Swine judging will begin at 10:00 a.m. Saturday. Sheep judging is scheduled to get underway at 1:00 p.m., followed by the steer judging at 2:00 p.m.

Judge of this year's show will be James Dietrich of Canyon.

All animals must have been the property of the owner and exhibitor throughout the feeding period. Such feeding period should have begun a reasonable length of time before the show to give the animal sufficient finish for market.

Each exhibitor shall exhibit his own animal and be responsible for its care while on the show grounds unless otherwise granted permission by Show Superintendent Don Burson.

Each exhibitor may enter no more than three animals in each the steer, barrow and lamb classes. No calf will be accepted in the show ring that is not halter broken and fitted for show.

### Scabies Quarantine Inspectors Named

J. C. Fowler, livestock inspector with the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC) and Bill Boling, USDA Animal and Plant Health Service, both have completed a training course in cattle scabies identification. Fowler and Boling are working in Briscoe County to help cattlemen move their livestock to market during the current cattle scabies quarantine.

The quarantine is aimed at halting the worst cattle scabies outbreak to hit the nation since 1959. The eradication effort needs specially trained men like Boling and Fowler because the mites that cause cattle scab are hard to spot. The mites are often masked by pesticides used to kill ticks and lice.

Boling, Fowler and the other inspectors in the quarantine area are helping cattlemen identify infected animals and clean them of mites. If every head of infected and exposed cattle in the quarantine area is inspected and the affected animal is properly dipped for scabies the quarantine can be lifted.

### Car Licensing Process Begins

The Motor Vehicle Division of the Texas Highway Department is now issuing renewal applications for obtaining license plates for 1972; however, owners of motor vehicles CANNOT register their vehicles until February 1.

Vehicle owners may go ahead and order their license plates by mail immediately. All that is required is to send the entire renewal application, the registration fee and \$1 for each vehicle to be registered to the Briscoe County Tax Office. License plates will be returned by mail after registration begins formally on February 1.

Vehicle owners should allow at least 30 days for processing and delivery. The application should be sent to the Briscoe County Tax Office—NOT to the Texas Highway Department.

License plates can be obtained in person at the county tax office beginning February 1.

In any case, registration will go faster if the owner leaves the three-part form intact and does not separate any of the three parts. Instructions are contained on the form and on the envelope. Deadline for displaying 1972 license plates is midnight April 1.

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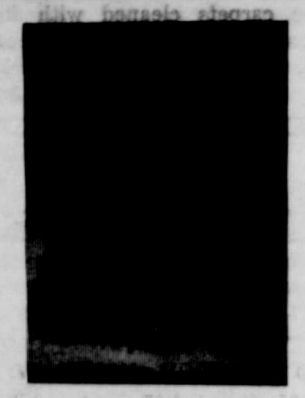

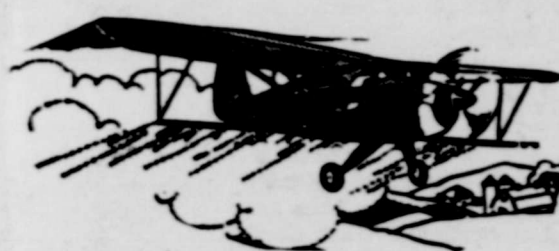
