

NOTICE OF INTENTION TO ENGAGE IN WEATHER MODIFICATION ACTIVITIES

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated of 4981 East Dakota, Fresno, California, 93727, who holds License No. 2

of the State of Texas, intends to engage in a weather modification operation designed to decrease hailfall and enhance rainfall, for and on behalf of the Plains Weather Improvement Association located at P. O. Box 1627, Plainview, Texas, 79072, and will conduct such a program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The target area within which hailfall is intended to be decreased and rainfall enhanced can be described as that total area within the boundaries of Hale County.
 2. The area over which equipment may be operated shall include portions of the counties of Hale, Crosby, Floyd, Briscoe, Swisher, Lubbock, Hockley, Lamb, Castro, Parmer, Bailey and Cochran.
 3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of approximately 1,000 square miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.
 4. The person in charge of this program shall be Thomas J. Henderson, Atmospherics Incorporated.
 5. The program may be operational at various times throughout the period from 15 April 1972 through 30 October 1972.
 6. Any person who feels they may be affected in some adverse way by this program may file a formal complaint to the Texas Water Development Board, P. O. Box 12386, Austin, Texas 78711.

An Open Letter To The People Of Texas

Dear Voter:

I'm a candidate for attorney general of Texas because I believe it's time for a change in the office. Crawford Martin is seeking a fourth term. It's the first time in the history of Texas an attorney general is running for a fourth term.

Campaigns should be run on the issues and I don't like to inject personalities and personal relationships into a political campaign. But, the relationship between Frank Sharp and Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin cannot be swept under the rug.

The new book about the Texas stock fraud scandal, "Texas Under a Cloud," tells about that relationship. On page 128 the book says: "Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin... got some free newspaper publicity when it was revealed in October, 1971, that he received a 'stock tip' from Frank Sharp - while Martin and his family were Sharp's ranch guests late in 1969 and again at Sharp's Houston office early in 1970."

"Sharp was trying personally to sell National Bankers Life stock to Martin, although the attorney general said that Sharp never mentioned the possibility of Sharp's town Bank loans to buy the stock."

"Martin said that he turned the stock offer down because it would have cost too much, because NBL was in 'shaky' condition, and because he did not buy 'speculative' stocks."

"He did not comment on the ethical aspects of a state official's accepting a stock tip of that sort - perhaps, because Martin, as attorney general, had ruled in favor of Sharp on a key legal issue about Sharp's State Bank only two and one half years before Sharp made the stock offer to Martin."

"Martin's ruling had the effect of increasing the bank's capitalization dramatically and thus its ability to make large loans, ultimately giving Sharp the financial resources he used in the manipulations charged by the SEC."

As you know, hundreds of Texans lost their life savings because of Sharp's stock manipulations and it probably wouldn't have happened but for Atty. Gen. Martin's legal opinion.

Don't you agree, it's time for a change in the office of attorney general of Texas?

Just so you'll know what you'd be changing to, I'd like to tell you a little about John Hill. I'm a native Texan, grew up in Wink and Kilgore, was national debate champion at Kilgore Junior College and graduated from the University of Texas Law School. I served in the Navy during World War II, practiced law (much of the time in courtrooms) in Houston, and was secretary of state from 1966 to 1968.

I certainly would appreciate your support. It is time for a change.

Notice is hereby given that Atmospherics Incorporated of 4601 Dakota, Fresno, California, who holds License No. 27, State of Texas, intends to engage in a weather modification program designed to decrease rainfall and enhance rainfall, for the benefit of the Plains Weather Improvement Association located at P. O. Box 1627, Plainview, Texas, 79072, and Better Weather Incorporated, Littlefield, Texas, and will conduct such a program by means of aerial application of artificial nuclei as follows:

1. The area over or in which equipment may be operated shall include portions of the counties of Hale, Crosby, Floyd, Briscoe, Swisher, Lubbock, Hockley, Lamb,

Castro, Parmer, Bailey and Cochran.

2. The target area within which rainfall is intended to be decreased and rainfall enhanced, can be described as follows:

"The boundary of the target area shall be a line beginning at a point of origin at Littlefield in Lamb County, Texas, and running northwest along Highway 84 to a point four

miles southeast of Sudan; thence due west to a point one mile west of Road 303; thence due north to the north boundary of Lamb County; thence due east to the intersection of the east boundary of Parmer County; thence due north along the east boundary of Parmer County to Road 145 to its intersection with Road 1424 in Swisher County; thence south on Road 1424 to the north boundary line of Hale County; thence due east along the north boundary line of Hale County to Road 378 at the intersection with the north boundary line of Floyd County; thence due south to the south boundary lines of Floyd, Hale and Lamb Counties to the intersection of Highway 84 and the south

boundary of Lamb County; thence northwesterly along Highway 84 to the point of origin at Littlefield."

3. The equipment, materials and methods to be used in conducting an operation within this area of approximately 1,000 sq. miles include a 3cm radar system, cloud seeding aircraft, and the application of silver iodide ice nuclei, hygroscopic nuclei or other nuclei considered appropriate to the artificial nucleation of clouds or weather systems.


