

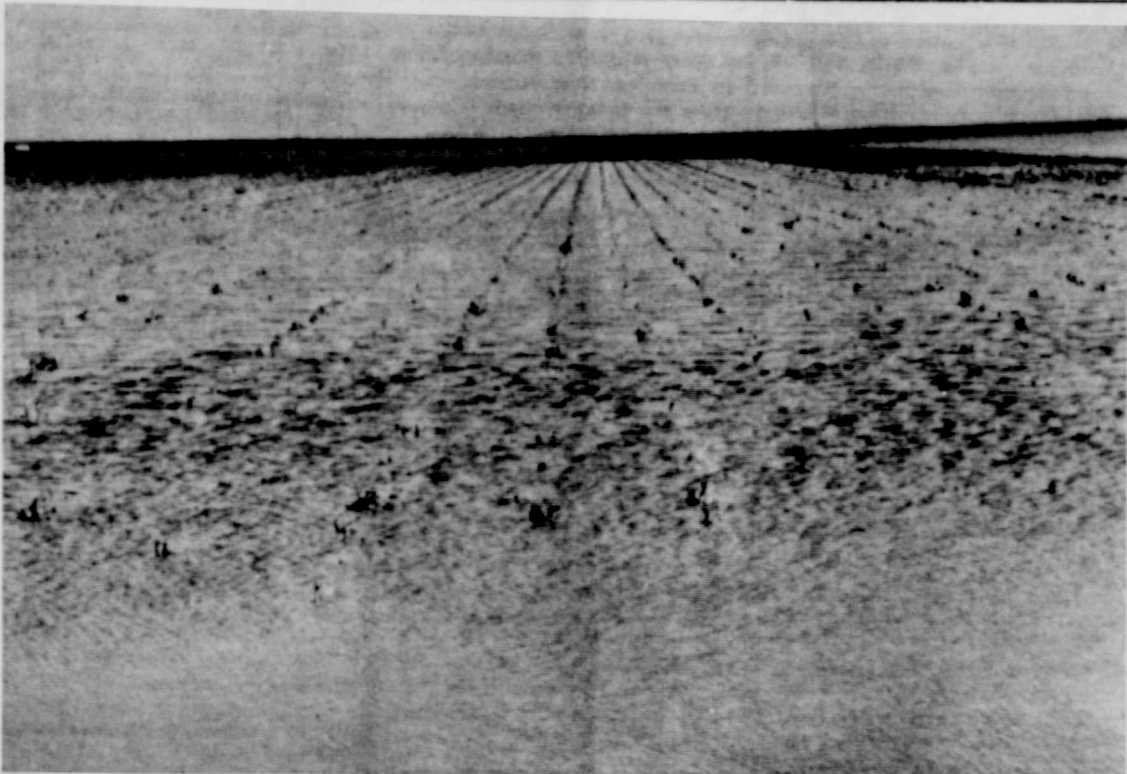

Good Amounts Of Rain Received Here This Week

A total of 1.93 inches of rain had been measured in Silverton early this week, with heavier reports coming in from the rural areas. From Sunday through Tuesday, 3.40 inches of rain had been measured at the W. D. Peugh place. Rags Riddell reported three inches Monday and Tuesday. Berle Fisch measured 2 1/2 inches of rain for the same two days. Some of the rain has fallen fast enough to cause some washing, but no reports of serious hail damage have been received this week. Any crop damage received will probably be due to flooding of young crops or shattering of ripe wheat.

Gold Sox, White Sox Take Baseball Wins Here

Gold Sox Pee Wees came out hitting in the first and fourth innings Thursday night to defeat the White Sox Pee Wees 11-6. Jimmy Stone pitched the win, going all the way for the Gold Sox. Michael Hill was the losing pitcher, with relief by Casey Bean.

Warren Jarrett warmed up the action in the last of the first inning by hitting a triple with the bases loaded. He scored on a single by Blaine Eddleman to put the Gold Sox out front 4-1.

Gary Juarez walloped a triple for the White Sox in the top of the second inning with the bases loaded to bring the score into a 4-4 deadlock. Michael Hill hit a solid home run in the third inning, and the White Sox held a 5-4 lead. Jessie Ortega got on in the fourth with a single and stole home to extend the White Sox lead to 6-4.

In the bottom of the fourth, the Gold Sox rallied with a seven-run bonanza, with Kelly McMurry and Jimmy Stone both hitting triples. The White Sox were retired in the fifth inning with Michael Hill, Chris Sperry and Robert Boyd loading the bases.

Gold Sox runs were scored by Dwain Tipton, Cary Fleming and Jimmy Stone, two each; Eric Patton, Warren Jarrett, Blaine Eddleman, Kelly McMurry, and Bryan Schott, one each.

Scoring for the White Sox Pee Wees were Jessie Ortega, two runs; Casey Bean, Michael Hill, Jim Estes and Bob Arnold, one run each.

The White Sox Little Leaguers took an 18-6 win from the Gold Sox in their first game of the season Thursday night. Johnny Ortega went all the way on the mound for the White Sox. Jimmy Wilson recorded the loss, with relief pitching by Jace Francis and Rodney Bullock.

At the end of four innings the White Sox held an 8-5 lead and it was still "anybody's ballgame." The White Sox allowed only one run in the fifth and shut out the Gold Sox in the sixth inning, but put on a razzle-dazzle show of their own their last time at bat when 10 runs crossed home plate.

Jacky Vaughn homered with two on base, Brent Bean followed with a stand-up double, Diji Couch singled, Kirk Durham walked, and Johnny Ortega cleared the bases with a home run. The White Sox started through their batting order for the second time with only one out, and this time around Vaughn hit a triple with the bases full.

A double play, the first of the season, was executed by Brent Bean, who caught a line drive at second and threw it to first in time to catch the runner off base. Former Teacher Buried At Plainview

Mrs. Mattie C. Walling, 81, former Silverton school teacher, died at 12:30 a.m. Wednesday in a Plainview hospital. She had resided at 408 West Seventh in Plainview.

Funeral services were conducted at 2:00 p.m. Thursday in the First United Methodist Church in Plainview, with the Rev. Mark Williams, pastor, officiating. Burial was in the Plainview Cemetery with arrangements directed by Lemons Funeral Home.

Mrs. Walling was born in Denton County May 20, 1891. She and H. P. Walling were married March 16, 1913 in Hale Center. He died August 8, 1924 in Plainview. Moving to Plainview in 1912 from Denton County, Mrs. Walling taught school in the Whitfield community east of Kress, in Amarillo, Silverton, Kress and Plainview.

She was a member of First United Methodist Church, American Association of University Women, Plainview Knife and Fork Club, Plainview Community Concert and the Retired Teachers Association.

Surviving are a daughter, Mrs. Albert Dickenson of Blue Springs, Missouri; a son, Elmo L. Walling of Midland; two brothers, W. C. McClellan of San Antonio and E. R. McClellan of Lubbock; four grandchildren and seven great-grandchildren.

The family requested that memorials be in the form of donations to First United Methodist Church in Plainview.

LOCAL TEACHER WAS PARTICIPANT IN WORKSHOP
