

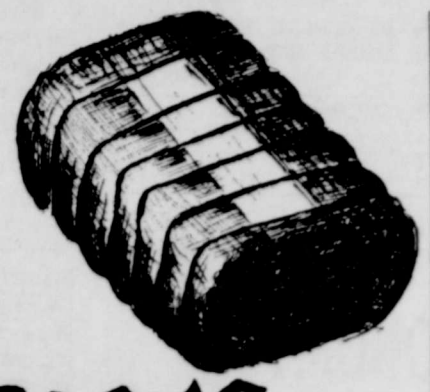

Self Sets New Discus Record At Idalou

Silvertown's defending state Class A discus champion, Marvin Self, in his second appearance in competition this season, hurled the platter 162'5 1/4" to break the Idalou Relays meet record last Saturday. The old record was held by Howard Van Loon, 160'4".
The old record had stood since 1969.
Self then put the shot 53'3" for his second blue ribbon of the day.
The second - best discus throw was 129'7" by Blevins of Aberrath.
Secondplace in the shot put was won by Theil of New Deal, who put the shot 42'11".
Self's first appearance of the season was in an invitational meet in Houston recently, in which he placed sixth in the discus.

AREA TRACK BEST

The Amarillo Daily News records an area Track Honor Roll. At this point in the season, Self is listed third in the shot put with 53'3", behind Tommy Lusk of Plainview, with 58'3 1/4", and Gus Schneiderheinz of Tascosa High in Amarillo, with 56'1".
Self stands first in the discus this week with 162'5 1/4", ahead of Lawrence Gaines of Vernon, with 159'8 1/2", and Schneiderheinz of Tascosa, with 147'9 1/2".

1971 STATE MEET

At the state track meet last spring, Self won the discus throw with a distance of 172'. Second place was won with a throw of 160'9". Self placed third in the state in the shot put with a distance of 55'6 1/4". First place was won with a put of 55'10 3/4" and the second - best distance was 55'7 3/4".
Self broke a number of track meet records last year, and is expected to break some of his own records this year. The Silvertown High School track star has only been working out for the shot and discus since the end of basketball season, and quite likely will get better distance with every meet he enters.

Contract Awarded For Briscoe Highway Construction Work

A contract for highway construction in the Childress district has been awarded by the Texas Highway Commission.
The work will be under the supervision of District Engineer V. J. McGee, and will be in Briscoe County.
Cooper and Woodruff, Inc. of Amarillo was awarded a contract for grading, structures, base and surfacing on 4.0 miles of Farm to Market Road 284 in Briscoe County. Low bid was \$119,904.73.
The project extends from FM 145, southward to the road intersection. Everett H. Monroe of Clarendon is the Highway Department engineer in charge of the project which will take an estimated 120 working days.

THE SECRETARY AND THE FARM ECONOMY

Submitted by Joe Brannon, President, Briscoe Farmers Union. **What is Secretary of Agriculture Butz up to?** It is a question much on the minds of farmers. He says he is spending money "like a drunken sailor." He says he will fight "like a wounded steer" to keep ceilings off farm prices. He says he may win a few and lose a few, and compromise may be necessary.

Neither a spending spree nor the absence of ceilings on agricultural products will solve the farm problem. Agricultural pro-

duction increased 38% in the past 25 years. Net farm income decreased 8%. The cost of production has gone up 64% since the 1947-49 period. The parity ratio dropped from 108% to an average of 70% in 1971. Farmers literally paid for the increased production and advanced technology out of their own pockets. More than 15 million people left farms to seek increased economic equity in the cities.

A deafening silence rises from the U. S. Department of Agriculture about the widening farm-retail price spread. The share of the food dollar going to shippers, processors, and supermarkets has nearly doubled in the last 20 years. No mention is made that middlemen are taking 10 to 20 cents per pound for every two to three cents per pound the beef cattle raiser gets. The fact that beef cattle producers are still getting only 88% of parity is con-

cealed deep in economic reports of the Department.

Secretary Butz is offering everything but substance — the one essential element of real long-term assistance to agriculture, workable supply management. He turned down immediate economic aid, the 25% increase in wheat and feed grains loan rates under the Emergency Feed Grains Bill (HR 1163). The Secretary has authority to raise loan rates administratively. Instead, he has prescribed an aspirin of extra diversion incentives in wheat and feed grains to alleviate the "set aside" cancer. Grain farmers are indicating they will retire additional acres under the new program only in cases where they overplanted substantially last year.

