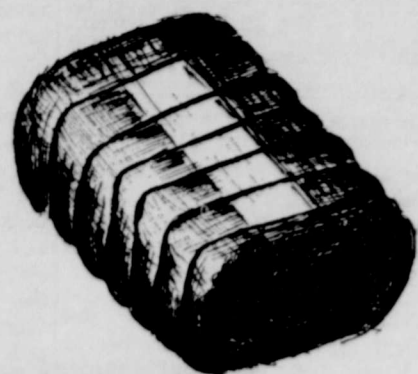
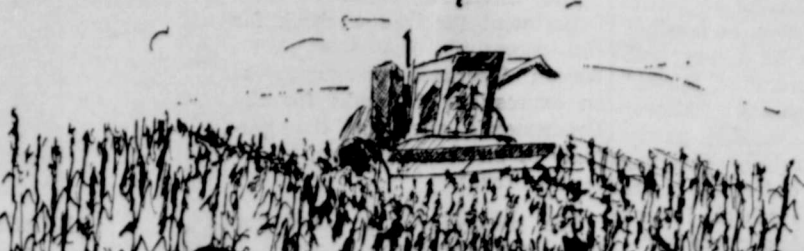
ANNOUNCED POSTER CONTEST

Farmers Can Get Quality Guarantee On Set-Aside Acreage

City Election To Be Held April 1

The Silverton City Council met in regular session Monday evening, with Mayor Pro-Tem Troy Jones presiding in the absence of Mayor H. B. Simpson. A letter of resignation was received from Mayor Simpson, effective June 1.

The Council called for an election for the purpose of electing three councilmen for Saturday, April 1, at the City Hall. Mrs. C. A. Holt was appointed judge for the election.

The terms of Councilmen Troy Jones, H. A. Cagle and Charles Sarchet are expiring. Jones has indicated that he will not seek re-election; Cagle and Sarchet agreed to be candidates for re-election. The name of Wayne Nance has also been placed in nomination as a councilman and will appear on the April 1 ballot.

Others who would like to be placed in nomination for a position on the City Council should sign up at the City Hall.

Two representatives of General Telephone Company, John Allen of San Angelo and Bob Douthit of Memphis, met with the Council to discuss a telephone rate increase which was proposed some time ago by the company.

General Telephone Company proposes to raise the following rates: Business One Party, from \$10.50 to \$15.45; Residence One Party, from \$6.25 to \$6.90; Residence Two Party, from \$4.50 to \$5.75; Residence Extension, from \$1.00 to \$1.25.

The representatives of the telephone company said they had not asked Silverton for a rate increase since 1967.

The Council took no action on the proposed rate increase.

SELECTED AS OUTSTANDING TEENAGERS OF AMERICA

Several Silverton High School students have been selected as Outstanding Teenagers of America for 1972, according to Robert Wheelchel, principal.

Selection for the Outstanding Teenagers awards program automatically qualifies these students for further state, regional and national honors and scholarships totaling \$7,000. Local nominees are Mark J. McArthur, who is now a student at Baird High School, Cindy Cross, Colene Culwell and Britt Parker.

Nominated by their principals, the Outstanding Teenagers of America are chosen from individual schools across the country for excellence in community service and academic achievement. The local students will now vie for the Outstanding Teenager of the Year Trophy to be presented by the state's governor. Similar trophies will be presented to winners in other states. The state winners are selected by the Outstanding Teenager Awards Selection Committee, in cooperation with the Board of Advisors.

The 50 state winners will be eligible for awards totaling \$7,000. One boy and one girl will be chosen for national scholarships of \$1,000 each to be used at the college or university of their choice. Ten regional winners will also be selected from the remaining state winners to receive \$500 regional scholarships.

In recognizing the special talents of these outstanding teenagers, former Secretary of the Interior Walter J. Hickel said, "I congratulate you... You have been recognized for what you did yesterday and what you are today."

These outstanding teenagers also have the "opportunity to become great national leaders and doers," President Nixon said in a congratulatory message to the nominees.

Under the guidance of the Board of Advisors, the Outstanding Teenagers of America program was created in 1967 to encourage young people to take full advantage of the opportunities in our country. The awards are presented each spring, and biographies of all those honored are recorded in an annual volume.

THE TEXAS HIGHWAY PATROL INVESTIGATED LAST MONTH

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated three accidents on rural highways in Briscoe County during the month of January, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in no one killed and one person injured.

The rural traffic accident summary for the 60 counties of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region for January 1972 shows a total of 500 accidents resulting in nine persons killed and 217 persons injured as compared with January 1971 with 467 accidents resulting in 17 persons killed and 235 persons injured.

Also during 1971, Lubbock County's 511 traffic accidents was the highest number recorded by any county of the Lubbock Department of Public Safety Region. Parker County ranked second with 429 accidents.

