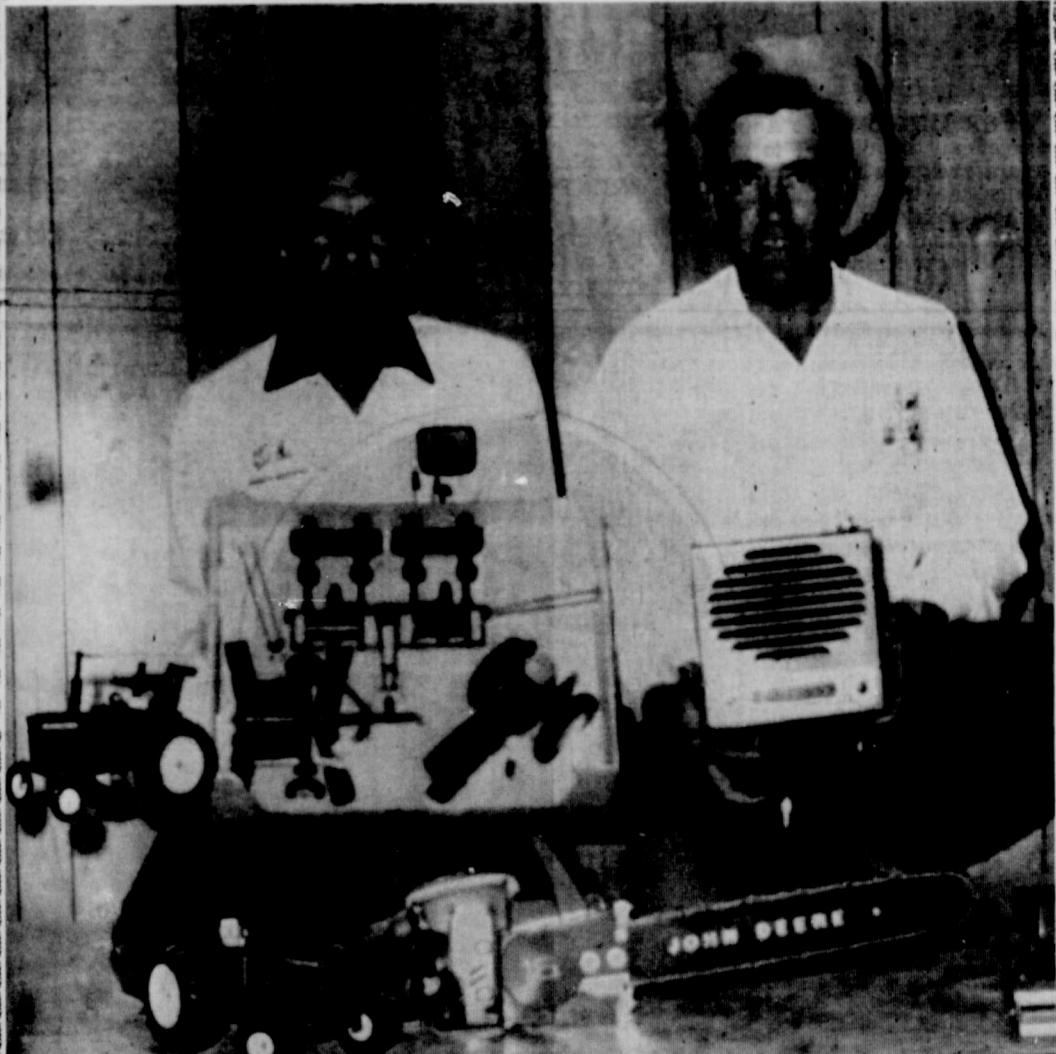