Over-production in 1972 is a virtual certainty. The Secretary has applied a bandaidd purchase program to relieve the swollen and glutted grain market. This purchase program has now been suspended after buying only about two-tenths of 1% of the year's production. The Administration is committed to an increase in soybean production. The question in the minds of farmers is how much will it take to break the soybean market, too. Excess supplies of feed grains have resulted in farmers' withholding breeding stock from the market, causing some increase in cattle prices. But cattle on feed in the seven major cattle feeding states is up 10%. Lower prices are a certainty in the months ahead.

Problems are not restricted to grains and livestock. The support rate for manufacturing milk, for example, is 4% lower today than it was five years ago. The milk support price was set at 85% of parity last April, yet the current market price is \$5.04 per cwt., 81.8% of parity today. Is Secretary Butz willing to fight like a "wounded steer" to improve this situation? He says he has a coordinated approach to "rural development." Yet the Administration's budget for fiscal 1973 calls for cutting funds for: REAP (down \$55.5 million); REA (down \$107 million); REA telephone loans (down \$9 million); Food for Peace (down \$230 million); water and waste disposal loans (down \$4 million); and Forest Service land management programs (down \$61 million). There is no comfort in Secretary Butz' words—and what a torrent of them there has been—on the need to eliminate tax loss farming, extend loan programs to marginal farmers and small-farmer co-

Highway Commission Approves \$240 Million Two-Year Program

The Texas Highway Commission on March 1, 1972, approved a \$240 million, two-year program for the development of almost two thousand miles of Texas highways. The 1973-74 Consolidated High-

way Program calls for construction of 1,186 miles of highway facilities and the State's portion of right of way costs on 810 miles. The program includes both new work and additional finance for work previously authorized.



