

## 'Horns, Eagles in 3-1A battle

It won't take a handicapper to figure the odds of making the state playoffs after Friday's District 1-3A opener between Three Way and Lazbuddie (7:30 p.m.) at Longhorn Field.

### SIX MAN PREVIEW

The winner becomes a solid favorite to earn one of the district's two state playoff bids along with state-title contender Whitharral.

The loser a longshot. "This is a must win," said Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson. "This is for the district championship as far as I'm concerned. The loser could very well find itself out of contention after the first week."

Whitharral, ranked second in the state, is heavily favored to win the district title after reaching the state quarterfinals last year. The senior-laden Panthers (5-0) have outscored their opponents, 258-24, including four shutouts.

Lazbuddie (5-0) survived an upset bid last week. Three Way (4-1) didn't.

Only Three Way's 20-18 upset loss to Melrose, N.M. (4-1) prevented a matchup of unbeatens.

"I'm ready to start playing for keeps. I'm sure Lazbuddie is too," Three Way coach Danny James said.

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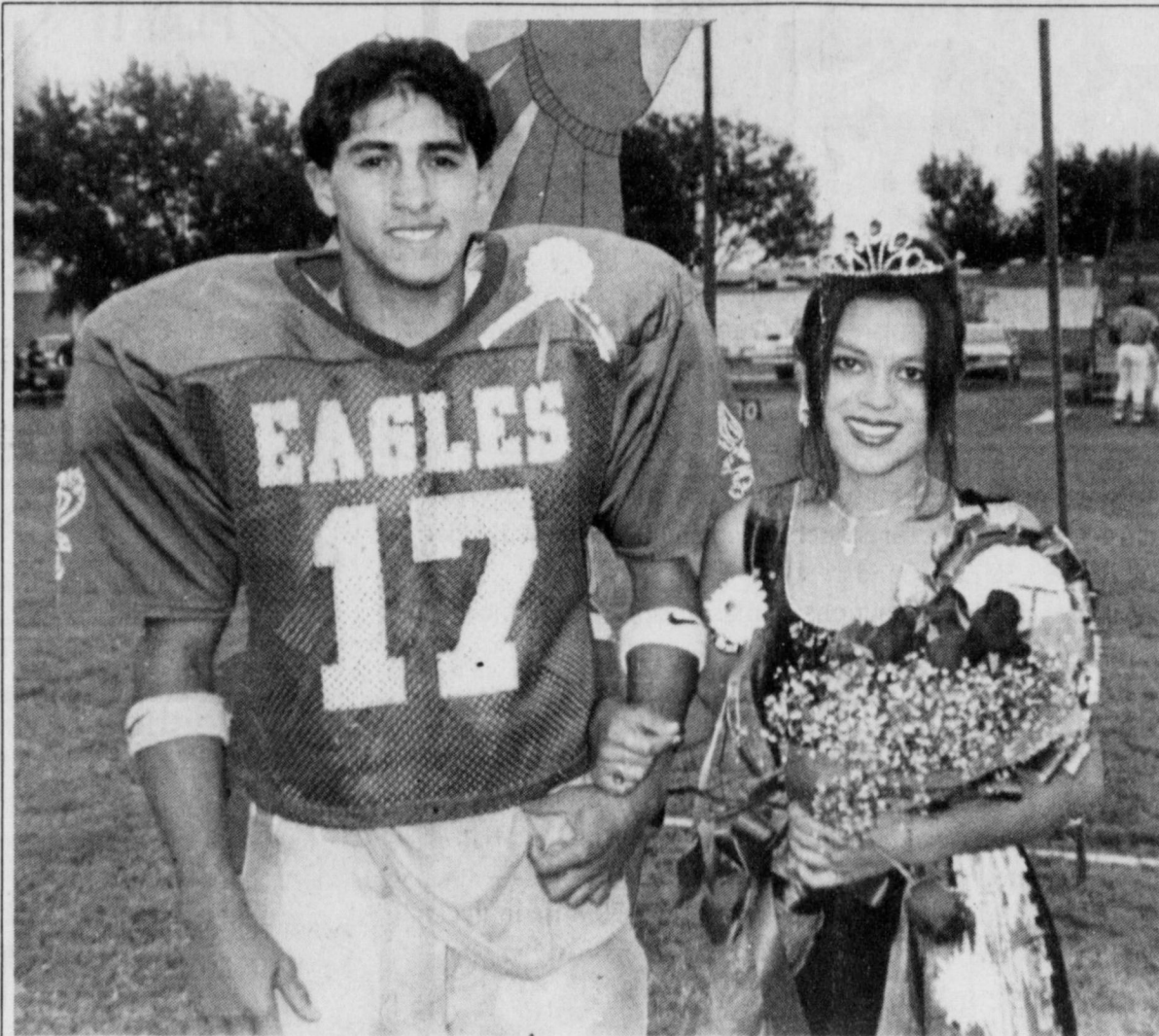

## Friona is Mules' chief 1-3A rival

This is a "GUE" game — as in it could get ugly early.

