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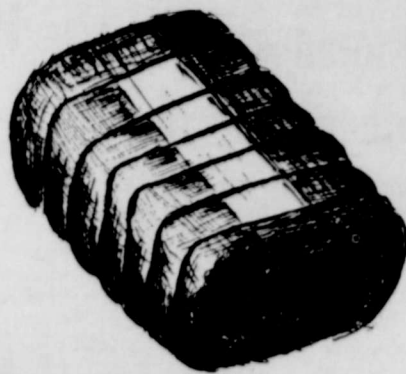
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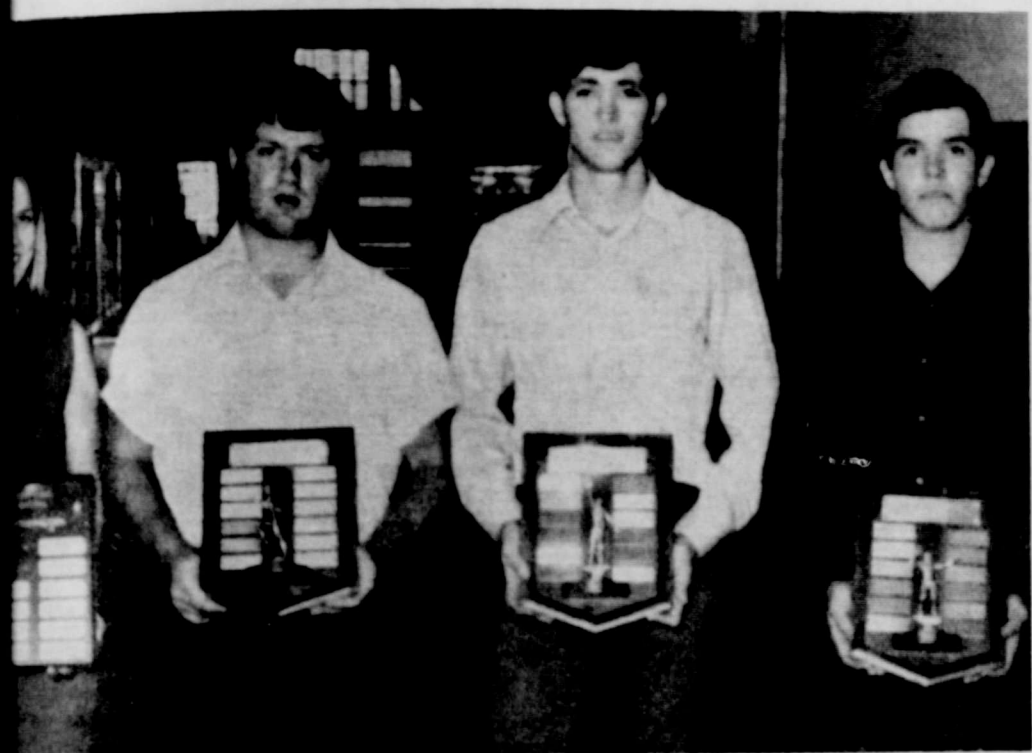

## Saturday Is Primary Election Day In Texas

Saturday is Primary Election Day in Texas, and voters in the Democratic Primary in Silverton will all go to new voting places which were recently designated by the Briscoe County Commissioners' Court.

The Silverton Young Farmers want the voters to know that they will be furnishing rides to the polls for those who don't have transportation. If you need a ride to go to vote, call Silverton Butane (823-2481) and a Young Farmer will take you to your designated place to vote.

The Republican Primary will be held at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Williams in Silverton.

Announcement has been made by County Judge M. G. Moreland that the voting places of the Silverton precincts which have always voted in the courthouse have been changed.

Purpose of the change was to give voters more room in which to mark their ballots and also to provide a voting place on the ground level for the elderly, ill, and others who have trouble climbing the steps at the courthouse.

These changes are effective immediately, and the new voting places listed below are the ones that will be used for the Democratic Party Primary May 6.

### PRECINCT 1

In the past the voters in this precinct have voted in the County Judge's office. For all elections until further notice the voting place for this precinct will be the Silverton City Hall.

### PRECINCT 3

This precinct has voted in the Sheriff's Office in the past, but will now go to the Pioneer Room at the First State Bank to vote.

### PRECINCT 4

The voters in this precinct have gone to the county courtroom to cast their ballots in the past, but in the future will vote at the PCA community room.

Please make note of this change and pass the word to your friends so that no one will be inconvenienced on election day. If you have moved into a new precinct since you registered to vote, please contact the County Clerk immediately so that your name can be placed on the proper registration list.

# Voters Must Vote "For" On Ballot To Be Against Busing

will finally get a chance to voice their grumbles about day-long lines to the ballot box. But they'll have to vote "For" or "Against" on the ballot—where they don't—to do it.

Referendums—one on the ballot and two on the ballot—will allow voters to express their feelings on DST and desegregation.

Demag leaders, however, are pushing the idea of a DST "straw vote."

### BUSING COMPLICATED

The Republican DST question merely asks that the ballot be marked "For" or "Against" daylight saving time, but the busing questions are considerably more complicated—and confusing.

On both Democratic and Republican busing questions, the voter must mark his ballot "For" in order to register himself as being against busing to achieve racial

balance.

**WORDING IS CONFUSING**

The Democratic question reads, "No public school student shall be assigned to or required to attend a particular school. This referendum applies to the required busing of public school students and provides for equal quality education for all public school students."

The GOP wording is thus: "Are you in favor of a constitutional amendment which would prohibit forced busing of school children or forced consolidation of school districts solely to achieve racial balance?"

So, if you mark your ballot "For" such an amendment or "For" no student being required to attend a particular school, you are voting "Against" busing.
