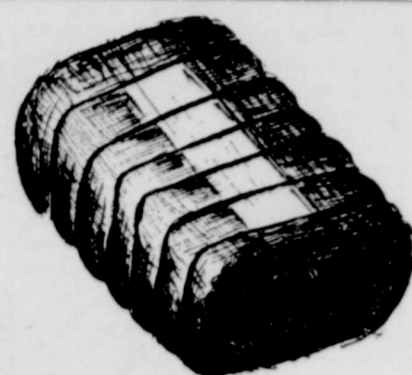


Citizens To Vote Saturday on Sales Tax

Saturday the residents of the City of Silverton will go to the polls to decide whether or not a sales tax will be levied in the city.

The proceeds from a 1% city sales tax would be used primarily for street maintenance and repair that is required in the near future. Approximately \$22,000 is needed immediately for street repair.

Some 64 blocks of city paving is to be seal coated soon.

Councilmen also hope that residents will adopt the city sales tax to make possible the purchase of badly needed equipment for repairing the city's streets and alleys. For years the city has been needing a grader with which to keep streets and alleys repaired without having to wait until a rain when the County Commissioners can bring a maintainer to town.

The cost of keeping up the city's streets continues to rise along with everything else. It cost the city about \$300 to repair the intersection east of the First Baptist Church—but it needed it badly, and there are several other intersections which need it also. When the paving crew was working on the highway, the councilmen inquired as to how much it would cost to retop the one block west of Nance's Food Store, and the price quoted was \$1,400.00. They didn't have it done because they just didn't feel that sufficient money was available to do it.

Wouldn't it be nice to dream of a day when all of Silverton's streets could be curbed and guttered? This is the only real answer to the drainage problems that plague city residents, especially on the south end of town.

A city sales tax would apply only to those items already covered by the state sales tax. Food, drugs, etc. would not be taxed. Collection and remittance of the tax would not require additional work on the part of the local merchants, because the tax would be collected and remitted to the state along with the state's portion of the sales tax. Once each quarter the state comptroller's office would compute and remit the proper amount to the city in one check.

The sales tax is a fair tax. Everyone—whether he is a property owner or not—pays a small portion of the tax.

Wouldn't it be worth contributing one penny everytime you spend a dollar here to help keep Silverton's streets nice? You are helping keep up just about every other city in which you spend a dollar today, so why not do it for your hometown, too?

School's Free Lunch Policy Announced

The Silverton Schools today announced that they would offer a lunch policy for Silverton School children unable to pay the full price.

Local school officials have adopted a family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Families falling within these scales or those suffering from unusual circumstances or hardships are urged to apply for free or reduced price lunches for their children. They may do so by filling in the application forms sent home in a letter to parents. Additional copies are available at the principal's office at the school. Applications may be submitted any time during

the school year. The form itself is simple to complete and requests information needed to determine economic need based on the income and number of persons in the family and any unusual circumstances or hardships which affect the family's ability to pay for school lunches. The information provided on the application will be confidential and will be used only for the purpose of determining eligibility.

Under the provision of the policy, applications will be reviewed and eligibility determined in the principal's office. If a parent is dissatisfied with the ruling of the principal, he may make a request either orally or in writing, for a hearing to appeal the decision. O.

The policy also provides that there will be no identification or discrimination against any student unable to pay the full cost of a lunch.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the office of the school's secretary where it may be reviewed by any interested patron.

Eligibility determinations are made on a family basis; that is, all children in the same family attending schools under the jurisdiction of the same school authority are to receive the same benefits, a free lunch or a reduced price lunch, not some a free lunch and some a reduced price lunch.

Home Notes

FOOD PRESERVATION

I have a number of good pamphlets on canning and freezing foods you may find useful now. I also have information on pickling foods. CONTAINER PLANTS

Have you wondered why your container plants do not look as nice as you would like for them to? There are two main reasons

for their poor appearance —improper watering and nutrient deficiency. When watering container-grown plants, apply enough so that it runs through the drainage hole in the bottom of the pot. Tap water usually contains some form of salt which tends to accumulate in the soil unless adequate amounts of water are applied to leach out these soluble salts. Discard the water that accumulates in the tray beneath the pot as this contains any salt that is leached from the soil.