The nine traffic deaths for the month of January 1972 occurred in these counties: Lubbock, 3; Palo Pinto, 2; Cochran, Garza, Gray and Wheeler, one each.

Farmers who use the set-aside inspection and early measurement service offered by the County ASCS Office will be guaranteed that their set-aside acreage in the 1972 farm programs will be of acceptable quality and sufficient acreage to earn full program payments.

The quality guarantee is new, according to Louie Kitchens, chairman of the Briscoe County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. The guarantee of sufficient acreage has long been a major reason for widespread use of the ASCS measurement service by farm program participants.

"Guarantee means just that. If a farmer gets set-aside inspection and early measurement service — and follows those measurements when he makes his set-aside — then ASCS guarantees no deductions will be made from his program payments because of insufficient set-aside acreage or because the set-aside land was not of average productivity," Mr. Kitchens said.

The quality-and-quantity set-aside guarantee was announced at the beginning of the sign-up period for the 1972 feed grain, wheat and cotton programs. Sign-up opened February 3 and continues through March 10 at the county ASCS Office.

Program participants who want measurement service usually request it when they sign up, since it is a convenient time. This year, special consideration should be given to getting in early to sign up and to request set-aside inspection and early measurement. The service is provided at a nominal charge which covers the cost.

The sooner a set-aside inspection and measurement request is made, the sooner that farm will get the service, and with double guarantee on both quality and quantity of set-aside acreage, the county ASCS Office expects even more than the usual large number of measurement requests at sign-up this year. The way to get ahead of the rush would be to go in early to sign up for the 1972 feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs.

The quality guarantee for set-aside acreage is important because of the "average productivity" requirement for set-aside land, the ASC committee chairman said. Land designated for set-aside must have a productive capacity at least equal to the land on which program crops are grown this year — or the land on which program crops would have been grown. Failure to meet this requirement can result in reduction or loss of farm program payments.

The local ASCS Office has been instructed not to accept for set-aside land any acreage which is known in advance to be of below average quality.

Under the Agricultural Act of 1970, which embodies the set-aside program, farmers participating in the voluntary feed grain, wheat, and cotton programs may plant their cropland almost as they wish if they maintain their set-aside acreage and conserving base. Some crops which are under quota, such as rice, peanuts, extra long staple cotton and a few others, may be grown only within farm allotments.

It is essential that good quality set-aside land be offered by program participants in order to help reduce the potential American agriculture has for excess production.