Both coaches are down playing the rivalry, but Friona would like nothing better than to put a hickey on Muleshoe when they host the Mules at 7:30 p.m. Friday in a District 1-3A game at Chieftain Stadium.

After all, they're not exactly kissing cousins.

Friona and Muleshoe are towns of similar size and makeup, and separated by just 30 miles of milo, corn and cotton.

But the gap between the two teams on the football team right now is as wide as Palo Duro Canyon.

Friona (4-1 overall, 2-0 in district) is ranked in the top 20 in Class 3A Harris Ratings. Muleshoe (0-5, 0-2) is floundering near the bottom of the nearly 200 Class 3A teams.

"It's easy for the kids to get caught up in (the rivalry)," Muleshoe head coach David Wood said. "As a coach, I just treat it as any other game."

"But the kids probably want to beat Friona more than anyone."

Friona head coach James Morton expects a battle.

"Anytime we play Muleshoe it's a battle," Morton said. "I expect them to play us tough because their year could be complete if they beat Friona."

Wood said Friona is a program he'd like to emulate.

"Coach (James) Morton has done a heck of a job," Wood said. "It's certainly a program you'd like to mimic."

It wasn't that long ago that Friona was rebuilding.

Friona was 0-10 in Morton's

first season in 1992. Friona won the district title in 1994 and finished 7-3 last year.

Morton is 23-20-2 at Friona.

Friona's climb to the top has been fueled by a potent running game and a rock-solid defense. The Chieftains also have 17 returning starters.

Friona is averaging 343 yards per game, including a season-high 477 yards in a 35-19 win over preseason co-favorite Amarillo River Road last week.

Quarterback Kyle Grimsley is in the controls of the Chieftains' wishbone offense. Grimsley has rushed for 385 yards and passed for 411.

Tailback Andy Kendrick leads Friona with 405 yards rushing. Diminutive but sure-handed Angel Vega is Grimsley's favorite target with 272 yards on 12 catches.

"They're probably the best balanced team we've faced," Wood said. "They're real hard to read by formation. We have

**NM man killed in accident**

An Albuquerque man was killed in a two-car collision Thursday on U.S. Highway 84.

Nick Romero, 56, was killed instantly when the small convertible car he was driving slid out of control and into the path of a 1995 Chevrolet pickup driven by local veterinarian Steve Kennedy, according to the police report. The accident occurred about two miles west of Muleshoe.

Romero was pronounced dead at the scene shortly before 2:30 p.m. by Bailey County Judge Marilyn Cox.

Kennedy, 40, was transported to the Muleshoe Area Medical Center and treated for a broken foot, according to Department of Public Trooper L.T. Kirk.

Alcohol was believed to be a factor for Romero's part in the accident, according to Kirk.

An autopsy was performed on Romero Friday in Lubbock.

Romero was traveling east on Highway 84 when he ran off the shoulder, overcompensated trying to return to the road, and slid across the median divider and into the path of Kennedy, who was headed west.

The pickup hit the 1993 Mercury Capri flush in the driver's door.

Kirk said an air bag probably prevented Kennedy from more serious injury.

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## Students given tips during National Fire Safety Week

Local students are getting into the fire-safety act.

The Muleshoe Fire Department, in conjunction with National Fire Safety Week, hosted a fire safety program Tuesday for Dillman second-graders and Deshazo students in third through fifth grade at the Earl M. Ladd Fire Station.

"We hope to get these kids acquainted with the role of the Muleshoe Fire Department," said J.O. Parker, a firefighter who helped run the program.

Parker, better known to kids as Sparky, is a larger-than-life dalmation who serves as mascot for the local fire department. Sparky showed the children stop, drop, and roll, the proper procedure for preventing burns when a person catches on fire. Firefighters explained how knowing such procedures can help save lives.

Along with Sparky's demonstration, children watched videos on fire safety in the home. The video explained how common household objects like stoves, hot water

heaters, and even bathtubs should can be the sources of burns or fire.

Muleshoe Police Department officer Hector Sanchez also discussed the roles that the police and the fire department share.

"There are many more people in the fire department

than in the police department," Sanchez said. "The fire department helps us if we need people for things like finding a missing child."

