SELF BREAKS SHOT, DISCUS RECORDS AT AMARILLO RELAYS

Silverton High School's Marvin Self put on two record-breaking shows last Friday in the 23rd Amarillo Relays.

Self notched his name in the record book twice with Division AA-A-B wins in the discus (172'½") and shot (56'6") which broke his own 1971 discus mark (159'9¼") and shattered the 55'8¼" shot effort in 1970 by White Deer's Ricky Thurman.

Tommy Lusk of Plainview placed first in the AAAA-AAA division by putting the shot 57'9¼". Second place in that division was won with a distance of 53'1¼". First-place in the AAAA-AAA discus event was won with a throw of 167'3".

The 20 points Self earned boosted the Owls' total to 28¼, giving them second place for Friday behind Floydada's 36 points.

John Minyard placed second in the high jump by clearing the 5'10" mark. First place in the event was won with a record-tying 6'1" by Randy Quisenberry of Floydada. Craig Culwell tied for sixth place with 5'6".

Mr. McWilliams died at 12:30 a.m. Monday in Swisher Memorial Hospital in Tulsa after apparently suffering a stroke at his home in Silverton at 8:00 a.m. Sunday.

Born in Hill County July 23, 1917, Mr. McWilliams came to Briscoe County in 1929. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. C. L. McWilliams of Silverton.

A graduate of Silverton High School, Mr. McWilliams served in World War II as an Army infantryman in the 104th Division. He received the Purple Heart and Bronze Star for action in Europe.

He and the former Miss Margaret Bess Webb were married October 29, 1939 in Claude.

He served as county and district clerk of Briscoe County from 1946 until 1964. He was a past worshipful master of Silverton Lodge No. 754 A.F.&A.M. He was a member of the First United Methodist Church and the Silverton Lions Club. At the time of his death, Mr. McWilliams was manager of the Plainview Production Credit Association office in Silverton.

Surviving are his widow, Bess; three sons, Jerry Dee McWilliams of Snyder, Larry Webb McWilliams of Midland and Paul Ray McWilliams, a junior student at Southern Methodist University; three sisters, Mrs. Wilma Hunt of Silverton, Mrs. Willie Mae Gerdes of Tulsa and Mrs. Mary Sue Bingham of Kress; five brothers, Guy, Glenn, and C. L. McWilliams, jr., all of Silverton, Bobby and Billy McWilliams of Quitaque; and three grandchildren.

O. Box 1627, Plainview, Texas, 79072, and Better Weather Incorporated, Littlefield, Texas. The program will consist of a series of aerial applications of silver iodide nuclei as follows:

The target area within which the program is intended to be decreased

and rainfall enhanced, can be described as follows:

"The boundary of the target area shall be a line beginning at a point of origin at Littlefield in Lamb County, Texas, and running northwest along Highway 84 to a point four miles southeast of Sudan; thence due west to a point one mile west of Road 303; thence due north to the north boundary of Lamb County; thence due east to the intersection of the east boundary of Parmer County; thence due north along the east boundary of Parmer County to Road 145 to its intersection with Road 1424 in Swisher County; thence south on Road 1424 to the north boundary line of Hale County; thence due east along the north boundary line of Hale County to Road 378 at the intersection with the north boundary line of Floyd County; thence due

south to the south boundary line of Floyd, Hale and Lamb Counties to the intersection of Highway 84 and the south boundary of Lamb County; thence northwesterly along Highway 84 to the point of origin at Littlefield."