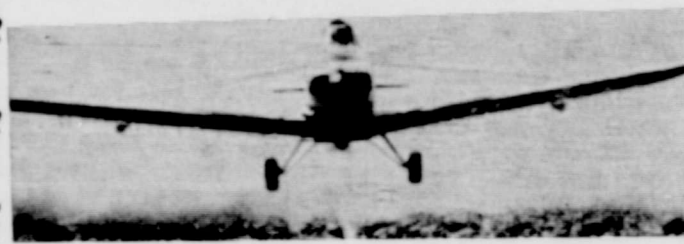

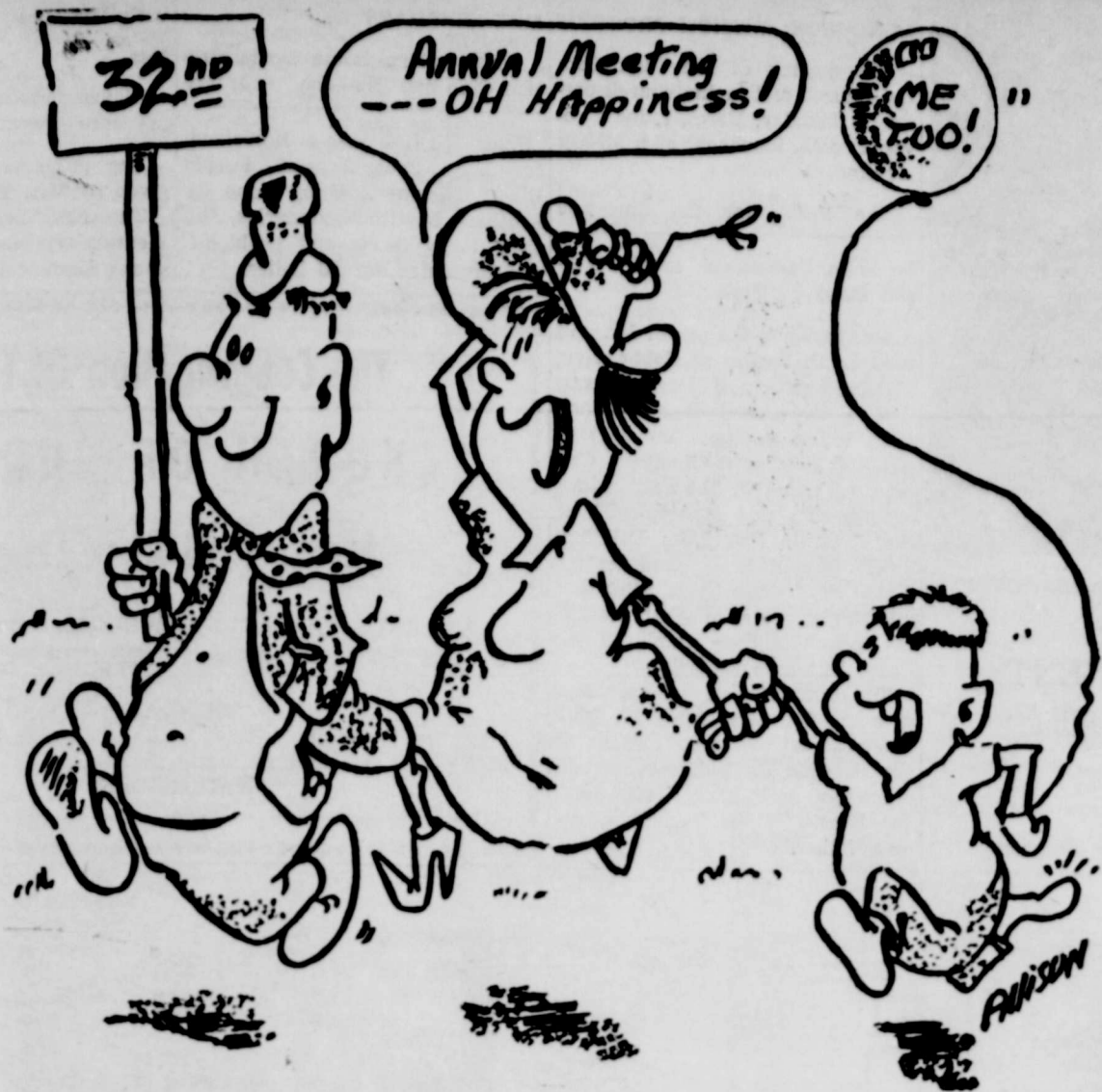

"You'll get a multitude of blessings from telling your friends or employees about Christ.

"Peter and Paul, they had their chance. This is our chance now."

Carlen was voted Southwest Conference Coach of the Year in the Associated Press poll following the 1970 season. He was also named SWC Coach of the Year by the Dallas Morning News.

Only 37, Carlen has coached or played in 11 bowl contests. The 1970 Sun Bowl appearance was the second in a row for Carlen-led teams. His 1969 West Virginia Mountaineers were champions of the Peach Bowl with a win over Paul Dietzel's South Carolina eleven.

In constant demand as a banquet speaker, Carlen is taking the Texas Tech story throughout the state as he speaks before audiences ranging from civic groups to the Texas Senate. With football, parents, children and the church as his main topics, he has not lacked listeners. In fact, he has averaged just about a speech a day since he arrived on the Tech scene in January 1970.

The personable Carlen is taking his football program to the people and has invited fans to spring practice, put on a clinic for high school coaches, conducted a summer football camp for more than 700 youngsters, and has a statewide television show where he shows films and talks Texas Tech and football.

Before coming to Tech, Carlen led the West Virginia Mountaineers to a 10-1 record in 1969, including the Peach Bowl win. His Mountaineers lost only one of their last 14 games, that to second-ranked Penn State.

Despite his youth, James Anthony Carlen III has a lengthy background. He began playing organized football at the age of seven, playing on every level through college, and coached at the high school, military service and collegiate levels.

Carlen played and coached under the famous Bobby Dodd at Georgia Tech. He played linebacker and handled the punting for the Yellow Jackets. He graduated from Georgia Tech in 1955 and was assistant coach one year in his hometown of Cookeville, Tennessee (where he produced a 9-1-0 record). He spent two years coaching an Air Force team at Weisbaden, Germany (22-2-1).

After military service, in which he reached the rank of Captain in the Air Force, he returned to Georgia Tech in a part-time capacity as assistant freshman coach. Six years later, at the age of 30, he was head of the Yellow Jacket defense.

Carlen married Miss Sharon Garner of Alcoa, Tennessee, in 1961. Their family includes Mollie, 9; Jamie, 7, and Melanie, 5.