After the videos, the students were given a tour of the fire station. They were also shown the trucks, as well as the gear that the fire fighters

wear while on the job.

"This program is essentially fire-prevention for kids," Parker said. "If we get the message to kids, then they can take it home. Then if they see something at home that they learned here, they can tell others in their family about it."

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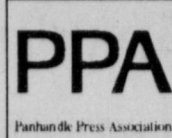

### DISTRICT ROUNDUP

Former District 2-3A members Friona and Dimmitt are tied for the lead at 2-0.

Friona whipped Amarillo River Road, 35-19, in a matchup of preseason favorites while Dimmitt rallied for a 31-10 win at Sanford-Fritch.

#### Friona 35, River Road 19

The Chieftains (4-1) used the big play to beat River Road. Friona scored on three plays of 40 yards or more.

Friona took a 13-0 lead in the second quarter on a 5-yard run by Shane Blackburn and a 41-yard run by Andy Kendrick (150 yards on 18 carries).

Quarterback Kyle Grimsley's 80-yard touchdown on an option keeper one play after River Road (1-4, 1-1) scored gave Friona a 21-7 lead. Rowdy Lundegreen scored the first of his two short touchdown runs to make it 21-13 at the half.

Friona upped its lead to 28-13 early in the third quarter on Grimsley's 53-yard pass to Angel Vega.

Friona outgained River Road, 477-321. The Chieftains rushed for 357 yards while Grimsley completed 4-of-8 for 120 yards. Lundegreen completed 10-of-17 passes for 136 yards.

#### Dimmitt 31, Sanford-Fritch 10

Dimmitt (4-1) won its fourth-straight game, rushing for 211 yards in the second half while scoring 24 unanswered points.

Fullback Beau Hill rushed for 154 yards and halfback Zack Matthews added 104 yards and two touchdowns for Dimmitt.

Sanford-Fritch (2-3, 1-1) took a 10-7 halftime lead on a 1-yard

Dimmitt rushed for 360 yards and finished with 422 total yards. Sanford-Fritch finished with 239 yards, 32 yards in the second half.

#### Tulia 14, Perryton 10

Jerry Patton blocked a Perryton punt that teammate Chris Barrow recovered in the end zone for a touchdown with 2:10 left in the game to give Tulia a 14-10 win.

Patton made another big play two minutes later when he intercepted a Ranger pass on the 1-yard line on the game's final play.

Roy Gonzalez rushed for 74 yards and a 4-yard touchdown that gave Tulia (2-3, 1-1) a 7-0 lead in the first quarter.

Cody Sunday gave Perryton (1-4, 0-2) a 10-7 in third quarter with a 46-yard touchdown run. Sunday finished with 122 yards. Perryton held a 211-154 edge in total yards.

### Lady Mules impressive third at Lubbock Invite

LUBBOCK — The Muleshoe girls cross country team finished third Saturday at the prestigious Lubbock Invitational at Mae Simmons Park.

Yvette Barrios powered Clint to the Division I (Class 1-3A), blistering the hilly

two-mile course in a time of 11 minutes and 35.2 seconds, 28 seconds ahead of her closest competitor.

The Lady Mules showed they stacked up well against other district and regional teams in a meet that featured 59 teams

and more than 450 runners just in Division I.

Clint placed two runners in the top five and finished with 76 points. Brownfield, with three runners in the top 20, was second with 122 points.

Muleshoe was third with 155

points, handily defeating six other District 1-3A teams. Dimmitt was second among district teams, finishing seventh with 288 points.

### Lazbuddie survives upset bid . . .

LAZBUDDIE — Rallying from a 12-point halftime deficit, Lazbuddie remained unbeaten with a 24-20 non-district win over El Paso Jesus Chapel.

Lazbuddie (5-0), the state's fourth-ranked six-man team, sidestepped the upset when Adam St. Clair scored on a 17-yard screen pass with a little more than five minutes left in the game.

"Trailing 20-8 at halftime woke us up," Lazbuddie coach Mark Scisson said. "I think the players knew if they didn't get after it in the second half, they were fixing to get beat."

Longhorn junior Chris Smith caught a pair of touchdown passes from Justin St. Clair. Smith has caught 17 passes for 283 yards and seven touchdowns this year. He's also scored twice on interception returns.

Scisson has inserted sophomore Josh Morris to the starting lineup, bumping senior Justin St. Clair to running back, giving the Longhorns two quarterbacks on the field at the same time.