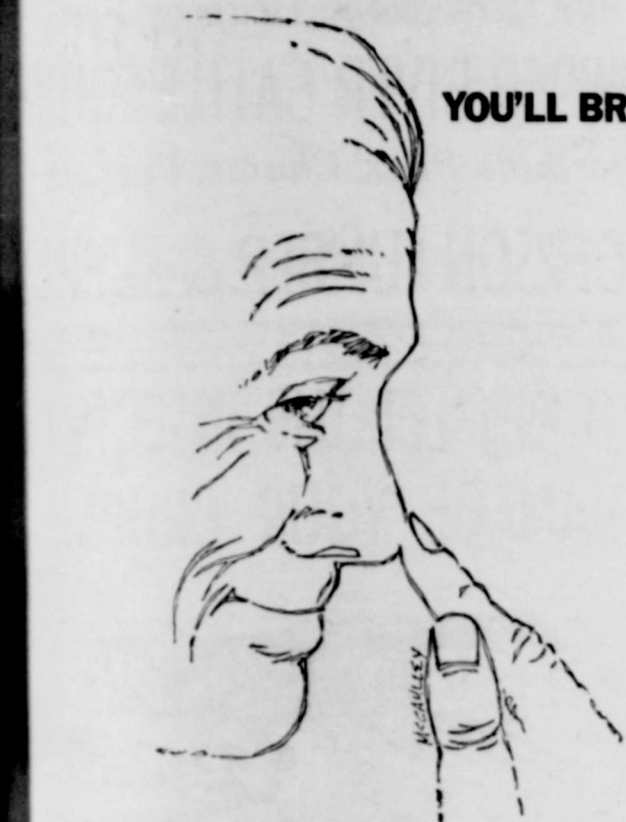

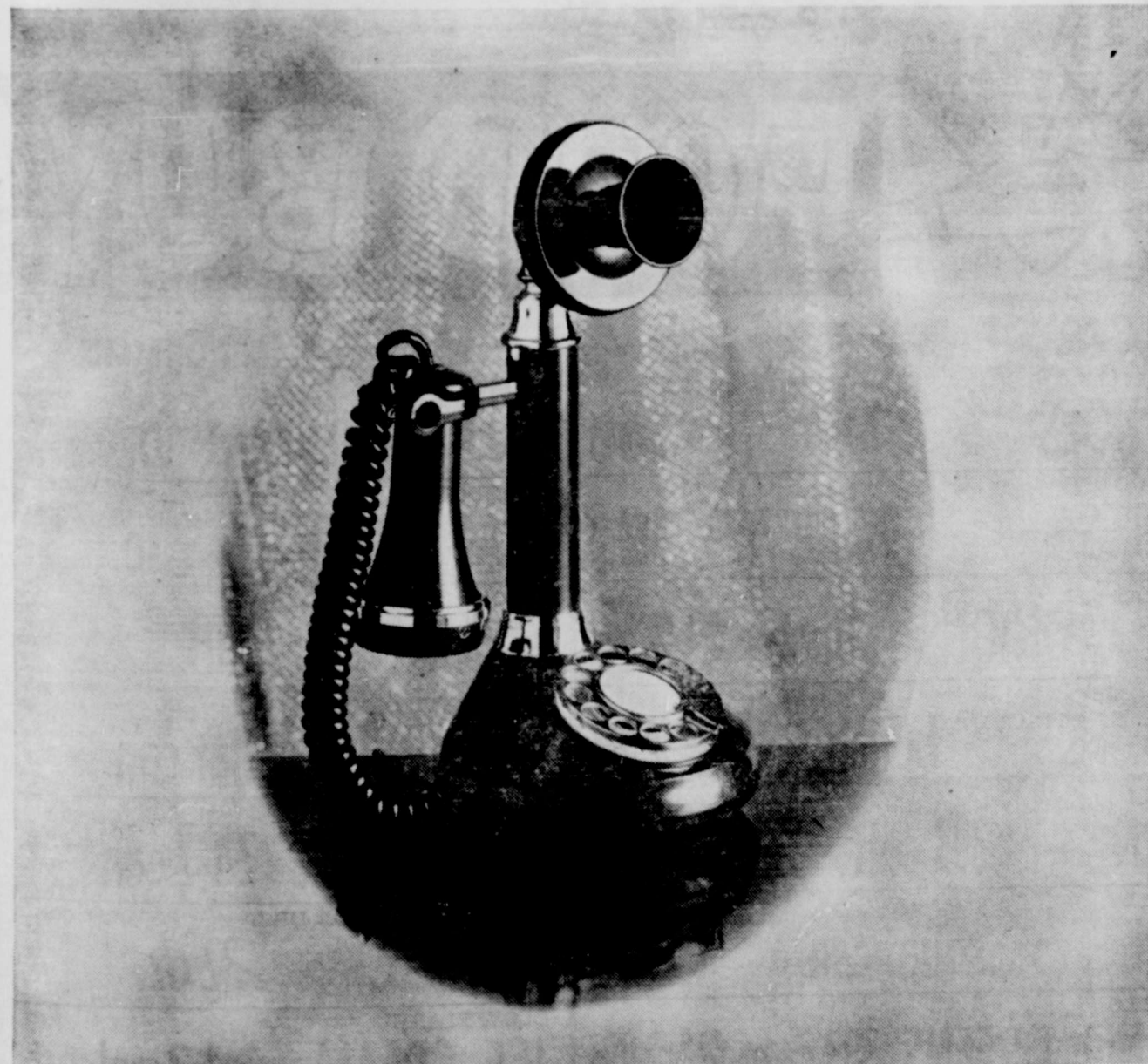

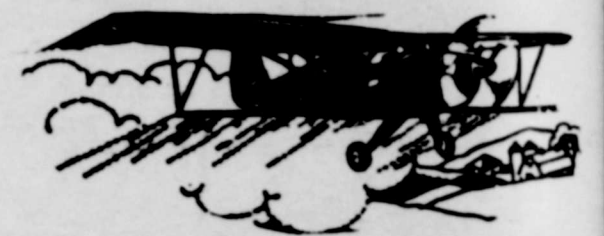
