The Hereford steer shown by Briscoe 4-H'er Zane Reagan remained in the show, but failed to place high enough to get in the sale. Other steer exhibitors were Debbie Boling and Bobby McPherson, Briscoe 4-H, and Ty McMurry, Silverton FFA.

The situation wasn't much brighter for the barrow exhibitors. Three barrows were sifted because they were too light. In several large classes, when only the top 15 barrows were placed, the Briscoe 4-H's were sent out of the arena with no placing.

Briscoe 4-H lambs didn't win any of the coveted top places, but the exhibitors were able to get 15 of them into the sale.

Silverton and Wheeler split a pair of District 2-A basketball games here Tuesday night, with the Owls taking a 43-42 win and the Owlettes dropping a 41-21 decision.

The Owls held an 11-9 lead at the first stop, and by halftime had built a 24-14 score. The Owls also led by a 10-point spread at the end of the third quarter, but the Mustangs closed the gap in the fourth period and the Owls finished with a one-point win.

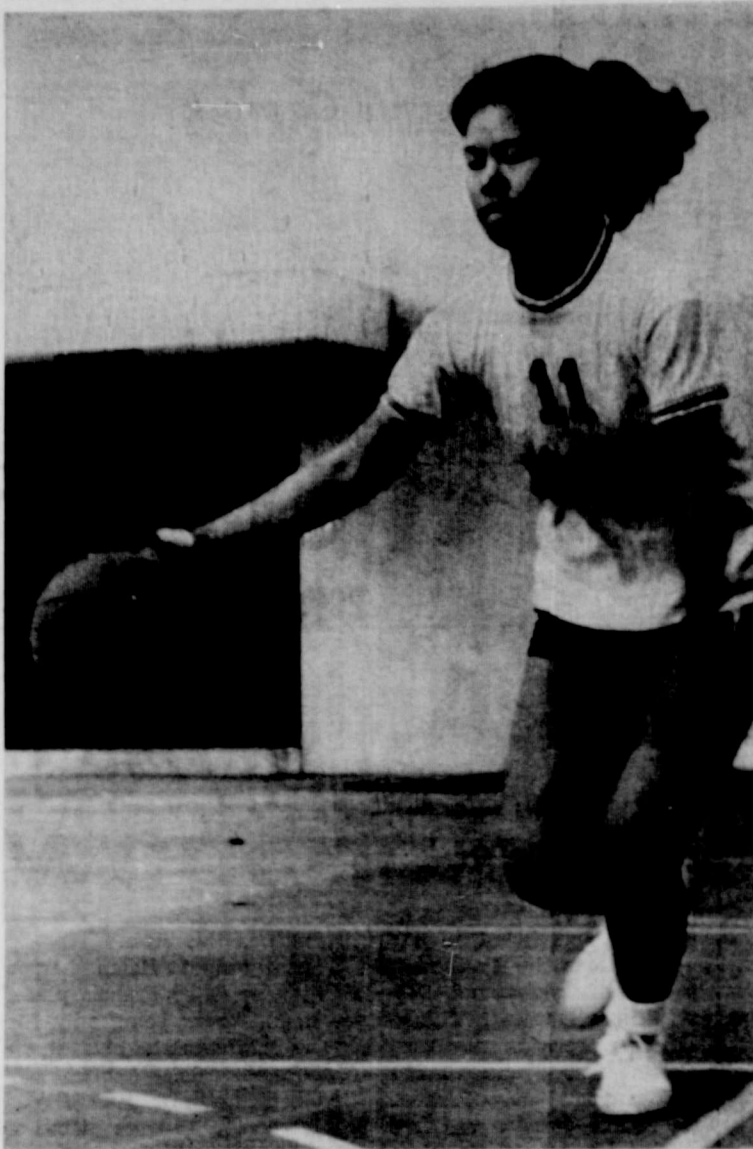

Flying Queens To Play Ya Tung Girls

A special basketball attraction is planned for the new Hutcherson Center in Plainview February 1 and February 3 when the Ya Tung Girl's Basketball Team of China meets the National AAU champion Hutcherson Flying Queens as part of their goodwill playing tour of the U. S.

The Ya Tung team has won the national championship of the Republic of China from 1967 through 1971 and was runner-up for the Asian Youth Championship in 1968 and 1969. Nine members of the team are members of the National Team of the Republic of China.