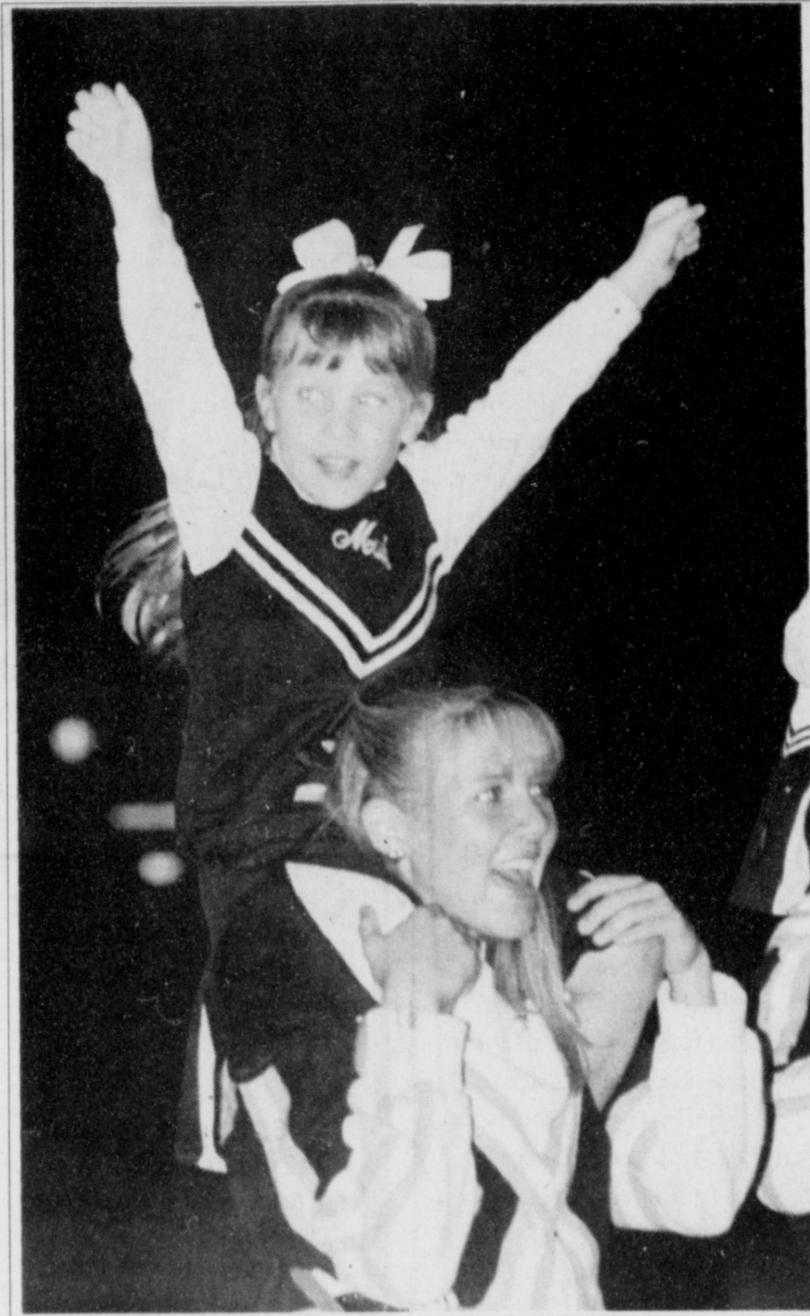

Lazbuddie has fashioned its 5-0 mark behind a balanced offense averaging an area-best 416 yards per game.

Strong-armed senior Justin St. Clair leads the Longhorn stampede. St. Clair has rushed for 641 yards and completed 42 of 71 passes for 590 yards and eight touchdowns.

At 6-2, 200 pounds, St. Clair has the kind of arm that forces teams to defend the whole field and the strength to bowl over would-be tacklers.

"He's the key," James said. "But I don't think you can shut down that type of athlete. You just hope to limit his opportunities."

Three Way counters with

the quickness of senior Jesus Perez, who Scisson feels is among the best athletes in the district.

"He scares me the most," Scisson said.

Three Way, averaging 379 yards a game, likes to pound the ball at teams running out of the tight set.

Perez has rushed for 584 yards completed 24 of 45 passes for 505 yards and eight touchdowns.

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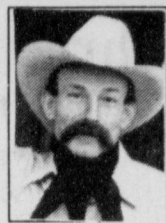


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# Yogurt as a meat substitute

Or, "Kids, we've got this great egg shell compote. Better than McNuggets any day. It's rolled in oyster shells and sauteed in cod liver oil."

If yogurt can be a meat substitute than how 'bout dried poultry waste, barbershop sweepings and fricasseed toenail clippings?