Once the soil in the container is thoroughly wet, allow the soil to become rather dry before watering again. If soil is kept saturated, the roots will be damaged from lack of oxygen.

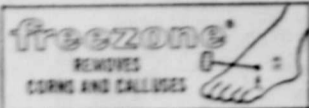
Fertilizer should be applied frequently and in small amounts. The soluble fertilizers usually available in garden stores and nurseries are convenient to apply and are very effective.

While clay pots do provide good aeration, much less water is needed when plants are grown in plaster or other non-porous containers. A mulch of coarse bark or gravel on the surface of the soil in the container will reduce evaporation and prevent compaction of the soil.

A little extra care will pay good dividends resulting in attractive plants that will add much to the enjoyment of your container plants.

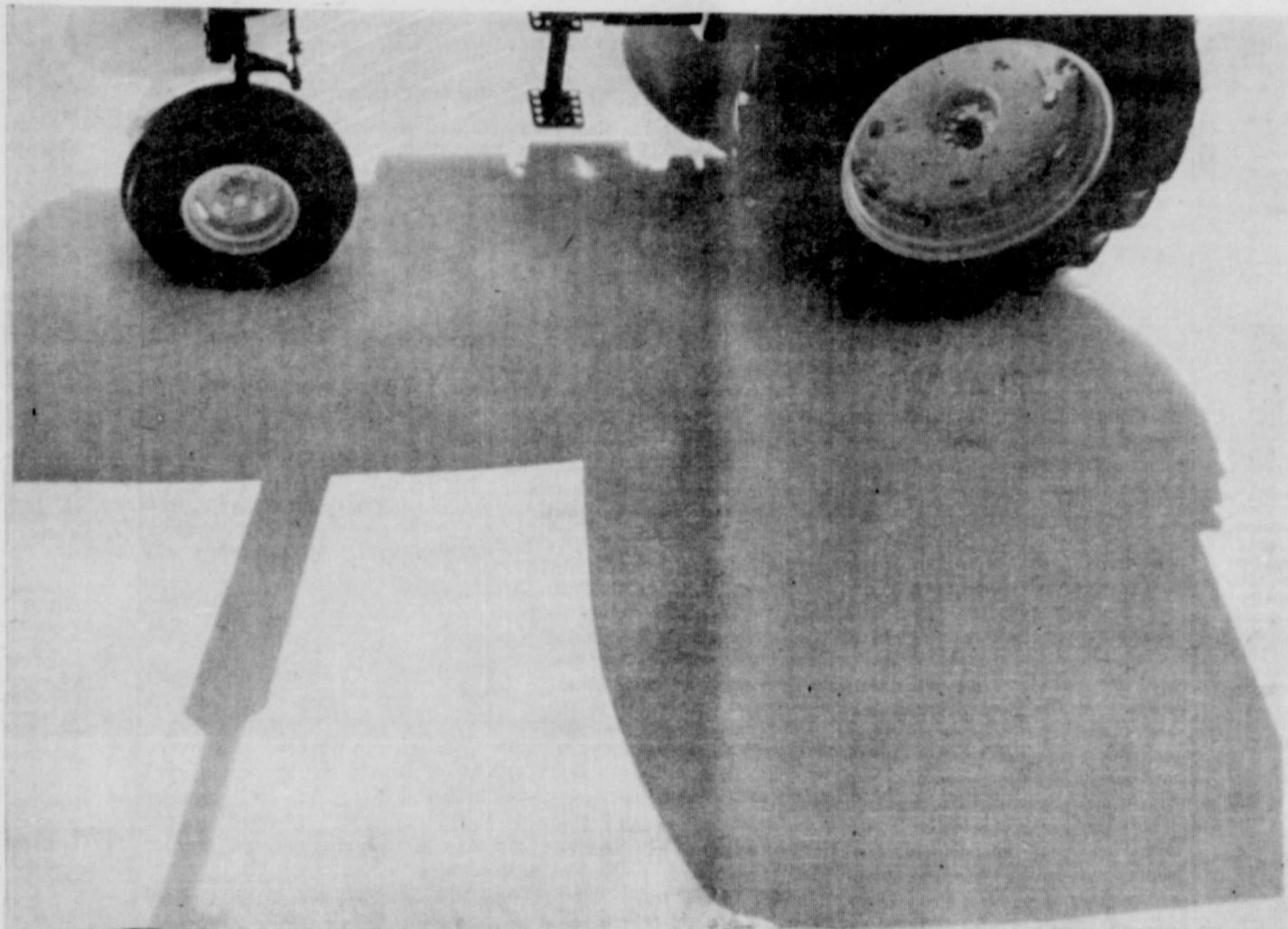

... until cold weather.
... Animals should be inspected
... as often as possible and

all wounds, regardless of how
large or small, should be treated
with a larvacide and insect repellent.
(4) Animals should be sprayed
or dipped in one of the recom-

mended organo-phosphate systemic
insecticides when animals are
gathered for whatever purpose.
Although the battle against
screwworms is apparently lost this
year, we need to begin thinking a-
