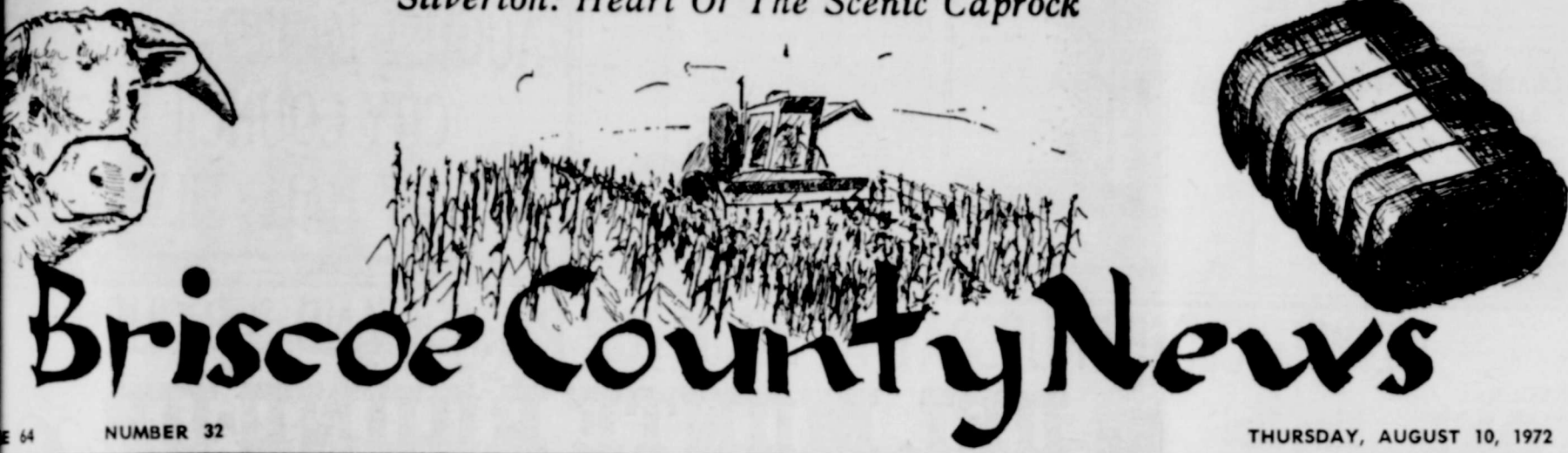

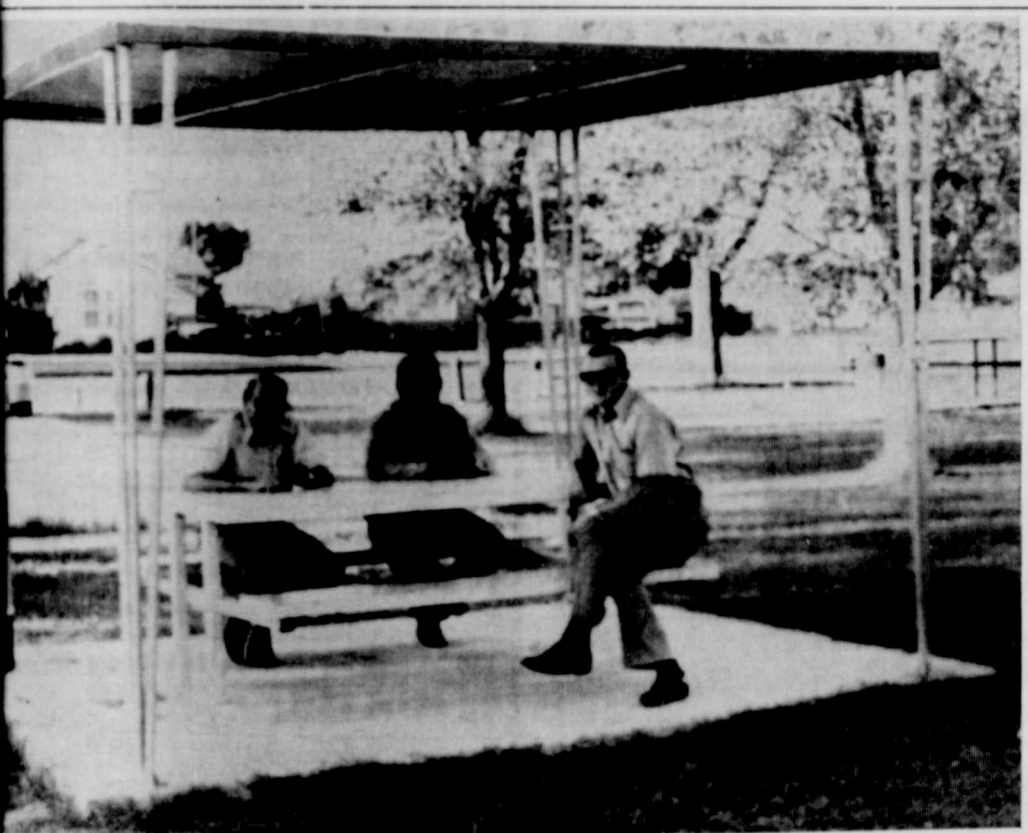

Briscoe County Celebration To Open With Parade

Briscoe County's 80th birthday will be celebrated in Silverton August 10-11-12. Activities begin at 3:00 p.m. Thursday, August 10, with a western parade through downtown Silverton. Riding clubs will participate from several area towns, and clubs and businesses are being encouraged to compete for prize money in the floats division of the parade. Prize money for the parade floats will be \$50.00, \$30.00 and \$20.00.

