Self Breaks Own Record At Panhandle

The Silverton Owl track team participated in the Panhandle Relays over the weekend, scoring 25 1/5 points to place ninth in the meet.

Marvin Self earned blue ribbons in both the shot put and discus throw. Winning the discus event with a heave of 161'10 1/2", Self set a new meet record by breaking the record of 159'6 1/2" that he set at the meet last year.

Second place in the discus was won by Tommy Duniven of McLean, with a throw of 130'10". Ken Thurman of White Deer placed third with a throw of 130'9 1/2". He won the shot put with a toss of 51'9 1/2".

Gene Culwell placed fifth in the 880 with a time of 2:09. It was the first time Culwell had run the event, and he placed well behind the first-place time of 2:04.4.

Storm Warning System To Be Checked Today

The tornado warning system will be tested here today if weather permits.

Since the stormy season is here again, local residents should review the storm warning system:

When a tornado alert is issued for the Silverton area by the weather bureau, four or more blasts of the fire alarm system will be heard. At the same time, the tornado warning air horn will be sounded at short intervals and the new warning devices will be operated on their siren sound. This warning should alert residents to watch the clouds and be prepared to move to a place of safety.

If hooks, funnels or tornadoes are sighted which are considered by the weather bureau, D. P. S., or private citizens to be potentially dangerous to the City of Silverton, the fire alarm and air horn will be sounded with a continuous blast, and the "yelpers" will be sounded. This will warn residents not only to watch the clouds but also to move to a place of safety.

The fire alarm is sounded three times for fire. One blast of the fire alarm calls the firemen to practice on the first and third Thursday evenings.

Short Course To Be Sponsored By Vo-Ag Department

An oxy-acetylene welding short course for adult farmers will be held March 20-23 under the sponsorship of the Silverton High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to O. C. Ramsey, Superintendent, Monroe Gates, teacher of vocational Agriculture, and Toke Riddell, president of Silverton Young Farmers.

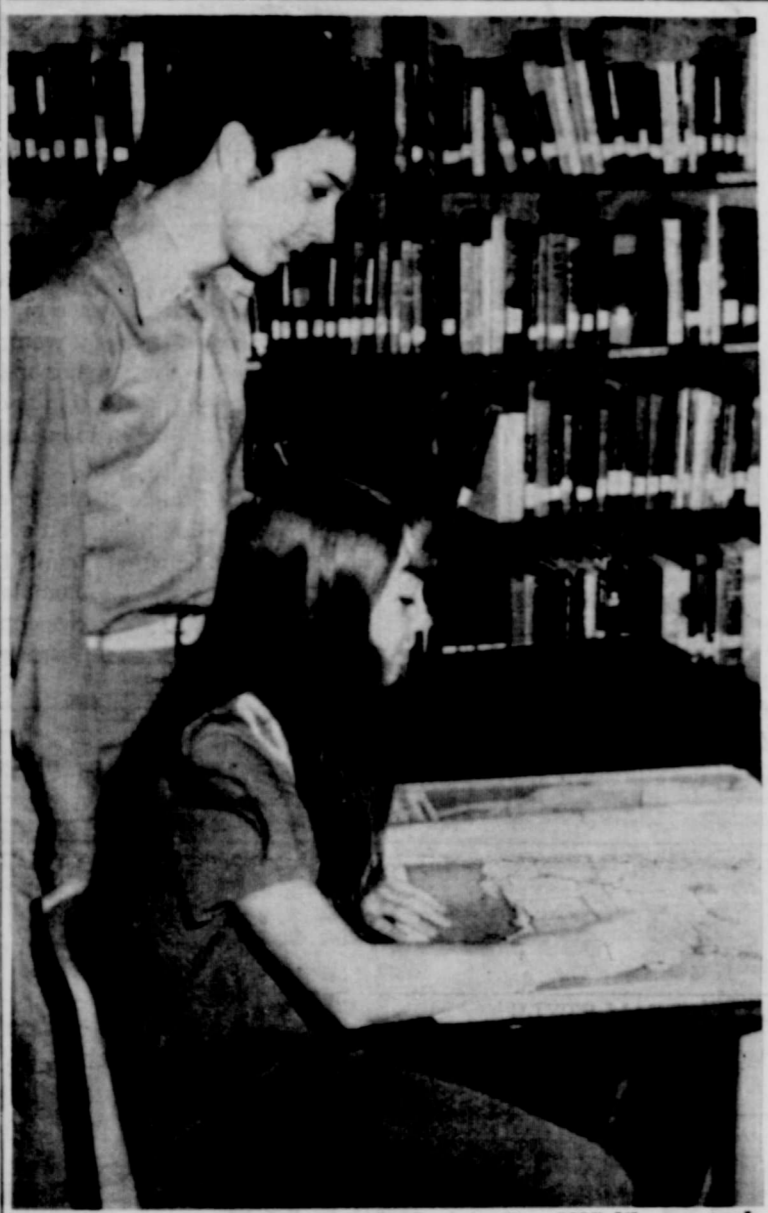
Charles H. Yeates, welding specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Agricultural Engineering at Texas A&M University, will be the instructor for the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Yeates holds a B.S. Degree from Texas A&M University in Agricultural Education. He taught vocational agriculture and farm shop for 15 years. For two years he was employed in industry as a professional welder. In 1962 he joined the Agricultural Education Specialist Program as Oxy-Acetylene Welding Specialist, conducting short courses for adult and young farmer groups over the state. Mr. Yeates recently completed a workshop on hard-facing conducted by industry personnel from Whittier, California.

The short course in Silverton is scheduled to begin March 20 at 7:30 p.m. in the vocational agriculture building. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Yeates will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Mr. Gates.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the Young Farmer President, Mr. Riddell, or the teacher of vocational agriculture, Mr. Gates. An entry fee of \$10.00 will be charged. Oxy-Acetylene welding short course certificates are to be presented to each enrollee who attended.

tends all the training sessions. Mr. Yeates stated that the short course will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but that he expects to cover such subjects as safety in oxy-acetylene welding, factors controlled by the operator in oxy-acetylene welding, choosing and adjusting torch flames, types of welding rods, preparation of joints, distortion, cutting and hard-surfacing. Short courses in welding, as well as in other areas, are now available to farmers throughout the state under a cooperative program between the Texas Education Agency and Texas A&M University.

This cooperative program is designed to make the services of specialists available to conduct short courses under the supervision of public schools. Such a program will enable teachers of vocational agriculture to provide improved educational services to farm people.

Specialists are now available in the fields of beef cattle, farm electric wiring and safety, farm electric motors, farm welding, swine production, tractor maintenance, oxy-acetylene welding, and pasture improvement.

The adult short courses conducted by Mr. Yeates have all been outstanding successes according to Mr. Walter Labay, area supervisor of vocational agriculture, Plainview.

Arrangements for the adult education short courses in welding and in other fields are made through Mr. Labay's office.