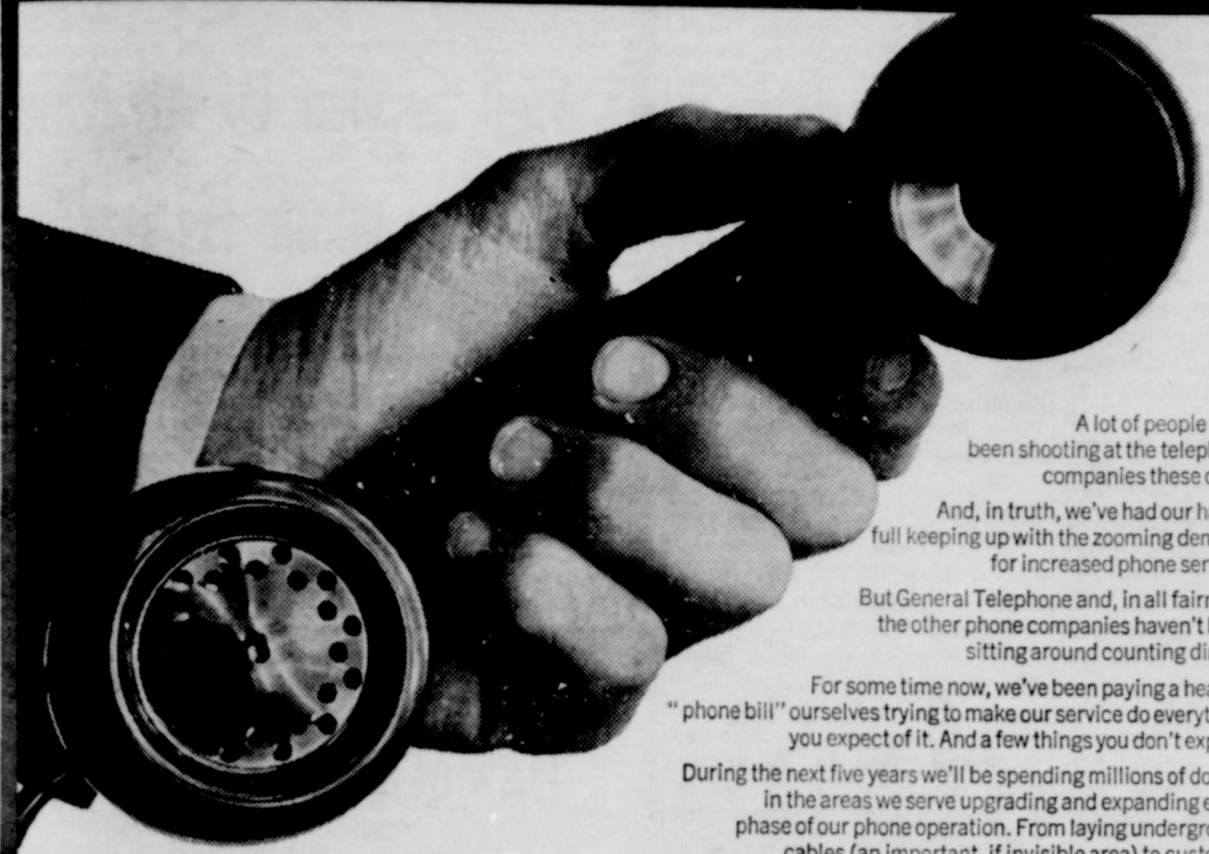

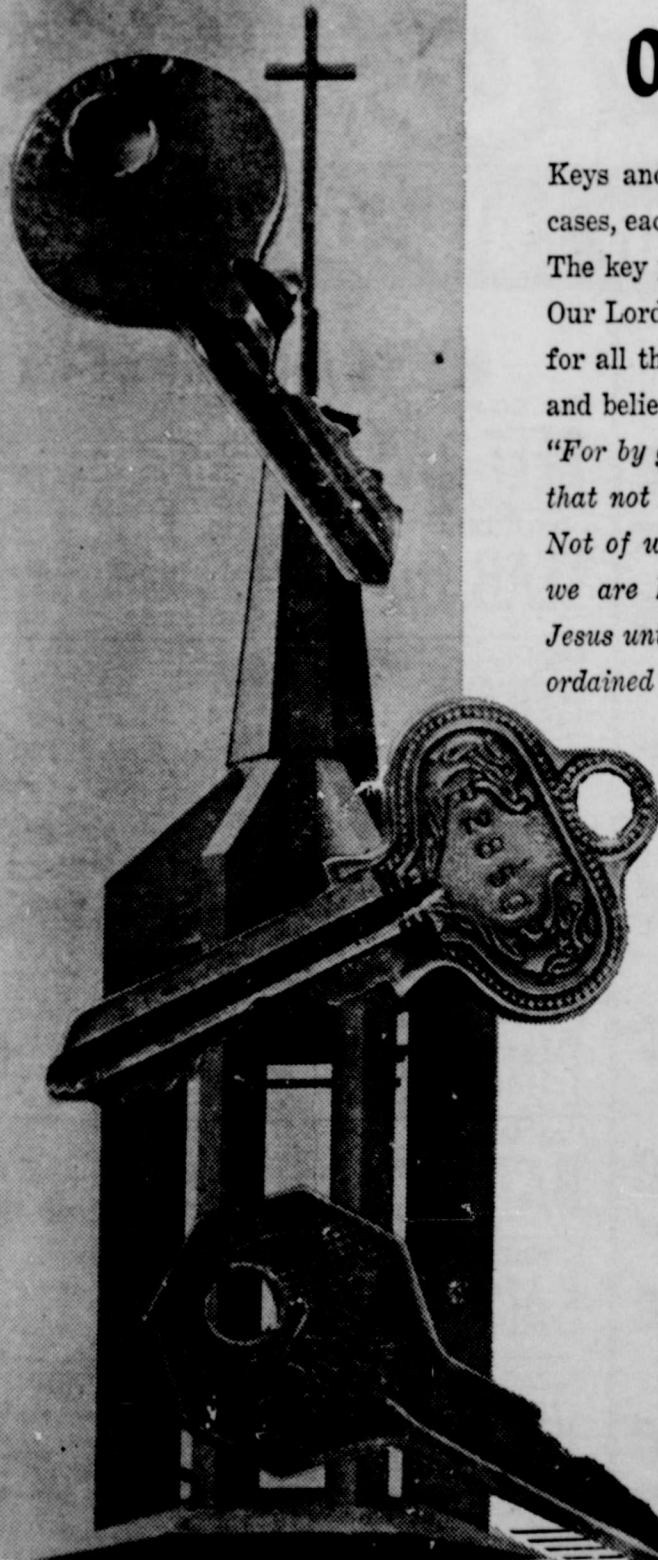

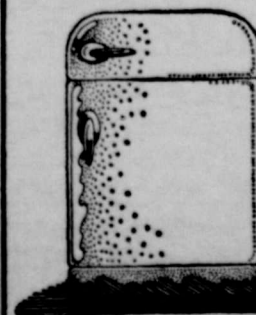