Horse Owners Urged To "Get The Jump" On VEE

Horse owners throughout Texas are urged to "get the jump" on VEE, Venezuelan Equine Encephalomyelitis, that deadly sleeping sickness of horses. All horses that were not vaccinated last year should be vaccinated as soon as possible, reports Jackie Johnson, County Agricultural Agent.

It was less than a year ago that the disease swept into the state from Mexico, killing hundreds of horses in its path.

The 1972 campaign against VEE calls for vaccination of all equidae (horses, mules, donkeys) not vaccinated last year. In addition to Texas, the vaccination campaign will include the Gulf Coast states and states adjoining Mexico. All these states have been designated "high risk" states by the U. S. Department of Agriculture.

The four categories of horses that should be vaccinated now are (1) unvaccinated horses that have recently been moved into the state (2) foals born since last year's vaccination drive, (3) foals vaccinated under six months of age, (4) horses that were overlooked and never vaccinated.

Officials of the USDA's Animal and Plant Health Service believe that VEE will break out again even though the disease was confined to 25 Texas counties in 1971. So, it's important to vaccinate now before mosquitoes which transmit the disease emerge in the warm months ahead.

This year the vaccination program will be conducted at the horse owner's expense. Commercial vaccine is available and must be administered by a veterinarian.

Vaccination will provide immunity for more than a year and possibly longer. However, if there is any doubt as to whether horses were vaccinated last year, it is best to vaccinate again.

Texas is still under federal quarantine for VEE. Thus horses must have been vaccinated for VEE at least 14 days before being allowed to leave the state for other areas. Horses for interstate shipment must be accompanied by a vaccination certificate with individual animals identified by tag, tattoo or other means.

About 92% of Texas' estimated horse population of 625,000 head was vaccinated in 1971. Almost 800 Texas veterinarians participated in the vaccination campaign. More than 2.8 million horses were vaccinated in 19 states and the District of Columbia last year.

By appearance, VEE is not distinguishable from Eastern and

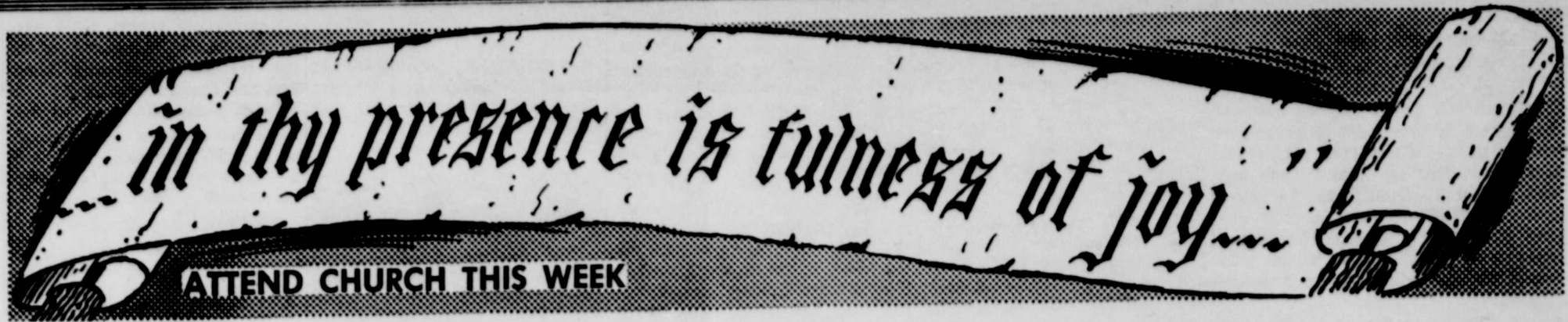

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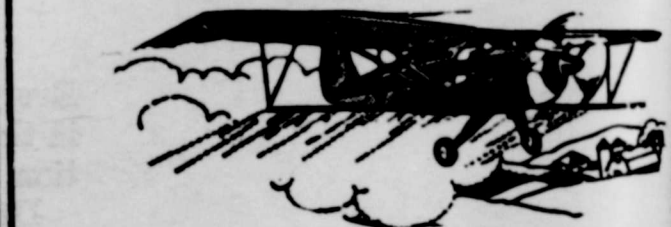
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