The team was formed in 1965 under the co-sponsorship of the Far Eastern Textile Ltd. and the Asia Cement Corporation. Talented junior high school girls were recruited with training programs to teach them the skills of basketball.

Three years of basic and methodological training began to pay off and last year the team was unbeaten at home. Currently, the players average 19 years of age and 5'6 1/2" in height.

Coach of the team is Tang Ming-hsin, professor of Taiwan Norman University who did extensive research on American basketball before the team was started and has written seven books on basketball. He was a referee at the Tokyo Olympics and coached the men's and women's teams in the Asian Championships.

The team has played Belmont College, Nashville, Tennessee; Parsons College, Fairfield, Iowa; two independent teams in New York; John F. Kennedy College, Wahoo, Nebraska, and the Raytown Piperettes. Other games on the slate include Seminole, Oklahoma Junior College, Ouachita Baptist College, the Flying Queens, and Temple Junior College.

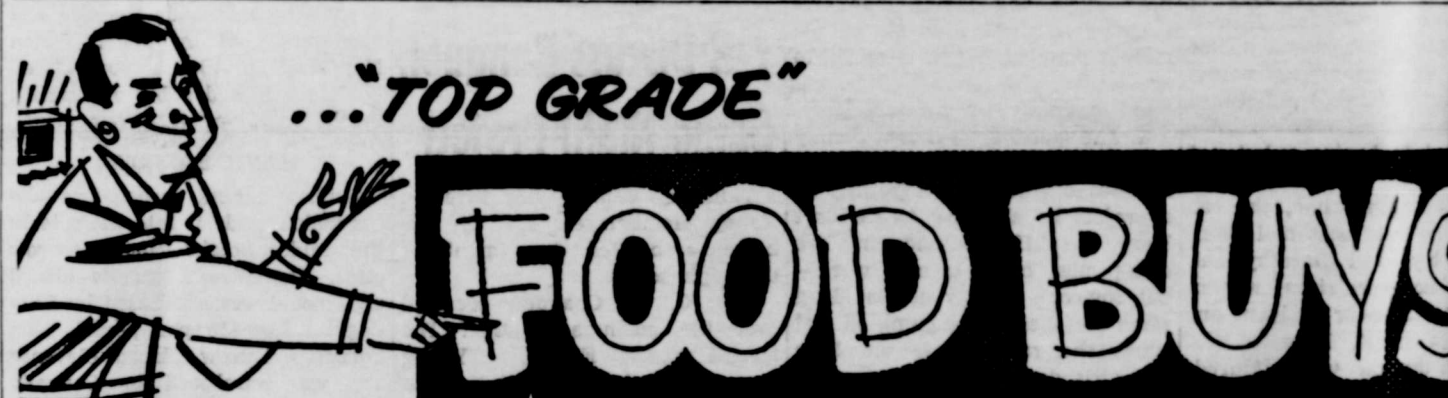

tember 1, 1972. Winners will join
winners of similar contests spon-
sored by other electric coopera-
tives across Texas on the eighth
annual Texas Electric Cooperative
Government-in-Action Youth Tour
to Washington, D. C. All expenses
of the 12-day trip beginning June
9, will be paid by Lighthouse El-
ectric Cooperative.

Each entrant will be required to
give a five to eight minute talk on
"Rural Electric Cooperatives —
Helping Texas Grow" and answer
one or more of 50 questions asked
by the judges.

The oratorical contest will be
judged on the basis of (1) knowl-
edge of subject, 40%; (2) speak-
ing ability, 30%; (3) poise, 10%;
(4) personality, 10% and (5) ap-
pearance, 10%.

Interested young people may ob-
tain an official entry blank from
their school or the office of Light-
house Electric Cooperative in
Floydada. The deadline for sub-
mitting entries will be February
12, 1972.

As participants in the Texas
Electric Cooperatives' Youth Tour,
local contest winners will travel
by chartered bus to Washington,
D. C., where they will spend four
days visiting places of historical
interest and seeing the nation's
government in action.

ish, but have everlasting life."

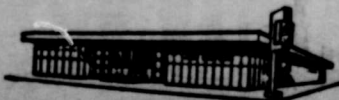
"For God sent not his Son into the
