Children's photographs taken for the National Cystic Fibrosis Research Foundation will be held in Quanah and Hardeman County on Friday, June 2, according to Mrs. Morris Degan, chairman.

Mrs. Degan will lead Quanah volunteers, which will include volunteers from the Quanah High School chapter of Future Homemakers of America, in the drive which will include a house to house canvassing of Quanah.

Mrs. Degan is the former Lou Brannon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Brannon of Quanah, former Silvertown residents. Mrs. Degan's daughter, Melinda, has cystic fibrosis.

Cystic fibrosis is thus far an incurable disease inherited when both parents have a biochemical defect. Many patients now are living beyond their teens and into adulthood because of improved therapy.

That same kind of therapy is relieving and often curing children suffering from chronic bronchitis, asthma with lung damage, bronchiectasis, the condition sometimes called childhood emphysema, and other respiratory afflictions.

"Most people don't realize how many children have serious breathing problems," Mrs. Degan said. "More than five million children cannot take breathing for granted, and the Foundation's basic research program, which seeks clues to the underlying cause of cystic fibrosis, is developing new knowledge that may benefit all of them."

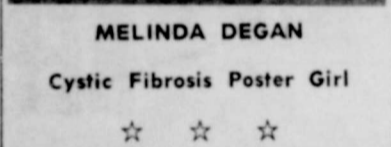
Only one run-off contest appears on the Republican ballot, that being between Albert B. Fay and Henry C. (Hank) Grover for Governor.

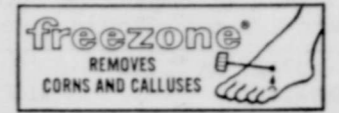

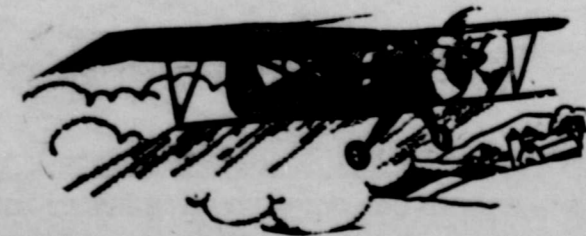