BICYCLE CONTEST
A Bicycle Decoration Contest will be sponsored as a feature of the parade for boys and girls by the Briscoe County News. Prizes will be \$10.00, \$5.00 and \$2.50. For the purpose of identification of the winners, each contestant in the Bicycle Decoration Contest is required to wear numbers attached to their left side where they may be seen easily by the judges. These numbers may be had at the News Office until near parade time and then at the parade.

The bicycle parade will form at the Silverton Hotel and west down Seventh Street at 2:45 p.m.

PUBLIC BARBECUE
Following the parade, a free public barbecue will be served in the City Park.

DANCES
Dances will be held on each of the three nights on the largest concrete slab in the Southwest at the Silverton Elevators. Music will be by Young Country, state and national FFA talent winner from Houston.

RODEO
A rodeo will be sponsored by the Silverton Young Farmers on Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights, August 10-11-12. Wild Cow Milking Contests will be featured. Rodeo events will include saddle bronc riding, bull dogging, tie-down calf roping, heading and heeling, ladies barrel race, bare-back bronc riding, bull riding, kids break-away roping and kids sled race. There will also be a calf scramble each performance.

Rodeo books opened Tuesday, and close Thursday at 1:00 p.m. Entry fee must accompany entry, and no personal checks will be accepted. Fred Strange is rodeo secretary again this year, and he may be contacted by telephoning 806-823-2161 or (after 6:00 p.m.) 806-823-5501. Admission will be \$1.50 for adults and 75c for children.

Stock for the rodeo will be furnished by Halliday Rodeo Company of Williamsburg, New Mexico.

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PURCELL HAILS NEW RURAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

Graham Purcell (D-Tex) hailed House passage of a comprehensive new rural development program as "the beginning of a new era for countryside USA." He sharply criticized a last-minute attempt to strip the program of its funding, which "would have destroyed the bill."

Mr. Price voted for the bill and, after its passage, he sided earlier with supporters of the Administration Reorganization Plan on a similar amendment. Supporters of the amendment sought to strip

authors of the rural development plan, and served on a key Conference Committee that resolved differences between the version passed by the House and the one passed by the Senate. He led in the intensive two and one-half hour debate that took place on the House floor.

"Enactment of this bill is going to mean more jobs, more opportunity and improved local services for Northwest Texas," Purcell said. "For the first time we now have a comprehensive plan of rural economic development—one that marks the beginning of a new era for non-metropolitan USA."

Named To Who's Who In Southern Politics

State Representative Tom Christian of Claude was recently named to Who's Who in Politics in the South and Southwest.

The book, to be published later in the year, provides a resource of biographical data of men and women who make up local, state and national government. In addition, the publication renders honor and recognition to those in public service. Rep. Christian's biography will join those of Governors, United States Senators, Congressmen and other political lead-

ers in the South and Southwest United States.

Rep. Christian was elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1968 and ran unopposed for a second term in 1970. He is currently serving on the Committees on Revenue and Taxation, Parks and Wildlife, Elections, Penitentiaries, and Business and Marketing Affairs. A director of the Panhandle Livestock Association and the Panhandle-Plains Historical Society, Rep. Christian also holds membership in the Sons of the American Revolution and the Sons of the Republic of Texas.

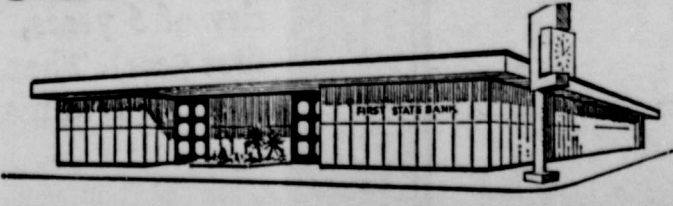

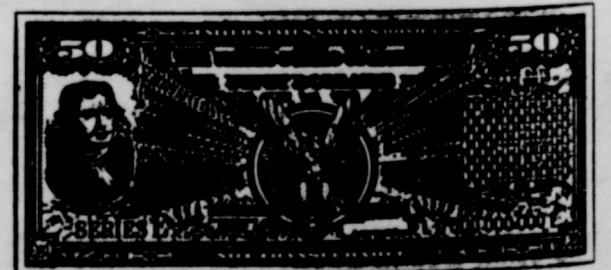