bout next year. A United States-
Mexico Screwworm Eradication
Program is at least two years a-
way. It is thus necessary to push
screwworms as far south as pos-
sible this fall and winter in order
to minimize another spring build-
up next year in the southwestern
United States.

The fly production facility at
Mission will remain at maximum
production at least until this fall
in the light of the present out-
break, even though our annual
budget does not allow for this con-
tinued high level of spending.

Due to the concentration of the
sterile fly drops in the southern
portion of the state and the ceas-
ing of drops in our area, produc-
ers are urged to keep an even
closer eye on their livestock and
to treat all wounds as soon as pos-
sible.

Six more cases of screwworms
have been confirmed in Briscoe
County during the past two weeks,
bringing the total to eight cases
which have been identified. There
are probably others which were
not sent to the screwworm lab in
Mission for identification. Every-
one should continue sending sam-
ples to the laboratory for identi-
fication.

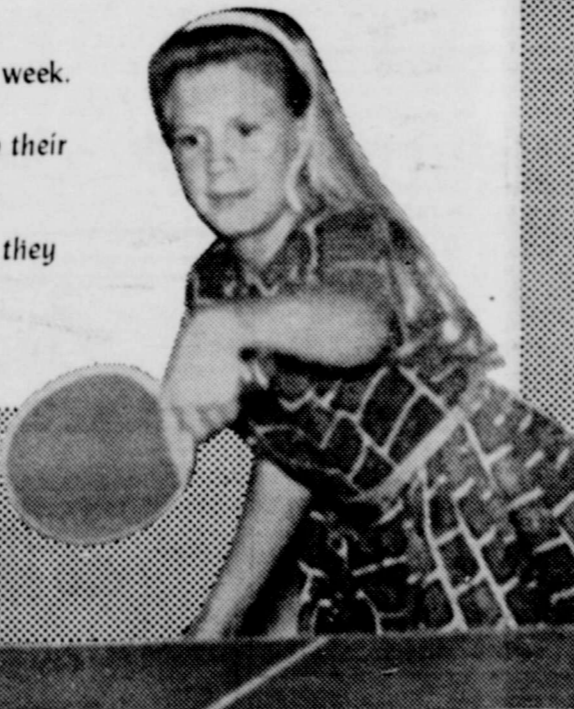
None of us can make our best contribution to life unless we take care of our physical selves. The right kind of recreation renews the body, mind, and spirit.

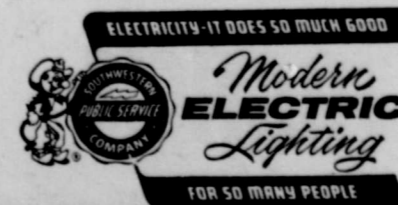