I hope the USDA sees the big hole in their logic. Yogurt is not meat. Neither is cheese, Ovaltine, spinach, egg shells, oyster shells, ice cream or cafe' au lait. ## GED requirements changing

Beginning Jan. 1, 1997, the national GED Testing Service (GEDTS) will require that all states comply with higher minimum scores on the General Education Development (GED) test.

Therefore, the Texas State Board of Education has approved new passing standards for candidates earning the Texas Certificates of high school equivalency beginning Jan. 1, 1997.

The new standards require that examinees make an average of "45" on the battery of GED tests, with no score less than "40" on individual parts of the test. Therefore, it is strongly suggested that anyone who has taken one or more of the GED tests complete the battery of tests before Jan. 1, 1997. After that time, the new standards will apply.

The Texas Education Code limits GED testing of persons under age 18, with the following exceptions:

■ Seventeen-year olds may take the GED (1) if they are enrolled in an approved school GED preparation program or (2) if they are not enrolled in school and have parental or guardian permission.

■ Sixteen-year-olds may take the GED if recommended by a public agency that has court-ordered supervision or custody of the person taking the test.

GED tests are administered at the Region 17 ESC Adult Education Office located at the Matthews Community Learning Center, 417 North Akron, Lubbock.

The Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District has completed their 55th year in Bailey County. E.L. Smith and N.C. Moore, County Directors at that time, submitted a petition requesting that a District be formed and approved by the State of Texas. On March 20th, 1941 the Secretary of State for the State of Texas certified the formation of Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District. It was number 111 and included all of Bailey County. As a legal sub-division of State Government, they requested the Soil Conservation Service to provide the technical assistance for the District. The Soil Conservation Service is now renamed Natural Resources Conservation Service, but still provides the technical assistance on soil and water erosion problems. Today there are over 200 Districts state wide working toward the same goal of wise use of all natural resources. Assistance is voluntary and private property rights are strictly observed.

The Blackwater Valley SWCD is divided into 5 zones with each zone having a director. Each zone director must own land within the zone served and services a four year term. The director's attend monthly meetings at the NRCS office in Muleshoe. These meetings are held the second Monday of the month at 8 AM. All meetings are open to the public.

Present directors are: Ernest Ramm, Zone 1, Nick Bamert, Zone 2, Sharon Dale - Zone 3, Larry Clawson, Zone 4, and Johnny Furgeson, Zone 5.

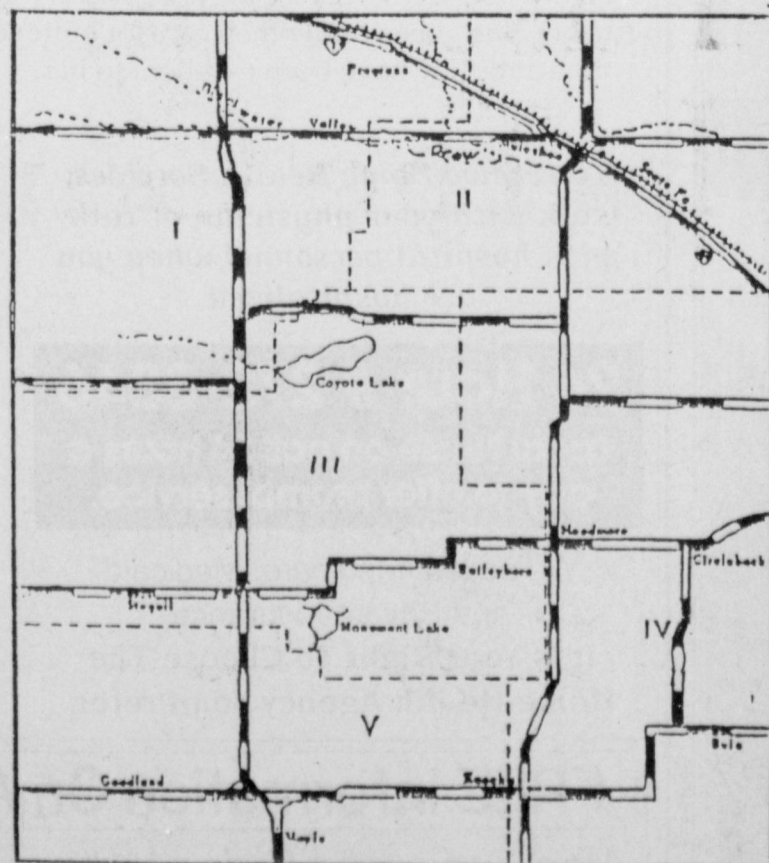
